### Watch for falling cows

Drivers in farming regions know to watch out for animals that stray onto the road, but even the most cautious seldom scan the heavens for livestock.

A 36-year-old woman should have been doing that last Thursday near Vienna, Austria, when a cow strayed from a hillside pasture to the top of a tunnel entrance and then fell onto her car. The woman was hospitalized with minor chest and foot injuries.

Her husband, in the passenger seat, was unharmed. The cow died after being hit when it fell 15 feet just as the car was leaving the tunnel.

# Traveler responds to Muleshoe tragedy

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Because of the circumstances in our community on this Fourth of July, the Journal is foregoing the usual fireworks photo on the front page in favor of this letter about Monday's traffic accident that claimed the life of Tomasa Bustillos. It is our feeling that we could offer no better holiday tribute to our readers than this.)

Dear Editor,

Monday morning, I was returning to Albuquerque from Lubbock and came upon an auto accident that occurred only moments before, just west of Muleshoe.

As most know by now, the accident resulted in the fatality of one of the passengers in the vehicle.

For anyone who has ever witnessed or been involved in such an accident, the minutes that follow quite often seem chaotic and "never-ending" as everyone scrambles to assist, and emergency and medical assistants work fervently at saving lives and treating injuries.

For whatever reason, I have been witness to a number of tragic incidents which necessitated emergency assistance.

Never before have I seen such immediate response by law enforcement and emergency medical personnel as I witnessed on this particular day.

The community of, and around, Muleshoe, Texas, can be very proud of these people and should take great comfort in their proven ability.

There was a particular incident, however, that really prompted me to write this letter. As I tended to the victim who subsequently died from the accident, I held her head and attempted as best I could to comfort her as she fought for her life.

A gentleman (who, although not in uni-

form, I believe was a law enforcement officer) stood at her feet and asked the Lord to bless his woman and help her in this great time of need.

It was one of the most moving and touching moments I have experienced in my life.

In this day and age, when public officials are criticized for even mentioning the word "God" and court's rule that "God" should be removed from our nation's Pledge, this simple prayer — whispered over the body of a dying woman — seemed monumental.

This gentlemen knows who he is; however, I want him to know that in my mind he is a true hero. And I feel it is important for the deceased woman's family to know that in her last moments there were a number of folks doing all they could to help her, both physically and spiritually.

As I made my journey home, I wondered if the people of Muleshoe recognize how wonderful a community they have, where a person in need is treated with dignity and respect, regardless of ethnicity.

And to the gentleman with the prayer: God bless you, my friend, God bless you. You will give us all a special reason to celebrate this Independence Day

## County to discuss new jail again



# South Plains iris sale coming up in Lubbock

For those of you who have not stocked up on bearded iris locally, the South Plains Iris Society's annual iris sale (a fund-raiser for the group) is scheduled for 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 20 at the Lubbock Garden and Arts Center (4215 University Ave.).

With our lack of rainfall this year, I'm sure that more people than ever are thinking about drought-resistant landscaping. The bearded iris qualifies - some varieties have lived for years at the farm without any extra watering at all.

Naturally, they are more lush with a little extra water, but they'll survive if you ignore them. The color range includes just about every shade in flowers except for true red.



If you want drought-resistance, though, either make sure you buy bearded iris or that you inquire whether the species you're considering is tolerant of dryness. Some iris require wet ground, and some even thrive in standing water.

On the subject of bearded iris, remember that July-August (or even earlier, as long as they're through blooming) is the ideal time of year to transplant them. If you

have a bed that has grown too thick - or if you just want them somewhere else.

With this summer's heat, we're going to need to be vigilant about watering them until the weather cools off.

Still, it's worth it to get them re-established now rather than waiting until fall to dig them.

As I've written before, you can do your own test to see whether summer or fall is the best time to move them: Replant some now and then replant some from the same bed in October, setting them side-by-side.

When it comes time for them to bloom next spring, you'll have no trouble at all telling which plants were replanted when.

Also, by spring the summer-moved plants

will be re-established well enough that they won't need more water than long-established iris, whereas the ones moved in the fall may still need extra water to finish re-establishing themselves.

While the local stores wouldn't have their spring bulbs in stock yet, if you want an unusual variety or an unusual quantity you'll want to consider mail-order.

This is the time to order these bulbs for fall delivery — early-order discounts can be 10 percent (though not all businesses offer them), and most of them evaporate before the end of July.

This is also a good window of opportunity for ordering those bulbs (such as the Lycoris, or spider lilies) that die down in summer and then shoot up spectacular, leafless flower stalks in early fall.

Various species of lycoris may flower in red, pink, yellow, orange or white, but they are all spectacular with their spidery, recurved flowers (less pronounced in the pink species).

# Safe grilling combats foodborne illnesses

COLLEGE STATION — Now that summer cookout grees F; poultry breasts to 170 season is well under way, experts advise outdoor chefs to keep food safety in mind every time they fire up the grill.

That way the growth of bacteria that causes foodborne illnesses will be prevented, and outdoor cookouts will cook up only pleasant memories.

Dr. Peggy Van Laanen, Texas Cooperative Extension nutrition specialist, and Dr. Dan Hale, Extension meats specialist, offer the following tips for safer, healthier outdoor cook-

· Make sure the meat, poultry or seafood to be grilled is fresh and of high quality;

· Keep perishable foods refrigerated at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or colder until right before putting them on the grill. Frozen foods should be thawed in the refrigerator, not on the counter. Food also may be defrosted in the microwave im-

mediately before grilling. Keep food in the refrigerator while it is being marinated, and leftover sauce should not be used as marinade on cooked meat. Bacteria from the uncooked meat could contaminate the marinade and, in turn, contaminate the meat after it has been cooked;

 Wash hands before and after working with raw meats, poultry or fish;

· Wash work surfaces and cutting boards with hot soapy water before and after using them to prepare foods for grilling. If possible, use separate cutting boards for produce and for meat, poultry and seafood. For sanitizing cutting boards, use a combination of 1 teaspoon of bleach and 1 quart of

water; · If the cookout is some place other than the back yard, transport meat and poultry in a cooler with ice. To keep meat juices from contaminating other foods, use a separate cooler for anything else that

needs to be kept refrigerated; · Utensils used to put raw meat or poultry on the grill should be washed in hot soapy water before using to serve cooked foods;

• Use a food thermometer to make sure foods are cooked to the correct internal temperature to destroy harmful bacteria.

Cook whole poultry to an internal temperature of 180 dedegrees F; ground beef burgers to 160 degrees F and ground poultry to 165 degrees F; beef, veal and lamb steaks, roasts and chops to 145 degrees F; and all cuts of pork to 160 degrees F;

 Serve grilled foods immediately after removing them from the grill, or keep them at 140 degrees F or warmer until serving;

· Refrigerate leftovers immediately at 40 degrees F or lower. Throw away any foods left out for more than two hours (or one hour if the outdoor temperature is 90 degrees F or more).

Too much smoke or charring can ruin the most carefully planned outdoor menu. To keep the smoky flavor of outdoor grilling to its preferred level, Van Laanen and Hale provide these suggestions:

· Prevent flare-ups from dripping fat by trimming excess fat from meats before placing them on the grill. A little pre-cooking in the microwave can help release some of the meat juices that can also cause flare-ups;

· Don't use marinades or basting sauces that contain a lot

 Wrap fish and vegetables in foil before placing on the

· Before starting the fire, cover the grill with foil and poke holes in it so that juices can drip out;

· Move cooking foods around on the grill, rotate the grill or reduce heat to help prevent heavy smoke while cook-

 Control the fire. If foods do get charred, don't eat the charred parts;

· To shorten cooking time, some foods, such as poultry and ribs, can be partially precooked by boiling or cooking briefly in the microwave before placing on the grill. However, pre-cooked foods must be placed on the grill immediately to prevent the growth of bacteria that can cause foodborne ill-



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




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

BRIE, HAM AND SPINACH PIZZA 1 12-inch prebaked

pizza crust 3/4 cup julienned red

onion 1/2 tsp. chopped gar-

lic 2 tsp. olive oil

1/2 cup pizza sauce

1 cup part-skim mozzarella cheese, shredded

4 oz. Brie cheese, sliced a quarter-inch thick

1/2 tsp. ground cumin 3 oz. ham, diced to 1/4 the pie. inch

12-15 leaves of spinach, stems removed

Toss the red onion and

garlic with 1 teaspoon olive oil; roast at 475 degrees F until soft, for five

minutes. Cool.

Spread sauce on pizza crust, and sprinkle mozzarella over sauce. Arrange the ham on the mozza-

Sprinkle cooled red onion mixture on top of ham. Arrange Brie on top and sprinkle with cumin.

Toss spiniach with 1 teaspoon olive oil to coat lightly; arrange on top of


