Tony Parker and Jim Doran, who have sparked the Ozونians to three straight trips to the Austin meet, both graduate this season but prospects for the next season are not bad and the Lions will definitely be in contention for district honors next season.

Sanderson, Eldorado and Junction scored points in Austin, but were about the only other class A teams from this part of Texas to do so.

Ft. Stockton, which has had a fine season track wise, finished fourth in the 2A class.

89-Year-Old Minister Had Served Ozونا Church 8 Years

Rev. J. H. Meredith, 89, beloved Methodist minister who served eight years as pastor of the Ozونا Methodist Church, and who was the oldest minister in the Southwest Texas Methodist Conference, died last Thursday in San Antonio following a heart attack.

Funeral services were held Saturday, at the Harlandale Methodist church in San Antonio where he preached for a number of years after his official retirement. The body was then taken to Kerrville for burial.

Rev. Meredith served as pastor of the Ozونا Methodist Church from 1928 to 1935. He had served pastorates in Llano, Uvalde, Harper, Center Point, Stinson Chapel and San Antonio. He officially retired in 1940 after 33 years in the ministry but continued to preach for a number of years. He entered the ministry in Indiana in 1907 and moved to Texas shortly afterwards.

Last year many of his friends from throughout Southwest Texas attended a Meredith Day service held in the Harlandale church to honor the pioneer minister.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Wesley Mason of San Antonio, with whom he lived; a son, Ray Meredith of Uvalde, and three grandchildren.

Devonian Discovery Indicated In Western Crockett County Test

A Devonian discovery was indicated in extreme northwest Crockett County with the flowing of gas and recovery of oil on two drill-test tests at El Cinco Production Co., Ltd., Midland, No. 2 C. D. Johns, in 24-31-H&TC, 5 1/2 miles southwest of McCamey and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Crossett, South (Devonian) field.

On a three-hour test between 5,208-30 feet, gas surfaced in 10 minutes, rated at 70,000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 680 feet of mud-cut oil, 360 feet of free 42 gravity oil and 10 feet of water.

Flowing pressure was 139-878 pounds; 45-minute shut-in pressure, 2,498-2,045 pounds.

On a subsequent three-hour test between 5,230-260 feet, gas surfaced in 12 minutes, rated at 64,000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 540 feet of slightly mud-cut and highly gas-cut oil, 360 feet of free oil and 90 feet of water.

Flowing pressure was 112-312 pounds; 45-minute shut-in pressure, 2,485-2,080 pounds. Contract depth is 6,200 feet.

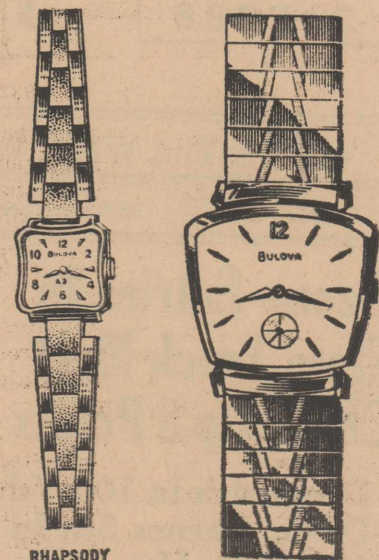

From The Stockman, May 21, 1932

The three inches of rain in Ozona, McDonald figures, was worth \$13,033.50.

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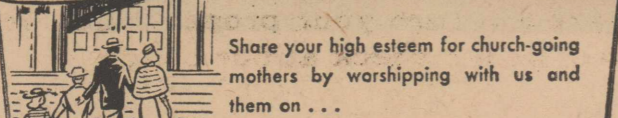

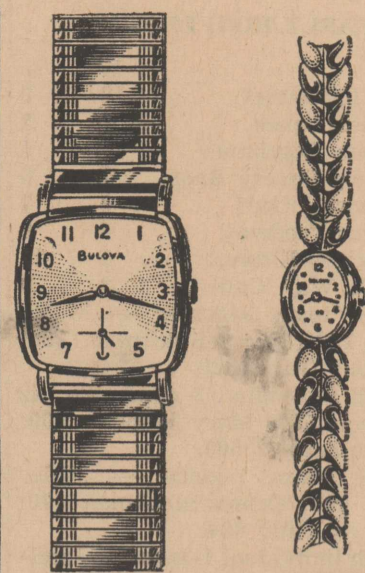

Mike is a member of Calvary Baptist Church where his father is minister.

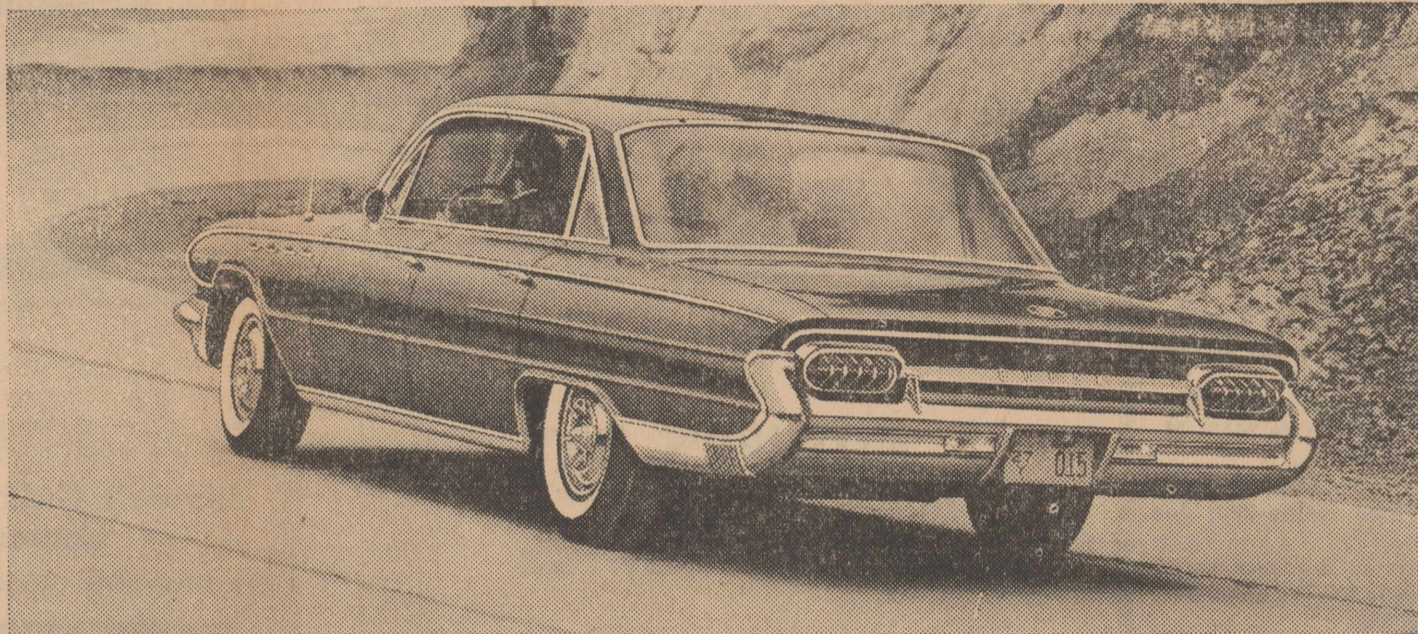

Notes From The County Agent's Office  
By Pete W. Jacoby

A poisonous plant — Threadleaf Groundsel — has been spreading fast in West Texas. It is a gray-green, yellow flowered plant about eight to nine inches tall. This plant is a member of the Senecio plant family and is considered toxic to livestock — particularly cattle. These plants contain a poison which usually causes abnormal calf deliveries and some abortion in cattle.

At the present, the flowers on this plant are too mature to use chemicals for control as the seeds would mature after the chemical are applied. To control a light infestation at this time of the year, digging and burning is recommended.

Some tips on reseeding offered by range specialist at Texas A&M College are as follows: In case of abandoned cropland, reseed the best land first. Start with a soil sample test and carry out the operation in the same thorough manner that you would use in any other crop. Control weeds to give grasses a chance, than practice good grazing management to help get grasses established.

On barren or denuded rangelands if 15% of the better grasses are present, deferred grazing may do the job quicker and a lot cheaper than reseeding. In some cases, such as range pitting or root plowing, reseeding has proven profitable. However, these will usually be dependant on adequate moisture supply and protection of the seedling grasses from grazing.
