**MAY THE CONGRESS PRESERVE US**

A curious nation seems to be gaining acceptance from the American public irrespective of how they voted last fall that the Kennedy program will not, after all, cost as much as people were led to expect.

As that program now emerges, we cannot see that there is much support for this ever-so tempered optimism. It is more likely a case of having become insensible to the arithmetical significance of billions and to being stunned by the galling tempo of White House orders to Congress.

Extension of unemployment insurance from 26 to 39 weeks, enlargement of social security promises, care for the aged under social security, medical facilities and training, assistance to distressed areas and aid to education will cost an estimated \$5.2 billion the first year.

Perhaps you can shrug off these first-year billions. But don't forget these are destined to be hardy perennials. We cannot now conceive of their total cost. What is before us is merely the token down-payment by which we can acquire these expensive and demoralizing habits for life — the life of the nation.

These are in the pattern of such earlier deception as the income tax which, would never (they said) take more than three percent of our earnings, but now abstracts from 20 to 91 percent of our substance; the social security experiment that originally took one percent of the first \$3,000 of our pay from us and a similar amount from the boss, is now taking three percent on the first \$4,800 and by 1969 will reach four-and-a-half

**Notes From The County Agent's Office**

Many farmers and ranchers overlook the possibility of making money from wildlife. It is possible to increase income by managing and harvesting the wildlife resources on the land. A new Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication discusses and explains how this can be accomplished.

There is one important point to remember, however. All wild animals in Texas are the property of the people living in the state. Game animals, including birds, fish and mammals, either dead or alive, cannot be sold. Landowners may, however, lease their land for hunting and fishing privileges.

Naturally, the better the hunting or fishing, the more people will be willing to pay for the privilege. This is where the management part of the program comes in. By providing, or leaving, adequate food and cover for the land

Unless our elected representatives in Washington are able to call upon some hidden reserve of fortitude and patriotism with which to resist the cynical blandishments of a collectivist pied piper, we shall find ourselves thoroughly compromised as that misguided young spinster who was reported to be slightly pregnant.

Orbiting and Safe Return of the Russian dog Chernushka, have sent sundry US commentators into flights of fancy. The Reds, they divine, are about to orbit a man and are therefore, months ahead of us in the space race!

There is some reason to believe they have already tried this — disastrously. But if they try again tomorrow — and win — it could prove nothing more than their subnormal respect for human life. This they have demonstrated repeatedly in their purges and massacres from Hungary and Poland to the Ukraine. Let's take it easy.

animals and by properly stocking and managing the pond or lake, the landowner can insure a plentiful population of game animals.

Other factors that help determine the price of the lease are the number of people to be accommodated, facilities available and accessibility. Many landowners, especially those with fishing waters, have found it profitable to make additional facilities available to the sportsman. Boat and cabin rental, bait selling and other extras can increase the owner's income.

Another important point to remember is the matter of licenses. Persons who sell hunting leases are required to purchase a shooting preserve license, and persons who sell bait are required to purchase a bait dealer's license. These may be obtained from the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Austin.

**IRS Speeds Refunds To Bolster Economy**

The Internal Revenue Service has long been noted for efficiency in the taking in of our tax dollars. This year's "hurryup" tax refund program to bolster the sagging economy has called for the tax folks turning their skill to getting tax dollars out. They are proving equal to the occasion.

Refunds mailed to Dallas District taxpayers by March 3, 1961 amount to 217,427 checks totaling \$21,063,600, or an average of \$97 per check. This is well ahead of the 143,148 checks totaling \$13,056,214, or an average of \$88 per check mailed to taxpayers by March 3, 1960. The tax men feel that the increase of \$9 per refund check is due to increased unemployment during 1960. They expect refunds amounting to some seventy to eighty millions to be mailed to more than 720,000 taxpayers before July 1.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director, advises all taxpayers to file now. He stated, "Those having refunds coming will help us to get their refund to them sooner by mailing their tax returns now."

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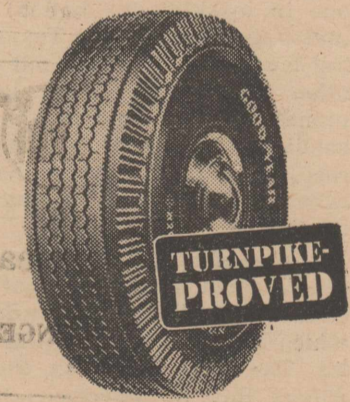

As was expected might be the case, Sanderson's Felix Valles broke the record in the 880 yard run, posting a new mark of 2:05.3 and toppling the mark of Ozona's Bobby Martinez set in 1956 at 2:05.9.

Borrowing from other people and failing to return what was borrowed is getting to be a very bad habit at Ozona High School. One of the main gripes has come from the typing room. These cases of borrowing have been a problem not only at OHS but every where for a long, long time and it is quite likely that it will go on for a long time to come. Something must be done about it, but what? Would locked lockers


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



**CHEF TAYLOR REVEALS RECIPE**

We heard about (and finally tasted) some of Mr. Taylor's famous Louisiana cooking and prevailed upon him to reveal his secret recipes. It took some high-powered persuasion, but he finally gave in and modestly submitted the ingredients and the technique.

**Creole**

Any kind of meat, poultry or fish  
1/4 cup cooking or vegetable oil  
Boiling water  
1/2 cup flour  
1 chopped onion  
1 chopped bell pepper  
8 or 10 garlic buds

Celery if desired  
1/2 teaspoon thyme  
1/2 teaspoon sweet basil  
1/2 teaspoon oregano  
1 bay leaf  
2 to 4 cans tomato sauce  
Salt and pepper to taste.

The basis for the most Louisiana cooking is the "Roux" (pronounced Roo). Combine cooking oil and flour in the pot and stir constantly until the mixture is about the color of smoking tobacco. Dump in meat and stir until the roux has adhered to it. Then pour in enough boiling water to cover. You are then under way! Add spices, onion, garlic, bell pepper, celery, and tomato sauce. Cook until the

meat is tender and serve over rice.

**Gumbo**

For gumbo, do the same as for Creole but substitute okra for tomato sauce about twenty minutes before the meat is done.
