where powdery mildew is a problem, Karathane may be added to Dithane M-22 or Manzate. Too, most commonly used insecticide can be mixed with the aforementioned fungicides. Combination fungicides-insecticide mixtures are available but are generally more expensive. Dutsts generally give very poor control of black spot. The use of fertilizer will help compensate for the loss of leaves to black spot.
