



THE FIELD of foreign policy is one fraught, in these days of "ultimate" military weapons, with booby-traps along the uncertain path toward peace.

Certainly President Eisenhower, his State Department representatives, the Congress and the people of the United States yearn for true, lasting peace-time conditions; certainly whatever actions are taken must be designed, in the minds of the officials having the responsibility of making foreign policy decisions to view the long range picture from the standpoint of our nation's best interests, and to fit the pattern of establishing a permanent, lasting peace.

It is, therefore, with much trepidation that one looks at our recent foreign policy in a critical light. It is easy to criticize without having an alternate plan to offer; it is easier still to criticize when one does not bear the lonely responsibility of, or possess the jurisdiction for, making the decisions that affect all mankind in the community of nations.

This is not a time when nations can afford to rattle sabers, to bluster and to threaten. But neither is it a time when nations who wish to maintain their traditional independence can vacillate and capitulate. Appeasement did not work when Chamberlain tried it with Adolph Hitler more than 20 years ago; it has never worked, and there is no reason for believing it will work now.

ALL THIS IS by way of saying

that there is some concern here over the way our national government has reacted to several international matters within the last few months.

Perhaps our most obvious case of bending with conditions has to do with the case of the Berlin flights. About a year ago, the U. S. stopped its high-level plane flights through the Berlin air corridor, on Soviet demand. But we insisted that we could resume the flights any time we felt it necessary, and some three weeks ago we served official notice that such flights would be resumed. Immediately Russia accused us of aggressive intentions, and literally forbade the U. S. to resume them. Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany sent several urgent pleas to our nation, saying we should not ignore the Soviet protests. Shortly thereafter, Secretary of State Christian Herter announced that we had decided against resuming the flights. This was not, Herter said, connected with the Soviet protests nor connected with the coming summit conferences, but based on a "technical" decision that there was no necessity for our planes to make the high-level flights, after all.

Frankly, the announcement was greeted with some skepticism around the world. Diplomats wondered to each other why the U. S. suddenly found the flights to be unnecessary from a "technical" standpoint when only a few days earlier we did not take that position. It looked like, and has been so interpreted, as a backing off by the United States. It is also recalled in the world of diplomacy that we are taking a dim view of the staunch anti-Soviet-French delegation at Geneva, and that we have opposed a West Germany-Spain military co-operation agree-

ment, to which the Soviets object. This puts us on the same side of the question with Russian on that point, although such an alliance would appear to be a definite asset to the U. S. in the event of world conflict.

Add to these the apparent lack of official U. S. action in connection with Fidel Castro's rabidly anti-U. S. speeches, his grabbing of property owned to our citizens in Cuba, and one cannot help but wonder just where our foreign policy is going.

At what point does cooperation and peaceful coexistence end, and at what point does appeasement begin? These are the questions our President and State Department officials must struggle with in the never-ceasing-and often very frustrating — search for peace.

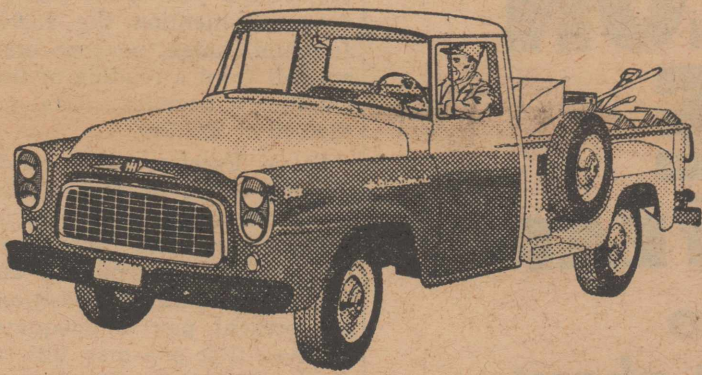
Larry Bishop, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John L. Bishop, is recovering from a mastoid operation performed in Lubbock last week.

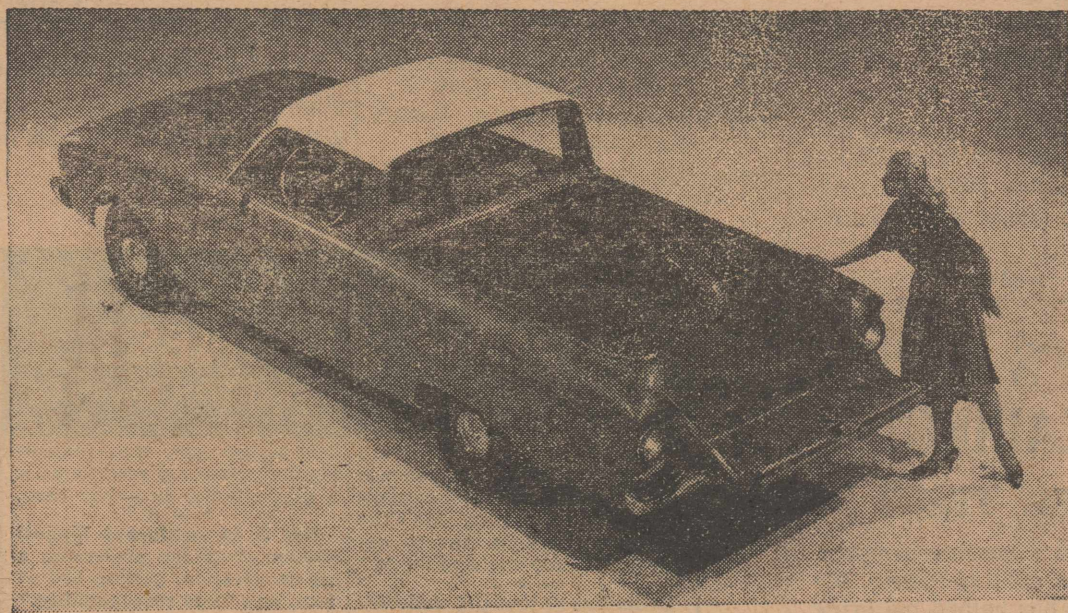

Garden Reminders
From Garden Club Reporter

Our thanks to Mr. Dick Ketchum of the local Soil Conservation Service, for disking the soil in the new park. Now it is ready for piping for water, then planting, which will be in native plants.

Now is the time to fertilize all perennials already established in flower beds. Scratch the plant food in with the teeth of a hand rake, using care not to injure the roots.

Hasten the appearance of color in the borders and beds by setting out bedding plants now as petunias, phlox, verbenas, violets, snapdragons, columbines, carnations and the fragrant old-fashioned spice pinks.

Plant more pansies. Fertilize and water regularly those already growing. Keep the flowers picked so plants will continue blooming.

Be sure to remove dead leaves, grass and other garden litter from beds and hedges to oust sowbugs and snails. Cultivate the soil around all plants, to loosen it for aeration of roots and also, a good stirring of the earth will destroy many insect eggs.

Many people are clearing away winter litter from their places also some vacant lots. Many business places still have old metal, burned refrigerators, stoves, old cars, even some flood debris around. Won't you please have it hauled to the dump ground. If it's of value at least stack it neatly. Let's make Ozona beautiful. How grateful everyone is to those who do. It will at least stack it neatly. Let's make soon be clean-up day, so start stacking and boxing your trash near the exits of your place.

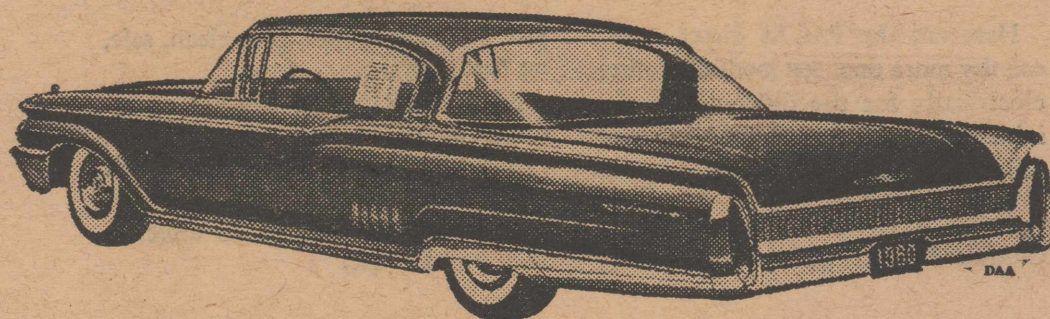

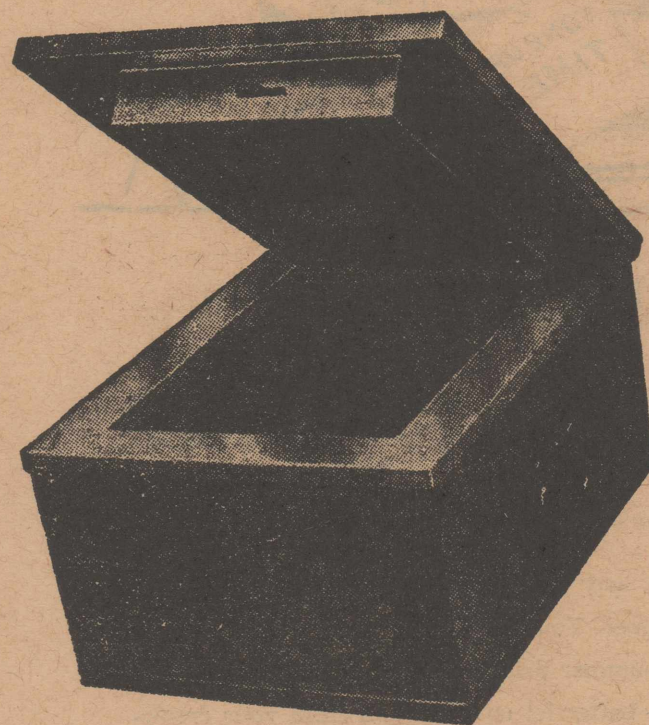

and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

At every fourth household, the census taker will seek the answers to additional questions covering population and housing characteristics which are being asked of a 25 percent sample of the nation's population. The sample population questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be used for regulation, investigation, or taxation.

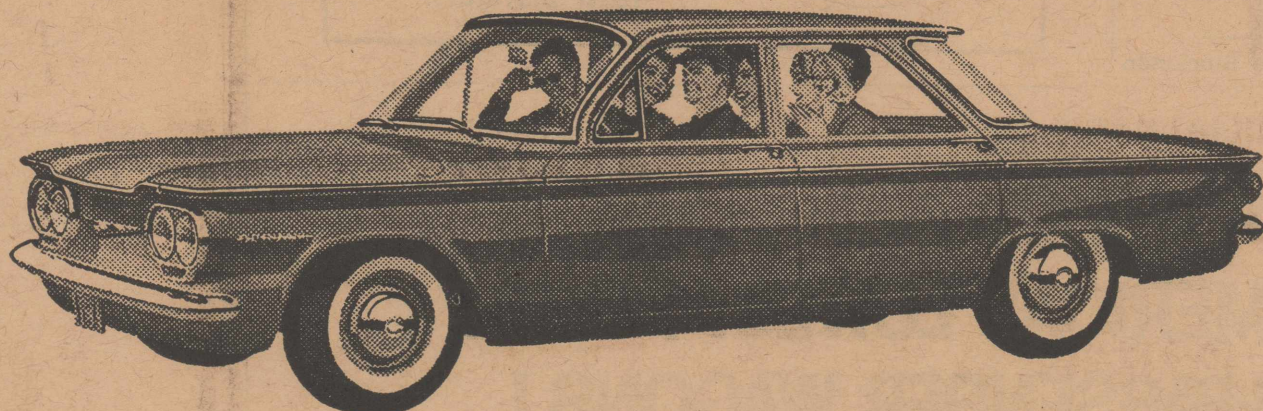

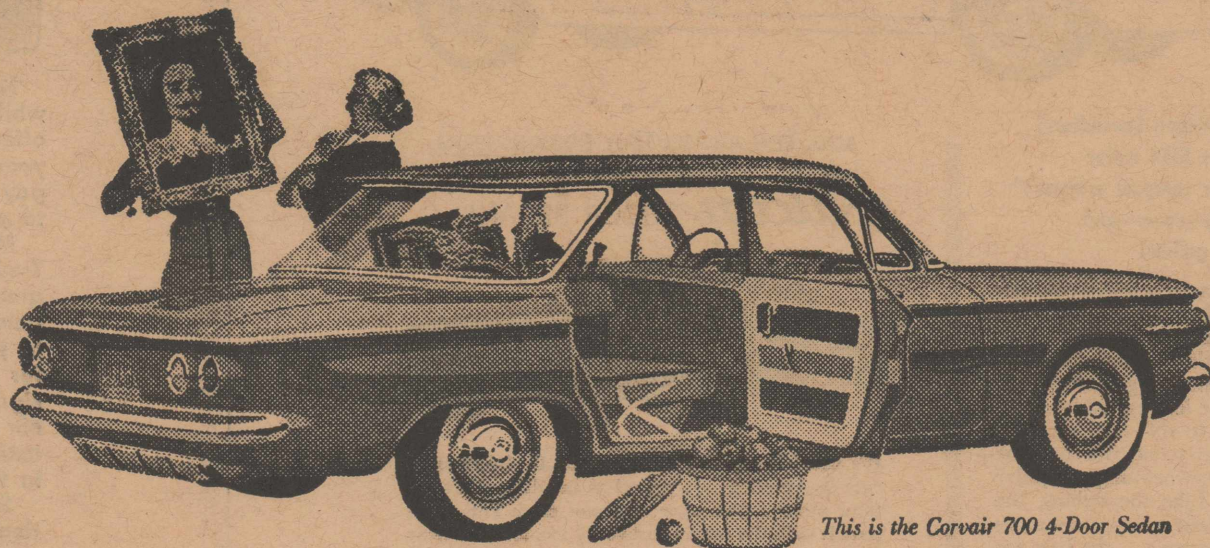
