Joe G. Chapman Buried Saturday In Services Here

Native Ozonan Died Friday Of Heart Ailment

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday from the First Baptist Church here for Joe G. Chapman, 61, a native of Ozona, who died in a San Angelo hospital Friday morning from a heart ailment following an attack of pneumonia suffered a few weeks earlier. He had been in ill health for some time.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Harry Trulove, pastor, with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under direction of the Cody Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Frank McMullan, Jr., Chas. E. Davidson, III, J. B. Parker, J. G. Hufstetler, Sam Perner, Bud Cox, P. C. Perner and Bill Friend.

Mr. Chapman was born Sept. 1, 1898, in Ozona, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Chapman, Crockett county pioneer family.

Reared in Ozona, he became a member of the Baptist Church when a young man. He was a member of the Ozona Masonic Lodge. He married the former Estelle Henning of Del Rio.

After working for a number of years in the copper mines in Arizona, Mr. Chapman returned to Ozona with his family in 1925 to accept employment with the Illinois Pipeline Co. He worked for the Illinois Pipeline Co. on a Crockett county station for ten years. He later engaged in ranching for a time and then operated the Ozona Recreation Club until his retirement a few years ago.

Surviving are the widow of Ozona; four sons, Joe B. and James Chapman of Ozona, Frank Chapman of Fort Stockton and Kent Chapman of New York; two granddaughters, and six sisters, Mrs. Ralph Watson, Mrs. Sam Cox and Mrs. Eldred Roach, all of Ozona, Mrs. J. Walker of Douglas, Ariz., Mrs. Dan Kidd of San Angelo and Mrs. Bill Foster of Lamesa, Texas.

Close Scores, Extra Periods Mark Team's Luckless Season

The Ozona Lions wound up their 1959-60 basketball season in Big Lake last Friday night as they dropped a 53 to 44 decision to the Big Lake Owls and in so doing wound up in the district 8-A cellar.

Despite the fact that the Lions made most of their games close and played two contests into overtime, the Lions managed to win but one district contest this season and finished behind Menard which had two wins for the season.

Big Lake jumped ahead early in the first quarter Friday and then after the Lions pulled into close contention in the second period 21 to 22 the Owls jumped to 34 before the Lions could manage a point and that was the game.

Herbie Taylor hit seventeen points for the Owls but got good balanced scoring from his mates while the Lions, weakened by illness, got a good game from Johnny Jones who had 15 and Carl Montgomery who had 10 but beyond that only Phillip Carnes was able to score to any extent.

Jim Williams, Bill Meinecke, and Jim Freeman sat in the stands due to illness and injury and the loss of Williams in particular was felt.

Final standings for the season left Junction undefeated as district champions for the second straight year. Sonora took second place with two defeats, Big Lake lost five to finish third, Menard dropped six to finish fourth and the Lions won one in finishing last.

On the brighter side for the Lions the Ozona B team crushed Big Lake's reserves 61 to 32 as Coach H. O. Hoover used all of his squadmen extensively throughout the contest.

Soph Hal Long, even though hampered by a sprained ankle in recent work outs, was having a field day at the expense of the Owls until pulled with just two minutes gone in the third period. Long had 17 points to lead all scorers but the Cubs got 15 points from there on it was a rout.

The Cubs jumped into a comfortable lead early in the second quarter but saw the Owl reserves cut deeply into that at the half as the Lions led 22 to 19.

In the third period the Lions scored 14 points before Big Lake managed to hit a free throw and from there on it was a rout.

Art Kyle and Robert Cox along with Robert Montgomery all played well for the reserves who played most of the last half.

A Crockett County 4-H Grass Judging Team won the State Grass Judging Contest at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition last Saturday. Team members were Pierce Miller, second over-all high individual; P. L. Childress, third over-all high individual; and Frank Childress, fourth over-all high individual. This same team was 1959 State Champion 4-H Grass Judging Team in the State 4-H Contest held at Texas A&M College last year.

The team was presented a beautiful plaque as champion grass judging team and team members received silver medals for their high individual performances. Presentations were made at the afternoon performance of the rodeo in the Joe Freeman Coliseum.

A second Crockett County 4-H Grass Judging Team won third place in the contest. Team members were Bill Jacoby, eighth high over-all individual; Bill Williams and Bob Childress. The team was presented a banner and Bill Jacoby received a bronze medal for his individual performance. Team alternates were Jay Miller and Jimmy Baggett.

Ward County 4-H teams placed second and fifth in the contest and Motley County won fourth place. This was the first time that a grass judging contest has been held at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition with separate contests for 4-H and FFA grass judging teams. In previous contests, 4-H and FFA teams competed in the same contest.

Although they outscored the first place winning Crockett County 4-H team in the identical contest, the Ozona FFA Chapter's grass judging team found the competition much stiffer in the FFA division and emerged in sixth place in the contest in which 30 FFA teams from over the state participated.

The FFA team scored a total of 1023 points against 1005 scored by the 4-H team, but five other teams, Gatesville, Roaring Springs, Richland Springs, Teague and Tioga, in that order, outscored them. First place Gatesville scored 1130 points.

One Ozona FFA team member, Bob Cooke, placed 5th in the high individual scoring with a total of 380 out of a possible 400 points. One member of the Gatesville team scored a perfect 400.

The contest will be decided at the annual school trustee election which will be held this year on Saturday, April 2.

Funeral Mon. In San Angelo For Knifing Victim

Silas Benson, Jr. Buried; Joe Willis Held On Murder Count

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon in San Angelo for Silas Benson, Jr., 31, who died in his pickup a block from the Crockett County Hospital where he had driven after receiving a fatal knife slash across his throat in a fight at the Harlem Cafe on the opposite side of Ozona. Tuesday night.

Services were held in the Independent Methodist Church in San Angelo with the Rev. F. D. Crenshaw officiating. Burial was in Delta Memorial Park.

Joe Willis, 39, Ozona Negro shine boy, is being held in the Crockett County jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond set in justice court where murder charges were filed against him following the Tuesday night knifing of Benson. The charge will be investigated by the Crockett County grand jury, possibly at the April term of 112th district court which convenes here the first Monday in April.

Benson, employed as a ranch hand on the J. B. Parker ranch, is survived by his father, Silas Benson, Sr., of Ozona; his mother, Mrs. Rosie Williams of San Antonio; one sister, Mrs. Oleva Sanders of San Francisco, Calif., and two brothers, Carnell Benson of Seattle, Wash., and Shannon Benson of Kerrville.

DECLARATION FOR INDEPENDENCE

Declaring that "there is no such thing as world law", Clarence Manion, vice-chairman of For America, former professor of international law at Notre Dame University and dean of the College of Law, has assured the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that "the rule of law in the world" under the International Court of Justice as urged by President Eisenhower is "sheer fantasy".

Testifying against repeal of the Connally Amendment (which protects the US against the compulsory jurisdiction of the World Court in domestic matters), Dean Manion said:

"We are asked to give the International Court unreserved jurisdiction over all American affairs because of the good influential example that this surrender will provide for the cause of world peace. Although the Communist plunderbund has refused to submit itself to any part of the jurisdiction of the International Court, it has nevertheless placed two of its judges, so called, on the 15 judge International Court where they are now ready

and eager to sit in judgment upon the right of the US to retain its naval base at Guantanamo, Cuba, to keep the American flag flying in the Panama Canal Zone and to protect its expensive ring of military bases in half a hundred countries of the world."

In concluding his protest against the repealer sponsored by Hubert Humphrey and endorsed by the President, Dean Manion urged the senators to be realistic. "Let us face it," he said. "Neither peace nor law is possible for a world that is locked in a death struggle between freedom and Communism. We can think about "world peace through world law" only after the diabolical menace of the Communist conspiracy has been swept from the face of the earth. In the meantime we will have all we can do to preserve this country and its freedom - protecting Constitutional system from complete destruction. This is no time to let down our guard. Senate Resolution No. 94 should be defeated."

This fantastic proposal constitutes more than letting down our guard. It is surrender. If the senate would destroy America it has only to pass this measure.

"TO BE CONTINUED"

The ghost of Povl Bang-Jensen continues to haunt the UN. The mortal remains of the Danish statesman and UN secretary discovered four days after his reported disappearance — beside a frequently used path in a suburban New York park, were swiftly consigned to the grave under the police dictum of "an obvious case of suicide."

Since Thanksgiving day, when his body was found with a revolver in his right hand a suicide note in his wallet, those who knew him best have insisted he would not have killed himself and rejected the "evidence" as planted.

In the current issue of USA magazine, Publisher Alice Wodener presents a memorandum written by Bang-Jensen on November 30, 1957 — a few days before suspension from the UN for his refusal to reveal the names of Hungarians who had testified on the Russian slaughter of the freedom fighters in 1956.

"My wife has . . . insisted that I should inform a few of my friends" he wrote, "that under no circumstances would I commit suicide. I have done so, though reluctantly, since I fear my friends might think I am getting a little dramatic . . . (suicide) would be contrary to my whole nature and to my religious convictions."

Meantime, Publisher Sam D. Melson of the Chronicle, Jacksonville, Fla., reports that Lt. Gen.

George E. Stratemeyer, USAF (Ret), who commanded US airmen in Korea, and his wife, Anna Lee Stratemeyer, have filed a similar document with the Sheriff of Orange County, Fla., the Chief in Winter Park, where they reside, and the FBI in Washington.

As quoted by the Chronicle, the Stratemeyer statements reads:

"In our opinion Povl Bang-Jensen did not commit suicide. Anyone as courageous as he would never take his own life.

"We have always been suspicious of the deaths of Secretary of Defense James Forrestal, General George Patton and Senator Joseph McCarthy.

"Therefore we believe it is time for patriots to take steps to protect themselves.

"We have done the following: We have notified our lawyer that we have no intention of committing suicide. That if we are found dead under peculiar circumstances, or should disappear, we want him to insist upon a thorough investigation . . .

"We urge all patriots who are fighting to preserve our Republic to do likewise without delay."

The neighbors in Winter Park, who have known the Stratemeyers since the General's retirement, do not think them "odd nor off the beam", says Publisher Melson. Neither did those who knew Bang-Jensen or Forrestal or Patton or McCarthy. The common denominator could be courage and honor — qualities that interfere with the Communist conspiracy that is not-so-slowly hemming us in.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

A sharp break in cattle prices is not likely in 1960 but we are entering a period which calls for wariness, is the latest word from John McHaney, extension economist. The small increase in cattle slaughter expected for 1960, together with a large hog slaughter, will take the bloom off cattle prices.

Prices of cows and feeder cattle will likely show greater declines than fed cattle, said McHaney. Seasonal price changes will likely be evident in these lower grades and a major part of the year's expected decline will probably be felt during the late summer and fall. Fed cattle prices in the spring of 1960 may average a little below a year ago with little prospect for price advances before summer.

On January 1, 1959 there were

96.8 million head of cattle in the United States and during 1959 producers probably added over five million head of this number—setting a new record on January 1, 1960. McHaney said some economists have estimated the January 1960 figure at somewhere between 101 and 103 million head. This expansion in numbers will result in an increase in slaughter and a decrease in prices; however, the increase in slaughter and the decrease in prices is expected to be moderate in 1960 unless a drought should occur causing heavier marketings.

If cattle numbers expand at a fast pace, there is a possibility numbers will reach 115 million head by 1964—making available 94½ pounds of beef per person. McHaney emphasized that an output of this size would demoralize beef prices.

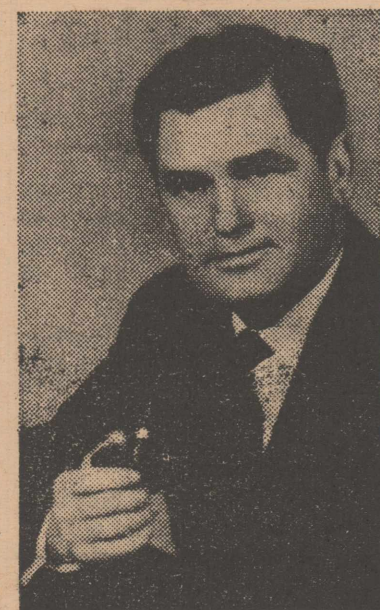

Steve Preslar Comments

In our last discussion we saw that the trial judge determines the law applicable to each case before him, whether is it tried before a jury or before the Court sitting without a jury. The next question is, "What laws does he apply?", and for the answer to that we need to look briefly to the laws by which we are governed daily.

These can be broken down into three groups: our constitutional law, statute laws and what we call the common law. Our constitutional law is derived from our federal and state constitutions, and those documents are best described as being contracts or agreements entered into between the people and their government in which the people consent to be governed and give the government certain rights and reserve to themselves certain rights. Our statute laws are those enacted by the legislative branches of our government. Our common law is that great body of law which has grown up through the years by custom and usage; it is what we have come to know and understand to be right or wrong in our relations as one citizen to another in a civilized society. It has been interpreted and recognized by the courts down through the years until it now has the binding force of law.

During the course of a trial the judge decides the law as it applies to each legal question that is raised, which, depending on the case, may involve construing the constitution, a Statute, or the common law — each a serious matter. No one goes to court for a lark, and the interpretation given to the law by the judge needs to be a fearless, fair, informed decision — a just decision. It needs to follow and be consistent with the law, for otherwise we would never know what the law is and how to arrange our business dealings and conduct our affairs.

It is not enough that a Judge should know the law — he must love and respect it.

You be my judge . . . I ask to be yours.

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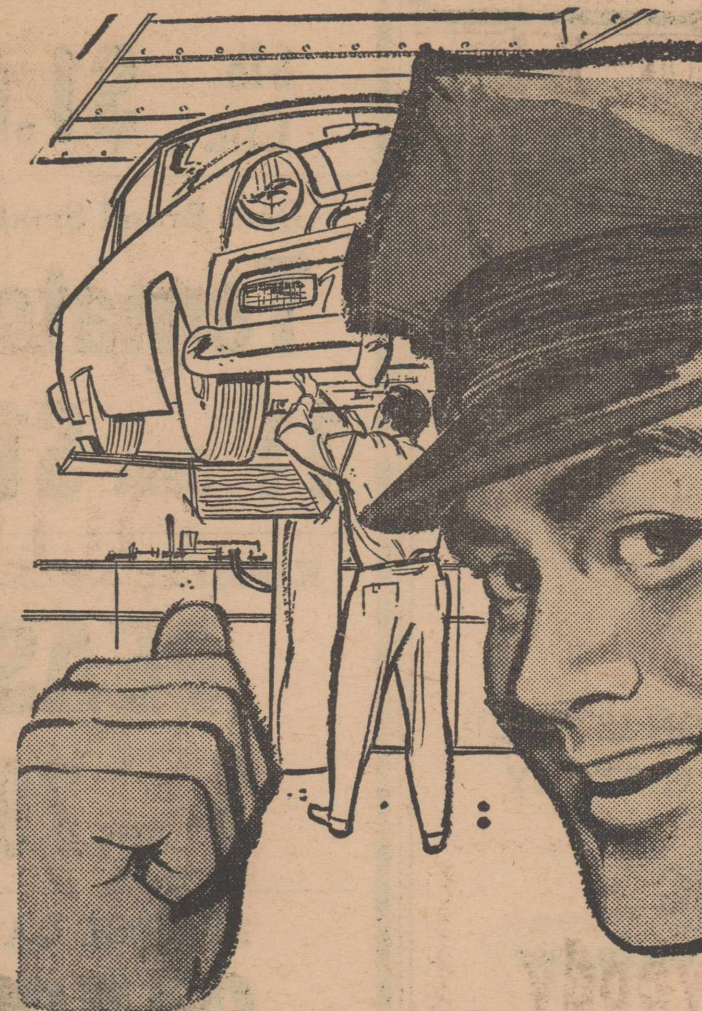

The idea backfired though. After hearing the second patient's story, the doctor stared into space a few minutes and then murmured "I can't understand it, that's the third time I'm heard that story today."

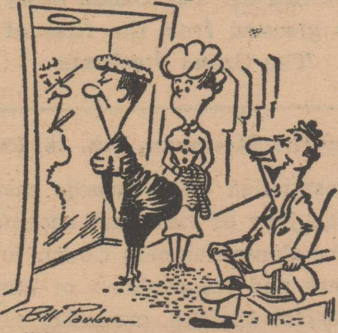

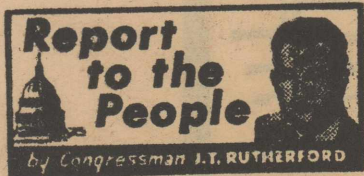

Report to the People

THE CATERING TO Communists by Cuba's Castro within a 40-minute, or less, trip from the Continental United States has become a matter of concern throughout the nation, and particularly in Washington. The grave situation was emphasized with the recent signing of a trade agreement under which Cuba will sell Russia a great deal of sugar. This has brought on discussion within the U. S. relating to our own sugar agreement with Cuba, and charges have been made that our government is subsidizing the Cuban Government by sugar purchases at prices well above the world market figure.

Someone said long ago, and I subscribe to the theory, that given the facts on a given subject the American people are capable of reaching a judicious decision in the national interest. Being as concerned as anyone over the Castro-Cuba situation I have made an effort to obtain the facts relating to our sugar agreements

with that nation. In doing so, I checked closely with the appropriate legislative committees and export-import officials within the Department of State and Agriculture, who administer the law. I hope in this Report to present the facts gathered, stripped of their sensationalism, as objectively as possible.

IN THE FIRST place, the U. S. Government has not purchased sugar from Cuba in almost a decade. To understand what is transpiring and what has transpired, we must go back to 1934, when Cuba was the only source of sugar in sufficient quantities to supplement our domestic production in meeting U. S. requirements. At that time, Congress passed an act permitting our government to buy sugar from Cuba when we needed it and setting an import quota under which private industry in this nation could purchase Cuban sugar. The Act has been several times extended, the last time being in December of 1956, and this latest extension expires December 31, 1960.

As with most trade agreements the Act sets a maximum import quota but no minimum. In other words, private industry may import up to a certain amount of

sugar each year, but is not required to import a single pound if they so elect. For the past few years, the quota has been set at roughly three and one-half million tons annually and the private importers have each year imported the maximum or near-maximum amount. The Act passed by Congress does not establish a price at which purchases must be made. The State Department, in administering the Act, along with the advice of the Agriculture Department and after consultation with private importing firms, does establish a figure relative to the world market price which the U. S. will pay. The figure fluctuates within certain boundaries, depending on world market conditions, Cuban supply, U. S. need and other complex factors. Such an arrangement has assured our having an ample sugar-import source in times of emergency, as a preferred customer.

AT PRESENT, prices paid by private importers are higher than the world market but due to transportation costs and other factors involved, they obviously feel it is to their economic advantage to continue purchasing near-maximum quotas and, after all, they are not required to purchase any.

When the US really got the best of it was during World War II. Faced with a serious sugar shortage, we contracted for the entire Cuban crop for the duration at prices well below the world market. At the outbreak of the Korean War when world market prices skyrocketed we bought 600,000 tons of Cuban sugar again at prices considerably below world market. That was in 1950 and, as previously stated, was the last time the U. S. Government has purchased sugar from Cuba. Thus the role of the government is to act as an agent to allow private industry to import Cuban sugar, since private firms or individuals cannot sign international trade agreements. President Eisenhower said this week that State Department officials are studying the matter but have reached no decision as to what to recommend to Congress in connection with the expiration of the Sugar Act this year. With several other nations eager to become our sugar customers, chances are the Cuban import quota may be reduced and a price more favorable to American industry sought. Although this matter is admittedly too complex to cover in detail here, I have tried to fairly present the basic facts and hope it will help your consideration of a much misunderstood situation.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER'S foreign aid requests to Congress this week totaled \$4.1 billion for the fiscal year 1961 program, an increase of \$240 million over his FY 1960 budget and the third largest request in his White House tenure.

In his message to Congress, Mr. Eisenhower said "there is no question but that the nation can afford the expenditures and must provide them." How strongly he feels about a liberal foreign aid program was pointed out at a recent press conference when the President said anyone who considers foreign aid as a giveaway program is "abysmally ignorant." In spite of this, almost certain reductions will be made by Congress. Without exception this has been the case with each of this foreign aid requests, and to date Congress has reduced the amount Mr. Eisenhower wanted for this program by almost \$5 billion.

The President refused, saying it was the Executive's business. Congress retorted it has a Constitutional responsibility to account for spending of public funds, and indicated the Members may get stubborn if the information isn't forthcoming. To date, the President has not released the information. Senator Mansfield of Montana, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, may have set the tone for debate when he said the new foreign aid request consists of "too much money and too little change in administration." The Eisenhower request for the new \$4.1 billion brings to a total of \$27 billion, 742 million the money he has asked for foreign aid during his stewardship of the Presidency.

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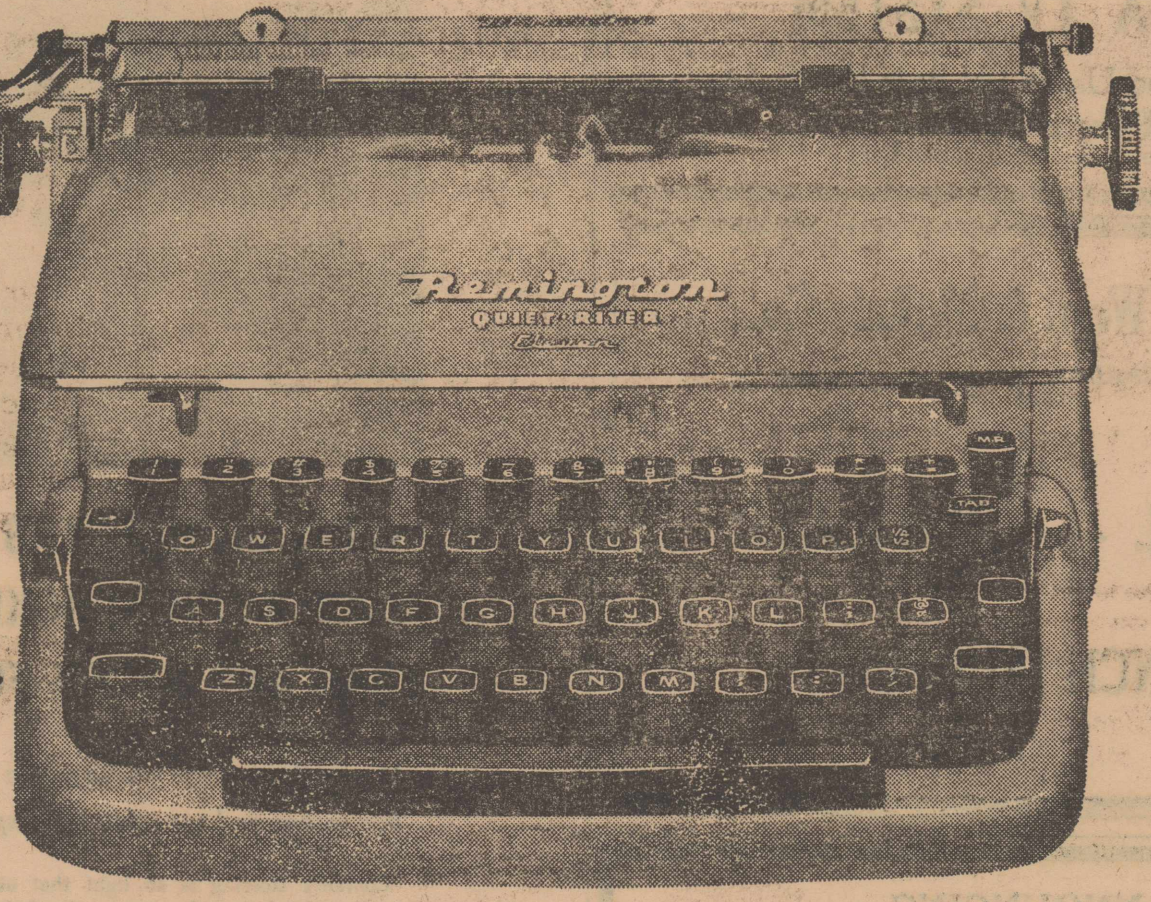
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Texas Sheepmen To Protest Lamb Imports At Washington Hearing

San Angelo — Two representatives of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association are to go to Washington next month for the hearing on lamb and mutton imports before the U. S. Tariff Commission. The hearing is to be held March 22.

Jerry Puckett of Fort Stockton, a director of the TS&GRA is to be one of the two, says L. M. Stephens of Lometa, TS&GRA president. The other remains to be selected.

Representatives of the National director of the TS&GRA of the Wool Growers' Association and other western grower associations affiliated with the National are also to attend the hearings.

It is also expected that the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, and probably the American National Cattlemen's Association, will have representatives at the hearings since cattlemen have expressed some concern over the possibility of more beef being imported into the U. S.

Imports of both frozen and live lamb from Australia have been on the increased and many growers feel these imports are definitely affecting the price of the domestic supply. They believe the domestic market will improve if imports are halted, or put on a quota basis.

TS&GRA directors have been urged through letters from the headquarters office here, to write their U. S. senators and representatives and explain the real situation and describe how these imports have affected the lamb and mutton trade in their particular areas.
