

> The Census Bureau pioneered in the use of electronic equipment to tabulate data and to prepare statistical tables, beginning in 1951, but this is the first time such devices have been used to prepare news stor-

--000---Congressman White Offers To Help In Lancaster Project

Congressman Richard C. White, in a letter to Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, expressed his interest in the program of the committee and especially its interest in the preservation and possible restoration of Fort Lancaster in west Crockett county.

The Congressman sent a brief history of the fort, taken from war department records, and declared he is greatly interested in the preservation of the site.

Congressman White pointed out that he was chairman of the El Paso County Historical Survey Committee and was president of the El Paso County Historical Society.
