Schedule Vote On Assessment

A special election will be held by the Texas Soybean Association on September 26 on the proposition of whether or not soybean producers in a 23county area in Texas shall assess themselves one-half cent per bushel, Collection would be made at the point of the first processing of the soy

beans or at the first sale. Also to be named in the election will be a nine-man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment which will be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production,

Tuesday night, following the day-long testimony of seven witnesses, District Court Clerk Nelda Merriott issued 11 additional subpoenas to be served Tuesday night and Wednesday, bringing a total of 192 subpoenas issued in the case as of Wednesday noon. Among the 11 were three for correction of names, re-issued; three new subpoenas, two re-issued from Muleshoe to Canyon; one reissued from Muleshoe to Texas Tech, Lubbock; one re-issued and another re-subpoenaed to Mrs. Bernard Phelps, witness of Tuesday.

More Hill-Burton Funds Are Sought A growing demand from the years, the State is expected

and better hospital care facilities has tested the resources and ability of both state and federal health care officials. As a result, the Federal Hill-Burton Act authorized financial assistance for construction and modernization of health facilities and the Texas State Department of Health is required to develop an annual "State Plan" listing the facilities provided in the state and establishing "bed" need for health facilities in Texas.

The Health Facilities Construction Section of the State Health Department is responsible for the preparation and the administration of the "State Plan". The plan is primarily a survey of present facilities and a projection of bed need in any given area or facility. These facilities are then rated as to priority of need, in order to qualify for the limited Hill-Burton funds available. Allocations of these funds are made

by the State Board of Health. The Hill-Burton program approved by Congress only a few weeks ago calls for \$1.2 billion in federal funds to be spent in the next three years for construction and modernization of facilities across the country. In past years, Texas has received about 6.4 per cent of the total allocation. If Congress appropriates the funds for each of the proposed three

The Administration recommended earlier this year a military budget for fiscal 1971 which it considered the bare minimum required. Yet, the Committee pared 1.3 billion dollars from the Admin-

Since fiscal 1968, our nation's defense budget has been reduced more than 17 billion dollars while non-defense expenditures have risen more than penditures to the total federal While 43 cents of every tax dollar went for defense spending in fiscal 1968, only about 341/2 cents will go for that purpose this fiscal year. In fiscal 1968, 9.7 percent of this nation's Gross National Product was spent on defense. This fiscal year, we will spend only about 7 percent of our GNP. In June of last year, we had some


