The Sabin vaccine is recommended for all ages from six mone sets up years. Since the vaccine sets up an intestinal block
against the disease, inoculation among the older people will eliminate some carriers of the disease who are not even suspect of being carriers. The three doses of the
vaccine, taken on a lump of sugar vaccine, taken on a lump of sugar
at about six weeks intervals, will set up a lifetime immunity against polio, doctors believe.
The unfortunate bad publicity which resulted from suspension of
the immunization in Canada no doubt will cut down on the numbers of people who will take the vaccine this year, doctors said, but so confident are they of the vac-
cine's safety and of the pressing cine's safety and of the pressing
need for mass inoculation that they have decided to press for carrying out the planned administration during the coming winter months.
