GAGARIN'S LAUNCHING — U. S. PRESS VERSION

You just can't satisfy a glutton. The Russian Communists got the most tremendous footage in film and sound, and biggest type splash in the American pinko press and news media from its claimed man in space than was accorded the Pearl Harbor sneak attack or the Allied invasion of Europe.

Yet news broadcasts of Tuesday morning told of complaints from the Russians that American news media had belittled and ridiculed the Russian man in space stunt. One of the American media, the NBC Dave Garroway Today show, was among the first to broadcast the Russian complaint against American news media, to which Garroway promptly replied, "Not this one." And Dave can say that over and over again, for his program is one that always gives the Russians a full run of free publicity in any of their propandanda efforts.

Despite the many questionable facets of the Russian announced manned space flight, such as the varying accounts of how the man landed, his statement that he could see the earth plainly, (despite the 'thing's' tremendous speed and height) and the Russ scientist's statement that the 'thing' didn't have a window, and the mix-up in signals which resulted in the London issue of the Daily Worker to announce the so-called space flight five days before the Moscow version — despite all these palpably doubtful aspects, only one man in the U. S. government, so far as we have been able to find, has expressed any doubt about the Russian claim of successful man in space. That one heroic doubter is Congressman Roman C. Pucinski, D-III.

"I believe it is the duty of some responsible branch of our government to fully investigate this accomplishment before we accept it as a reality," Congressman Pucinski said in pointing to the obvious discrepancies in the Russian announcement.

But to get back to the ample coverage being given by the American news media to things Communist, a columnist by the name of Inez Robb wins center billing on the highly tinted editorial page of one of our area daily papers. Tuesday morning to shed big crocodile tears for Americans who fail to go into panic over the Russian's "astounding feat." (her words) She sees "little note of urgency among we, the people," that the Russians one more "had beaten us to the draw—in a most spectacular manner—bound to impress the rest of the world with their skill and know-how." If they don't impress the world it won't be the fault of American news media, who, like Pravda, no longer bother to say "according to the Russians," but state claims as facts of their own knowledge.

This Robb character muses on and on ad nauseum about the great accomplishments of the Russians and their "Christopher Columbus of the space age," and the fat and satisfied complacent Americans who fail to work up that "note of urgency," berates Congress for its failure to "do something" and the American people for "burrowing

deeper into their electric blankets." Just what the Robb would do about it may be revealed in her statement that the "only real fear in this country . . . is the awful possibility of a raise in taxes."

Yes, Inez, there is great fear of a raise in taxes, what with the great New Frontier cruising all over the world with its peace corps, aid to the aged, to the depressed, to the unemployed, to the backward nations, to the United Nations, etc. etc. And nothing would please the Communists more nor serve their purpose more completely than for the American people to panic and demand a crash program of catching up in space and losing the race on old terra firma.

FEDERAL CONTROL STILL THE ISSUE

The fate of \$2,298,000,000 worth of Federal aid to education — and the infinitely more significant threat of Federal encroachment on the schools of 50 states — still await the outcome of the collision of the seemingly irresistible force of the Kennedy welfare state steam roller and the apparently immovable objection of the Catholic hierarchy and its various supporters to an aid program that excludes parochial and private schools.

Curiously, support for the Catholic viewpoint has come from the Jewish head of the New York public schools, President Charles H. Silver of the New York City Board

of Education. He pointed out, in testimony before a House subcommittee, that nearly half of New York's 960,000 elementary and high school pupils are presently enrolled in parochial and other private schools. If they were all to decide to go to public schools the system would be swamped. The city would need \$1 billion for buildings, \$200 million more a year for operations.

In the meanwhile, 19 Protestant and Jewish clergymen and laymen, including such figures as the Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Washington, the presidents of Columbia, Harvard and Princeton and former Senator "Uncle Herbert" Lehman, urged support of the Kennedy measure to aid public schools only. The joint statement declared that it would be "most unfortunate for a major church to press its own

interests in a way that would threaten the strengthening of our basic educational system."

In Congress and over the nation, however, there was a growing feeling of gratitude toward this "major church" and any and all other forces that had helped to stem the headlong rush to pass the Kennedy measure and provided time to think — and time, perhaps, to save our basic educational system from the clutches of the Washington bureaucrats and their unremitting search for more guineapigs and more bil-

lions. It is better luck than we deserve.

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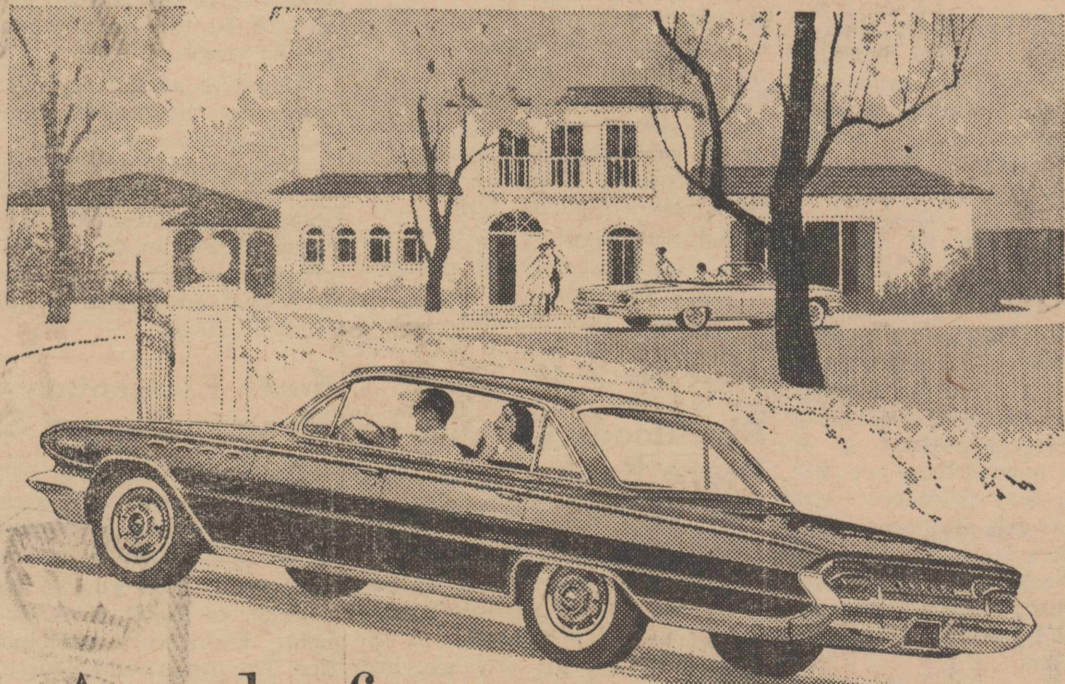
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The News Reel
