Four Teams Squared Off For Summer Diamond Battles

Little League play will get under way Monday when Ozona Oil meets Moore Oil in the first game of the season at 6 p. m. followed by the second game between B&B and Mason Motors.

Spring tryouts were held during the past two weeks, after the schools were canvassed for new prospects during the week or two before.

Managers for the new season will be B. J. Howerton and Dan McBroom for B&B, Moore Oil will have Bud Cox and Norman Upham Mason Motors will be managed by Ralph Eversole, and George Southard, and Ozona Oil by Taylor Deaton and Glenn Webb.

Mason Motors will be defending its 1960 title, but will be missing a number of its fine 12-year-olds, a loss that will be common to most teams even though the importance of the loss and the quality of loss may vary from group to group.

The league, under the direction of Roy Killingsworth this year, and sponsored jointly by the Ozona Lions Club and the county, will attempt this year, for the first time, to have a full fledged program for those boys not chosen in the big league. A number of coaches have been secured and a schedule including one night game each week, will be followed if enough interest is shown by the boys.

A program of all practice and no games was followed last season but lack of competition killed the program. The new minor league will not have sponsors, nor uniforms, but will have coaches and games under little league regulations.

Games during the first half of the season will start at 6 p. m. and during the last half at 6:30 with games on Monday and Thursday in big league play and the other date to be set.

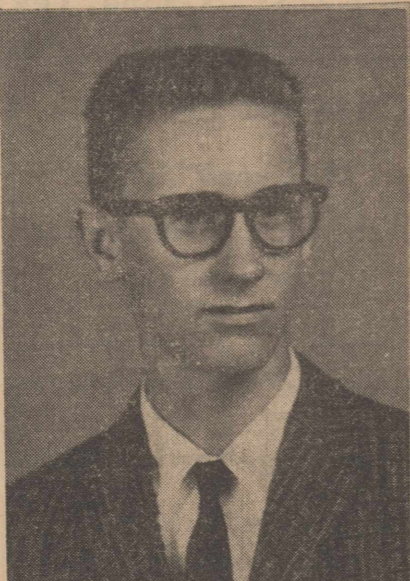

Basketball Coach Brooks Dozier released his 1961-62 schedule this week which includes 19 games plus three tournaments for the up-coming season.

The Ozona high school team is expected to be a strong one next year with all but one regular returning, plus at least one ineligible and most of the team's reserve bench.

Figures for the past season revealed that the first five scorers will be returning, with this year's co-captain Van Miller, having led the team for the season while Hal Long lead district scoring.

Besides Long, and Miller, Phillip Carnes, an all-district selection this season, and Pete and Carl Montgomery will be returning for action next year.

Carl Montgomery led the team in rebounding while brother Pete started nearly half the season at guard in lieu of senior Jim Freeman, who was out with illness and injury a large part of the season.

Juniors-to-be, Robert Cox and Gary Studdard who was ineligible due to the transfer rule, will both be trying to win a post next season, with Studdard due to be a distinct threat to become a starter.

Billy Corpeilus, who had a good season on the B team, will also be a strong contender and with a little improvement could play a lot of basketball for Ozona next season.

The Ozona schedule will start Nov. 17 in Ozona with the Lions facing Garden City, a home and home series with Menard, Iraan, and Del Rio, plus the Rankin Tourney will precede the Christmas holidays.

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Two Students In Dead Heat For Top Scholastic Honors

Arthur Kyle, Jr., Roberta Johnigan To Share Valedictory

For the first time in the history of the Ozona High School, it is believed, the 1961 graduating class will have co-valedictorians.

Two students emerged from four years of high school studies with identical grade scores, even if carried to the decimal point.

And the class with a two-headed brain offered no discrimination as to sex, since the two top tying students were a girl and a boy.

Roberta Johnigan and Arthur Kyle, Jr., each emerged with a grade average of 94.139 and will share honors as co-valedictorians of the 1961 graduating class, it was announced this morning by Principal J. A. Peltó, after completion of the check and re-check of the grade average by faculty members and the students themselves.

In a class of 32 candidates for graduation five students scored grade averages of 90 and above and the top one-fourth of the class had averages 86 and above.

In third place in class averages was Sandra Whitaker, who was close to the winners with an average of 93.912. Barbara Barbee was fourth with 90.83; James Freeman was fifth with 90.16. In sixth place was Mary Lou Zunker, with an average of 88.97. In seventh slot was Anne Davidson with an average of 88.81 and Tony Parker finished in eighth place with a grade score of 86.87.

Commencement exercises will be held May 18 at 8 p. m. in the high school auditorium. Baccalaureate services will be held Sunday morning, May 14.

Range Management Study Featured In Station Field Day

Ranchers Invited To Barnhart Station's Program Monday

Ranchmen of Crockett and surrounding counties are invited to attend the field day and program at the Texas Range Experiment Station between Ozona and Barnhart next Monday, starting at 9 a. m.

Dr. W. T. Hardy, director of the Sonora and Ozona-Barnhart stations, will welcome the day's guests. Dr. D. L. Huss, department of Range and Forestry of A&M College, will outline the scope of research at the Texas range stations. Dr. O. E. Sperry of the Extension Service will discuss the chemical control of bitterweed and perennial broomweed and demonstrate spraying equipment.

Other discussions will be on sheep and cattle improvement through selective breeding, range research work, prickly pear and mesquite control and range management topics of interest.

A barbecue dinner will be served at the noon hour by the Crockett Soil Conservation District. After lunch, visitors will be taken on a tour of the station pastures where different degrees of stocking and management will be observed and explained, with results of the various plans revealed.

1961 Track Team Wins First Title In Regional Meet

Five Team Members Now Head For State Meet At Austin

Ozona High School achieved a new mark in its athletic record book last Saturday when they captured the regional track meet held in Lubbock in a close meet decided by one third of a point.

The Lions, who had qualified six men in nine events, were for the most part rather disappointed at their achievements for the day and did not expect the championship, the first one ever captured by an Ozona track team.

The Lions will now advance the 440 relay team of Carl and Pete Montgomery, Tony Parker and Jim Doran to state, having finished a very close second with a 44.0, .9 of a second better than the time posted here in winning the district meet.

Jim Doran, who placed fourth in state in Austin last year in the 100, also advanced to state, finishing second in Lubbock.

Phillip Carnes won first place in the high hurdles with a 15.6 to become the fifth man on the team to advance to state in Austin next week.

The sixth man on the Ozona team, Van Miller got off his best jump in competition so far, but wound up third, missing the Austin trip by only slightly over an inch. Van jumped 20 7/8 inches, bettering his winning distance in district by slightly better than one foot.

Carl Montgomery, the Lions second point maker in district, was hampered by a bruised foot and failed to qualify in any of the four individual events in which he was entered. Both Montgomery and Phillip Carnes, who have been far above the winning distance in the district failed to place in that event even though the winning distance was only 134' as compared to Carnes 139' in winning district and Montgomery's numerous throws of over 140' in practice the last two weeks.

The winning 1/3 of a point came from the high jump where Carnes was involved in a tie for third place with two other competitors. Tony Parker placed in both the 100 and the 220 but not high enough to move on to Austin except in the 440 relay.

As predicted, Eldorado's Jim Runge broke the state record in the 440-yard run. The Eldorado speedster posted a 49.7 to knock off a second from the time posted here and in the prelims in Lubbock. Runge was pushed more than here, but still won by 10 yards or more and appeared to be capable of a better time yet.

Junction advanced George Willis, winner in the 220, and Robert Jones, one of the its pole vaulters, to Austin for the only other qualifiers to reach Austin from this district.

Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere will take members of the Ozona team to San Antonio Saturday to take part in a practice meet for teams having qualified for state competition. The meet is not limited to division of entries making competition very stiff for class A or 2A but the experience is considered very beneficial to the team.

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Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Black spot is one of the most common diseases of roses, according to Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist. It is likely to be more serious on susceptible second-year plants in areas of high rainfall.

Large, roundish black leaf spots with irregular margins are often observed. However, the spots on soft twigs and leaf branches may frequently develop unnoticed, and severe damage results in premature leaf drop. This weakens plants and makes them more susceptible to die-back, drought and winter injury. Too, it also results in smaller flowers which are weak in color and fragrance.

Black spot can be controlled by spraying once a week with Dithane M-22, Manzate or Phaltan. Time between sprays may be longer during periods of little rainfall. The addition of spreader-sticker to the spray will insure better coverage, and both lower and upper sides of the leaves should be sprayed. Hose on sprayers or compressed air sprayers are generally satisfactory for applying the fungicide if only a few rose plants are involved.

Where powdery mildew is a problem, Karathane may be added to Dithane M-22 or Manzate. Too, most commonly used insecticide can be mixed with the aforementioned fungicides. Combination fungicides-insecticide mixtures are available but are generally more expensive. Dusts generally give very poor control of black spot. The use of fertilizer will help compensate for the loss of leaves to black spot.

Additional information on rose and culture is available from local extension agent. Ask for a copy of TAP-1, "Roses for Texas."
