
"Mother Baggett' was a devoted member of the Methodist Church. She died July 30, 1941 and is buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozonia.


#### South Elementary 3rd Grade Stages Animal Show For PTA Meet



Governor Price Daniel, while Attorney General, wrote an opinion on the question of party loyalty in which he said, "The courts of Texas have answered this question by holding that the pledge taken at the time of voting in the primary election DOES NOT create a legal obligation."

Recently Governor Daniel reiterated that opinion by saying that the pledge on the primary ballot does not obligate anyone "legally or morally" to vote for the Democratic ticket in the general election.
