Funeral Services Here Sat. For Mrs. A. C. Hoover

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the First Baptist Church in Ozona for Mrs. Arthur C. Hoover, 87, daughter of a pioneer Crockett county couple, who died Friday at her home here after a long illness.

Services were conducted by Dr. Clyde Childers of Wichita Falls, former pastor of the First Baptist Church here, and the Rev. Max Brown, pastor. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under direction of Coody Funeral Home of Ozona.

Pallbearers were nephews Basil Dunlap, Byron Stuart, Billy Hoover, Tom Mitchell, Armond Hoover, Jr., J. P. Pogue, all of Ozona. Royce Smith of San Angelo and Norris Pogue of Riverside, Calif. Named as honorary pallbearers were Deacons of the First Baptist Church, and another nephew, Bob Neal of Junction.

Mrs. Hoover was born Dorra May Dunlap, Jan. 17, 1878, in Coryell County. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Davis Bell Dunlap, were Crockett county pioneers moving here from Eden in 1892.

Mrs. Hoover, after teaching for a time in Hembride, was one of the first teachers in Ozona school, then under the direction of a Professor Merchant. She was married to Arthur Hoover June 10, 1902, in Ozona the ceremony performed by the Rev. A. R. Watson, father of the late Ralph Watson of Ozona. Mr. Hoover, also of a pioneer family, has been in the ranching business in the area all of his life.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Hoover have been active in the First Baptist Church here and have been generous supporters of church work here and throughout the world. Mrs. Hoover was active (Continued on Last Page)

\$320,000 School Bonds Sold For 2.958% Interest

A \$320,000 school bond issue, recently approved by the voters of Crockett county to finance a system wide building program, sold at the low interest rate of 2.958 percent at a sealed bid sale held Friday in the district courtroom.

Bache & Co., nationwide brokerage firm and bond buyers, was low bidder on the issue. Jack Harmon of the firm's San Antonio office represented Bache in presenting the successful bid. A total of seven bidders sought the issue, the highest interest rate bid being 3.25 percent.

With the bond sale disposed of, the way is cleared for the start of construction as soon as suitable architect's plans can be obtained. Preliminary plans were recently submitted to the school board by a Houston architectural firm and these are being given study with a view to suggesting alterations and improvements.

The school board hopes to be able to get some of the repairs and alterations in the present plant, which will not require the services of the architects, under way in the near future. Bids are being sought on some of the paint and repair work and on the contemplated improvements in the lighting at the football field.

Ozona Lions Win Regional Title At Lubbock; Qualify 3 For State

Screwworm Fund Collection Here Pushed To \$8308

With a little over a dozen livestock producers in this county not yet heard from, the Crockett county emergency screwworm eradication fund campaign had reached \$8,308.38 to yesterday, Pete Jacoby, county agent and secretary to the drive committee, reported.

News from Washington yesterday was that Congress had passed the emergency appropriation of \$550,000 to match state and individual funds in Texas to carry on the successful fight against the costly pest until the federal government takes over the entire program beginning with the fiscal year beginning July 1. It was estimated that a little over a million dollars was needed to fill the interim gap and the Texas legislature appropriated \$250,000 and growers are attempting to raise a \$300,000 fund to assure continuation of the sterile fly drop program across northern Mexico to keep the fly out of the southwest.

Ozona FFA First In Wool Judging In Lubbock Meet

The Ozona FFA wool judging and grading team composed of Wesley West, Larry Kilgore, and Fred Chandler won the 1965 regional area II Wool Contest in Lubbock, Saturday. The contest was held on the Texas Tech campus, with 16 teams competing. The contest required the grading of 20 wool fleeces, giving the correct combing lengths, and estimating the shrinkage of each fleece.

Fred Chandler of Ozona was high man in the contest in grading wool. The scores of the five highest individuals are as follows: Fred Chandler, 218; Bill Landers, Van Horn, 216; Wesley West, Ozona 213; Larry Kilgore, Ozona 213; Leslie Clegghorn, Dell City, 213.

In the overall contest, including the grading and judging, the ten highest ranking were Ozona FFA 1248; Dell City, 1238; Fort Hancock, 1178; Stanton, 1177; Spur, 1157; Friendship, 1152; Iraan, 1127; Van Horn, 1115; Anson, 1100; and Lake View, 1100.

Some 15 to 25 team compete each year in the Texas Tech Regional Area II contest finals in wool grading and judging.

Ozona 4-H Rifle Teams Place In Crane Competition

The Crockett County 4-H Rifle Teams placed second and fourth in district competition at Crane last Saturday. The junior team of Jesse Deaton, Eugene Vinson, Gary Loudamy and Steven Hubbard, shot a team score of 849 out of a possible 1200 to win second place, with eight teams competing in this division. Val Verde county won first with a team score of 960.

The senior team of Duwain Vinson, Lellee Mitchell, Fannie Everett and Janie Edgerton placed fourth with a team score of 903. Eight teams competed in the senior division with Upton county taking first place with a score of 1051. Ward county was second with 1045 and Val Verde was third with a 1004 score. Team scores are composed of the three highest team members.

The teams were accompanied by Crane by county agent Pete W. Jacoby and Joe Couch, junior team coach. Buddy Couch and Cuatro Davidson, junior team alternates also made the trip.

The Lion win made it two years in a row that a district 8-A team had taken the title, Eldorado winning last year.

Coach Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere's squad was led by David Childers, who swept to wins in both hurdle events, winning the highs with a time of 14.7 and just edging Sonora's Bill Elliott and running off with the lows in posting a 19.9.

Chief disappointment for the Lions came in the 440 relay where Eldorado just nudged the Lions at the tape to take second place, thus keeping the Lions quarter mile relay team from advancing to state.

Joining Childers in the winners circle was Gary Pagan, who tossed the shot 52' 7" for an easy win, and Bill Carson, who vaulted 12' but had to settle for second behind Sanderson's Tommy Wiegand.

The Lion Mile relay team got points with a 5th place finish as Sanderson took the title, and Bob Amthor added to the Lion total with a 5th in the discus.

The Lions advanced the largest number of possible points to the State meet as they sent forward a 1956-57 20. Eldorado took the state title last year with 28 but had a greater number of possible points before the meet.

Sonora's Bill Elliott, who was the second place winner in the district broad jump, and the regional 2-A title holder last year, set a new mark of 23' in taking the class A title this year. Roy Winters of Rankin, who upset Elliott here, placed but did not threaten the Sonora jumper's mark.

The James Group and the Barbee Group tied for the Junior Achievement Award.

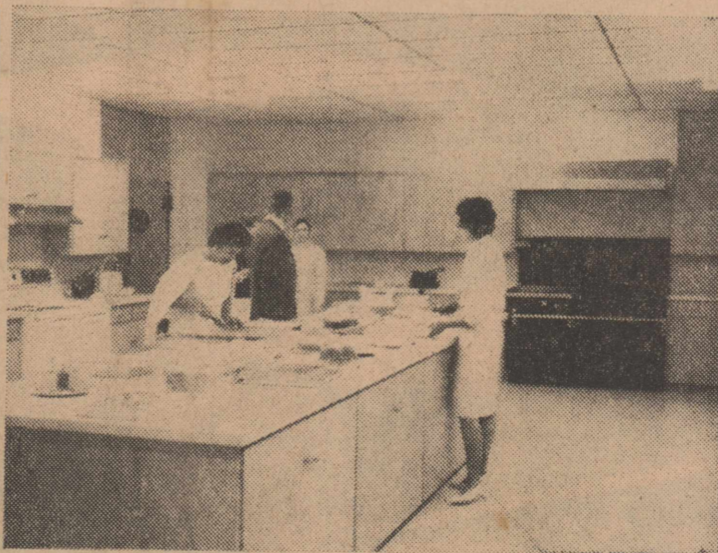

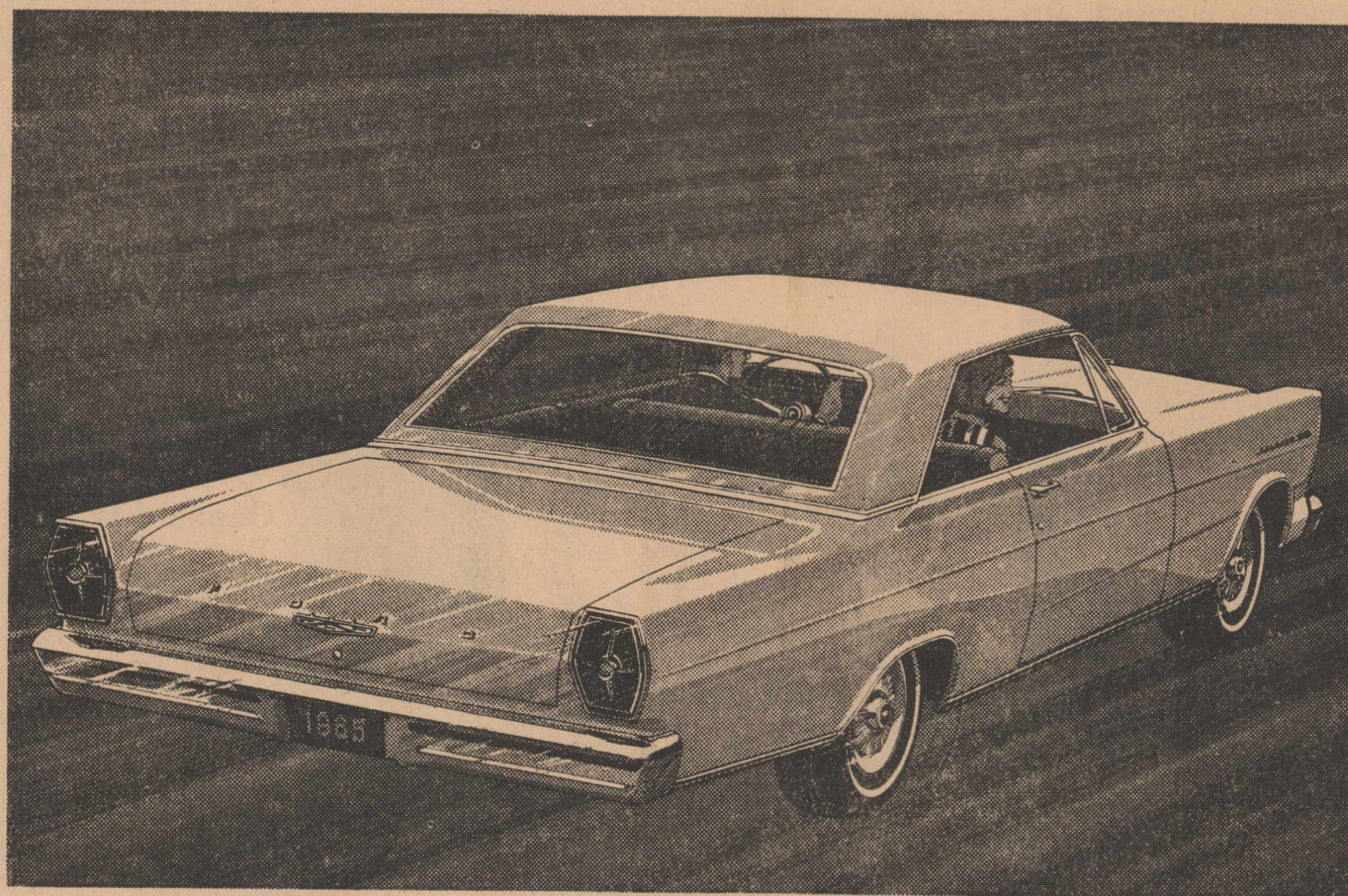
WINS PRAISE FOR DRAMATIC ABILITY

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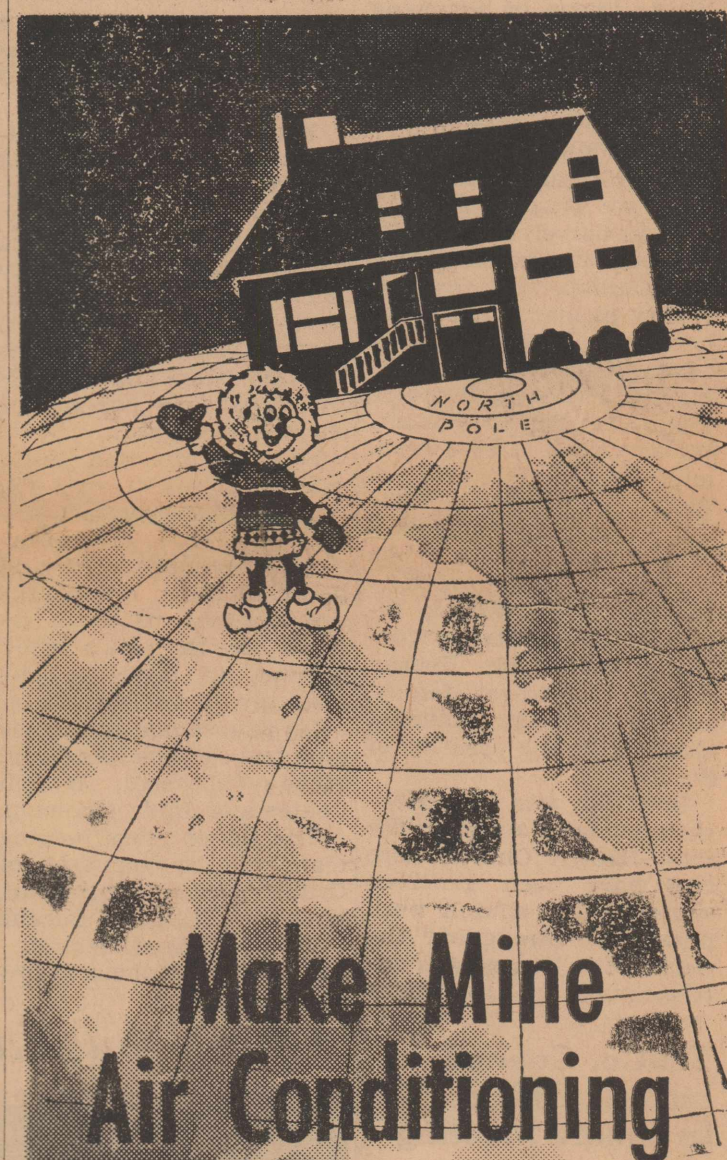

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Delta Completes Gasser in Canyon

The Ozona, Southwest (Canyon) field of Crockett County gained a 1/2-mile southeast extension with completion of Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc., No. 1-2 Couch, nine miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,350,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 32,500-1 through perforations between 6,293-895 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 59 degrees.

Location is 525 feet from the south and 5,628 feet from the west lines of 2-QR2-Wm. Powell.

Union Texas Petroleum Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 1-25 Roy Henderson, a 7,200-foot Canyon gas test, 3/4 mile southeast of the nearest Canyon gas production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, 11 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 25-M-GC&SF.

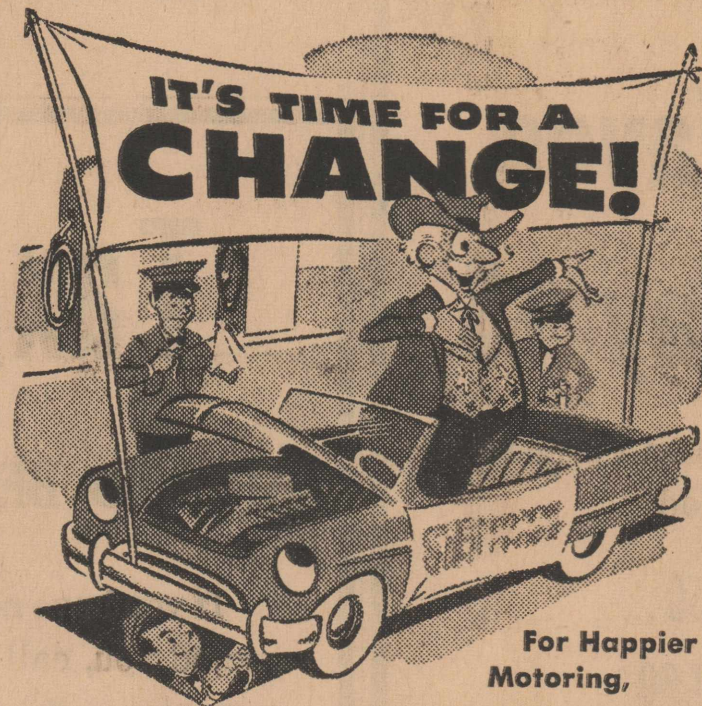

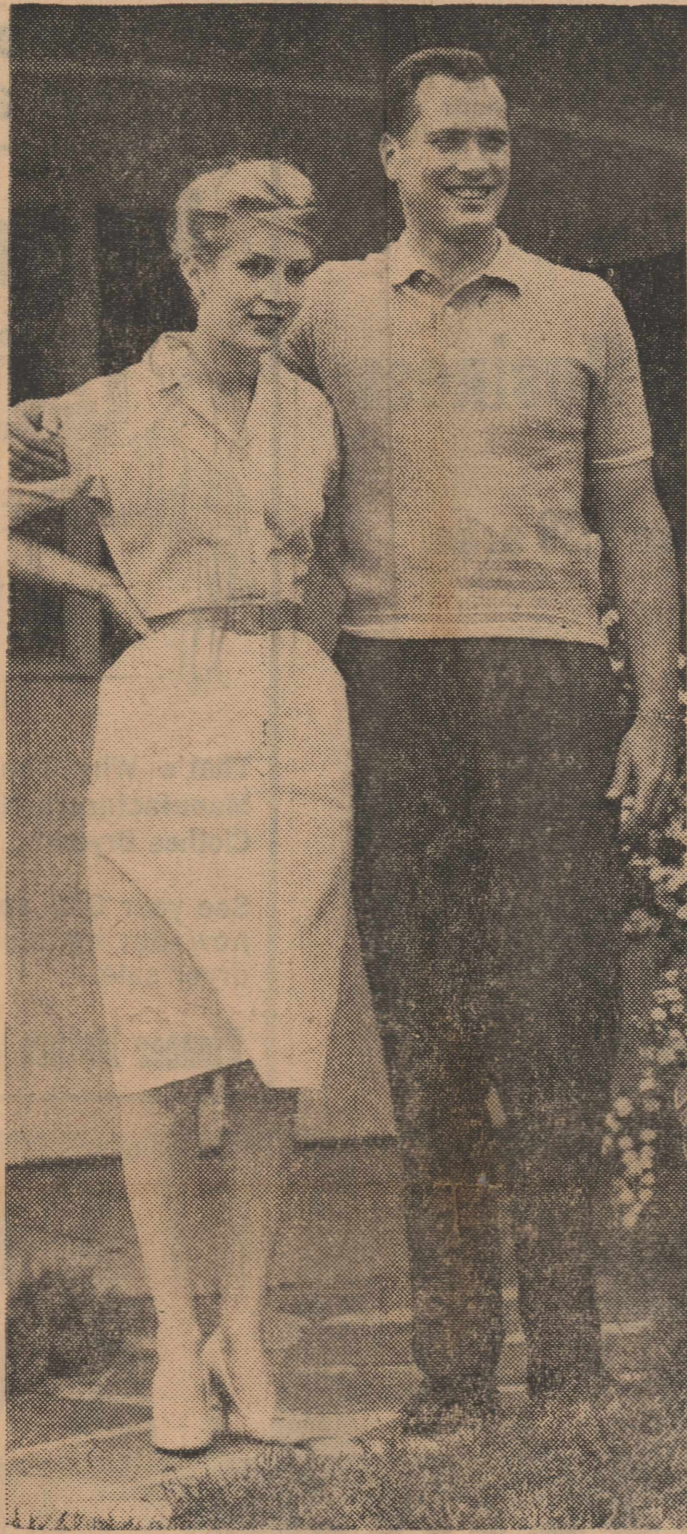

Goats Sell Well At First Sale Of Year At Sonora

Receipts totaled 5,512 goats with sheared yearling muttons bringing \$7 to \$10.40 per head at the Sonora Livestock Exchange Company's first sale of the year April 23.

Market and demand were good at the special Angora sale that saw one group of yearling muttons in the hair bring up to \$13.20 per head. Yearling nannies sold from \$5.60 to \$8.50 per head out of the hair. Good quality weighing nannies brought \$6.60 to \$7.40 per hundredweight. Good quality weighing mutton goats sold at \$7.50 to \$8.90 per hundred.

Sears Sentell said that the exchange already has 1,300 head of good muttons consigned for the special goat sale to be held May 14. A stocker and breeder sheep sale will follow on May 31 with breeder sales and special lamb sales planned for the future.

Friday's sale brought goats from surrounding towns including Rock-springs, Brady, Menard, Junction, Eldorado, Christoval and Barksdale.

Wildcat Spotted, Gas Production Area Is Extended

C. Gary Garlitz, Midland will drill the No. 2-13 Mills-paugh, a 1,000-foot rotary San Andres wildcat in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County, 18 miles southwest of Ozona, and 1,706 feet east of the No. 1-13 Millspaugh, active shallow wildcat.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 2,193 feet from the west lines of 13-2-I&GN.

Strawn gas production was extended 1 1/2 miles northwest in the Hunt-Bagget (Strawn and Canyon) field of Crockett County with dual completion of The Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1-25 Ruby Helbing, recent 2 1/2

mile southeast extension to Canyon production in the Ozona, East multipay field, two miles east-southeast of Canyon production in the Ozona, Southwest field and the same distance west-northwest of Canyon production in the Hunt-Bagget multipay field and six miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finaled April 13 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between 8,697-8,723 feet which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 45,000 pounds.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 25-QR-J. H. Gibson.

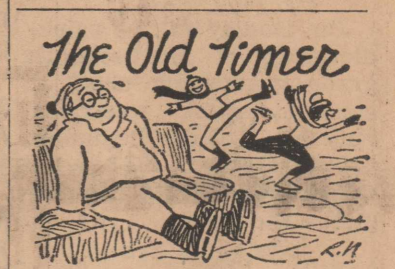

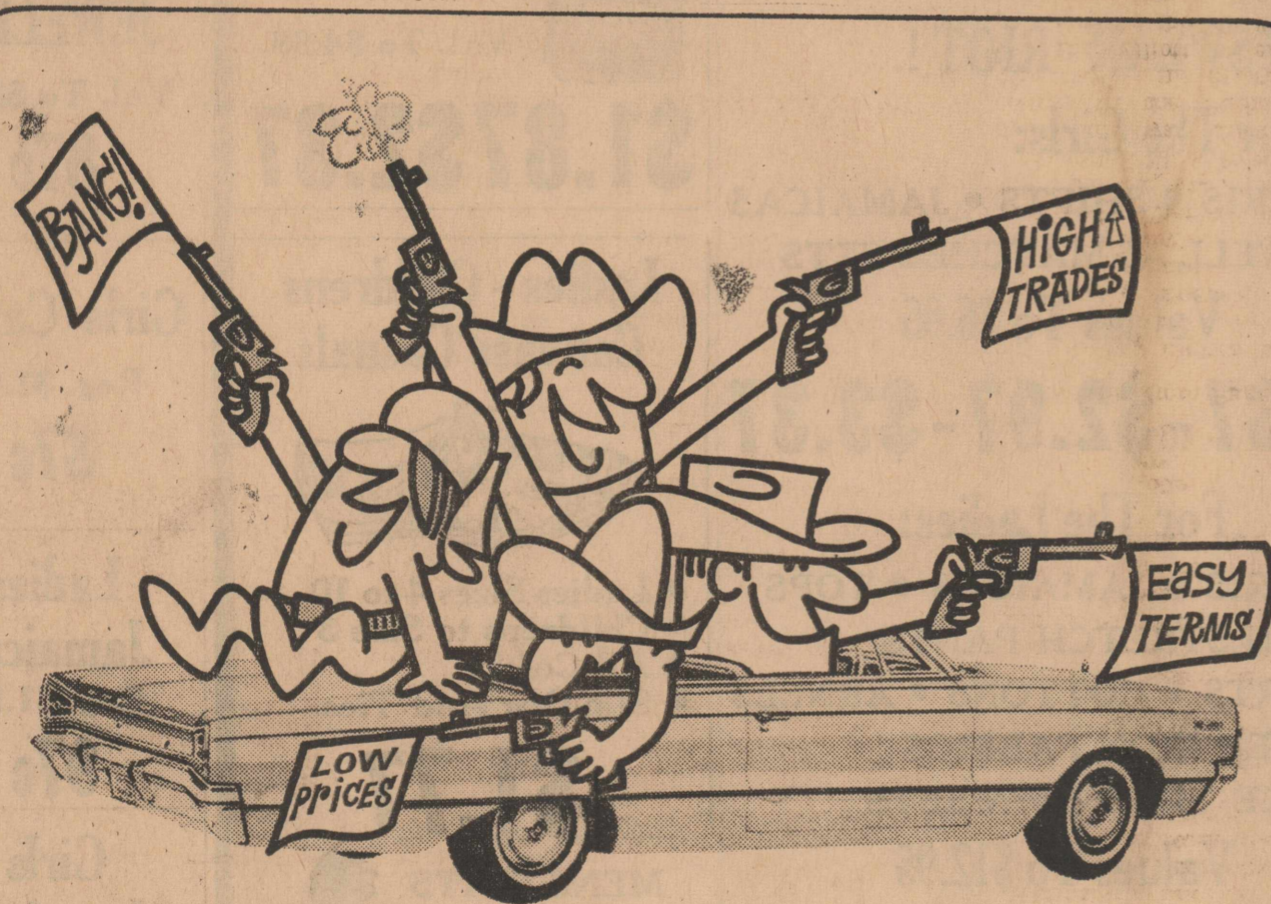

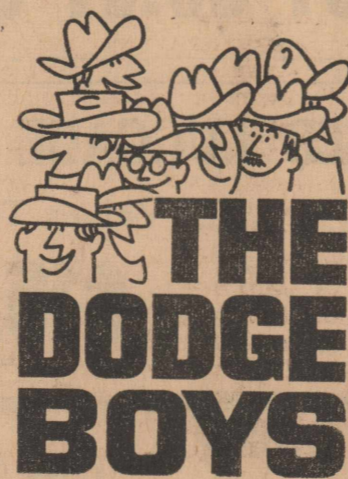
