Tatum of Rocksprings, work up a sweat in picking out the top animals.

Mark Baggett had champion and reserve champion finewool fat lambs. Penn Baggett showed champion crossbred fat lamb, champion group of three crossbred fat lambs and won grand-champion group of three fat lambs of the show. Tom Davidson had the reserve champion crossbred fat lamb, reserve champion group of three crossbred fat lambs and reserve grandchampion group of three fat lambs of the show. Eugene Vinson showed the reserve champion group of three finewool fat lambs.

The new plates went on sale Wednesday morning and the sale will continue until April 1, after which it will be unlawful to use the 1960 plates.

The Crockett county passenger plates for the next year carry the prefix letters JL and numbers here start at 9225. Auto owners are reminded to bring their license receipts and certificate of title for each vehicle they intend to register.

### Poll Payments Exceed 1,000 In Last Day Spurt

### Over 250 Receipts Issued Here On Final Day of Period

When a weery crew of clerks at the sheriff's office closed shop at a late hour Tuesday, they had issued more than 250 poll tax receipts during the final day in which voters could qualify for a vote in 1961 elections, and had pushed the total voter strength of the county to well past the 1,000 mark.

The last minute spurt of payments was one of the busiest days for the local collector's office in several years and indicates a growing awareness of politics on the part of the average citizen of Crockett county. The important election to choose a U. S. Senator to succeed Lyndon B. Johnson, scheduled for April 4, is perhaps in large measure responsible for the large off-year voter strength.

A check on total poll tax payments Wednesday morning showed a total of 998 paid poll taxes, 4 disability polls and 32 under-age exemptions. Remittances for poll taxes postmarked up to the final day will be valid and these last-minute payments, if any, will further swell the voter total.

## Winter's Longest Sustained Attack Is Finally Broken

### Snow, Sleet And Rain Add 1/2 Inch Moisture In Week

The much predicted but late coming warm weather returned to Ozona Wednesday following one of the longest sustained cold spells in Ozona in a number of years.

A cold wave which struck Ozona last Tuesday maintained subfreezing temperatures even in the day for four days and held the thermometer in the fifties into this week as nearly a half inch of rain, sleet and snow covered the ground.

Icy streets and sidewalks caused a number of accidents and sent several to the hospital with injuries sustained in falls on the glazed pavement.

Mrs. Cora Anderson, a teacher at South Elementary, suffered a broken arm in a fall Friday and numerous others were injured to a lesser extent in falls.

Even though temperatures have fallen lower on a few occasions in Ozona in the last ten years, the 1961 spell seemed to have been the longest sustained low temperature span in the last decade.

Numerous ball games and other events slated over the weekend were cancelled or postponed due to the icy weather which made road travel, particularly at night, hazardous.

The additional moisture which was registered in Ozona over the week put the 1961 January total well ahead of 1960 in moisture count for the month.

Showing of fat lambs will get under way at 8:10 a. m. and classes will be shown in the following order for: Best fitted crossbred, best fitted finewool, finewool fat lamb, pen of three finewool, lightweight shown finewools, heavyweight shown finewools, pen of three shorn finewools, lightweights crossbreds, heavyweight crossbreds pen of three crossbreds. Presentation of awards to FFA members will be at 11:30 and grading of calves and selection of champions will be the final event before the noon hour.

Austin, Texas — The 1961 Texas Official Highway Travel Map — with "Over 60,000 Miles of Motoring Pleasure" as its theme — is now available to the general public.

Free copies of the new Texas motoring map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5064, Austin, or at highway district offices and travel bureaus.

Multilane-divided highway miles now completed and planned on the map total 2,067 miles, and include the finished sections of the seven National System of Interstate and Defense Highways located in the state.

Roadside parks having full picnics facilities are marked on the map with a green dot — 830 in all on the new 1961 map.

Range Conservation Commemorative Stamp On Sale February 3

The Post Office Department will issue the world's first range conservation commemorative postage stamp February 2, 1961, at the annual meeting of the American Society of Range Management in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The stamp is the eighth in the Conservation Series that has included four wildlife, stamps, and, in the last three years, stamps featuring forestry, soil conservation, and water conservation.

The new 4-cent stamp will be in three colors — blue, reddish brown, and black. It is a split-frame stamp, one part being a reproduction of "Trail Boss", a famous sketch by Charles Russell, noted western artist, and the other showing a modern range conservation scene.

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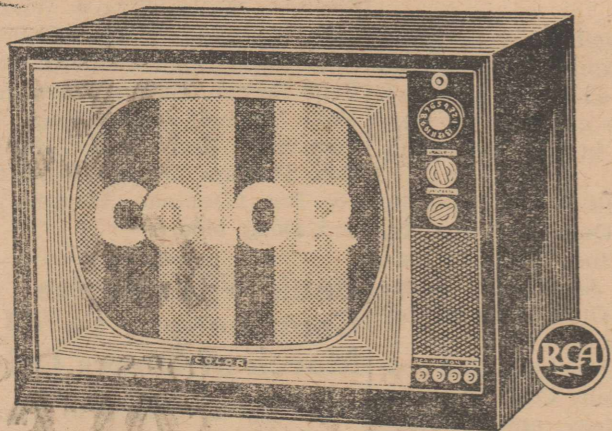

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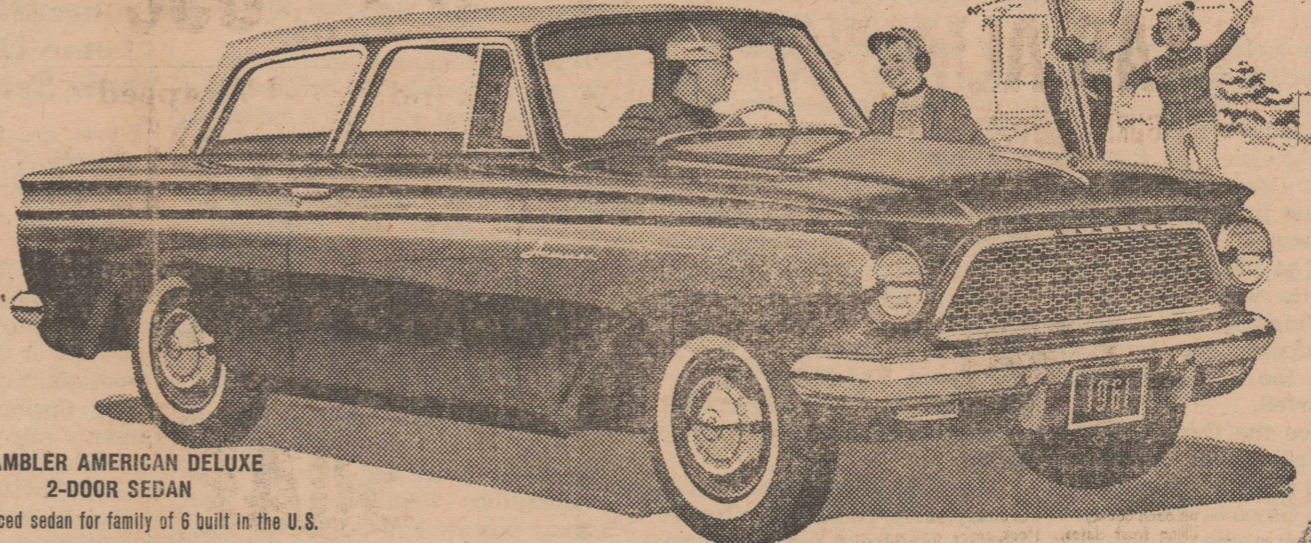

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A proposal that would take the monkey off the backs of the legislators who campaigned on a no-sales-tax, no-income-tax platform has been made by one of the State Capitol correspondents.

It is the feeling of many persons in Austin as well as over the state that the public is ready for a definite, long-time tax program, whether it be a sales tax, an income tax or the Governor's proposed payroll tax.

They are convinced that the state has to take some drastic financing steps. And they are ready to foot the bill. Many legislators realize this fact.

Other Tax Plans Advocated — Lawmakers have proposed numerous methods for raising additional tax money.

Rep. W. W. Glass of Jackson-

ville suggests a constitutional amendment authorizing a one per cent levy on the gross income of all businesses. He estimated it would bring in \$100,000,000 a year.

A 10 per cent tax on the gross receipts of trading stamp firms was suggested by Rep. Henry A. Fletcher of Luling.

A graduated levy on gross income at the wholesale level and on income from personal services — for an estimated \$300,000,000 yearly — was put forward by Rep. Lloyd Guffey of El Campo.

Rep. Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio took the opposite approach by proposing a constitutional amendment that would prohibit either a state income or payroll tax.

Raciest suggestion came from Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio who, as he promised in his campaign, introduced a bill to legalize horse racing and parimutuel betting and to levy a tax on the track proceeds.

As bills dropped into the hopper. State Treasurer Jesse James announced that the general revenue

fund deficit has risen to \$95,381,122.

Savings Sought — Legislature is also considering proposals aimed at cutting expenses.

Texas Research League, reporting on a study made at the request of the Legislature, made 19 recommendations for reducing the cost of collecting taxes.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria has proposed a bill that would set up a commission to study the agencies of state government with a view to eliminating duplication and bringing about maximum economy and efficiency. It has been dubbed the "Little Hoover Commission."

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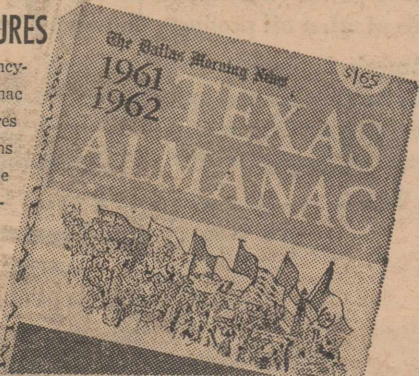

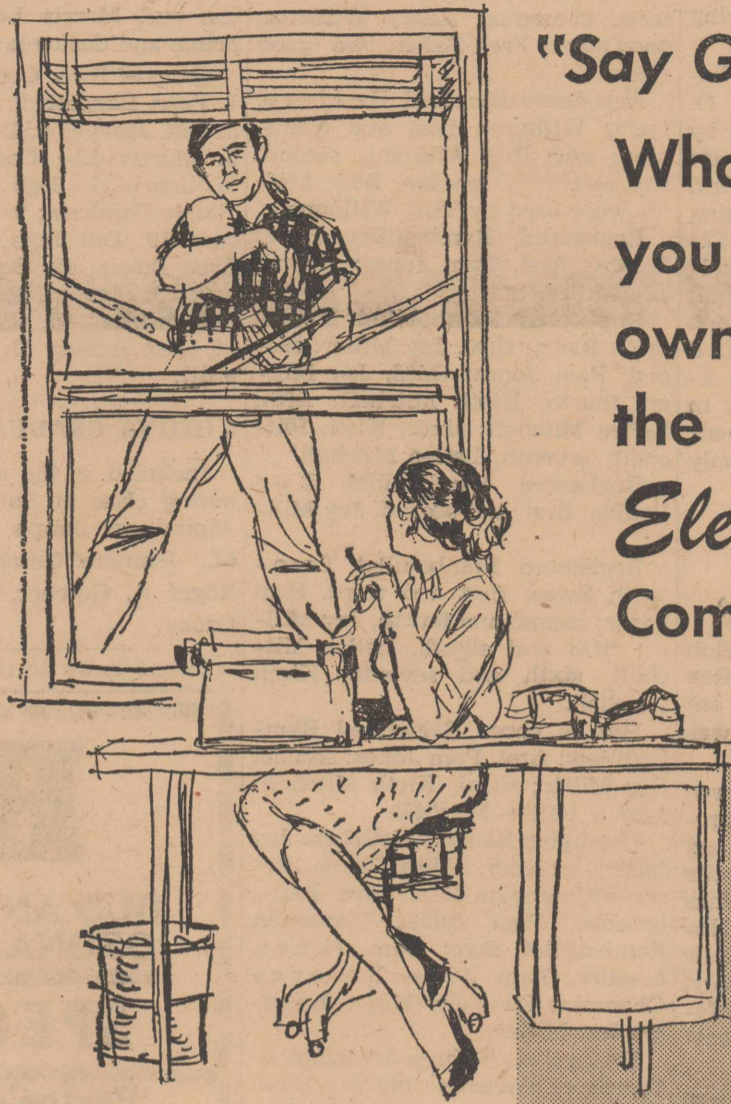
Have you ever stopped to think just how important books are? Without books an education would be almost impossible.
