THE RULES COMMITTEE VOTE

Congressman J. T. Rutherford, representing this 16th district in the U. S. House of Representatives voted with the slim majority of the House to "pack" the Rules committee to prevent a so-called bottleneck of liberal legislation expected to come from the Kennedy administration.

The move, manipulated by Mr. Sam and the White House stooges, was designed to win a liberal majority on the Rules committee of the House by adding three members thereto. This maneuver was successful by a margin of five votes in the House of Representatives.

It would have been much more pleasant for this writer to have commended Congressman Rutherford for his vote on this issue, since we consider him a personal friend. We have no doubt that the Congressman voted his personal convictions in this instance, but we believe he was wrong. We believe he was wrong from two standpoints — 1. we believe the committee packing maneuver was in the nature of power politics and tending to grease the way for the

radicals to move in on the country to its harm and maybe its ultimate destruction; and 2. we believe Congressman Rutherford did not represent the majority opinion of his district when he voted on the liberal side. We have no way of proving either contention. We sincerely hope the Congressman was not wrong from the first standpoint and more sincerely that he was from the second.

Congressman Rutherford's explanation of his vote leaves us somewhat cold. He speaks of "removing a bottleneck" so that members of the Congress might have "an opportunity to work our will on bills as the directly-elected representatives of the people." We recall no complaint from the Congressman in all his writings in the past while a member of the House of Representatives of being denied an opportunity to work his will on legislation. Why did the matter just come to his attention after election of the Democratic administration? Why did it suddenly become necessary to by pass a conservative dominated committee in order to permit the Congress to work its will?

The Congressman further states, in his explanation of his vote on the committee expansion question, that the three new members of the committee he voted for "were just numbers," that he did not know their names, their philosophy nor their identities. This was, no doubt, the strict truth. But the Congressman must have failed to read the papers for several days or he would have had grounds for a logical conclusion that the Kennedy-Rayburn-Johnson pressure was on either to purge the committee chairman or pack it with liberals so that it would become a sluice instead of a sieve for ultra-liberal legislation. And, though their identities may have been unknown, there was little doubt of what their philosophy must be if they were to be appointed to the committee as a result of the packing vote.

A certain amount of "going along" may be necessary in politics these days but it is our fervent hope that our representative in the Congress in this perilous time will in the future weigh his country's good against party politics and vote always for the greater good.

UNCLE SAM, M. D.

Uncle Sam is going into the health business in a big way if President Kennedy can sell Congress on his six-point proposal for Federal intervention in the fields of medical and nursing services and education, hospitalization, medical research, vocational rehabilitation and "Youth Fitness."

The most controversial item is a revival (with some revision) of the medical care for the aged program that was rejected by Congress last year. Under the new specifications, the estimated cost of \$1.5 billion to be met by a hike in Social Security taxes.

The five other programs to be paid for with increased outlays of tax money are loosely figured to cost something over \$56 million for the first year and \$170 million the second year and include construction of nursing homes and medical and dental schools, Federal medical and dental scholarships.

The health plan for the aged, if passed this year, would be available on July 1, 1962 to 14.2 million Americans over 65 and provide up to 90 days or hospitalization (\$10 deductible the first nine days,) up to 180 days of nursing home care and up to 240 days of visiting nurse service.

The President insisted in his message that: "This is not a program of socialized medicine." It "guaranteed," he said, freedom of choice of doctors and hospital and is "in accordance with the traditional American system of placing responsibility on the employe and the employer rather than on the general taxpayer, to help finance retirement and health costs."

We had somewhat felt the "traditional American system" involved looking out for oneself and one's kith and kin. Nor is there any "freedom of choice" regarding payment of the increased Social Security taxes — even among those who are providing their own health insurance. Nor can we conceive of the Government barging into the healing business in any large way without regimenting the medical profession and entailing the customary extravagance, inefficiency and bureaucratic arrogance.

to this year, has been hampered by lack of size, hopes this year to break his brother's record in the low hurdles set two years ago. Deeny, like his brother, is a hard worker and now that his size and strength have caught up with him it is expected that Holden is going to be a key member of the squad this year.

Phillip Carnes, Gary Studdard, Van Miller, Deeney Holden and others could give the Lions great depth in the hurdles where Carnes was a fine performer last year and is expected to be better this year.

The return of Eldorado to the district will bring back into the district one of the areas track powers, and in its first year back, the Eagles may be considered the favorite for this year's title.

Ozona will try to concentrate its power in the hurdles, the sprints and the relays and hopes to pick up a few points in the pole vault, the broad jump and the high jump along with a place in the shot.
