## School Bond Election Set For March 27

County Judge Brock Jones this week ordered an election to be held in Crockett county on Saturday, March 27, for the purpose of deciding whether or not bonds of the county in the amount of \$320,000 shall be issued for the purpose of making needed additions and improvements to facilities of the Ozona Public School system.

Any otherwise qualified voter who owns property in the county, real or personal, and has rendered the same for taxation, is eligible to vote in the election.

The election will be county wide but only three voting places are to be provided, at the courthouse in Ozona, at Powell field and at the West Texas Utilities Co. power plant in far north-west Crockett county.

The bond issue, if approved by the voters, will be used to make needed expansions to the local school system to meet overcrowded conditions in some areas due to recent increases in enrollment, and to make some needed repairs and improvements.

The building plans promulgated by the board include a new library building which would include two additional high school classrooms and would make two more classrooms available in the high school when the present library is moved from the high school building. Three additional classrooms at the North Elementary and two at the South Elementary are also contemplated. Additions to four teacher residence units to make them three bedroom instead of two, a new residence for use of the system's superintendent, a new field house at the athletic field, improving the lighting facilities of the field, improvements to the rest room facilities at Junior High School and painting the high school and gymnasium are other undertakings contemplated in the program.

## Civic Center's Completion Date Set Near Apr. 1

While the newly appointed board of directors of the Ozona civic center are ironing out details of rules governing use of the center, and accepting applications for its use by various groups the contractor has extended the possible completion date for the project to about April 1.

While the building was expected to be completed by the first week in March, reservations had been made for its use nearly every day during the month. Most of these reservations will be cancelled as the completion date is moved forward but the committee reports an active interest in making use of the facility when it is finally ready for occupancy.

The Commissioners Court has named a governing board of ten persons who will have charge of the administration of the building, with final authority resting in the hands of the Commissioners Court, an arrangement similar to that under which the Crockett County Hospital is operated.

Mrs. Joe Pierce, Jr., is chairman of the board and Joe Couch is vice chairman. Other members named to the board are Henry Miller, Sam Martinez, Mrs. Leonard Boyd, Mrs. Boyd Baker, Mrs. Thad Tabb, Bob Stephens and Mrs. P. C. Perner and Mrs. Dick Henderson was named a member for life on the board. Site for the building was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Dick Henderson as a memorial to the pioneer citizens of Crockett county and dedicated to the use and enjoyment of the youth of the county.

## Two Killed In Head-On Crash On Iraan Road

Two persons were killed instantly and a third only slightly injured when two cars collided head-on at mid-morning on Ranch Road 29 to Iraan, about 30 miles northwest of Ozona Saturday morning.

Killed in the thunderous collision were George F. Alsup of Odessa and Mrs. Juanita Gant Jefferson of Shepherd, Texas, north of Houston. The accident occurred on top of a small rise in the road about a half mile from the Charlie Black ranch home. Mrs. Black told officers she heard the noise of the collision and described it as sounding like an explosion.

Mrs. Jefferson's daughter, Mrs. Alice Crump, also of Shepherd, is receiving treatment in the Crockett County Hospital for cuts and bruises suffered in the accident. The two Negro women were on their way home to Shepherd.

The two victims were apparently killed instantly, Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields said. He ruled death accidental. Both cars were practically demolished.

Bodies of the accident victims were brought to Ozona by James Funeral Home and later transferred Hubbard - Kelly funeral home of Odessa taking the body of Mr. Alsup and McDuffie funeral home of Shepherd the body of Mrs. Jefferson.

## Brush Control Is Top Conservation Measure In County

Crockett county ranchers used brush control measures on 25,600 acres of range land in the county under the soil conservation program administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service during the year 1964, Cliff Elder, office manager, Crockett County ASCS Committee, revealed in a report to cooperators this week.

To improve forage on ranges in the county, operators also deferred 8,272 acres of pasture land during the growing season of the year. Other conservation practices carried out by ranch operators during the year included 47,738 feet of livestock water pipelines installed, 3,098 rods of cross fencing to protect vegetative cover, 141 acres planted in improved bermuda grass (irrigated), 3 concrete storage tanks for livestock water and one well drilled for livestock watering.

Mr. Elder announced that aerial spraying of mesquite for control is again available under the 1965 program.

## Rabies Increase Prompts Move To Vaccinate Pets

Rabies, the most dreaded disease by humans, is again on the increase in Crockett county. Several recent confirmed cases of rabies have been discovered in livestock in the county and one dog in Ozona, according to reports received by county agent Pete W. Jacoby and M. A. Barber, high school agricultural teacher.

Dr. Joe David Ross, veterinarian, of Sonora has stated that more cases of rabies have been confirmed in Crockett county since December than during the spring months of last year.

In order to help prevent further outbreaks of rabies and to render a service to local people, the 4-H club and FFA Chapter have arranged for Dr. Ross or his partner, Dr. Gary Peoples, to be in Ozona on Monday, March 15, for the purpose of vaccinating pets. Time set for the vaccination period is from 2-6 p. m. at the Vocational Agricultural Building at the high school. A charge of \$2.00 will be made for each animal vaccinated.

Dr. Ross has advised that any pet, regardless of age, if not previously vaccinated should be vaccinated at this time. He also advised that all animals vaccinated prior to June of last year should be vaccinated again.

## April Completion Date Set For Gas Processing Plant

Orloff Corporation of Midland, Texas, contractor building the new Shell Oil Company's Northwest Ozona Gas Processing Plant, located two miles northwest of Ozona on the Dick Henderson ranch, announces that the plant will be in operation about the first week of April, barring unforeseen difficulties.

The construction firm at present has about 65 construction workers employed on the project.

Lock Construction Co., also of Midland, is building the gathering system for the plant. Work on the gathering system started last week and should be completed in about four weeks, company officials indicated.

The plant when completed, will process 10 million cubic feet per day of gas from the Northwest Ozona Field. The plant will recover 14,000 gallons per day of propane-butane mixture and 3,000 gallons per day of natural gasoline from the gas being processed, a Shell official explained.

Medals will be given for the first four places in each event, including the relays, and trophies will be given to teams as well as for the winners in the 880, mile and 440 relays.

Records considered to be in the greatest danger of falling are the shot, where Gary Pagan of Ozona has already recorded a throw of 53'1" at Fort Stockton and almost two feet farther in practice here. The meet record of 50'10" was set by George Johnson in 1957 and is one of the oldest marks in the meet.

Pagan will also be a threat to break the discus mark of 145' set by Jacobson of Iraan in 1958. Last week in Ft. Stockton Pagan threw the platter over 149' but the throw was later ruled a scratch. In practice this year Pagan has bettered 150' on several occasions.

In the high jump, Jim Morrow of Bronte, who set the mark of 6'1" last year, will be returning for another crack at the record and will be joined by Bill Elliott of Sonora, who bettered 6' in the state meet last spring.

In the mile run, Frank Uruquidez of Big Lake ran a 4:50 mile at Ft. Stockton last week and the record held by Pete Dyson of Ft. Stockton is 4:52 and was (Continued on Last Page)

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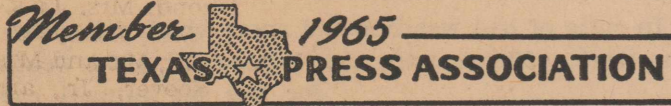

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**INFLATION IS HERE!**

The one-hundred-cent dollar of fiscal 1939 — when the gross public debt and guaranteed obligations of the USA stood at \$49.89 billion — is now worth 44.8 cents, according to Virginia's Rep. Richard H. Prof, while the nation's obligations now total more than \$312.5 billion.

In a revealing tabulation of the nation's fiscal posture from 1930 through 1964 the Old Dominion Congressman presents, year by year, a statistical sermon on the wages of Federal extravagance

In all these 35 years, budget surpluses have occurred just seven times — deficits 28 times. In only one year out of four, in all this time, has the Government of the United States taken in more than it has spent! At the end of 1964, the red ink figure for the period stood at \$287.29 billion, annual interest on the public debt at \$10.666 billion.

Inflation is not something to fear. It is here. It is something to fight — now.

President Johnson's message of February 18 on our urgent need to cut off the flow of dollars into foreign hands, has finally reached the State Department passport office where something is to be done to implement the President's plea that Americans "see the USA" this

year to improve our balance of payments. Accordingly, posters and displays suggesting foreign travel are being removed and never is heard an encouraging word about seeing the world. And it is reported that State Department employees have even cancelled one of several vacation charter flights to Europe for 1965!

Considering that a Presidential slash in foreign aid and spending on our overseas military forces could reverse the unfavorable balance almost overnight, the plea to vacationing Americans that they stay home this year is reminiscent of the noble gesture of turning out lights in the White House.

Similarly, the President has urged American industrialists not to spend dollars on foreign plants, but return overseas earnings promptly to the US. If, instead, he would demand protection against loss of their home markets to low-wage foreign producers, the problem would be solved — for years to come.

**STORY ABOUT A STORY Computers Prepare Local News Stories In Blink of An Eye**

Elsewhere in this paper appears an item about Crockett county's 1963 retail sales volume. Here is "the story" about how that item was prepared by the Department of Commerce:

Electronic computers at the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census are extracting retail trade data on each county in the United States from tabulations of the 1963 Census of Business, inserting the figures in news stories, typing out the stories at eye-blinking speed, and addressing a story to each one of 16,000 news outlets in the Nation's 3,000 counties.

Three elements are used to produce these "machine-made" news stories:

1. Statistics for 1958 and 1963 on number of establishments, their kind of business and location, their sales volume, employment, etc. This information is stored in machine "memory" and is part of the process of preparing the 1963 Census of Business reports.

2. The names and addresses of the newspapers and broadcasting stations, coded county-by-county.

3. A set of instructions which cause the computer to select statistics concerning each county, print the statistics at the proper points in a news story, and address the story to each newspaper or broadcasting station in a county.

The news stories, accordingly, emerge as by-products of the process of preparing statistical reports from the Census of Business. Although the series will total more than 6,000 stories before it is completed it will require no additional personnel. The stories about retail trade will be followed by a series of stories about service trades in each county.

The Census Bureau pioneered in the use of electronic equipment to tabulate data and to prepare statistical tables, beginning in 1951, but this is the first time such devices have been used to prepare news stories.

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**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS**

**From Your State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Gov. John Connally served notice on the U. S. Labor Department he doesn't like its directives that unskilled high school students in War on Poverty program jobs must be paid more than some of their parents make.

Connally, needed by an unnamed Labor Department official, indignantly denied he is scuttling the new Neighborhood Youth Corps job project. But he made clear he won't approve applications of some 25 local school districts for participation in the program until he is sure they know what they are getting into.

NYC offers part-time (10-15 hours a week) around schools and public agencies to youngsters 16-21 who are on the verge of becoming high school dropouts because of financial difficulties. Federal government pays 90 per cent of the cost and local participating units 10 per cent. But next year the cost will be shared 50-50.

Connally spoke out against the Labor Department ruling that students must be paid \$1.25 per hour, the federal minimum wage.

**Pesticide Protested** — A cheap poison used against roaches and rats in many homes and in grain storages and warehouses can cause loss of hair and mental disturbances, physicians testified in a House committee hearing. In heavy doses, it can kill a person or leave him mentally incompetent, they said.

Doctors appeared at a public health committee hearing on a bill which would outlaw the sale, use or possession of poisons

based on thallium compounds.

**Liquor, Racing Bill Hearings Set**—Horse racing and "small bottles" liquor bills are expected to turn out some of the biggest crowds at legislative hearings this month.

Bill by Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville to legalize parimutuel betting on horse races will be heard by House State Affairs Committee on March 29.

Edinburg Sen. Jim Bates' bill to permit sale of two-ounce bottles of liquor by restaurants will get hearing before Senate jurisprudence committee on March 16.

**Redistricting** — Legislators got a sampling of public views on congressional and legislative redistricting during a four-hour public hearing before the House Districts Committee.

As expected, they didn't get much help since every plan advanced met opposition from some quarter.

House committee members heard lengthy testimony on four congressional re-apportionment proposals and two bills to realign the state House of Representatives.

Eight more measures remain to be heard.

**Texas Lawmaker's Bill Would Punish Criminal With Gun**

Washington, D. C. — A Texas lawmaker urged Congress to stop harassing legitimate gun owners, and instead to open war on the criminal element by setting a 25-year mandatory federal sentence for use of firearms in committing a crime.

U. S. Rep. Bob Casey of Houston today introduced legislation to make the 25-year sentence mandatory for use or carrying of firearms during any robbery, assault, murder, rape, or kidnapping. He urged Congress to take quick action on the measure.

Casey introduced a separate bill covering the District of Columbia, pointing out that Congress could swiftly enact a model program of prevention and control of illegal gun-use in its own crime-ridden home base.

The fourth-term Democrat called proposed gun re-

**gistration bills before Congress "completely ineffectual" in striking at the criminal use of firearms.**

"I see little need to further harass the legitimate gun owner, the collector, or the sportsman when the problem is caused by the criminal, most of whom are repeat offenders often using stolen weapons to commit a crime," Casey said. "No man in his right mind can expect a criminal planning a robbery with a stolen gun to register the weapon with federal authorities, or to be alarmed because he hasn't done so."

### \$7.1 Millions Retail Sales In Ozona For 1963

Crockett county's 50 retail establishments had \$7.1 million in sales in 1963. An increase of 58 percent from 1958. The U. S. Bureau of the census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the census bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 232 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$677,000.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$2.5 million, an increase of 177 percent from 1958. In other retail business — the county's eating and drinking places had sales of \$247 thousand, and gasoline service stations had sales of \$793,000.

For the state as a whole, the census bureau reported 96,406 retail establishments with sales of \$127,154 million, up 18 percent from 1958.

Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

Figures on number of establishments and sales volume for major types of retail establishments in each county are provided in the printed report: 1963 census of business, retail trade, Texas, available at \$1.00 from superintendent of documents, Washington, D. C. 20402 and at U. S. Department of Commerce Field Offices.

Note: Heading the above news story from the U. S. Department of Commerce was this notation: "This local news item was prepared by a census electronic computer and typed at 10 lines per second for —" and The Stockman's address followed. A story about this remarkable machine appears elsewhere in this issue.

Congressman Richard C. White, in a letter to Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, expressed his interest in the program of the committee and especially its interest in the preservation and possible restoration of Fort Lancaster in west Crockett county.

The Congressman sent a brief history of the fort, taken from war department records, and declared he is greatly interested in the preservation of the site.

Congressman White pointed out that he was chairman of the El Paso County Historical Survey Committee and was president of the El Paso County Historical Society.

"Thus you can see I have more than a normal interest in your project and will do anything I can to help," the Congressman wrote.
