

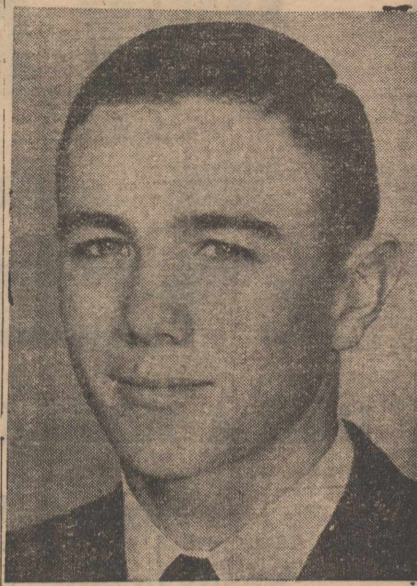
Frank Childress And Bill Jacoby Win State Honors On 4-H Record Books; Get Trip to Natl. 4-H Congress In Chicago

Frank Childress, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Childress, and Bill Jacoby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Jacoby, have been named state winners with their 4-H club records. Frank made it there in a row for Crockett County when he was named winner of the Texas Sheep and Wool, Goat and Mohair award for 1961. The Texas Sheep & Goat Raiser's Association is sponsor of the award, won by Pierce Miller in 1959 and Pam Jones in 1961.

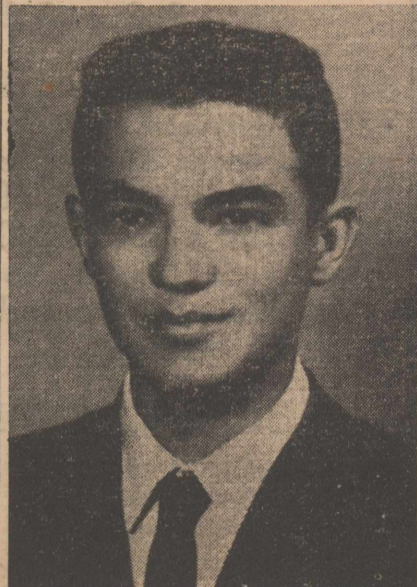
Bill Jacoby was named a winner of the Santa Fe Educational award sponsored by the Santa Fe railroad. Both boys will receive a trip to the 40th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, in late November. They, along with some thirty other state winners, will serve as Texas delegates to the National Congress.

Both Frank and Bill have compiled outstanding records in 4-H work, particularly in judging work where they have been members of six different state-wide champion 4-H judging teams. Each won numerous high individual awards on district and state level in grass, range, wool, mohair and livestock judging. They were members of the state champion Junior Wool & Mohair Judging team in 1960, the Senior Wool & Mohair team and Grass Judging team in 1959. Range judging team and San Antonio Grass Judging team in 1960 and won the over-all Sonora Wool Show judging contest in 1961.

Frank and Bill have each attended several district leadership camps, the state range management camp, and both have received the Mother Davidson Trophy as outstanding 4-H members. Both boys are seniors in Ozona High School and are completing their last year of 4-H club work. They will leave Dallas for Chicago on November 24 with the Texas delegation and return on December 2.

Quarter Horses Added To 4-H Club Program For Year

Colt Show To Become New Feature Of County Shows

The Crockett County 4-H Club Quarter Horse committee met with County Agent Pete Jacoby Monday night to work out rules and regulations for the county program to be started this year. Showing of Quarter Horse colts at the county program to be started this year. Showing of Quarter Horse colts at the county show will be a new phase of 4-H training in the county.

Committee members working with the county agent on the new program will be Bud Cox, P. C. Perner and Chas. E. Davidson, III. October 15 has been set as the deadline for enrollment in the program this year. To be eligible for the program, a boy, or girl must be of the required 4-H club age, and must secure individually, a 1961 foal of either sex.

The colt must be registered in the club member's name and it is recommended that the colt be eligible for registration in the American Quarter Horse Association, although it will not be a requirement, to be eligible for the county program. Colts not eligible for the AQHA will not be eligible for major shows but only for the county show.

Only colts of quarter horse breeding will be eligible for the program. They will be judged 60% on quarter horse conformation, 20% on grooming and condition and 20% on manners and showmanship.

The 4-H committee will supervise the program under the direction of the county agent and will serve as adult leaders and advisors to 4-H members feeding and training colts in the program. The committees will approve eligible entries and make recommendations on the requirements for facilities for each individual member in the program.

Necessary classes for showing of the colts at the county show will be set up and awards in line with other classes of livestock in the county show will be awarded to the winners. Boys and girls interested in this program must enroll with the county agent by October 15.

Ingham Gas Field Extended East By University Strike

Texas Gulf Producing Co., Midland, No. 1-AA University, Crockett County Strawn and detrital gas discovery, 21 miles west of Ozona and five miles east-southeast of the Ingham (Devonian) field, has been completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through detrital perforations between 8,556-564 feet and 8,526-530 feet and from Strawn perforations between 8,470-74 feet and 9,485-95 feet.

Drilled to 9,758 feet, 5½-inch casing was set at 8,754 feet. Location is 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of 4-33-University.

R. A. Harrell was re-elected Zone 5 supervisor of the Crockett Soil Conservation District at the annual election of supervisors for Zone 5 held Tuesday in the local SCS offices.

After the election, interested ranchmen and others, including representatives of the county and Commissioners Court went on the annual inspection tour of the Johnson Draw flood control dams, constructed under SCS supervision.

Cy Richmond of San Angelo, area Soil Conservation Service representative, and James A. Glynn, newly assigned work unit conservationist here, accompanied the group on the tour of the dams.

\$15,000 Donated In First Week Of Screwworm Drive

County Ranchers Respond Generously To Fund Solicitation

If producers in the rest of the Southwest respond as heartily as Crockett county ranchers have to the call for contributions on a per-head basis to the fund being built up for the atomic age attack on the screwworm fly, the past summer may have been the last in which livestock men will have to fight this most expensive pest.

Organized a week ago last Tuesday night at a meeting here, the Crockett County committee, headed by Wayne West as chairman and Joe Tom Davidson as vice chairman, has secured contributions from around 70 Crockett county ranchers totalling more than \$15,000 and the campaign gaining momentum as more solicitors are recruited, more contacts are made and more voluntary contributions come into the Ozona National Bank.

Ranchers are being asked to put up 10 cents a head on sheep and goats and 50 cents a head on cattle and horses as their contribution to the fund to be turned over to the Southwest Animal Health Foundation and ultimately to go into financing of the battle to control the screwworm fly in the Southwest.

Earlier letters were prepared and mailed to 220 Crockett county ranch operators explaining the solicitation and the plan by which scientists have demonstrated the fly can be eliminated. Tremendous annual losses in livestock and in money spent to fight the screwworm menace have made ranchers realize the huge economic lift which would be theirs were the screwworm fly eliminated from among the hazards of livestock raising. For that reason most producers being contacted are enthusiastically responding to the call for their share of the contributions.

Fort Worth — Cattlemen from areas throughout Texas meeting in Uvalde, Sept. 29, strongly endorsed objectives of the newly organized Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, asked USDA to initiate a research project on whole sale meat reporting for the Southwest, and voted to give full cooperation to the Texas Legislative Council in studying possible ways of improving the brand laws of Texas.

The cattlemen were attending the quarterly director's meeting of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation was organized recently with the primary objective of stamping out screwworms in the Southwest. It is a cooperative effort between representatives of major livestock and agricultural groups in the state, and every livestock producer will be asked to support the Foundation.

The TSCRA Board of Directors' resolution read in part: "Be it resolved that we urge all members of the TSCRA to lend their support and assistance to the Foundation, and that we commend this program to all livestock producers in the State of Texas."

Garden Reminders

From Garden Club Reporter

October's "bright blue weather" is here again. This is the big planting month in Texas. Order your bulbs, shrubs, trees and vines for planting when they arrive.

Clip informal hedges for the last time this year. Plant bachelor buttons, stock and poppies. Plant American beauty-berry and honeysuckle where you need low shrubs. Plant Texas buckeye, amur, maple or common jujube in that spot where you need a hardy, tough small tree.

Try mahonia, gardenia or box honeysuckle where you want small evergreen shrubs. Now is the time to pot your house plants for winter pleasure. You don't need a green thumb to have indoors when the outside is gray.

Drive around and enjoy the lovely fall roses and lush greenness of the yards. Watch for chrysanthemums. They are bursting into bloom.

Roses duplicate their May and June color displays this month. Water well.

Pansy plants are now ready for setting out. Use plenty of bone-meal. Mix this into the soil well.

To keep crabgrass under control, apply any good pre-emergence crabgrass killer between now and Spring.

Don't fail to notice the village shopping center garden.

Another record that we can be proud of is that no county has ever won the Texas Sheep and Goat Award twice in a row except

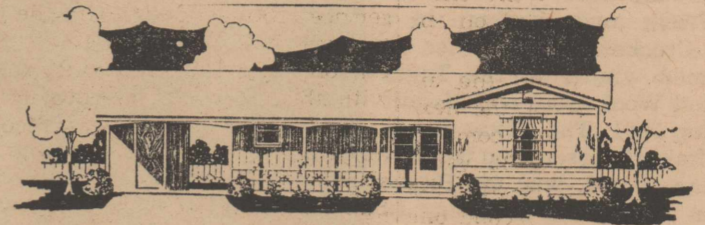
Crockett county, and Frank Childress this year made it three in a row.

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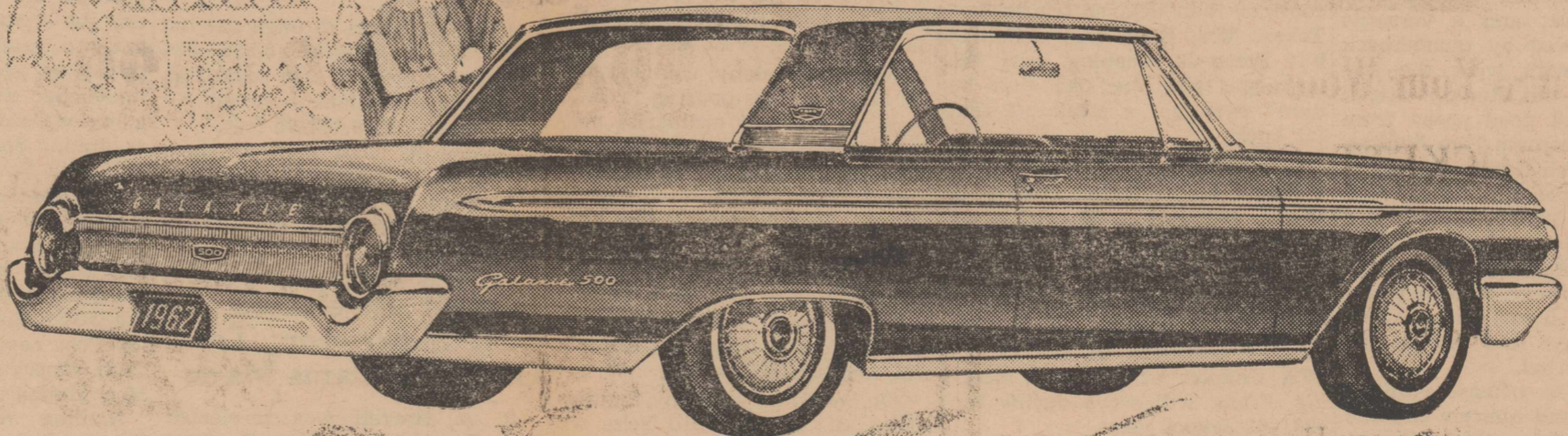

where Rankin launched the drive to the go-ahead touchdown.

The scoring play was a well-executed fake to the hard running Linthicum and a pitch to Tom Aguilar outside with the fleet half-back racing over unfouled as the Lions ganged Linthicum at the line of scrimmage. The try for point failed and the third quarter ended with the Devils leading 14 to 8.

The fourth quarter brought with it disaster for the Lions as the outmanned local team, hampered by several key injuries including one of the Lions top defensive hands, Pete Montgomery, went down under well balanced and well executed attack by the visiting club.

Jerry Linthicum pushed over the clincher early in the fourth period and also booted the extra point and from that point on the Lions were just hanging on.

The Red Devils found the air lanes open and went for the next two touchdowns on long completions, the first covering 35 yards and the second 65 yards with the first kick good and the second one blocked.

The two scores came on passes from Scarborough to end Ernest Clay and halfback Lloyd Farrell.

The Lions chalked up their last score on the board shortly before the contest ended when Carnes passed to Moore in the end zone and then repeated the trick for two more points.

In final review it was a case of too much speed and reserve strength with the Lions' lacking both the personnel and the speed to cope with the Rankin attack.

A review of the film of the game shows that the Lions made many basic mistakes which of course contributed to their downfall but this would be true of any loser and particularly where the coach has to rely on inexperienced players.

The Rankin club had all the best of the game statistics as they racked up 14 first downs to Lions 8, gained 292 yards rushing to 182 for the Lions, passed for 125 yards to the Lions 66 and were forced to kick only once.

Phil Carnes not only distinguished himself on offense as the quarterback of the Lion club but also had a good day on defense. Darrel Rasberry and Robert Cox anchored the center of the Ozona defense.

The injury of Pete Montgomery, who played only at times, and the slowing down of several other players due to injury hurt the Lions even though freshman replacements continued to look good even if they do make some rather critical mistakes.
