Bill Jacoby was named a winner of the Santa Fe Educational award sponsored by the Santa Fe railroad. Both boys will receive a trip to the 40th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, in late November. They, along with some thirty other state winners, will serve as Texas delegates to the Nation-

Both Frank and Bill have compiled outstanding records in 4-H work, particularly in judging work where they have been members of six different state-wide champion 4-H judging teams. Each won numerous high individual awards on district and state level in grass, range, wool, mohair and livestock judging. They were members of the state champion Junior Wool & Mohair Judging team in 1969, the Senior Wool & Mohair team and Grass Judging team in 1959, Range judging team and San Antonio Grass Judging team in 1960 and won the over-all Sonora Wool Show judging contest in 1961.




