### HEIR BECOMES APPARENT

The press of the nation seems to have agreed, on the strength of a Phone 2-2594. bit of "musical chairs" by-play leaked from the hitherto newstight Gridiron dinner, and the White House press conference that followed that the President has given full and unqualified endorsement to Richard Nixon as the Republican standard-bearer.

Going back over the statements that are properly public, President Eisenhower has admitted having a "personal preference or even bias with respect to this upcoming Presidential race."

Asked later if his "bias" might favor Mr. Nixon, the President replied: "Was there any doubt in your mind?" The reporter's "No, sir," was drowned out in laughter

In reply to a cautiously worded query on the possible injury to a candidate by "another powerful figure speaking out on the same issue but perhaps not in perfect coordination," the President said:: "Now, so far as I know, there has never been between Mr. Nixon and myself, and that's who you are talking about . . a specific difference in our points of view on any important problem in seven years."

Mr. Eisenhower went on to assure the newsmen that there had been give and take in their meetings without important differences and he would not feel it necessary to check his words with the candidate before making a speech.

So there it was. The President had referred to the GOP candidatepresumptive by name at long lasteven though he didn't say (as once before). "My boy!"

Meanwhile, speculation on the Nixon running-mate, and whether his selection would be left to the Chicago convention as indicated by the Vice President, continued to build up among the politicos. "One GOP figure whose name is mentioned with increasing frequency for the No. 2 spot." reported the magazine HUMAN EVENTS, "is Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona . . . One Washington observer, recently returned from a visit to Republicans in many states across the land, reports that sentiment in favor of Goldwater is growing rapidly . . next to Nixon

Brig. Ben. Bonner Fellers, (USA Ret), one of the wartime aides who helped Gen. Douglas Mac-Arthur plan and execute the victorious, island - hopping "return" from New Zealand to fallen Bataan, told the House Foreign Affairs Committee the other day that there's plenty of money in the current defense budget, but it's being spent for too many of the wrong

Appearing as spokesman for the Citizens Foreign Aid Committee, a group that would cut our huge, ineffectual spending in this field, Gen. Fellers declared that \$10 billion of current military spending contributes nothing to modern defense and that the \$4.175 billion budgeted for foreign military and economic aid in fiscal 1961 will not improve American securi-

In case of war, our allies would accept neutrality rather than atomic extinction. Their five million troops and our overseas forces would be useless. Thus, we should cut the handouts in half at once and below the billion dollar mark in two years. Bringing our garrisons home would cut another billion to be spent where it would do more good.

Altogether, Gen. Fellers estimated that \$18 billion could be salvaged from mis-application and devoted to more and better missiles, nuclear propulsion systems for missiles, more Polaris submarines, jet bombers, rocket engines, space craft and anti-missile miss-

The Administration has said that nuclear war is "unthinkable". But here is one seasoned old soldier who is tough-minded enough to think it through. And we should assume that the Russians are thinking, too - real hard.



### Steve Preslar Comments

There have been so many inquiries about the Judge's pay bill which was put through the last Legislature that the writer feels obligated to comment on it. First, let us understand that District Judges are paid by the State of Texas, with some of them drawing additional pay from counties which they serve as Juvenile Judges. The Judge of the 112th District, which includes Pecos, Sutton, Crockett and Upton Counties, is paid \$12,000 per year, plus an additional \$3,000 per year as Ju-I am moving and would like venile Judge. The facts concerning to sell these. A real bargain. Come the pay bill in question are clear and simple and need to be understood by all. Shortly after Price Daniel appointed Hart Johnson to serve as Judge of the 112th District until the next election, the Legislature passed into law a bill permitting the four counties of the 112th District to add to the pay of the Judge of that District any amount up to \$8,500 per annum. This is clearly in addition to the \$12,000 per year State salary, but does not mention the \$3,000 as Juvenile Judge, so that one can not tell from a reading of the bill whether it permits a total pay of \$20,500 or \$23,500.

Steve Preslar, as a candidate for the office of District Judge, has made it clear that he is not seeking the office because of the increased pay permitted, and in addition to taking the position that the present pay is adequate, he believes that one-man bills are a waste of the Legislature's time and are not the proper way to fix judges' salaries. To attract good men adequate compensation must be paid, but in doing so the Legislature should set the pay of all judges at the same time, just as it acts (or fails to act) on the pay of all teachers and other groups at the same time. It is argued in some circles that a judge's pay is not a proper subject for comment in a judicial race. The writer disagrees and holds to the position that there should be nothing sacred or taboo about a judge's pay, and so far as mentioning it in a political campaign, it would seem to be a proper subject for that because, after all, a political campaign is put on in order that the people can hire a public official of their choice. The people not only do the hiring, but also do the paying, and some of them might just think it is good practice to know how much you are going to pay a man before you hire him. At any rate the bill in question is now a Law and all men are presumed to know the law, so that certainly there should be no secrecy sur-



### Notes From The County Agent's Office By Pete W. Jacoby

According to Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist, sooty mold disease occurs in all areas of Texas, but is likely to be more common in areas of high rainfall.

The black coating on the surface of leaves of infected plants is easily rubbed off by the hand. The coating is made up of a weft of black, fungus microscopic threads. The black mold is the result of certain fungi living on secreations (honey-dew) from insects. Scale, aphids and immature stages of white fly are mainly involved. Injury to the plant is indirect in that the black mold prevents sunlight from reaching the leaves. Too, the asthetic value of the plant is affected. Usually more of the black mold is on the top part of the leaf than the un-





and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or own-

At every fourth household, the census taker will seek the answers to additional questions covering population and housing characterisacs which are being asked of a 25 percent sample of the nation's population. The sample population questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be used for regulation ,investigation, or taxation.


