Dr. Hugh B. Tandy Prominent Ozonan Dies In Sleep Mon.

Ozona Civic Leader & Hospital Founder Succumbs at Home

Dr. Hugh B. Tandy, age 65, veteran Ozona Doctor and Civic leader died in his sleep Monday morning and funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church at 10 a. m., Wednesday. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Cody Funeral Home.

Dr. Tandy was the founder of the Ozona Hospital, a past President of the Ozona Rotary Club, for several years was a member of the board of trustees of the Ozona Methodist Church, and was the senior member of the Crockett County Hospital staff at the time of his death.

In addition to his many civic duties Dr. Tandy served his country in two world wars, having been a member of the Medical Corp at Fort Knox Kentucky in World War I, and having served in combat theaters in Africa, Sicily, and Italy, in World War II. Dr. Tandy was discharged from the service with the rank of Major and returned to his practice in Ozona in 1945.

Hugh B. Tandy was born Oct. 18, 1895 in Weatherford, Texas, the son of the late C. M. and Mrs. Tandy of Abilene, Texas. Young Tandy graduated from Abilene High School and following service in the first world war, attended the University of Texas and later the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston.

After serving his internship in New York Dr. Tandy was married to the former Faye Bland of Abilene in 1923.

In 1933 Dr. and Mrs. Tandy moved to Ozona and for a number of years Dr. Tandy had his office in the building where Colletts Trading Post is now located on the Southwest corner of the square.

In 1947 Dr. Tandy established the first hospital in Ozona and operated it himself until the County took over the operation a year later.

When the new hospital was finished in Sept. 1956 the old hospital was converted to the present Court house annex. The building had been the Methodist Church before it burned just prior to World War II.

In March, 1957, a painting of Dr. Tandy was hung in the foyer of the new hospital in recognition of the work and service Dr. Tandy had rendered during his stay in Ozona.

Dr. Tandy had for many years been the Crockett County Medical officer, and from time to time during his thirty-seven years in Ozona was the only doctor in Ozona.

Dr. Tandy was a member of the Ozona Country Club and an ardent golfer.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. M. D. Tandy of Abilene; a daughter, Mrs. J. C. Conde of Malibu, California, three sons, Bland Tandy of Abilene, Kerry S. Tandy of Atlanta, Georgia, and Mills Tandy, a Sophomore student at the University of Texas, and eight grandchildren.

The Sonora Broncos and the Wink Wildcats will meet in McCamey at 7:30 Friday night for the 7-A, 8-A bi-district title it was learned in Ozona Sunday.

Sonora, one of the tri-champions in district 8-A won the right to represent the district in a flipping session held in the Ozona press box following the Ozona vs Eldorado game last Friday night. The coins were tossed seven times before Sonora finally came up with a different side of the coin from that held by Ozona and Eldorado.

The flip for the right to play in bi-district did not effect the 8-A title which remains a three way tie between Ozona, Eldorado, and Sonora.

Despite losing the flip, Ozona players were greatly elated over salvaging a share of the title after apparently being out of it, and also in turning in one of the most inspired games any Lion team has displayed in the last eight years at least.

Gate receipts confirmed estimates of between 3,500 and 4,000 in attendance at the final game. The Lions finished the year with a 7 and 3 mark while Eldorado and Sonora, both playing a much weaker schedule, ended the year with a 9 and 1 marks.

The return to competition of Miss Friend will greatly strengthen the Ozona team since she was one of the squads outstanding players while a freshman.

Coach Gotcher will have his hands full, developing a winning team from the talent present however, as last years undermaned, (women) squad won few contests.

The Ozona girls will open their season next Monday night when they began a two game series with Iraan.

Lions Grab Share Of District 8-A Title With 14-7 Win Over Eldorado Eagles Record Attendance Sees Lions Win Game

The Ozona Lions put together an inspired defense and a slashing offense last Friday night as they grabbed a share of the 8-A title by downing previously unbeaten Eldorado, 14 to 7.

The Ozona defense which featured bone rattling tackles and lightning like pursuit all night, was given a severe workout, but for once this year was equal to the occasion as they stood off the Eagles, despite losing the ball six times on fumbles during the contest.

It would almost take the entire eleven starters to name the defensive standouts for the night, but it was an outstanding night for Deeny Holden, Mark Baggett, Darrel Rasberry, Wayne Albers and Hal Long in the line, and the entire secondary with Phillip Carnes, Carl Montgomery and Jim Freeman getting particular note.

The six lost fumbles marred Ozona's otherwise near perfect showing, and hamstringing an Ozona offense which was a marvel to watch. Quarterback Jim Freeman called the best game any Ozona quarterback has called since the the Lions started using the prototype T, as he varied his offense constantly, used his flankers for the first time since the Lions adopted the formation, and threw beautifully whenever he needed it, regardless of field position.

The sharpness of execution and the ever changing attack kept the unbeaten Eagles defense off balance all night, and had it not been for the fumbles the Lions may well have run off with the contest as Tony Parker, Jim Doran, and Freeman along with the tremendous clutch plays of Phillip Carnes shredded the Eldorado line almost at will throughout the contest.

The first quarter almost spelled the end of the determined Lions as they fumbled three times and gave up a pass interception due to having been off sides, only a brilliant defense, playing with its back to the wall, and a strong wind in its face, saved the night for the Lions.

Quarterback Jim Freeman had a hand in on all of the Lions points for the night as he passed to Phillip Carnes for one score, plunged over from the one for another, and passed to Carl Montgomery for the two points following the second score.

Eldorado scored first in the second period when they took a Lion fumble on their own thirty and marched seventy yards for the TD.

The fumble blunted a promising Lion threat which had carried from deep in Lion territory and seemed to be on the way to putting the Lions in the lead.

The Eagles had to work hard for their only score, and it appeared the Lions had them stopped, when Carl Parker threw 27

Deer Season Opens With Warm Weather In Crockett County

yards to Jerry Johnson to set the Eagles up on the Lion 6, from where they scored in two plays, with Donnie Holden rounding left end for the six points. John McGregor kicked the extra point from placement and the large Eldorado delegation began to breathe a bit easier.

The Lions responded to the Eldorado score immediately as they took the kick off and launched a 70 yard drive of their own for a score.

The Lions got things under way when an Eldorado halfback was caught holding a Lion receiver and the interference went for 43 yards. That was all the Lions needed as they pushed to the six yard line and then with fourth down facing them, Freeman rolled left and passed to Phillip Carnes in the end zone for the score.

Carnes catch of Freeman's pass was a sensational one, but was typical of the Lions play all night, and was just one of the spectacular plays Carnes had a part in during the nights play.

The Lions trailing 7 to 6 elected to go for 2 points since a tie with Eldorado would not give them a share of the title, and in a close decision, Parker fell just short of the end zone to leave the Lions trailing 7 to 6.

The Lions came back from the half and with the wind at their backs promptly drove the Eagles into a hole where a short kick, that was almost blocked, paved the way for the Lions winning points.

The first Lion effort was halted on the Ozona 40 yard line when a hand off from Freeman to Doran mised, and Eldorado covered its fifth fumble of the night.

The Eagles were unable to go against the Ozona defense which seemed to be getting tougher all the time. Actually Eldorado was unable to make a first down in the last half until a penalty for pass interference gave them one in the fading seconds of the game.

The Lions continued to push the Eagles back, but a second goal ward surge by the Lions was halted when McGregor came up with a pas interception on his own 28 and returned it 11 yards.

Three plays and fifteen yards back down field the Eagles kicked but the ball rolled out short and Ozona began to move.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

National Farm-City Week has been proclaimed for the period of November 18-24. There is much need for better understanding between the city people and farmers and ranchmen of our country. Most people think that agriculture is not important anymore since only about 11 percent of our people live on farms and ranches. Actually, about two-fifths or 40 percent of all the people in our state are either engaged in farming and ranching, in supplying production needs to farmers and ranchers or in processing and distributing our agricultural products.

In 1940, only 4 percent of all Texans were engaged in supplying farmers and ranchmen with production items. Today, 11 percent of all Texans derive part of their living from supplying farm-

ers. In 1940, only 7 percent of all Texans processed and distributed agricultural products to the consumer, today, it is 18 percent. Today, about 96 percent of all the agricultural production in Texas must pass through the business firms in our state before reaching the final consumer. This is big business for the businessman.

In 1930, the average farm and ranch in our state was 252 acres. Today it is over 500 acres, almost a 100 percent increase.

Texas farmers and ranches are big spenders in town. They normally spend annually about 18 million dollars for pesticides; 31 million for fertilizer and lime; 44 million for construction materials; 59 million for machinery; 106 million for petroleum products; 221 million for feeds; and 885 million dollars for other items used in farm and ranch operations.

Everyone complains about the high cost of food but because of the high production of agricultural products, we are in better shape than in the 1920's. When a consumer went down to the retail store during the 1920's, and purchased a pound of beef steak, a pound of pork, a quart of milk, one dozen eggs, a loaf of bread, a dozen oranges and a 10 pound sack of potatoes and based upon average wages at that time, he would have had to work about 4 hours and 29 minutes to buy that bill of groceries.

Now this would leave him only 3 hours and 31 minutes out of an 8-hour work day to work and earn money to pay for his shelter, his clothing and the other needs of his family. In comparison, today it takes only 1 hour and 42 minutes of labor to buy the same bill of goods. Which today, leaves about 6 hours and 18 minutes of labor income out of a 8-hour working day to buy such items as clothing, shelter, TV sets, long black automobiles, pink tile bathrooms, air conditioning units and the many other items that make for the very high level of living which most people have in the United States.

Another way that we might point out the importance of agriculture to our economy is the fact that farm and ranch product values rank second to the gross value of crude oil produced in the state.

half feet. You will be rewarded in the spring, when the large blossoms appear on your plant. Several hundred were planted here in Ozona this fall.

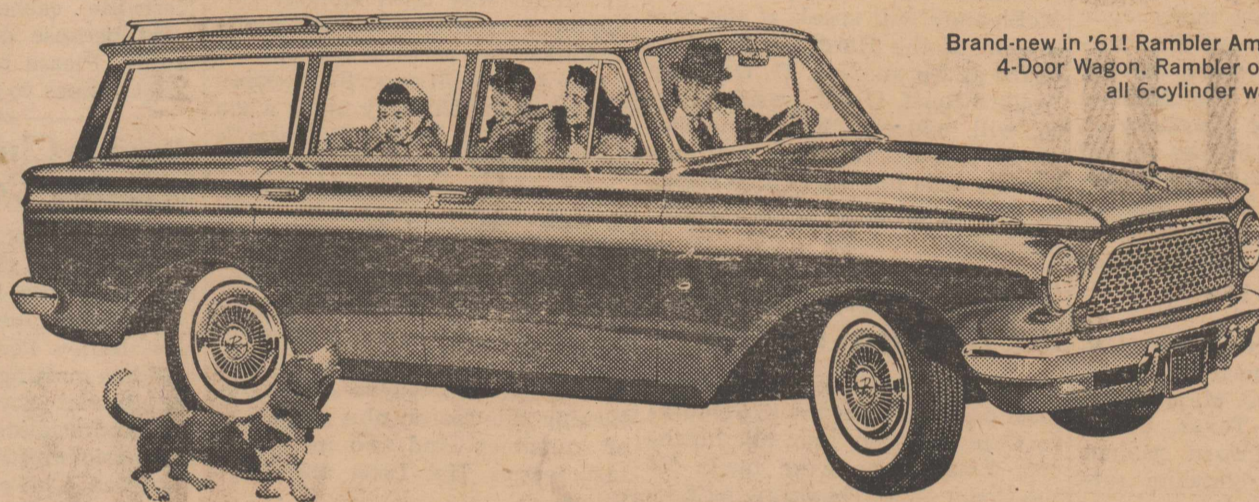

Phillip Carnes moved to the 11, but this time the Eagles braced and held the Lions at the 5.

The constant defensive pressure put on by the Lions took effect as Parker picked up one yard and Holden lost three. Cheek was able to get one yard back, and Holden standing in his own end zone was rushed so badly he had to pivot to kick and the ball carried for only 3 yards beyond the line of scrimmage.

Eldorado braced but two power lunges by Parker and Doran set the ball on the one, and Freeman leaped over the pile into the end zone.

Freeman's pass to Montgomery was good and the Lions had a 14 to 7 lead.

The Eagles narrowly averted being crushed minutes later, when Phillip Carnes took an Eldorado pass and hustled it back to the 10 yard line. This time the Lions drew a five and then fifteen yard penalty to blunt the drive.

A penalty against the Lions for pass interference gave the Eagles a late gasp, but it was too little, too late, and the Lions had sewed up a third of the title.

Statistics reveal the true nature of the game which saw the Lions dominate both on offense and defense all night long, but at the same time they stay in trouble with six lost fumbles.

One of the largest crowds in Ozona's football history viewed the contest with large delegations of Eldorado and Sonora fans joining Ozona rooters to fill all available seating and spill out along the

track. Cars along both ends of the field were also filled with spectators many of whom had placed their cars in favorite locations before school began Friday mornig.

Ozona had 12 first downs to the Eagles 8, picked up 195 yards rushing to Eldorado's 73, completed 7 to 10 passes for 61 yards, to 7 of 16 for 38 yards for the Eagles, and intercepted three Eagle passes to just one for the foe. Only in losing 6 fumbles to the birds 0 did the Lions run second.

Jim Doran was the games leading ground gainer with 75 yards on 16 efforts, with Tony Parker and Jim Freeman next with 53 and 54 yards each.
