## Timely Rain Brings Badly Needed Surface Moisture To Ranges

A more timely rain could not have been ordered by ranchmen than that which soaked a wide area of West Texas last Friday, with falls from 3/4 to two inches reported in Crockett county.

Ozona registered .7 of an inch of slow falling rain, triggered by a cold front which made for uncomfortable weather while the rain was falling but moderated with the passing of the front.

Some hail damage was reported in the western part of the county but for the most part the hail stones were small and no livestock losses are believed to have oc-

With bountiful winter moisture in the form of snow and rain, West Texas range land has one of the best stores of deep moisture since before the drouth. But extremely cold temperaturs and wind had sapped the surface moisture somewhat and spring growth needed just the kind of rain that fell last week.

### WITH THE GLOBAL COMMUTERS

As Russia's Nikita Khrushchev warmed in Paris to his twelveday task of alternately blowing on the ashes of Franco-German conflicts of the past century and bragging of Soviet armed strength, Britain's Prime Minister, Harold MacMillan, packed his portmanteau and umbrella for Washington, taking off on what would seem, at least, a related mission.

Word from the White House that President Eisenhower had asked "the Prime" to hop over and see him seemed a little out of key with other reports that the British have been pushing hard for US acceptance of the latest Red proposal on banning nuclear weapons tests. There was also the feeling in some quarters that our English cousins were a little alamred at the forthrightness of the joint statement of the President and 475. West Germany's Chancellor Adenaeur on Berlin the week before. 639.

As matters stood at the Geneva nuclear parley, Russia had accepted the Eisenhower proposal of February 11, that all such weapons tests, in space, the atmosphere and the ocean be banned and that all underground tests above the level of the Hiroshima bomb (19 kilotons) be banned - with the proviso that lower powered underground tests also be suspended for four or five years while scientists on both sides figure out means of detecting such blasts.



### Sheepmen's Promotion Program Boosts Wool And Lamb Demand

About 41/2 years ago sheepmen from this area joined with others across the country in a program of promotion and advertising of their products. The program is now one of the finest of its kind in agriculture, creating greater interest in lamb and wool to help boost a sheep industry that was flat on its fleece a few years ago.

The promotion organization is the American Sheep Producers Council at Denver, entirely supported and governed by sheep pro-

Sheepmen contribute one-cent per pound of wool and five cents for each 100 pounds of lamb sold into the promotion fund. This promotion fund contribution comes from the sheepman's incentive payment, a payment he receives on wool which comes from duties on imported wool.
