A ranch farm welding short course for adult ranchers & farmers will be held Dec. 5 through 9, 7:00 to 10:00 p. m., under the sponsor-ship of the Ozona High School Vocational Agriculture Depantment, according to L. B. T. Sikes, Superintendent and M. A. Barber, teacher of vocational a-

C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Miss Betty Baggett Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M College, will do the instruct- Near Fort Stockton ing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M Colege.

Mr. Edwards holds two college degrees; a B. S. in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M and an M. S. in Agricultural Education-Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma A&M, and in addition, has several graduate hours at the University of Texas. Mr. Edwards has had experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as supervisor of state schools. He has organized T&I programs and supervised the operation of several shops. Mr. Edwards has been with the Adult Specialist Program since its' initiation in 1958.



1910 - THE OZONA WOMAN'S CLUB - 1960 FIFTY YEARS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

Mrs. Friend, the organizing chairman, was also a War President of the Ozona Woman's Club. She served as Crockett County chairman of National Defense the same year. It was a hectic year! World War I had reached a critical stage, and the United States was in grave danger. Boys and men from the age of 18 to 31 were in service. In Crockett County, as else where, men and women not in service were working "to help make the world safe for Democracy."

Mrs. C. W. Connery, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Club, urged Texas Clubs to remain organized but to correlate their work with war service. Ozona women responded immediately. No yearbooks were printed because of paper shortage, business meetings were curtailed, but all reports relating to Federation mat-Iters were sent to State and District officers. The 1917-1919 yearbook of the State Federation carried the folowing information: Ozona Woman's Club, membership 52, President Mrs. Frank Friend, corresponding Secretary Mrs. Joe Blakeney and chairman of Music Department, Mrs. W. E. Newton.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Feeds which supply low cost 3 to 1. protein and low cost energy are matters of real concern to beef producers. Grain is considered the cheapest energy source, and protein supplements should be chosen on the basis of their protein contest and cost. U. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman, says that anyone considering the purchase of a supplemental protein feed for beef cattle should note the price per 100 pounds, the percentage of crude protein supplied by the oil seed protein meals, percentage of equivalent protein from non-protein nitorgen, and the crude fat and fiber content. The higher fiber content feeds should be cheaper than others.

Detemine cost of crude protein on a per pound basis, says Thompson. Divide price per cwt. by percent protein: as cotton-seed meal 41 percent @ \$3.50 cwt.; \$3.50 divided by 41 equal \$.085 per pound, Urea 262 percent equivalent protein @ \$5.50 per cwt.; \$5.50 divided by 262 equal \$.021 per pound.

Other factors should also be considered when choosing a supplement. Mixtures containing ingredients which limit consumption have the advantage of saving labor and distributing herd consumption more evenly. 
