Santa Is Slated For Annual Pre-Christmas Visit This Afternoon

Old Man Santa Claus makes his annual visit to the boys and girls of Ozona in the park this afternoon following the dismissal of school for the Christmas holidays.

As has been the case in the past, Santa arrives on the town's biggest fire truck to be greeted by a large portion of Ozona's small fry.

Ozona firemen will distribute candy to those present while Santa discusses Christmas needs with the children.

School was dismissed this afternoon and will resume classes again until January third.

Many of the Ozona teachers and no small number of the students plan to spend at least part of the Christmas holidays with friends and relatives away from Ozona but in keeping with the season a large number of former residents are expected to be in Ozona visiting over the holidays.

College Students Home For Holidays

Dozens of Ozonans college students began to arrive home for the Christmas holidays this week as colleges and universities over the country began the annual Christmas recess.

Ozona has some thirty to forty young people now away in college and their return to their homes for the next few weeks is expected to have a noticeable effect, particularly on the social life in the home town.

Almost all of the Ozonans now in college are in Texas colleges and Universities with a scattered few attending such schools as Colorado, Christian, and Eastern New Mexico. Texas Tech was the most popular school this year with some thirteen Ozona students currently enrolled.

Dry Cold Front Drops Mercury To New Low Here

Crisp, Dry Weather Is Promised For Christmas Week-End

A blustery cold front moved through Ozona early Tuesday bringing the season's coldest temperatures to Crockett County with a reported low of 20 degrees being recorded early Wednesday.

The new front did not bring any moisture or any promise of it as have the past several fronts that have hit Ozona this month.

Rain gauges indicated that from one and one-half to better than two inches of moisture fell during the near one week period of rain and snow which occurred in a two weeks period.

The new front is expected to hold on for about two or three days but a bright sun and clear skies promise pleasant days for the holiday week despite cold nights which however, are normal for this time of year.

Water on the streets and in exposed places froze hard for the first time this season and a heavy frost covered grass and exposed cars early Wednesday morning before the bright sun melted it.

Ozona's Granddaughter Wins Trip To India's Science Congress Under Sponsorship Of State Department

Susan Brown, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Brown of Austin and a granddaughter of Mrs. J. M. Bagegt and the late Mr. Baggett of Ozona, has been selected as a special goodwill ambassador by the U. S. State Department to attend the All-India Science Congress in New Delhi, India.

The University of Texas freshman will sail from New York Dec. 26 for a seven-weeks trip, returning to Austin for late registration at the Spring semester at the University. She will travel with four other U. S. scientists to the Science Congress and after the Congress, she will travel extensively in India under auspices of the U. S. Embassy there.

Something of a genius - class science student, Susan has attracted state and nationwide attention with her scientific experiments in high school and college. A full account of her work and the coming trip was contained in an article appearing recently in the Austin American written by Anita Brewer. The article follows:

Susan Brown, 17 years old and a bundle of brains and looks and energy, has a new role: Good will for the USA.

Susan, a freshman at the University of Texas and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram S. Brown, 2604 Pecos, will leave Austin during the Christmas holidays for New Delhi, India. From Jan. 2-9 she will be at the University of Roorkee, India, showing her scientific exhibit at the All-India Science Congress.

After that, she will tour nearly all parts of India under the auspices of the US State Department. She will be gone from her University classes for seven weeks.

The State Department never showed better judgment.

As an Austin Public Schools official said, "Susan is the best example of American youth I can think of. She is full of enthusiasm

Lion Cagers Down McCamey 59-36 In Final Pre-Holiday Contest; Improved Play Poses Threat For District Balance Of Season

The Ozona Lions rode the fine shooting of Captain Van Miller and guard Phillip Carnes along with the powerful rebounding of Mike Stiles and Wayne Albers to a 59 to 36 win over the McCamey Badgers Tuesday nights as the Ozona team closed out pre-Christmas play on a winning note.

Miller and Carnes hit 15 of 31 shots during the fray to shatter McCamey's tough defense and give the Lions room to operate under the bucket in the second half.

McCamey jumped into a two point lead early in the first quarter on Mike Pirkle's jump shot but Carnes got a free shot and Miller hit a long set to put the Lions ahead to stay.

Facing a zone defense the Lions maintained a three to four point lead through the first quarter and then edged to a sizeable 26 to 14 lead at half as Phillip Carnes hit eight straight points while the Badgers were trying to stop Miller's deadly long shots which accounted for 14 points in the first two periods.

Unable to stem the long range bombardment, the McCamey team switched to a man to man defense in the last two periods and pressed at times but this opened up the middle and Carl Montgomery, Mike Stiles and Pete Montgomery along with Carnes all jumped in to the scoring, hitting 12 field goals between them in the last two periods.

Van Miller wound up the night as high man with 17 but just edged Carnes who had 16. Pete Montgomery had 9, Carl Montgomery 8 and Mike Stiles 7.

The win gave the Lions a two to one edge in the three game series with the Badgers but the third game reflected a great improvement in the Lions play over the first two contests.

The win gave the Lions a five won and four lost pre-Christmas record and the Lions will not return to action until Dec. 30, when they travel to Menard for a non-district game with the Yellow-jackets.

Co-captain Jim Freeman, who has missed all but one of the pre-holiday games due to illness, has returned to school and expects to return to action following the lay-off and with Hal Long returning to the squad, the Lions expect to reach full strength by district play.

The Lions have been hampered in early season play by a shortage of guards created when Freeman was unable to play but the rapid improvement of Pete Montgomery after his promotion from the B team has given the Lions unexpected guard play at this time and even should Freeman return now and take over his old post, Montgomery would still see a great deal of service and give the squad a much needed third guard.

When Long is ready again the Lions will have Carl Montgomery, Mike Stiles, the team's top rebounder, Wayne Albers, and Mark Baggett to use at the post positions giving the Lions great depth.

The problem thus far has been getting all of these boys ready and able to play. So far, illness and a few other factors have kept this from happening but there seems a good chance now that it can come about in January in time for the start of the real games in district competition.

Ozona Girl Cagers Win Third In Row To End Pre-Holiday Play

The Ozona High School girls basketball team ran its streak of with to three Monday night when they downed the Rankin girls 31 to 26 in Rankin.

The three wins represent the longest streak the girls have had since the sport was resumed here and ended pre - Christmas play with the girls having won five and lost four.

The Ozona girls also won a trophy in taking consolation honors in the Rocksprings tourney, downing Comstock 49 to 32 and Mason 32 to 30 in the finals. The Ozona girls were dropped in to the consolation bracket when they lost their first game in the tourney 48 to 36 to Leakey.

In the Rocksprings opener, the Ozona girls got balanced scoring efforts from their forwards but it was not enough to offset Lynette Hills' 22 points and Laura Brindo's 20. Janie Lara led Ozona with 13 but was just ahead of Don Nell Carnes who had 12 and Beverly Alford who picked up 11.

Leakey held a slight 21 to 25 lead at the half but the Ozona girls could not match the pace in the second half.

Ozona did not have too much trouble with Comstock as Don Nell Carnes hit for 19 and Janie Lara with 16 to lead the girls to a 49 to 32 win. Ozona led at the half 22 to 15 and maintained a safe margin throughout the last two quarters despite Alma Dinglers 24 point high for the game.

In the Consolation finals the Ozona girls came from behind in the second half to win a narrow 32 to 30 victory over the Mason Cowgirls.

Don Nell Carnes racked up 25 points for Ozona to pave the way for victory. Mason held a narrow 17 to 16 lead over the local team at half but Ozona finished strong to win the Consolation championship.

An additional honor won by the Ozona girls was announced at the tourney close when Glenda Friend was named to the all-tourney team.

Glenda distinguished herself throughout the tourney with her fine defensive play and strong rebounding to earn the honor.

Fredericksburg Man Awarded Contract For Road Work In County

A contract for 6.1 miles of construction on R. M. 1980 in Crockett County has been awarded to a Fredericksburg firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Allen Keller Company submitted the low bid of \$215,066 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from 16.2 miles west of intersection of R. M. 33 and R. M. 1980 to 6.1 miles west is expected to take 180 working days, according to J. A. Snell District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

Robert A. McCulloch, Resident Engineer at Sonora will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Garbage Disposal Plan To Be Put In Operation Jan. 3

Complete Rules of Operation To Be Published Next Week

Equipment has been assembled and preparations are being completed to place into operation on January 3 the new garbage collection and disposal system in Ozona to be operated under the direction of the Crockett Water Control & Improvement District.

The new sanitary garbage collection trucks will make twice weekly collections over the city and new rules to facilitate the planned collection are to be inaugurated with the new system.

Home owners and tenants will be required to provide covered containers of specified size and such containers must be placed in a place accessible to the garbage collecting crew. Rules concerning the preparation of trash and operation of the sanitary dump ground have been prepared and will be published in full in next week's Stockman.

The new garbage disposal area to be located south of Ozona and will be open each week day from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. with a man on duty each day during those hours. The road to the ground will be locked at all other hours to prevent careless and unauthorized use of the dump area. The dump ground will be open to those who wish to haul their own trash but persons so using the ground will be expected to meet certain requirements for orderly dumping of such trash.

A monthly charge, to be announced, will be made by the water department and added to monthly water bills for the garbage collection service. Equipment for the new sanitary garbage collection system was purchased by the county and the water district, through its board of directors and manager W. D. Cooper, agreed to operate the system.

Daughter of Early Day Crockett Sheriff Dies In Tucson, Ariz.

Mrs. Maude Parker Young, 75, an early day resident of Ozona, daughter of Dave Parker, former sheriff of Crockett county, died recently at her home in Tucson Arizona.

Mrs. Young, a native of Texas, went to Tucson in 1919 with her husband, Baylor Young, who was a state cattle inspector in Arizona for many years. They operated a hotel in Tucson for a time and moved to El Paso after selling the hotel. They returned to Tucson in 1923. Mrs. Young's father, William David Parker, for many years operated the A-7 ranch on the San Pedro river north of the Catalinas with his son, Bud Parker. Both are dead now.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Ethel Young Harbison of Casa Grande; a sister, Mrs. Joie Heard of Hachita, N. M. and three brothers, O. R. Parker of Tucson, W. D. Parker of Patagonia, and Bert Parker of California.

SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR THE WORKERS

"Coordination of manpower," obviously one of the things the Russians do best — especially on the remote collective farms and in the Arctic labor camps, is among the goals planned for the Kennedy Administration by the AFL-CIO. And indication of what is in store for workers who now — for the most part — must pay a union for the privilege of working, comes from Stanley H. Ruttenberg, research director of the giant labor combine in his testimony before a Washington hearing. He complained that manpower policies are not effectively coordinated by the Government, and should be centralized — a reform with which Kennedy aides are said to agree.

On the heels of this Big Labor push for centralized Government planning of how and where and when the minions work, came formal announcement of the appointment of AFL-CIO Special Counsel Arthur J. Goldberg as Secretary of Labor.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Cattle prices are expected to trend downward in 1961 if the predictions of Extension Specialist in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at Texas A&M College are correct. According to Lloyd Bergsma, Livestock Marketing Specialist, livestock producers will be faced with a generally downward trending market during 1961. Prices during the first half will not feel the effect of increasing supplies to the same extent that is expected during the last six months of the year.

Slaughter cattle are expected to average near 1960 levels during the earlier months of 1961. Increasing supplies of grass cattle and greater competition from expanded hog production can be expected to reduce slaughter cattle prices during the late summer and fall months. The greatest price reductions will be in the lower grades of cattle. With an estimated cattle slaughter increase of 10%, average prices can be expected to decline two to three dollars per CWT. This is about the same decline experienced this year.

When the books are closed on 1960, we may expect the total meat production to set new records. The estimated 1960 red meat production of 28.3 billion pounds is 3 percent above last year and slight-

ly exceeds the previous peak year 1956.

The estimated 1961 meat production will provide consumers with the largest supply of meat in history, both in total and per consumer. If the estimates prove correct, consumption of red and poultry meat would exceed 200 pounds for the first time in history.

Cattle numbers are reaching near a crest with the expansion of cattle numbers likely to continue during 1961. Expected increases in slaughter will not be sufficient to halt the cattle herd buildup. The fourth year (the increasing phase of the present cattle cycle began in 1958) expansion is expected to be at a reduced rate compared to the previous three

years.

No livestock producer needs to be reminded that weather conditions are important in determining livestock price levels. With the high cattle inventory, we can expect cattlemen to react quickly to changes in crop and pasture conditions.

As consumer incomes have increased, so has the demand for meat. Beef has increased in popularity, partially at the expense of other meat.

While the consumption of meat has increased, the percent of average disposable personal income spent for meat has declined. Ten years ago, 5.5 percent of the average disposable income was spent for meat. This compares to 4.8 percent in 1959 and 4.6 percent in

1960.

Demand for beef is expected to continue upward. This will partially ease the downward pressure on

prices resulting from the expanded supplies.

Lower cattle prices do not necessarily mean that profits will be

absent in cattle enterprises. However, producers should take these price indicators into consideration in planning their operations.

and ambition."

The trip to India is an outgrowth of Susan's work at Stephen F. Austin High School under the tutelage of Mrs. Edna Boon. Last spring Susan was a first award winner in biological sciences at the National Science Fair with a project on a root growth factor isolated from bean seedlings.

Then later in Stillwater, Okla., Susan's work was exhibited at the American Institute of Biological Sciences, and was selected for showing at the All-India Congress.

For the trip to India, she has an American Specialist Grant from the US State Department.

Ever since Susan received word to be postponed until March and making plans to catch up on the classes she will miss.

Susan will be a sophomore next term although she has gone to the University only three months. She received advanced standing credit in biology, algebra, trigonometry and English.

Although she is only 17, Susan has her life all mapped out. She intends to go into biochemistry, get a doctor of philosophy degree and do research.

She is a pledge of Delta Gamma Sorority and a member of Spooks.

Her sorority is helping her out on this India trip. Tuesday she is going to visit a Delta Gamma alumna who spent several years in India to learn what kind of clothes to take with her. She has a premonition she will need both her cotton dresses and her woolens because India is so big, it probably has all kinds of climate.

Susan with her enthusiasm and brains is turning the wheels of life rapidly, but she has plenty of occasions to learn the lessons of patience.

She is continuing her work with the root growth factor in the bean seedlings, doing purification work.

"It goes slowly," she says. "It isn't anywhere near completion." And she's been working on it for two years.

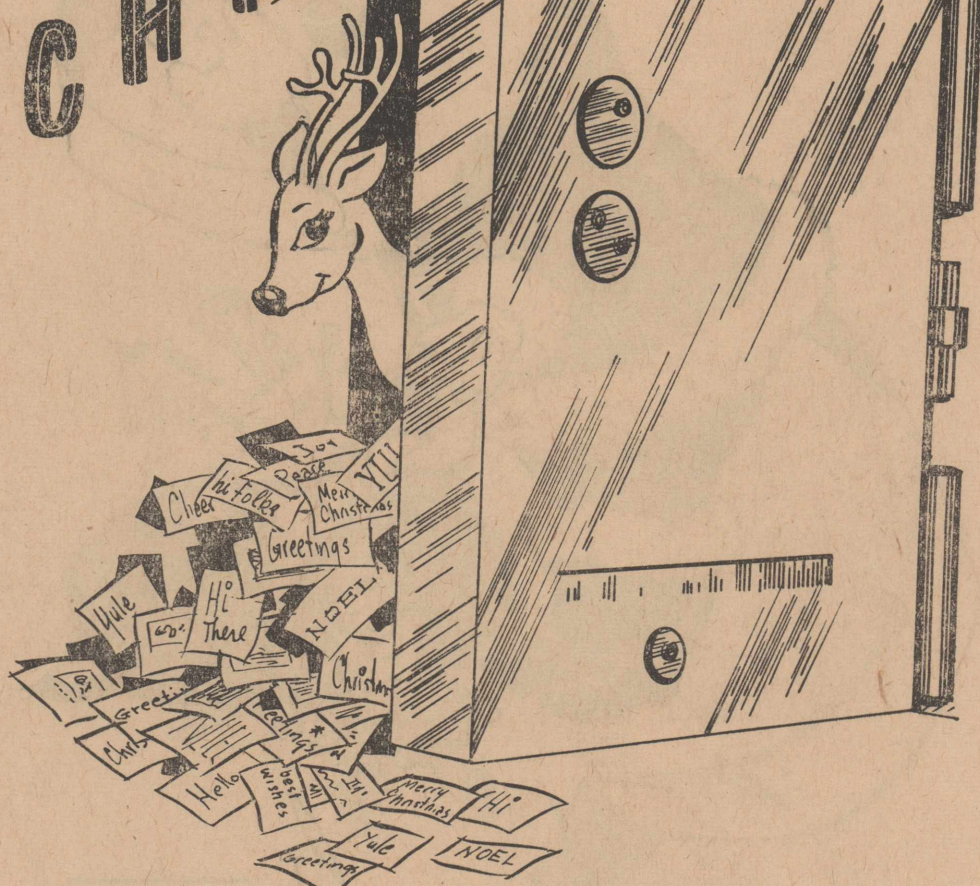
