Some tips on reseeding offered by range specialist at Texas A&M College are as follows: In case of abandoned cropland, reseed the best land first. Start with a soil sample test and carry out the operation in the same thorough manner that you would use in any other crop. Control weeds to give grasses a chance, than practice good grazing management to help get grasses established.

On baren or denuded rangelands if 15% of the better grasses are present, deferred grazing may do the job quicker and a lot cheaper than reseeding. In some cases, such as range pitting or root plowing, reseeding has proven profitable. However, these will usually be dependant on adequate moisture supply and protection of the seedling grasses from grazing. -000-






