Notes From The County Agent's Office By Pete W. Jacoby

How much is a mesquite tree worth? Extension Range Specialist G. O. Hoffman of Texas A&M College says that actually a dead mesquite tree is worth more than a live one. A live mesquite, 10 inches in diameter, will use a ton of water to produce a pound of beans. That same ton of water would produce four pounds of grass. The point of the whole thing, he says, is that you can kill the tree for five cents . . let it live and it wil cost you\$9.00 per year.

Hoffman recommends that trees over 4 inches in diameter be frilled or cut off and treatment applied to the cut surface. Spray solution in the cut surface until it bubbles. For mesquite control mix one gallon of 2, 4, 5-T to 48 gallons of oil; for oaks use one gallon to 24 gallons of oil. All you need in the way of equipment is an ax, a knapsack sprayer and chemical solution.

calcareous soils. Chlorosis or yellowing of planst results when the green coloring matter fails to develop or is destroyed. Affected plants range from light green to yellow to almost white.

The loss of color is most often due to lack of iron in plants. The diseased condition may also be due to viruses, deficencies of sulfur, manganese or nitrogen, poor drainage or aeration, nematode damage, root rot or crown gall.

Lack of iron is most common oin apple, apricot, arbovitae, ash, catalpa, cedar, cherry laurel, Chinese tallow, citrus, grasses, magnolia, oleander, peaches, pecan, pyracantha, rose, strawberry and many other shrubs and flowers. Most soils on which iron chlorosis occurs are well supplied with iron, but it is in form unavailable for plant use. Iron chlorosis is controlled by adding in sulfate (copperas) or iron chelates to the soil. These chemicals can also be applied as a foliage spray in late evening when the plants are actively growing. In general, spraying will give quicker results but will not last as long as proper soil applications. Chlorotic plants are found in all Applications of large amounts of

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
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
