Ozona Hosts Annual Area Meeting Here Saturday

Ozona Student Council members and school officials were hosts to more than 300 students from 19 West Texas towns representing more than 30 schools who gathered here Saturday for the annual district meeting of the West Texas Forum of Student Councils.

"Student Councils - Train to Freedom" was the theme of the convention, whose sessions were held in the high school auditorium. Rev. Morris Bratton, pastor of Ozona Methodist Church, addressed the morning session on the sources of freedom.

Taking part in the discussions on the problems of Student Councils were representatives of schools in Alpine, Andrews, Big Lake, Big Spring, Gail, Coahoma, Colorado City, Eldorado, Iraan, Kermit, Midland, Odessa, Ozona, Pecos, San Angelo, Snyder, Sonora, Stanton, and Sweetwater.

A highlight of the afternoon session was a panel discussion of exchange students from England, France and Iceland. Taking paint were Judy Luck, 17, from Lincoln, England; Nicole Boucher, 18, of Lyons, France, and Thorunn Kjerulf, 18, of Raydarfjordur, Iceland.

Johnny Childress of Ozona presided as the district president. Towns which will name officers for the various posts for the coming year were elected in the afternoon. Big Lake was chosen to name the president; Andrews will again elect the secretary; Snyder won parliamentarian.





France and Germany. In the field of modern art, the study included art from Flanders, Holland, Spain, France and England and concluding the study was Aboriginal art of America and the later arts of the Americas.

Mrs. Joe Oberkampf was chairman of the civic department which met once a month and studied such topics as city incorporation, cleanup of the city, yard improvements and needs of the cemetery. They planted the pecan trees around the school building as a project.






