Lion Cagers Drop Close Decisions To McCamey And Iraan In Succession; Enter Rankin Tourney The Week-End

The Ozona Lions dropped two decisions over the past week, losing to McCamey in McCamey 34 to 37 in a poorly played contest and then dropping a well played 44 to 46 decision to the strong Iraan Braves in Iraan Tuesday night.

The Lions, still playing without co-captain Jim Freeman, their fine play maker and ball handler, had a poor night in the Badgers gym hitting only 19 percent of their shots. The Lions got 67 shots at the bucket with 47 of them coming inside the free throw line but only 13 struck home.

The Badgers, meanwhile, were not setting woods on fire with their play but the Lions dominated the backboards and usually limited the home team to one or two shots at the hoop but were unable to capitalize on their defensive play due to their own poor shooting.

The Lions reversed form completely Tuesday night, however, as they played the strong Iraan Braves got a goal and were able to stall out the contest.

The Braves used their great height advantage plus some costly Lion mistakes to keep the Lions from getting away from them and were able to stand off a late Lion surge to win by two points.

The shooting of Van Miller, Phillip Carnes and Hal Long sparked the Lions with Van getting 14, Phillip 10, and Hal 8.

For the winners, Cash had 16 and Wilson 18 to just about account for all the Iraan scoring.

In the McCamey contest the Lions shot so poorly that there really wasn't much to choose between the shooters. Van Miller who had as poor a night as he has had this season hit 4 of 20 shots for high with 8 and Hal Long and Wayne Albers, who didn't do not iceably better percentage wise, had 7 points each.

In the Iraan game the Lions hit 10 of 18 free throws but in the McCamey game hit only 8 of 22 shots, most of the latter group would have been one and one shots since McCamey played a very rough contest and picked up five team fouls early in each half.

The Ozona B team kept its record clean over the week winning a narrow 42 to 40 decision over

McCamey and then toying with Iraan to win 44 to 14.

Coach H. O. Hoover continued his policy of playing all of the boys in order to give them game experience, the real purpose of a B team using every man suited out in both contests. Nine of the Lion B teamers scored against McCamey and the game seemed to be comfortably won until a late McCamey surge and a tight zone defense caused the Lion reserves to have to hold on to win. Pete Montgomery with 9 and Robert Cox with 8 points led the reserve attack.

In Iraan the first string B's went to the showers after the first quarter and Coach Hoover used seventeen payers in easily overpowering the Brave reserves. Eleven of the Lion reserves got into the scoring column with Billy Cornelius, who played only in the first period, leading the scorers with eight.

Billy Semmler with 6 and Scott Mahon with 5 were next among the point makers.

The Lions will travel to Rankin this weekend to take part in the Rankin tourney, facing Crane in the first round Friday.

Contract depth is 9,800 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger.

Location is 990 feet from the north and west line of 2-0-TCRR. It is also three miles northwest of the Baggett (Strawn gas) field.

The Refoil field has two 3,200-foot sand oil producers and three Strawn gas wells.

Winter's Initial Thrust Triggers 5 Inch Moisture

Slow Falling Moisture, Freeze Accompanies New Cold Front

Winter finally made its presence known in Ozona this week when a norther triggered a slow rain that turned to ice Tuesday night in the course of depositing slightly over .5 of an inch of rain in Ozona.

The wet, cold weather could almost be considered the first disagreeable weather of the year for Ozona since the few light freezes experienced so far this winter have been of the early morning dry variety that faded quickly in the sun.

The half inch of moisture was welcomed in Crockett County where rain has been very light in the past several months.

Predictions of light snow had failed to materialize yet but conditions for snow were favorable.

The appearance of the season's first cold, wet norther on December 6 was in contrast to the much colder one which was accompanied by heavy sleet on November 13 last year.

High way bridges west and northwest of Ozona were sanded Tuesday night as slow rain turned to ice on exposed surfaces and on automobile windshields making driving hazardous both in town and on the highway.

Despite the uncomfortable cold, temperature did not drop too far with the thermometer showing readings in the high twenties and low thirties after dark and above freezing during daylight hours.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 10, 1931

A platoon leader in the 1st Airborne Battle Group, 505th Infantry of the 8th Division in Mainz, the lieutenant entered the Army in

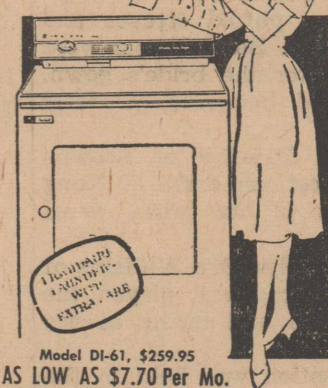
October 1959 and arrived overseas last May.
