



The Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, a Kennedy concoction, is growing by leaps and bounds This year it wants to more than double its budget - from \$6,500,000 to \$15,000,000. It wants to spend tax money on studies of private peace groups and their effect on public opinoin. A \$10,000 study would probe the organization and operations of the Soviet fiscal system and budget. Why they should be studying how totalitarian finances work is a matter of question.

One of hte gravy train riders in the growing field of disarmament boondoggle is the Institute of Defense Analysis, whose president gets \$45,000, twice the pay of a Congressman. It has received \$8 million from the Arms Control Agency and has 234 employees studying, in effect, how it can be more effective with its propaganda to get more money to hire more people. A whole flock of U.S. corporations have disarmament contracts ranging from \$10,000 to \$500,000. Disarmament has become a lush field for Federal till tappers. So universal is the desire for peace, and so beguiling is the soothsaying of the ACDA that "professional peacemakers" are finding heir happy hunting grounds.


