Major Bowman To  
Ft. Knox: Retires  
In One More YearLocal Base Commander  
Receives Commendation  
For Work

Major W. C. Bowman, commander of the Ozona Air Force Station, which was deactivated May 1, after four years of radar surveillance of the southern segment of the United States, and Sgt. Alton Hudson, were among the near last of Air Force personnel, except the maintenance group to remain permanently, left this week for new assignments.

Major Bowman was notified just before his departure that he had been awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal for the outstanding results produced by the Ozona 732nd AC&W Squadron while under his command. A copy of the citation was not available at press time.

Major Bowman is being assigned new duty at Fort Knox, Ky., where the Air Force maintains the only radar station in Kentucky. His assignment to Fort Knox will be less than a year duration, after which he plans to retire from active military service to settle with his family on his Hereford cattle farm in South central Kentucky where he grew up. Major Bowman attended school and taught school in that section of Kentucky before entering active service. He attended Western State College at Bowling Green, Ky.

His total service at retirement will be more than 24 years, Major Bowman said.

Sgt. Hudson, whose duties at the base here included those of public relations officer, is being returned to the post where he served prior to coming to Ozona. He left Tuesday with his family for Newburgh, N. Y., where he was serving when transferred to the Ozona base. Sgt. Hudson is a native of Pennsylvania.

Miss Diane Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Phillips, who recently took her Master's Degree at the University of Texas, has accepted a position as an English teacher at McArthur High School in San Antonio.

Two Odessa Men Hurt  
When Pickup Overturns  
On Big Lake Highway

Two Odessa men were injured, one critically, Sunday morning about 10:20 a. m. when the pickup truck in which the two men were riding had a blow out and overturned 17 miles north of Ozona on highway 865. The pickup was pulling a trailer.

Most seriously injured of the two was Melsa Kelly who was thrown from the truck. The two injured men were rushed to the Crockett County Hospital by the Big Lake emergency crew which was summoned to the scene of the wreck.

Kelly, after receiving emergency treatment at the Ozona hospital, was transferred to San Angelo while Larry Hayhurst, the second man in the accident remained in the local hospital.

The two men are employed by the Permian Casting Company of Odessa.

Shell Tippet ReEntry  
Tests Shallow; Outpost  
Set In Lancaster Hills

Shell Oil Co. will plug back to wildcat depth of 6,330 feet for tests of shallower zones at its No. 2 Marrs, former producer in the Tippet field of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCarney.

It became depleted and was abandoned Feb. 2, 1953.

Location is 1,320 feet from the southwest and 1,750 feet from the northwest lines of 3-GC&SF. Abst. 3951, Cert. 5001.

Hunt Petroleum Co., Dallas, will drill the No. 1-16 University as a one-mile northeast outpost to the lone Devonian gas-distillate producer in the Lancaster Hills multiphase oil and gas field of Crockett County, 25 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the west and 1,000 feet from the south lines of 16-29-University. Contract depth is 7,600 feet.

Signal Oil & Gas Co. Midland, has plugged back from 12,191 feet to 11,847 feet and was preparing to run casing and test an unidentified zone at the No. 1 Cities Service-J. W. Henderson Estate, in 1-SL-T&StL, Crockett County wildcat, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, 2 3/4 miles west-northwest of a recent Canyon gas discovery and four miles south-southeast of a recent dual Canyon and Strawn gas discovery.

No other information has been released.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-21 Couch, in 21-QR-HE&WT, Crockett County Wolfcamp prospect 1 1/2 miles north east of the opener of the Ozona, Southwest (Canyon sand gas distillate field) flowed 24 hours, making 16 barrels of oil and seven barrels of water, plus gas at the daily rate of 725,000 cubic feet.

Flow was through a 32-64-inch choke, and perforations between 6,284-820 feet.

Testing continued.

Sherrill, in accepting the appointment to the Judge's post, said that he hoped to maintain the high standards set by Judge Preslar and his predecessor, Judge Jim Langdon, who was on the Eighth Court in El Paso, until recently appointed to the Texas Railroad Commission by Gov. Connally.

The newly appointed 112th district judge plans to seek a full elective term and will enter the Democratic primary next spring. Sherrill holds a bachelor of business administration degree from Texas Tech, and a law degree from the University of Texas, having served in the U. S. Navy.

Sherrill moved to Ft. Stockton eight years ago and is President of the Pecos County Bar Association; a trustee of the Methodist Church, is married and he and his wife have three children.

That 'Burial' Still On Agenda

That treaty to restrict the testing of nuclear weapons, first talked of 17 years ago and more consistently pursued at Geneva for the past five, has been agreed upon and initiated in Moscow by the spokesmen of the US, Britain and the USSR - to be signed within days by the foreign ministers of the three powers.

"A very important work," declared Assistant Secretary of State Averell Harriman.

"It is the beginning of many good things," said Britain's Lord Hailsham.

"The end has been successful," commented Soviet Tough Guy Gromyko.

The question the US Senate now has to consider is: "important," "good," "successful" for whom? Military experts have testified that Russia now leads us in ICBM development, especially in the megaton range. Ratification of the treaty would freeze the US in second place. We will live up to the treaty and cease all but underground testing.

So, perhaps it's time now for apologists for Khrushchev (in and out of the Administration in Washington), who say his "We will bury you" outburst was a mere figure of speech, to consider the bully's enlargement on this theme at the Plenary Meeting of the Communist Party Central Committee last June 21.

"The imperialist ideologists are cherishing the hope of undermining us from within with the aid of hostile ideology. Their thesis is as follows: the more educated people there are in the Soviet Union the more vulnerable will become Soviet society in the ideological

respect. They say this quite frankly in their newspapers and magazines. According to imperialist propaganda, with the growth of material and cultural standards the Soviet people will start coming out against the leadership of the Party.

"We must know that the enemy is now sharpening his poisonous ideological weapon for more bitter clashes with us. It is reminiscent of what the Red Army men said during the Civil War: we have one outstanding issue with the White Guards on which we cannot agree, the simple question of land. The White Guards want to bury us in it and we want to bury them. Who will bury whom first - this is the little outstanding question between us.

"We have a similar outstanding question with Capitalism."

"Do you want your Senators ratifying a treaty to expedite our in-terment?"

"WARSAW" PACT NEXT?

Relaxing his original insistence on tying the test-ban treaty to a non-aggression pact wherein the West would promise to abandon the Communist satellite countries to indefinite slavery, Khrushchev is obviously happy at his progress as it stands.

No one can doubt, however, that the Master of the Kremlin will continue pushing for this so-called Warsaw pact, in spite of the fact that Averell Harriman was under strict orders from the President to limit his negotiating to the test-ban and discuss the pact only in general terms.

Not when Russians in Cuban uniforms dominate Castro's army, when refugee intelligence sources report the whole island is bristling with Russian military works and missiles being returned.

It is not likely that any further advantage in Europe would tempt the wily Khrushchev to abandon this mighty and strategic base that has already served so effectively in his South American subversion program while remaining the great set thorn American flesh has ever had to bear.

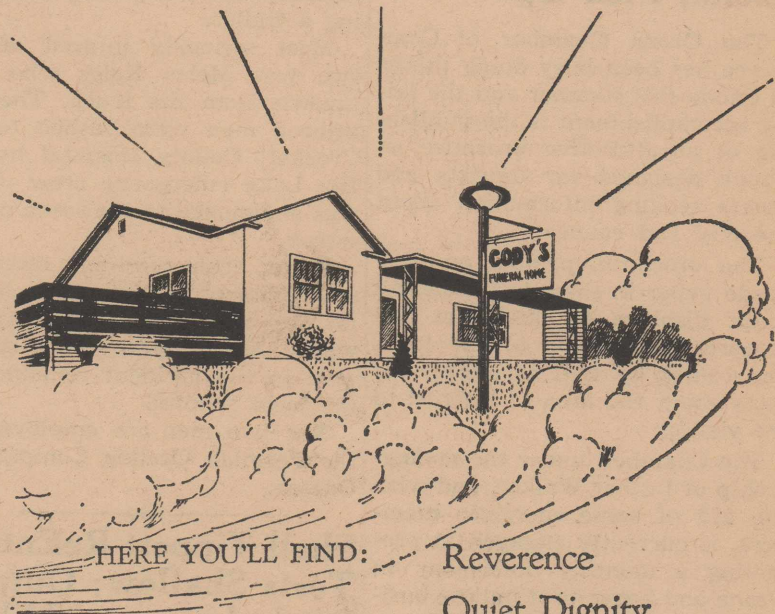
Any questions? Company dismissed!"

### The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

#### From The Stockman, Aug. 2, 1934

A write-in campaign that put Bryan McDonald, incumbent justice of the peace, a close second in the race for that office in the Democratic primary Saturday. The write-in race, in which W. M. Johnigan, whose name appeared in the ballot, beat out McDonald, sparked an otherwise listless primary.

Scattered rains falling over part of Crockett county and surrounding territory refreshed drouth parched ranges in areas visited by the moisture and served to lower the prevailing blistering temperatures for a few days.

A general shakeup in the Ozona baseball club following the Texon debacle Sunday in which the locals folded up while Texon romped around the bags for a 19-4 and a 9 to 1 win in a double header bill. Andy Andrews was fired as manager and Carl Dorley, big league veteran and hard-hitting third baseman, was named field manager. A second base flop, hired for the Sunday game, and Caraway pitcher, were both released.

A five-day delay in shipping of cattle in the government's drouth relief cattle buying program, occasioned by strikes in livestock shipping centers, was lifted Monday of this week and movement of cattle from parched Crockett county ranges was resumed. The appraisal of herds and the slaughter of condemned cattle continued in the interim, however, and between 1,500 and 1,800 were started on the road to the shipping point immediately.

The Crockett County chapter of the American Red Cross this week forwarded its check for \$10 from funds on deposit in its treasury for use in relief work in areas devastated by the recent Texas coastal hurricane.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows: (c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; provided that said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision after such political subdivision has been published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall be at least equal to the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (1), reading as follows: (1) of whom shall be well versed in the affairs of the State and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in financial matters. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the term to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased member was appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

Section 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which time the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and "If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith."

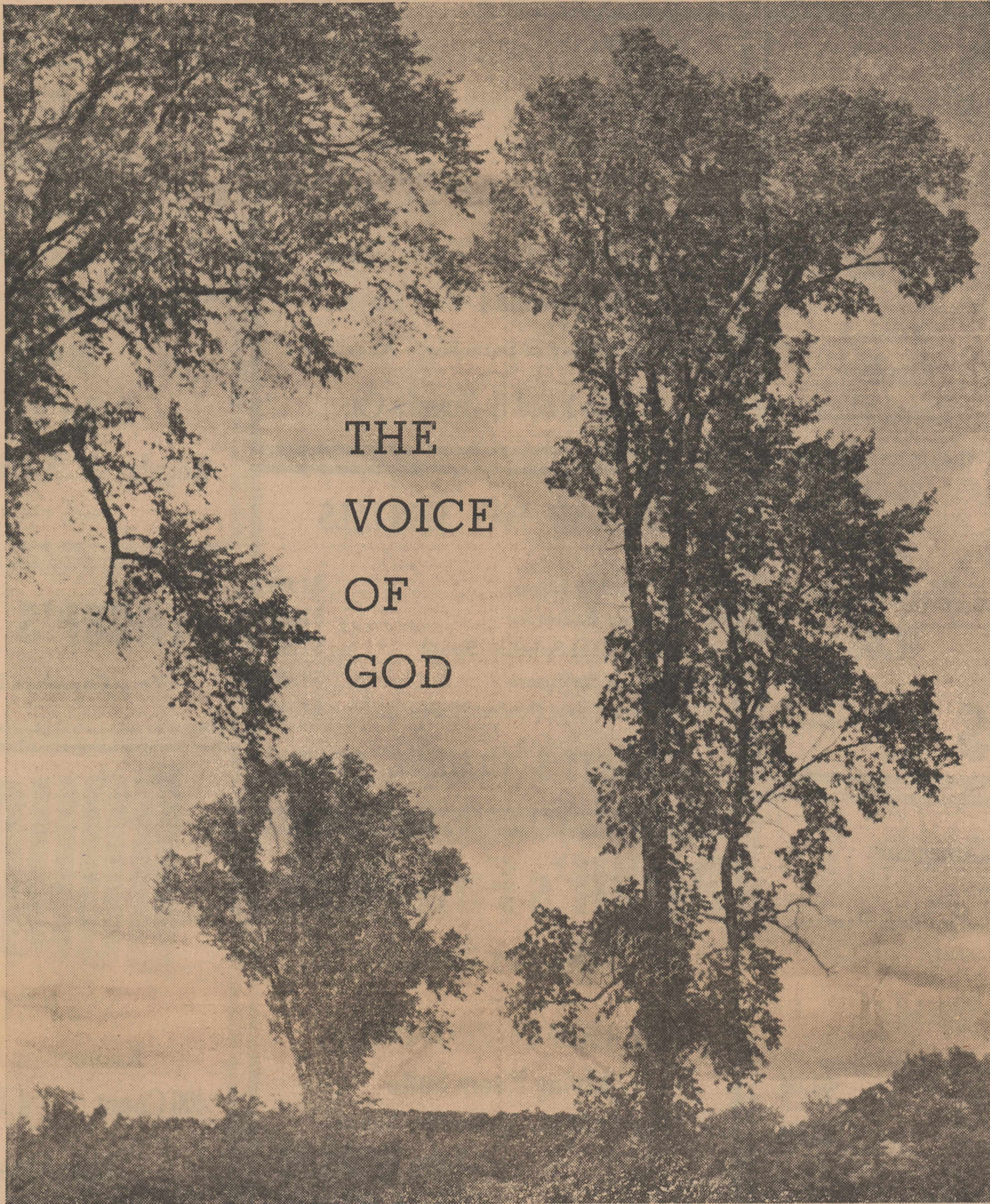

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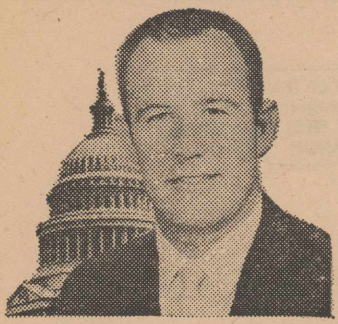

**PEACE FOR PROFIT**

The American taxpayer, groaning under the greatest defense load ever imposed on any nation, now is paying more and more every year for disarmament, too.

Under the New Frontier "program", we must keep spending more while we work energetically to become totally incapable of defending ourselves. The clear-cut philosophy of the Eisenhower Administration is gone. Then we built our armed forces to the point where no one dared attack us. Retaliation would be certain. Aggressors knew it would be swift and total.

Under this administration we now have a hodgepodge of cross theories — and a frightening decline in our armed potential. The Defense Department babbles about a modified second strike, sort of an atomic "eye for an eye" theory which would have us bomb only to the extent we have been bombed.

Although we are spending billions to maintain almost as much military "establishment" as we had during wartime, we are not developing new weapons. In the air, in the anti-missile field, in nuclear warheads, we have stopped cold. The Kennedy Administration has killed any further RS-70 program. Successful flight would cause a clamor for conversion to the super sonic jet transport plane for airline use, and further research and improvement for military use. The Administration is getting less defense for the dollar and more waste.

The Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, a Kennedy concoction, is growing by leaps and bounds. This year it wants to more than double its budget — from \$6,500,000 to \$15,000,000. It wants to spend tax money on studies of private peace groups and their effect on public opinion. A \$10,000 study would probe the organization and operations of the Soviet fiscal system and budget. Why they should be studying how totalitarian finances work is a matter of question.

One of the gravy train riders in the growing field of disarmament boondoggle is the Institute of Defense Analysis, whose president gets \$45,000, twice the pay of a Congressman. It has received \$8 million from the Arms Control Agency and has 234 employees studying, in effect, how it can be more effective with its propaganda to get more money to hire more people. A whole flock of U. S. corporations have disarmament contracts ranging from \$10,000 to \$500,000. Disarmament has become a lush field for Federal till tappers. So universal is the desire for peace, and so beguiling is the soothsaying of the ACDA that "professional peacemakers" are finding their happy hunting grounds.

### Deep Wildcat, Offset Spotted In Crockett; Show Of Oil Bailed

Crockett County gained location for a deep wildcat an extension and a show of oil in another operation during the past week.

Jake L. Hamon, Dallas, will drill the No. 1 Robbins, an 8,400-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, seven miles southeast of McCamey and three miles north of the Tippett multipay area.

Location is 4,656 feet northwest of the east corner and 467 feet northeast of the northeast line of 22-36-H&TC, but in 2-B-GC&SF.

Macdonald Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1-3 D&E University, in 3-29-University, 3,400-foot wildcat in the Lancaster Hill multipay oil and gas field of Crockett county, five miles east of Fort Lancaster, bailed oil at rate of one barrel per hour from an unidentified zone, possibly upper Clearfork.

The project had encountered free oil while drilling between 2,885-895 feet.

Drilling continued below 2,960 feet.

It is 1 1/4 miles south of the de-

pleted upper Clearfork discovery which was recompleted as a San Andres oil producer.

Howard Olsen Development Co., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Miller as a 1,000-foot north offset to its No. 1 Miller, recent 3/8-mile northeast extension to 3,200-foot sand production in the Refoil multipay field of Crockett County, 10 miles south of Ozona.

Location is 1,467 feet from the most southerly south line and 2,000 feet from the most westerly west lines of Sallie Renshaw survey No. 38. Contract depth is 3,300 feet.

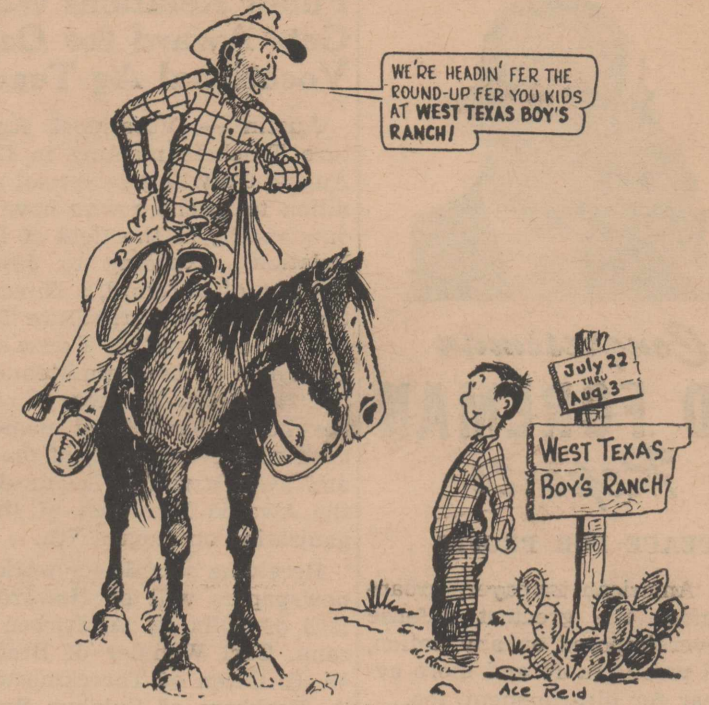

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to:

(1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amounts for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the issuance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that the same shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."
