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Red Herring In the Mississippi

We seriously doubt that the Administration will be able to impress the citizens of the 49 other states that the nation is being threatened from Mississippi rather than from Cuba.

It is entirely possible, of course, that before this commentary is ready for the public eye, our Commander in Chief will have ordered out the Army, perhaps even the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force to protect us against Governor Ross Barnett.

In view, however, of the lack of public enthusiasm awhile back for General Eisenhower's ordering the 201st Airborne into Little Rock in full battle regalia to prod high school girls in their fannies, we suspect Mr. Kennedy — who is more politically astute will continue to brag about the situation having been "resolved" "without the use of military force" while Mississippians continue to hear the distant rumbling of marching feet, the rattle of sabers and roar of military vehicles, while they look into the hard eyes of armed and steel helmeted "U. S. Marshals" deployed about the campus of Ole Miss and in downtown Oxford. It may be a bit difficult for the people of Mississippi to realize just how gently they have been handled by forces of the Kennedy brothers.

Meanwhile, Congress completed the formality of approving a resolution on Cuba which warns that if the Russians violate the Monroe Doctrine any more than they already have, we are going to be pretty annoyed. Be it noted, however, that there was some sentiment in the House for stronger language. But, a motion for recommitment for this purpose was voted down 251-140.

As passed, the resolution states "the US is determined to prevent by whatever means may be necessary, including the use of arms, The Marxist-Leninist regime in Cuba extending by force or threat of force its aggressive or subversive activities in any part of this hemisphere."

Thus, if we comprehend the matter tongue, this daring document concedes Cuba to the Kremlin. It says sternly to Khrushchev: "If you go another step, take over Panama, and/or Mexico, Guatemala, Brazil, Argentina, Chile or others — we shall undoubtedly pass another resolution!"

And it invites all and sundry who may have tears to shed for the Monroe Doctrine to shed them the Monroe Doctrine to shed them now.

WAS THIS TRIP NECESSARY?

When Secretary of the Interior, Stewart L. Udall, decided to lead a delegation of Federal power experts on a tour of Soviet electric power installations no doubt he expected all to applaud. After all, isn't everything bigger and better in Russia?

He came back and said we should learn about long distance transmission from them, hence the remark of Rep. John P. Saylor of Pennsylvania in the Congressional Record critical of this "junker" must have come as a rude shock to Mr. Udall. Mr. Saylor's remarks tend to put the trip in a different perspective. They are also encouraging and enlightening — well worth repeating.

Mr. Saylor said: "It seems to me that if the Secretary wants a better knowledge of the operation of a truly magnificent and efficient electrical power supply system he'd better look in his own back yard rather than spending the taxpayers' money to go half way around the world — even though it is approaching vacation time."

"It is not difficult to understand why this important spokesman for the Administration on

Federal power activities wants to study the Russian Government's controlled transmission system, for he and other members of the Administration on this junket have been actively advocating a federally controlled national grid ever since they have been in office . . . I have studied the electric power supply situation in this country

and I am completely satisfied that an industry which produces over 5,000 kilowatt hours per capita is far better for us than the Russian system which produces less than 1,400 kilowatt hours per capita . . .

"I think we would all be better off if the Secretary of the Interior and these other officials would

take some good advice and 'see America first' rather than going over to Russia to learn some new way to Federalize the world's greatest and most efficient electric supply system."

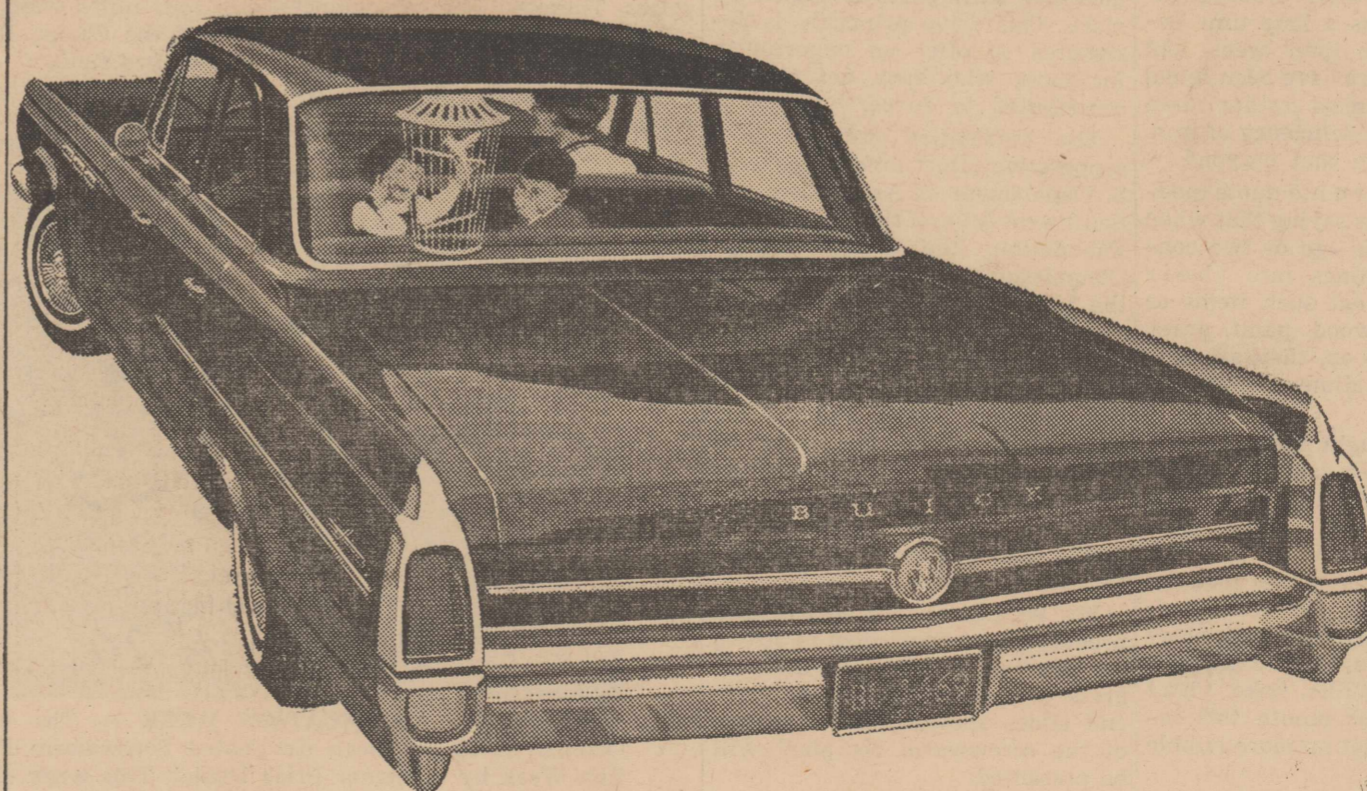

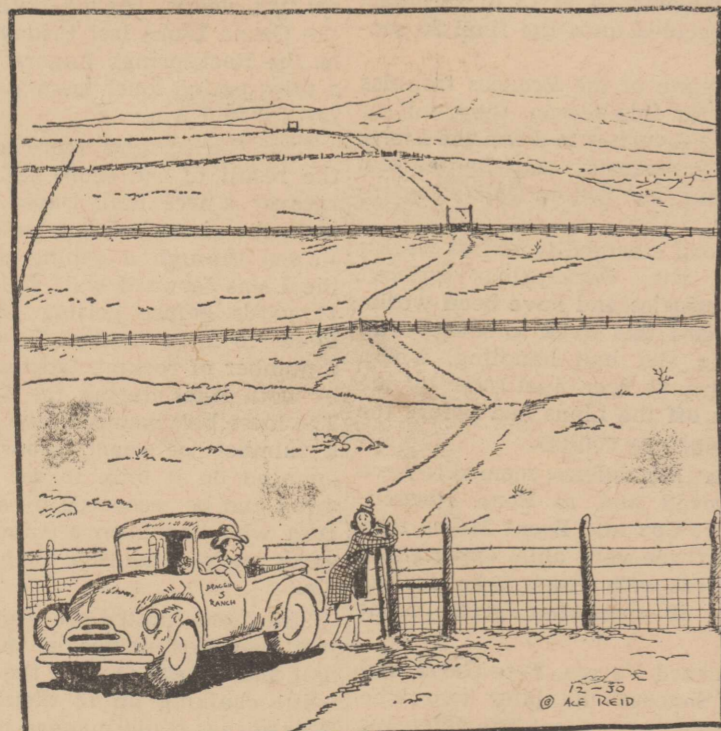

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Oct. 5, 1933

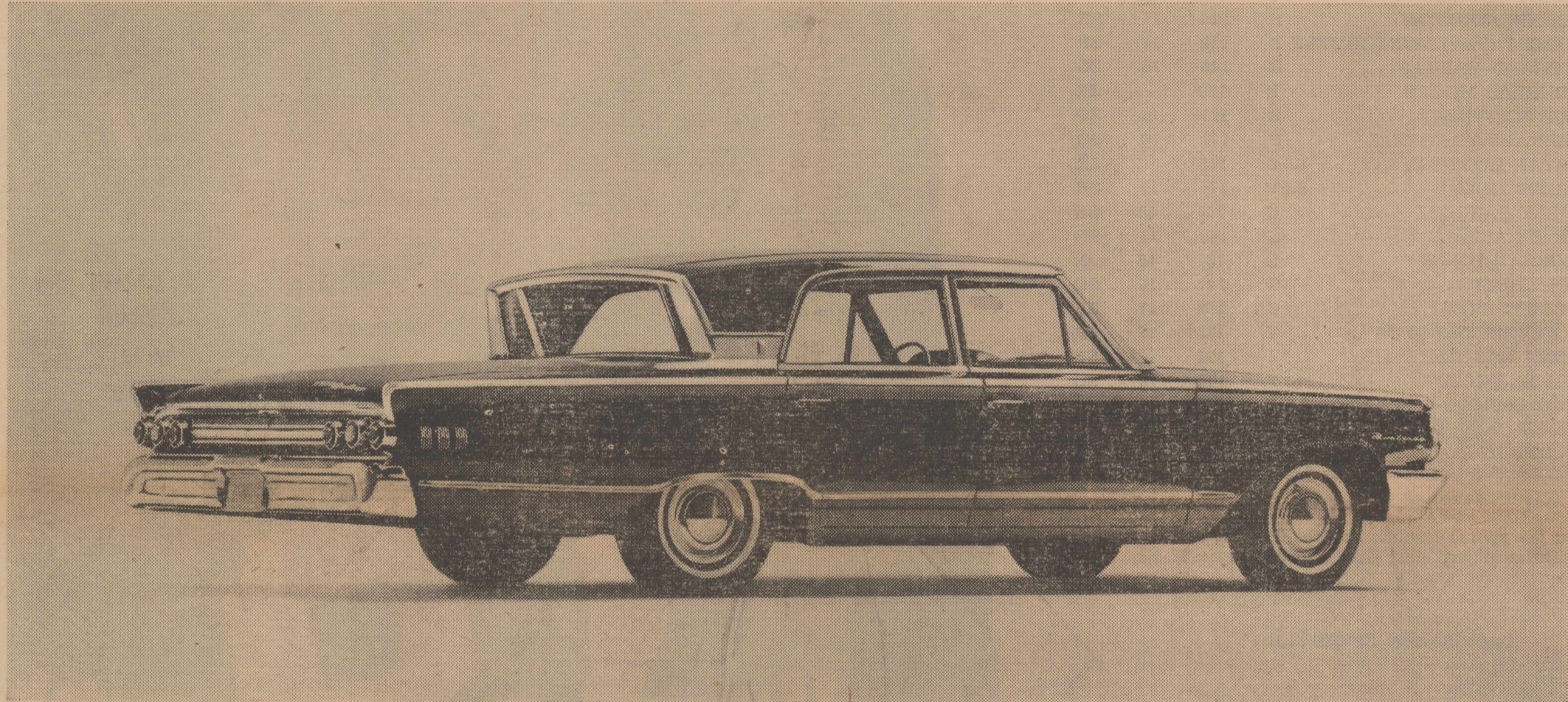

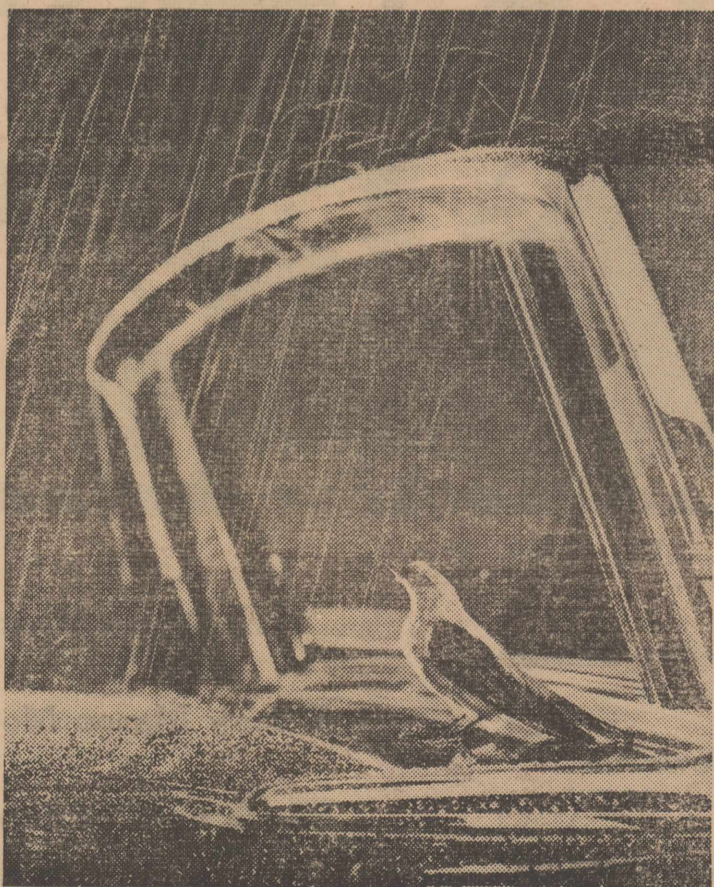

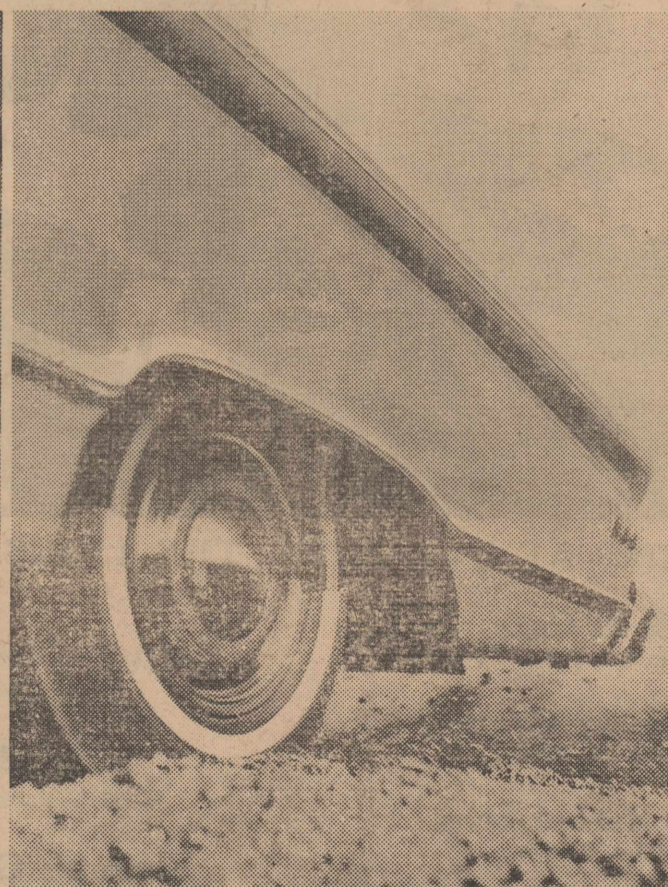

New Badge For Texas Rangers Harks Back To Badge Of Frontier Days

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the Texas Rangers are going back to the tradition steeped Mexican silver badge worn by their predecessors in frontier days.

Garrison said the new official Ranger badge, issued to each of the 62 members of the force, is a replica of the badge which old-time Rangers carved out of Mexican silver pieces when Texas became a state and their duties changed from military to law enforcement.

The best information available indicates that the five-pointed star on the badge symbolizes the "Lone Star" of Texas. The points are supported by an engraved wheel.

When the Department of Public Safety was created in 1935 and the Rangers became part of it, this badge was replaced with a solid badge of somewhat different shape and design. Then in 1957, a different badge was adopted for all officers of the Department, including the Rangers. This is a modern version of the old Ranger badge, with a five-pointed star surrounded by a royal blue background.

The history of the Rangers dates back to 1823 when Stephen F. Austin hired a contingent of 10 men to 'range' over a wide area to protect his colonists from Indians. Since that time, the force has been synonymous with the suppression of lawlessness and crime — first the Indians, then the bandits and cattle-rustlers, then the outlaws of the early 20th century and finally the modern-day criminals.

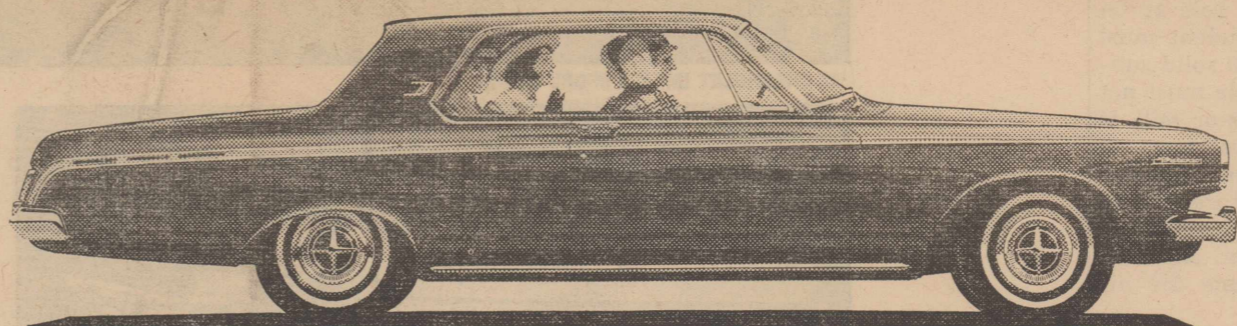

OHS GRADING SYSTEM

The grading system at Ozona High School has been explained by Mr. Pelto, the principal of the High School, for the benefit of new Ozona students and freshman.

At Ozona High School, no D's are given, so a C is the nearest thing to an F. If a student brings home a C to mother, he may think that he has it made, but he is wrong and he is very near failing.

To make the honor roll at Ozona High School a student must have a 90 average in all solid subjects, P. E. and Band. He must not have any C's. The honor roll is chosen for only the first five, six weeks periods; and any student making the honor roll three out of these five times will be recognized at the end of the year and will be awarded a certificate for his accomplishments.

At Ozona High School, Seniors may be able to exempt themselves from the final examinations in May if their grades are high enough.

When the four-year average is considered during the Senior year, the grades are recorded as follows: A+, 98; A, 95; A-, 92; B-plus, 88; B, 85; B-, 82; C-plus, 78; C, 75; C-, 72; F, 69 and below.

**HIGHLIGHTS
AND
SIDELIGHTS
From State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Jack Cox and John Connally crossed paths on the campaign trail in Austin . . . and they waved at each other.

Connally was talking to the County Treasurers Association convention. He stepped out on the hotel balcony to watch Cox riding in a parade put on by Youth for Cox.

Inside the hotel, Connally was urging the county treasurers to pitch in an dhelp support the Democratic ticket, else there might be Republican candidates for county treasurer next time.

Outside, Cox was urging young sters to pitch in and help him change Texas to a two-party state.

School Prayers — Public schools in Texas are not prohibited from allowing prayers to be said or passages from the Bible to be read (as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court decision in the Engel vs. Vitale case), so long as the State or a political subdivision does not prescribe or approve the prayer or religious activity.

So said Attorney General Will Wilson in a legal opinion requested by J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

Biggest Road Project — Largest highway program ever put together in Texas was authorized by the State Highway Commission.

Covering super-highway work only, the program comes to \$287,000,000 worth of construction and right-of-way buying during the coming two years. It will build 1,053 miles of expressway and buy right-of-way for 188 more miles.

When the work is completed about four years from now it will double the completed mileage of interstate highways in Texas under the 90 per cent Federal-10 per cent State program.

Screwworm Funds Needed — Texas Animal Health Commission will ask the Legislature for \$1-500,000 as an emergency fund to continue the fight against screwworms.

It will request another \$1,500,000 to make up the state's one-fourth of the \$12,000,000 program, with stockmen putting up \$3,000,000 and the Federal government \$6,000,000.

Statewide Trend — A statewide trend toward conservatism in state government is predicted by State Senator Charles F. Herring of Austin.

"Trend is evident", says Sentaor Herring, "by the election of so many new representatives with platforms that promise to take a closer look at government spending."

The veteran Austin legislator believes the public has become agitated and dissatisfied with the tendency toward more spending.

He cites the defeat of several "old-timers" in the Legislature as evidence; plus the nomination of many "new faces."

For Polio Action — Texas Medical Association has joined with the State Department of Health in urging community-wide oral polio vaccine programs.

III vaccine, the suspect type, and after a month not a single case of polio has developed among those who received the vaccine.

One of the reasons doctors feel that the mass inoculation is imperative in Texas is that this state now has the highest incidence of the disease of any state. Of the 200 plus known cases, 120 of them are in Texas.

The Sabin vaccine is recommended for all ages from six months to 99 years. Since the vaccine sets up an intestinal block against the disease, inoculation among the older people will eliminate some carriers of the disease who are not even suspect of being carriers. The three doses of the vaccine, taken on a lump of sugar at about six weeks intervals, will set up a lifetime immunity against polio, doctors believe.

The unfortunate bad publicity which resulted from suspension of the immunization in Canada no doubt will cut down on the numbers of people who will take the vaccine this year, doctors said, but so confident are they of the vaccine's safety and of the pressing need for mass inoculation that they have decided to press for carrying out the planned administration during the coming winter months. The plan was launched in Abilene last week and 65 percent of the population participated, the San Angelo medical meeting was told. This showing encouraged medical leaders to go forward with the mass inoculation plans.

Permit forms, to be signed by parents authorizing the polio vaccine doses for children, have been distributed among school children here in preparation for the November 11 inoculation. Authorization forms must be signed before the vaccine can be administered.

night. In control of the ball on their own 24 they sent Pete Montgomery, the game's leading ground gainer, who outgained the entire visiting team, racing almost 10 yards on first down, leaving a second and inches situation.

Ozona quarterback Leroy Cooper, correctly sizing up the situation, figured the visitors would stack the line against a running play in an effort to stop the first down try, and called a pass play.

The Lion receiver bolted into the clear without a visiting defender in the neighborhood. The blocking up front was good, and the screen of blockers in front of the passer looked ample to handle the situation, but Cooper unfortunately tripped over the nearest blockers foot and fell for a 6 yard loss. The next play gained five and the Lions kicked with fourth and one. That's the way it went the whole game.

The Lions pushed inside the visitors' 20 yard line seven times while allowing the visitors to cross the Lion 35 once, but it was all to no avail.

Ozona fans were able to give vent to the feeling of frustration on the game's first series of downs as Rocksprings played the first

three downs with 12 men on the field. Everyone at the ball game, except the officials, were well aware of the fact.

The Lions made one first down but then had to kick and Rocksprings quickly found the Lions too tough and kicked back. The Lions started to move and sparked by Vargas' 12 yard gallop and a 22 yard pass completion from Cooper to Montgomery moved deep into Angora territory before the first fumble loss occurred on the Rocksprings 17.

Things went rather evenly for awhile but with five minutes to go in the half the Lions started to move and apparently would have scored had not the clock caught them on the Rocksprings six inch line, first down.

Beginning the second half, the Rocksprings crew abandoned their single wing and reverted to a T formation and from then on the Lions had their troubles trying to contain the big hard running Angora backs.

After losing the ball on the Angora 16 yard line on a fumble, and having a pass intercepted on the Rocksprings 2, the Lions gave up the game's only score when the Angoras marched 55 yards behind the fine running of Danny Mennica and David Thurman. Mennica crossed the goal line from

three yards out on a sweep around the left side, but Ronnie Houston broke up the passing try for the extra points.

Following the Angora score the Lions stormed into Rocksprings territory three more times but busted plays, fumbles, and a little late game jitters, plus the aroused Rocksprings defense kept the Lions away from the promised land.

For the Lions, Brent Moore had an exceptional night, in fact, the entire defensive corps of the Lions turned in a good ball game.

On offense the Lions ran their plays, blocked, and ran well except for the last few moments of the contest, but one poor play every now and then spoiled the effect of a number of good ones.

He was also honored that year by the Paul Garrington Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution when it presented him its Good Citizenship Medal.

In the years since his successful battle with the Teamsters, Barry has continued to fight for the rights of the working man, the

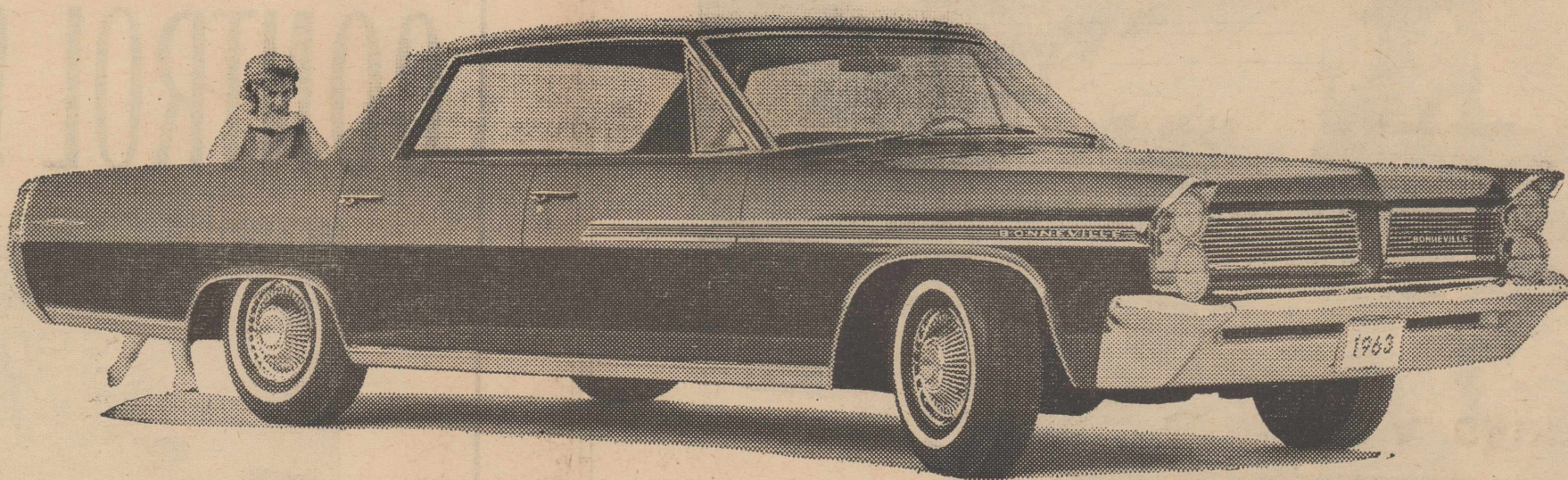
