

gical treatment. Edges of wounds should be smoothed with a sharp knife to promote healing. Injuries should be treated as needed with a disinfectant tree paint.

Where extensive wood rot has already occurred, the rotted wood should be completely removed. The cavity should be filled with a special filling. Cavity filling by an amateur may prove more injuries than beneficial to the tree. -000-
