New Highway Map Shows 60,000 Miles Of Texas Highways

Austin, Texas - The 1961 Texas Official Highway Travel Map with "Over 60,000 Miles of Motoring Pleasure" as its theme - is now available to the general pu-

Free copies of the new Texas motoring map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5064, Austin, or at highway district offices and travel bureaus. County tax offices have map cards on hand for requesting copies of the map.

Multilane-divided highway miles now completed and charted on the map total 2,067 miles, and include the finished sections of the seven National System of Inter-state and Defense Highways located in the state. More than 350 farm-to-market and ranch-to-market road miles have been added to this years' map. Approximately 20,000 miles of the state's nearly 34,000-mile Farm-to-Market Road System are shown on the map. All of the 26,857 miles of Interstate, U.S. and State highways are shown.


Roadside parks having full picnics facilities are marked on the map with a green dot - 830 in all on the new 1961 map. A total of 52 State Parks are also shown, their locatoin indicated by a green triangle. Two new recreational State Parks have been added to this year's map — Eisenhower State Park at Denison, and Atlanta State Park at Atlanta.



Range Conservation Commemorative Stamp On Sale February 3

The Post Office Department will issue the wordl's first range conervation commemorative postage stamp February 2, 1961, at the annual meeting of the American Society of Range Management in Salt Lake City, Utah. It will go on sale at all other U.S. Post Offices the next day, February 3. The stamp is the eighth in the Conservation Series that has included four wildlife, stamps, and, R. and J. M. Baggett and a joint in the last three years, stamps leaturing forestry, soil conversation, and water conservation.

The new 4-cent stamp will be in three colors — blue, reddish brown, and black. tI is a splitirame stamp, one part being a reproduction of "Trail Boss", a iamous sketch by Charles Russell, noted western antist, and the other showing a modern range conservation scene. The stamp symbolyzes the development of range conservation from the pioneer days of the open range to today's scientific management techniques.
