Oral Vaccine To Be Administered Here As Planned

Doctors Endorse Vaccine As Safe; First In Series Nov. 11

The Tom Green County Eight County Medical Society meeting in San Angelo Monday night unanimously endorsed the Sabin oral vaccine program as a safe means of finally elinimating polio as a threat to health and agreed to sponsor mass immunization of the

population throughout its area. Dr. Ralph Simon of Ozona, who attended the Society meting, said that plans are being made to carry out the mass immunization here starting November 11 when Type I vaccine will be administered. Type II will be administered December 16 and Type III around February 1, the definite date to be announced later.

Decision to go ahead with the program was reached after intensive study of results of administration of millions of doses of the vaccine throughout the Everybody is invited to attend world. It was also pointed out that the Canadian vaccine is an entirely different product from the Sabin vaccine manufactured in this country. The Canadian manufacturers were using a polyvalent vaccine, combining all three types in one dose. The American Sabin vaccine is in three doses, each aimed at one of the three known types of





New Badge For Texas Rangers Harks Back To **Badge Of Frontier Days**

Austin - Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the Texas Rangers are going back to the tradition steeped Mexican silver badge worn by their predecessors in frontier days.

Garrison said the new official Ranger badge, issued to each of the 62 members of the force, is a replica o fthe badge which oldtime Rangers carved out of Mexican silver pieces when Texas became a state and their duties Carr as pianist. changed from military to law enforcement.

on the badge symbolizes the "Lone Star" of Texas. The points are supported by an engraved wheel

When the Department of Public Safety was created in 1935 and the Rangers became part of it, this badge was replaced with a solid badge of somewhat different shape and design. Then in 1957, a different badge was adopted for all officers of the Department, including the Rangers. This is a modern version of the old Ranger badge, with a five-pointed star surrounded by a royal blue background.

The history of the Rangers dates back to 1823 when Stephen F. Austin hired a contingent of 10 men to 'range' over a wide area to protect his colonists from Indians. Since that time, the force has been synonymous with the suppression of lawlessness and crime - first the Indians, then the bandits and cattle-rustlers, then the outlaws of the early 20th century and finally the modern-day criminals. ---000-



The honor roll is chosen for only the first five, six weeks periods; and any student making the honor roll three out of these five times will be recognized at the end of the year and will be awarded a certificate for his accomplishments.

At Ozona High School, Seniors may be able to exempt themselves from the final examinations in May if their grades are high enough.

When the four-year average is considered during the Senior year, the grades are recorded as follows: A+, 98; A, 95; A-, 92; B-plus, 88; B, 85; B-, 82; C-plus 78; C, 75; C-, 72; F, 69 and be-





(Continued from Page One) III vaccine, the suspect type, and after a month not a single case of polio has developed among those who received the vaccine.

One o fthe reasons doctors feel that the mass inoculation is imperative in Texas is that this state state now has the highest incidence of the disease of any state. Of the 200 plus known cases, 120 of them are in Texas.

The Sabin vaccine is recommended for all ages from six months to 99 years. Since the vaccine sets up an intestinal block against the disease, inoculation among the older people will eliminate some carriers of the disease who are not even suspect of being carriers. The three doses of the vaccine, taken on a lump of sugar at about six weeks intervals, will set up a lifetime immunity against polio, doctors believe.

The unfortunate bad publicity which resulted from suspension of the immunization in Canada no doubt will cut down on the numbers of people who will take the vaccine this year, doctors said, but so confident are they of the vaccine's safety and of the pressing need for mass inoculation that they have decided to press for carrying out the planned administration during the coming winter months. The plan was launched in Abilene last week and 65 percent of the population participated, the San Angelo medical meeting was told. This showing encouraged medical leaders to go forward with the mass inoculation plans.

Permit forms, to be signed by parents authorizing the polio vaccine doses for children, have been distributed among school children here in preparation for the November 11 inoculation. Authorization forms must be signed before the vaccine can be administered.
