The shooting outside the ranch that DeLeon called Garcia outside J. W. Howell. the house and fired three shots from a 22 calibre rifle, using long rifle shells with hollow point bullets. All three shots took effect, one through the stomach, one in an arm. Physicians said one bullet pierce the man's liver, considered the most serious of his wounds.

Other employes at the ranch placed the wounded man in a pickup and started toward Ozona. A few miles from the ranch, they met Beecher Montgomery, son of the ranch owner, and Beecher rushed the critically wounded man to the hospital.

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
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**Stresses Freedoms In** Miss Lola Mae Daniel of Ozona Meeting Here Thursday

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
