Lima Residents Protest Against Windward Dumping

Open Letter Airs Complaint Against Bringing Dump To Town

Residents of Lima community, Latin-American section of Ozona, acting through their community organization, the U. P. O., United Parents Organization, have voiced a strong protest against the proposed location by the county and the Crockett Water Control District of a new pit type dump ground on the southeast edge of Ozona, just over the hill from the Lima community and from the southeast section of Ozona.

In an "open letter" to the people of Ozona, published elsewhere in this issue of The Stockman, Latin-American community citizens ask "With all the land there is in Crockett County, why do we have to bring the dump ground to the residential area?"

A road to the proposed new dump ground is to be carved through the heart of the residential area of the community and its placement will be on the direct windward side of town with prevailing breezes bringing the "smoke and stench from continuous and daily burning at the dump ground" directly into town and creating a "nuisance for all Ozona."

"The decision was reached by the Commissioners Court without consulting even one taxpayer or property owner in the Lima community which will be closest to the dump ground," the letter concludes.

Doran Run 100 In 10 Flat In San Antonio Warm-Ups

Jim Doran streaked to a 10 flat hundred to finish a strong second for the only high point in the Lions warmup meet for this week's state run off held in San Antonio last Saturday.

Ozona was the only class A school entered in the 440 yard relay and the 120 high hurdles, but none the less the Lions turned in sub par performances in both events and failed to place.

Poor handoffs in the relay event held the Lions down to a slow 45.4 in the 440 with only Johnny Jones, the alternate, on the team turning in a normal or good performance.

In the high hurdles Joe McMullan ran a 15.4, about 4 off his better times this season and he failed to place in that event.

The six Lion sprinters and their coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere will leave Friday for Austin for the state meet with seniors, Tommy Porter, Jim Williams, and Joe McMullan, going on to San Antonio to join their class following the meet Saturday 10th.

It is figured that a 15 will place Joe McMullan in the state, and a 44.3 might win the class A 440. Just what would be required to win the hundred is open to question but a 10 second run would in all likelihood come very close to winning.

Coach Womack has been conducting light workouts at Lion stadium this week for the state entries.

Tulsa Firm To Drill Shannon Ellenburger

Kewanee Oil Co., Tulsa, will drill its No. 1 Shannon, a 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat, 20 miles northwest of Ozona and 2 3/4 miles north of the shallow Todd, North multipay field of Crockett County.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 102-BB-ELRR (Block 10 on some maps).

Airman Injured In Accident Near Juno Still Is Critical

Airman Roy L. Brown, critically injured in an auto accident 30 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163 early last week, which took two lives, remains in critical condition with little hope for his recovery in Lackland AFB hospital in San Antonio, according to word received here.

Airman Brown was given emergency treatment in the Crockett County Hospital following the accident and later was flown in an Air Force ambulance plane to San Antonio. He suffered severe head injuries and multiple fractures of the legs and arms.

Domingo Garcia Dies Of Gunshot Wounds At Ranch

Pancho DeLeon Faces Murder Charge In Apr. 25 Shooting

Charge of assault with intent to murder, filed against Pancho DeLeon, ranch worker on the George Montgomery Hudspeth ranch following an early morning shooting at the ranch Monday of last week, were changed to murder following the death Saturday afternoon of Domingo Garcia, a fellow worker on the ranch.

DeLeon posted \$5,000 bond following his re-arrest and was released pending action of the grand jury. Judge Hart Johnson, here this week, indicated that the grand jury would be called back into session Tuesday of next week to consider the new charge.

Garcia was shot at close range with a .22 calibre rifle, using hollow point bullets. One bullet struck him in the stomach, one in the right breast and one in the arm. X-Rays showed both bullets which struck the man in the body exploded.

The shooting occurred about 4:30 a. m. outside the ranch house. Witnesses said the two men argued in the house and DeLeon called Garcia outside and shot him three times with the rifle. The injured man was rushed to the hospital here but efforts to save his life were futile.

SCD Asks Great Plains Inclusion For Crockett Co.

Would Be Southernmost Co. in 'Dust Bowl' Conservation Plan

The Crockett Soil Conservation District Supervisors voted at their regular meeting to request that the Crockett SCD be activated for the Great Plains Conservation Program. Eleven people attended the meeting, including the board of supervisors and ranchers interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The Great Plains program is restricted to ten plains states. Crockett County is one of the southernmost counties, in the ten states area, to be designated for the program. Before the program can be put into effect, however, the local landowners and operators must indicate an interest in the program and request such assistance.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a stepped-up program designed to speed up the planning and establishment of a complete and coordinated conservation plan on individual farms and ranches. The main difference between this program and others is that assistance is based on the farmers or rancher planning and carrying out a complete and balanced conservation plan on his entire unit. In other words, cost-share is not made on separate and segmented jobs without an economically and technically sound plan to tie all jobs together.

The Great Plains Program makes use of the current Soil Conservation District conservation plan, the ACP program, and the Conservation Reserve program. A ceiling of \$25,000 cost-share is placed on any one operating unit.

This program has been put to great use in returning thousands of acres of plains land back into grass that are unfit for cultivation because of climate hazards, wind erosion and other adverse conditions. The program is centered in the ten state area that gave birth to the dust bowl days of the dirty thirties.

The District received acknowledgement of the request from H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, last week. Mr. Smith said the application would be given consideration by the State Program Committee at its next meeting in June. The district will be notified of the action taken following the meeting.

Local Contests Spur Interest In Election Saturday

Sheriff's Race, Commissioner Contest May Bring Out Vote

Spirited campaigns being waged by candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, judiciary and state representative, plus local interest generated by one county wide contest and one precinct race are factors expected to spur interest in the early primary election set for Saturday of this week.

Of particular interest to local voters will be the race for sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes between incumbent Sheriff Billy Mills and former sheriff V. O. Earnest. Both candidates have waged active campaigns with the issue now resting in the hands of the voters next Saturday.

Voters in Precinct 3 have still another incentive to cast their ballots as they will choose a County Commissioner, with incumbent Commissioner U. S. (Rusty) Smith opposed for a new four-year term by Ozona business man Hubert C. Collett. Again, these candidates have waged determined campaigns throughout the precinct and interest should be high among voters in its confines.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. in all regular voting boxes in the county. Voting will continue until the closing hours of 7 p. m.

Two district races will add interest for local voters, that for judge of the 112th judicial district and for State Representative from the 78th district. Judge Hart Johnson, appointed by Governor Shivers to serve as judge until the next election following the resignation of Judge Jim C. Langdon to accept a post on the 8th Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso, is being opposed in his bid for election by McCamey attorney, and former Langdon law partner Steve Preslar.

The race for State Representative from this district is between two Kerrville men, Carroll Abbott, Kerrville newspaper man, and James E. Nugent, Kerrville attorney. Both are seeking the post now held by Joe Burkett of Kerrville, who is not a candidate for re-election.

Among the state races, interest centers in the race between incumbent Governor Price Daniel and Jack Cox of Brackenridge; for lieutenant governor between incumbent Ben Ramsey and Don Yarborough of Houston; for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court between incumbent Judge Robert W. Calvert of Hill County and Robert G. Hughes of San Angelo; for Comptroller of Public Accounts between incumbent Robert S. Calvert of Travis county and V. L. "Bo" Ramsey of Panola county; for Commissioner of the General Land Office between incumbent Bill Allcorn of Brown county and Jerry Sadler of Anderson county, and for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals with three candidates, incumbent Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis county, Jim D. Bowmer of Bell County and W. T. McDonald of Brazos county.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Start watching for the pecan nut casebearer to appear and have your trees sprayed at the proper time for effective control. Do not spray trees before the nut clusters turn brown and end. It is about this time that trees should be sprayed if casebearers are present. Eggs can be seen at the base of the nut clusters. Probably around May 10 this year will find the casebearer eggs on nuts. A second spraying at two to three weeks intervals is often effective for good control. A power sprayer that will put out 20 to 35 gallons per minute at a pressure of 200 to 600 pounds should be used. Thorough wetting of each limb from the top to bottom is necessary for a thorough job of spraying.

WHEN IT'S TIME TO ACT



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The leaves of oak trees are often attacked by fungal and bacterial leaf spots. The oak leaf diseases are more common in areas of high humidity or rainfall. While the diseases are not likely to kill a tree, they may weaken it and make it more susceptible to damage by drought, pests, winter injury or from other troubles.

Several of the leaf spots may cause premature leaf shedding. Leaf blister. Another common disease, can be recognized by the deformed, curled or blister-like depressions on the leaves of infected trees.

Small trees — up to five years or until they have established a good root system — should be protected. A fixed or insoluble copper fungicide spray should be applied when the new leaves start to come out in the spring. One or two additional applications of the spray may be needed at three to four-week intervals. One gallon of the spray is needed for each foot of tree height for good coverage. Small trees can be sprayed with

hand-operated, compressed air or hose-on sprayers. Special equipment is required for spraying the larger trees.

If bacterial leaf spots are absent, a combination of captan and zineb may be used throughout the remainder of the year as needed. If powery mildew is a problem, karathane or wettable sulfur can be used. Karathane should be used with care since it may stain brick or other parts of houses.

Diseased leaves should be composted for at least two years before returning them to the soil around the trees. The proper use of water and fertilizer will help keep trees healthy and in top condition.

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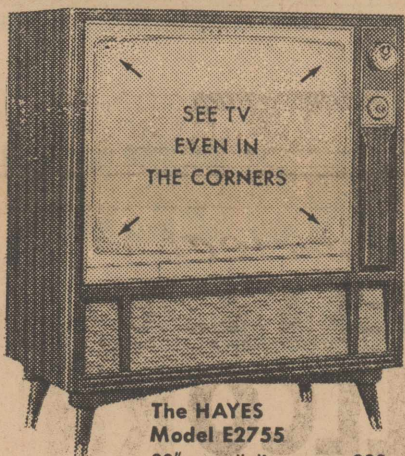

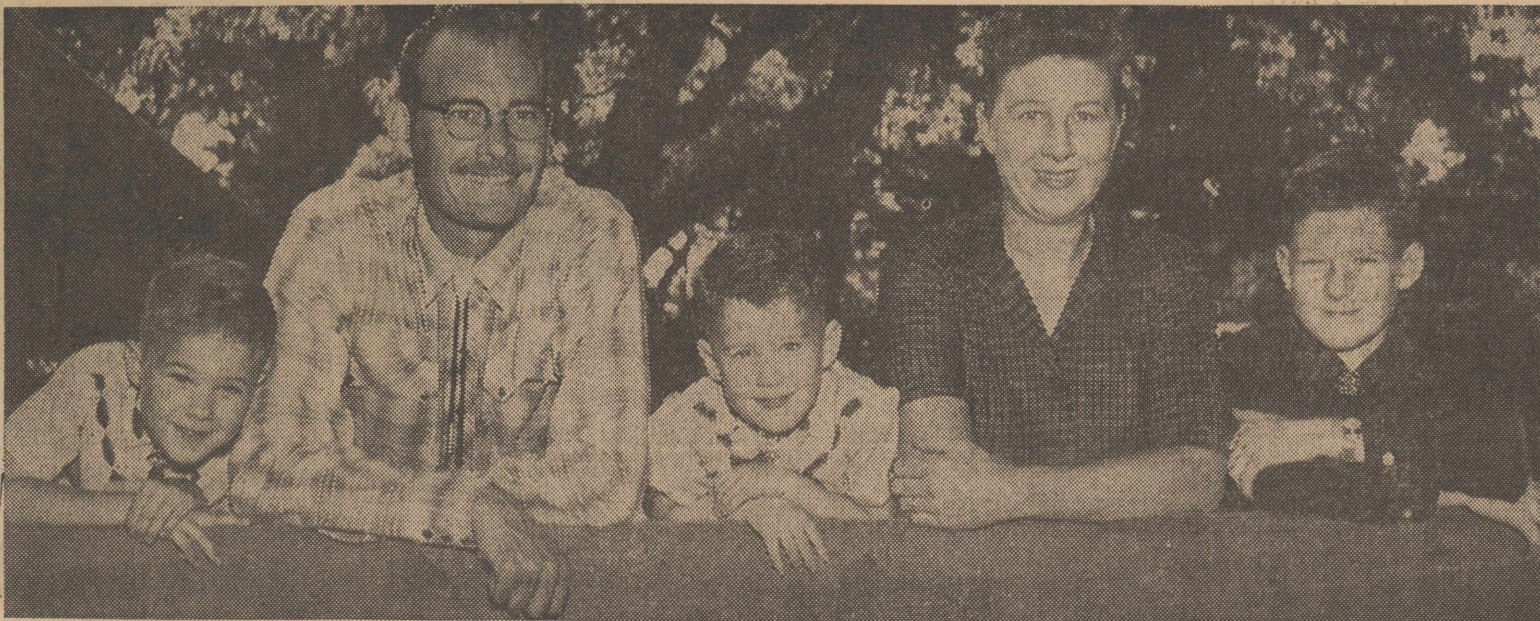

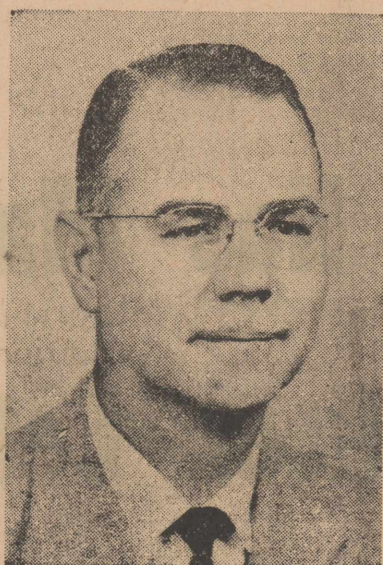

In a Judge's race there are no issues, no rewards or favors to be promised. One who would be your Judge should say, as I have said, "When the case shall be — I will do that fit for a Judge to do." Whether that solemn promise will be carried out or not depends on the man. The selection of a Judge is not on the basis of platforms and issues but on the man. Through this column, my cards and leaflets, and in my personal contacts with you, I have tried to let you know me as a man. It is fit that a man who would sit as your Judge should discuss with you the laws under which we live; that he should tell you whence he came and the things he has done which qualify him to understand the problems of the people and rule justly upon them. He should tell you of his experiences of life, his relationship with his family and fellow man, for there is where a man's character is revealed. Little has been said about public offices and other offices of trust which I have held, and the manner in which they were handled. Just to cite a list of public offices which I have held and ask you vote for me on that basis will leave you not knowing enough about me as a man. For, from the time of Stephen F. Austin to the time of Stephen F. Preslar, politicians have pointed to such experiences to perpetuate themselves in office. If that were the sole qualification, the "Duke of Duval" himself would

suffice for he has held many public offices. I have felt so strongly that you need to know me as a man that perhaps I have not said enough about my legal experience.

Suffice it to say that it speaks for itself that a man who arrived in this area some ten years ago in a 1941 Ford, loaded with law books and a secondhand baby bed, and who has enjoyed the successful law practice which I have through the years and is held in esteem by his fellow lawyers, has had some experience. Jim C. Langdon and I enjoyed a successful practice of law until he became Judge; and, at that time, I stepped into his big shoes and began doing the work that both of us had been occupied with full time; then in January of 1954, I added to that work-load the job of County Attorney; and have ever since maintained two full-time law offices in separate cities.

My work — experience — has been in varied fields of the law and every type of Court from the lowest to the Supreme Court of Texas and the Federal Courts; and I presently have cases pending in the Courts from El Paso on the west to Callahan County on the east, and Lubbock on the north to San Antonio on the south. This work as a lawyer — this experience — is only a small part of the qualifica-

tions of a Judge. For instance, when Jim C. Langdon became District Judge, he had been engaged in the practice of law for less years than I now have. It is not enough that a Judge should know the law, he must love it and respect it and have the courage to apply it to all alike. Knowledge of the law is only a small "piece of the pie" that makes up the "whole man" who sits in judgment. It matters not how much law a Judge may know if he does not understand people nor have the patience to hear them out and fully understand their problems. A Judge must have the head to handle himself and the heart to handle others.

It has not been easy for me to discuss myself and "toot my own horn" but I think that it is well that a man who seeks to be your Judge should tell you these things about himself before asking you to pass judgment on him at the polls. This I have tried to do, and I now stand before you, His Honor, to accept your judgment. You be my Judge — I ask to

be yours.





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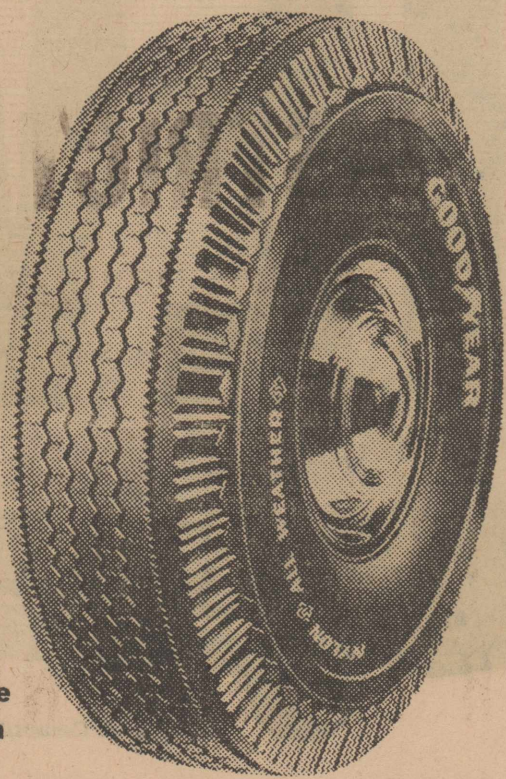

Mesquite Control By Aerial Spraying Should Start In May

The mesquite tree is a controversial plant, criticized by some and praised by others. Some ranchers criticize the mesquite for its heavy use of water and its invading tendencies, while others praise it for its bean crops. It is a fact that the mesquite requires four times as much water to produce a pound of material as does grass.

Those operators interested in mesquite control by aerial spraying should plan to start around the middle of May. Mesquite is ready for aerial control forty days after it first leafs out.

Aerial spraying of mesquite, with 2-4-5T herbicide, done last spring resulted in an excellent top kill. It is too soon, however, to evaluate the bottom kill, although a twenty to thirty percent bottom kill will give satisfactory control for several years. Information on last year's bottom kill of mesquite will be furnished at a later date by the Crockett Soil Conservation District.
