Three Men Hurt In Flash Fire At Miller Gas Well

Three Ozona men were seriously burned and are in the Crockett County Hospital as the result of a flash fire at a gas well on the Mrs. Roy Miller ranch about 15 miles south of Ozona Monday.

The three men injured were O. R. (Tex.) Blanton, owner of the Blue Construction Co., Clint Strother of Blue Construction Co. and Joe Horton with the Northern Natural Gas Co.

A separator at the well, which is an active producer was being repaired at the time and, though the burner had been extinguished, it still gave off enough heat or contained some glowing carbon that ignited the escaping gas.

The fire was quickly extinguished. One fire truck from Ozona answered the call for help during the fire.

According to reports from the local hospital, Strother and Blanton were the most extensively burned of the trio but all three were reported to be doing well at midweek.

Senate Increase Amendment Up For Vote Sept. 7

In this issue of the Stockman is the complete text of the proposed amendment to the state constitution, providing for an increase in the size of the state Senate.

The amendment, which is to be voted on September 7, arises from the redistricting efforts of the just past session of the Legislature.

Last year's decision by the Supreme Court that all representation in the State governments had to be on a purely population distribution formula, or the one-for-one vote decision as it has been called, brought about the effort to re-divide the state for legislative purposes.

This interpretation of the Federal Constitution resulted in it being rejected in the beginning and it was not until it was amended to give the small states equal votes in the U. S. Senate that it could be adopted.

work through that week in order for all of the Ozona and Barnhart telephone accounts to be transferred to the San Angelo business office. She will then have a one-month vacation before her 35 year telephone career comes to a close. Mrs. Butler, who had held the job of cashier since 1958, has been with the telephone company in Ozona since her telephone career began.

Special recognition of Mrs. Butler's long service is planned before the office closes, McCullough said.

The closing of this business offices is in line with a company-wide program which has been underway for several years, according to McCullough. The program is designed to centralize business office operations, improve operating efficiency and cut operating costs.

During past months, the move was discussed informally with various civic leaders, according to McCullough. "While they too are sorry to see the office close they were understanding of the Company's efforts to keep operating costs at a minimum and keep pace with the everchanging requirements of our business," McCullough commented.

After the business office closes, Ozona customers may mail their bills in the self-addressed envelopes enclosed with their monthly statements or they may pay them in person in the San Angelo business office at 14 W. Twohig, McCullough said.

"For those Ozona customers who prefer to pay in person, we are attempting to make contractual arrangements with a local business to accept telephone payments," McCullough explained.

The accounts of all Barnhart telephone customers who now pay their telephone bills to the Ozona office, also will be transferred to San Angelo.

To discuss telephone business after the Ozona office is closed, Ozona customers may continue to dial the same local Ozona telephone number, 392-2606 to reach the service representative who will handle their account in San Angelo. Barnhart customers may continue to call the San Angelo business office — without charge — by dialing Operator and asking for Enterprise 2484.

Heating, Cooling, System Planned In Medical Building

The Crockett County Commissioners Court is asking for bids for installation of a new heating and cooling system for the county medical building, where doctors rent offices, south of the Crockett County Hospital.

Heretofore, the building has been heated and cooled by the same system which serves the hospital a hot water circulating system in the winter and chilled water in the summer.

The system is inadequate for both buildings in extreme weather and the court was of the opinion that a separate system for the medical building would improve the operations in both buildings.

END OF AN ERA

Cold machinery has already replaced the tinkling voice of the old time "hello girl" of the days of the manually operated telephone, and replaced her with the coldly matter-of-fact mechanical voice which, even before you build up hope, announces that "This is a recording—"

Now the equally cold ways of the corporation have brought about the end of an era in Ozona — the enforced retirement of Mrs. Claudie Butler, for more than 35 years the pleasant, always helpful representative of the telephone system, and for more years than we care to count, was the acutal "voice" of the telephone, the oracle of information, the willing helper in time of need. She was the one person in town who knew where everybody else could be reached, knew everybody's voice without need to ask, knew every-

body's telephone number and, in case one was not available at his own phone, knew what neighbor to call to reach him.

It was almost a time for mourning in the town when the dial replaced the switchboard. Who were we going to call to hunt down Joe Bloke for us? That recorded voice was no help—you got the same answer every time. It wasn't easy, but we finally adjusted to it — and if anything went wrong there was always that company number you could call and get Claudie on the phone to tell your troubles to. There'd be no need to identify yourself—she knew you the minute she heard your voice. If it were a wrong toll charge, a balky telephone instrument or some other service or information you wanted, Claudie's soft voice would reassure you — and if anybody could move the cumbersome machinery of the "heartless" corporation,

Claudie could.

All that is to be changed come June 30. The local business office of General Telephone is to be closed. There'll be no place to pay your telephone bill in person and if you mail your check you'll have to use a 5 cent instead of a 4 cent stamp.

But the big loss will be that pleasant voice, that helpful, accomodating one who stood between us and the cold machinery and the cold corporation. It's been such a short jump from the crank phone and "two longs and a short ring" to reach a neighbor; an even shorter one from the common battery system. The dial system is handier, faster and more efficient. But sometimes there's a nostalgic longing for the days of "number please" and the soft, human voice of "central" who stood ready to summon the doctor, hunt down a strayed child, or mate, connect you with the law without a number, or even call you at any designated hour of the morning when your alarm clock went on the blink.

But time has a way of moving on. Scenes change, faces change, memories fade. But Ozonans of a quarter century past will scarce forget the soft spoken, always unhurried and always patient "Number Please?" of Claudie Butler.

ON MIXING RACES

It is not enough that the Negro must be transplanted among whites even over his own objection, his children mixed with white children even if they have to be transplanted far distances from their own homes and districts.

It is not enough that the Negro rioters and pillaging mobsters that roamed the streets and smashed store windows, carried off merchandise and did millions of dollars in damage to a section of New York must remain outside the pale of law enforcement. It is not enough that marchers, sit-inners, stand-inners, lie-inners can invade the rights of others with confidence that no law can touch them that if they are molested by law enforcement officers a hue and cry will go up all across the front pages of the pink press that their "civil rights" are being invaded. It is not enough that they can with impunity stop traffic and commerce with their marches and demonstrations — all without regard to the civil or human rights of others.

It is not enough, we say, that others must suffer these indignities that the Negro might not be "psychologically disturbed" — now there are those who advocate the destruction of bars against intermarriage of the races and interracial adoption of children.

We can not agree that such action is necessary in order to assure the Negro his rights nor to in any way grease the way of the white man or black man into Heaven. We can only recall that the announced aims of the Communists are being accomplished one by one in America mostly with the help of misguided do-gooders.

WHY LET DOWN OUR GUARD?

The Administration's immigration bill (S.500 and H.R.2580) to replace the McCarran Walter Act and abolish the orderly selection of readily assimilable immigrants under the national origins quota system is the dreamboat by which the Commies and fellow-travellers in our midst look to a mass infiltration of potential enemy agents, spies and revolutionaries.

The bill is now before the Senate Judiciary Committee where it might best be interred — lest, if it were reported out, White House pressure could well prevail. To assist in such interment, Liberty Lobby is urging constituents of Senators Dirksen, Ervin, McClellan, Eastland, Smathers, Long, Ellender, Byrd and Robertson of Virginia and Majority Leader Mansfield — all of whom are believed to be opposed or leading that way — to write strong letters of protest against the new measure.

While it is encouraging to note that a recent opinion poll indicates nationwide support of the McCarran Walter Act by more than two to one, few citizens realize that its "Asiatic-Pacific Triangle" provisions stand between us and the influx of thousands of Red Chinese agents. In eliminating this national security factor, the proposed law would open our gates to a flood of hundreds of thousands of Chinese, whose backgrounds could not be adequately checked by an army of investigators.

"Thus," says Liberty Lobby, "the 'Trojan Horse' of immigration will have penetrated our defenses... our future against Communism will be compromised."

And just in case this reckless replacement for the McCarran Walter Act should get out of committee, every American who cherishes his freedom for himself and his offspring had better make his sentiments known to his Congressman and both Senators.

Screwworm Fund Drive Doubles \$300,000 Goal

Mission — Farmers and ranchers in Texas were asked to contribute \$300,000 to help finance the screwworm eradication program through July 1. Last week, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation announced that this goal had not only been met, but had practically been doubled.

Completing a final county-by-county tabulation, the Foundation's board of trustees disclosed that \$565,000 had been raised in Texas. Another \$45,000 was collected in Oklahoma and \$9,200 in New Mexico. Contributions were also reported from Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Kansas and Indiana.

Gasser Completed On Roy Hendersons

Union Texas Petroleum Corp. No. 1-25 Roy Henderson, ¾ mile southeast of the nearest production in the Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field of Crockett County was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.5 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio unreported.

Production was through perforations between 6,491-6,599 feet.

On the latest 20 - hour production gauge it made 69 barrels of distillate and eight barrels of load water. No choke was reported.

It was scheduled in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field, however, Canyon sand gas production in the Ozona, East; Ozona, Southeast and Ozona, Southwest fields has been combined and assigned to the Ozona field.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 25-M-GC&SF.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Senator Tower Reports To Texas

By Senator John Tower
This week, on Monday, 1 introduced in the Senate a measure that removes from the Secretary of Labor jurisdiction in determining when a state needs foreign agricultural workers. My bill would place that responsibility with the state agency having primary concern with agricultural policies. In our State this would be the State Commissioner of Agriculture.
The bracero program, under which Texas farmers, ranchers, and consumers benefited for many years, was not renewed this year. Last year more than 200,000 foreign workers, most of them from our good neighbor Mexico, entered the United States to help harvest crops. This year only 1,500 have been allowed to enter. The results are well known. In California, for instance, valuable crops of strawberries were plowed under because of the labor shortage. Prices to consumers on many farm produce items have almost doubled, but the added money did not go to farmers. Rather, the added cost reflects, in many instances, additional labor costs.
In 1950, of each \$312 spent on food by the average American, our farmers received \$132. In 1964, on the other hand, the spread had grown, according to the

National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, to such an extent that for every \$517 spent on food by the average American, the farmer received only \$133. And apparently the trend is continuing.
The Texas Employment Commission bulletin for the Brownsville, Harlingen, San Benito area, and for Starr and Hidalgo counties, indicates that "the possibility of a farm labor shortage exists for harvesting spring vegetables." As all Texans know this is a region of heavy agricultural production, and a farm labor shortage here will hurt consumers far and wide.
I do not believe there is a single Texas farmer who would employ alien workers rather than domestic workers if those domestic workers were available for employment. But if they are not available, I do not believe we ought to allow crops to rot in the fields with the resultant price increase to consumers, just because the wheels of the federal bureaucracy move so slowly.
In a recent exchange of letters, Secretary of Labor Wirtz assured me he is working with the Texas Employment Commission to "meet the labor needs of Texas growers."
But time is running out. We must act and act quickly.

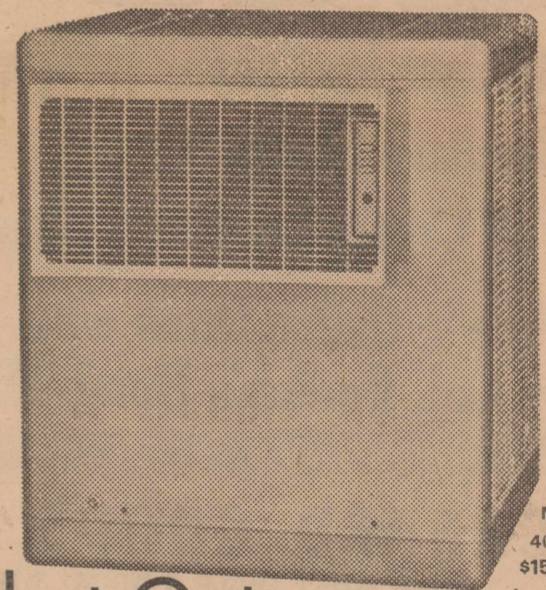

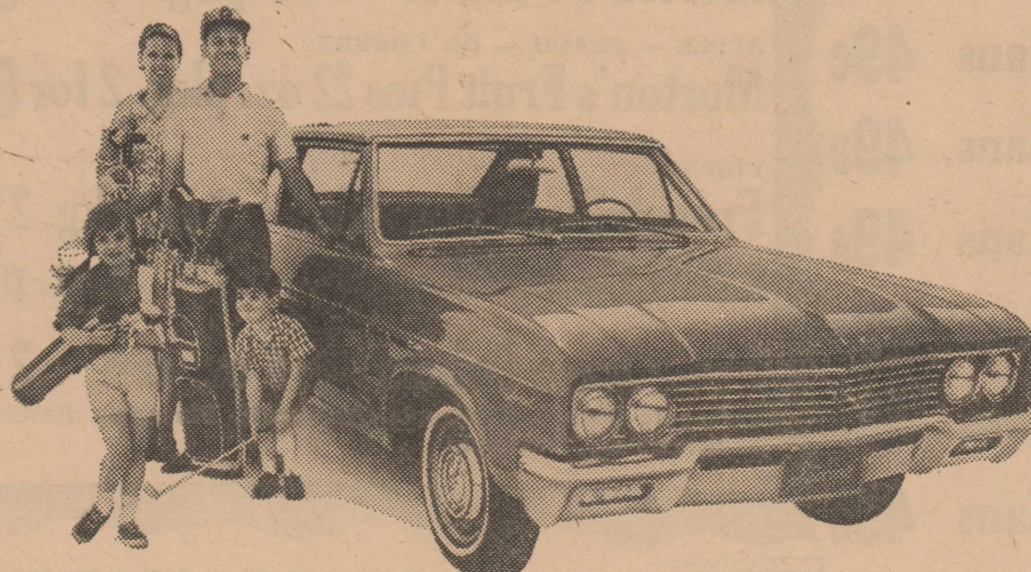

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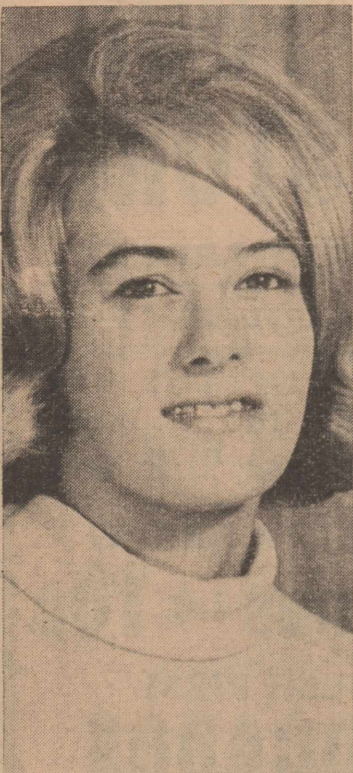

David Pagan led the assault for Ozona Oil with a home run, a double and a single.

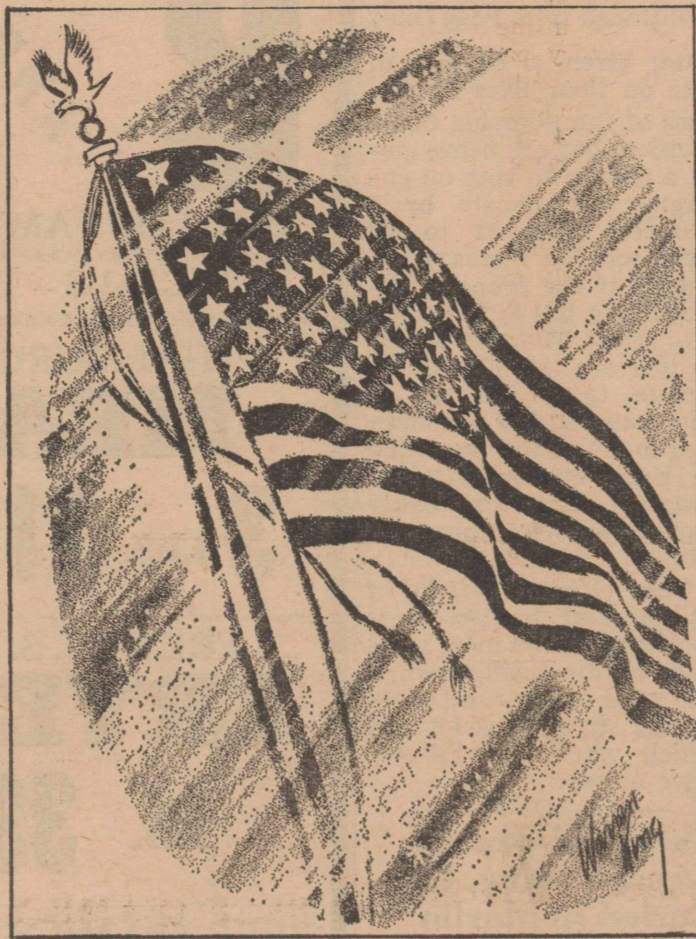

C. L. Norsworthy, Jr., Dallas No. 1 C. T. Harris, Crockett County Pennsylvanian detrital discovery 10 miles northeast of Iraan and six miles west of the Escondido (Pennsylvanian, Fusselman and Ellenburger) field, was finalized for 322 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 5 per cent acid water with gas-oil ratio of 700-1.

Production was through a 28-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,391-8,404 feet, which had been washed with 1,000 gallons of mud acid. Flowing pressure was 875 pounds.

Slated as a 10,200-foot Ellenburger wildcat it was drilled to 10,075 feet and recovered sulphur water on

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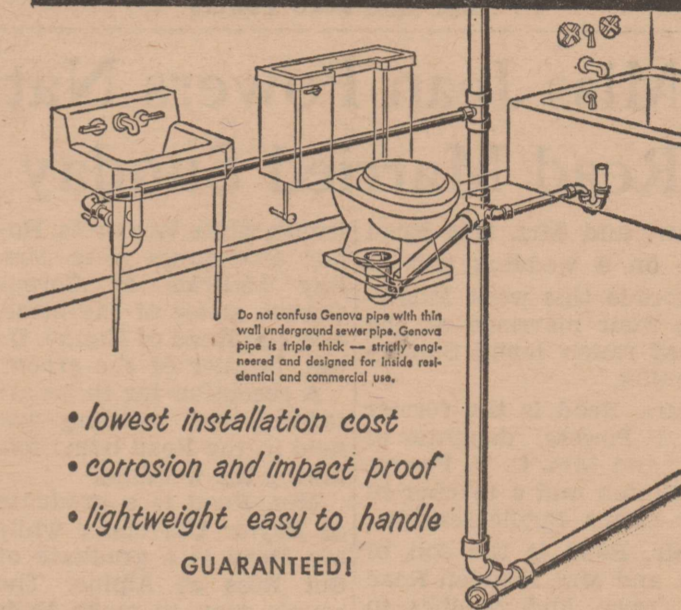
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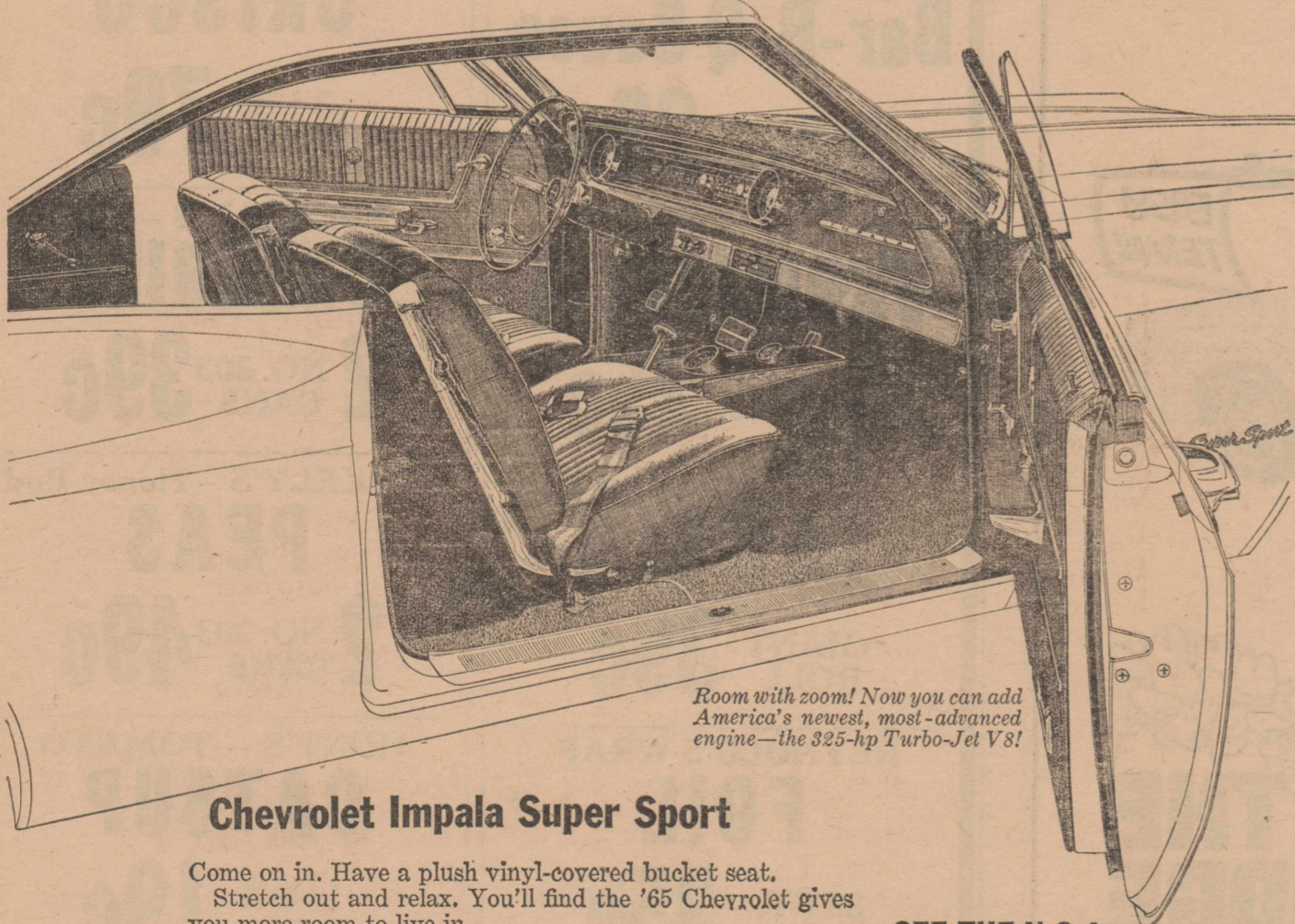

being given a chance to vote on their likes or dislikes of the Supreme Court decision, but are being given a chance to vote on enlarging the Senate by 8 members from 31 to 39, since such an increase was needed if the proposed re-districting bill is to be put into effect. The vote will be to increase the size of the Senate, to set the size of the House at 150 members, and to delete the limitation in the Constitution that provides that no county may have more than one Senator.

The ultimate effect of the bill and the decision is to give the cities more votes and to drastically reduce the voice of the rural areas of the state, a point on which voters again will have no say.

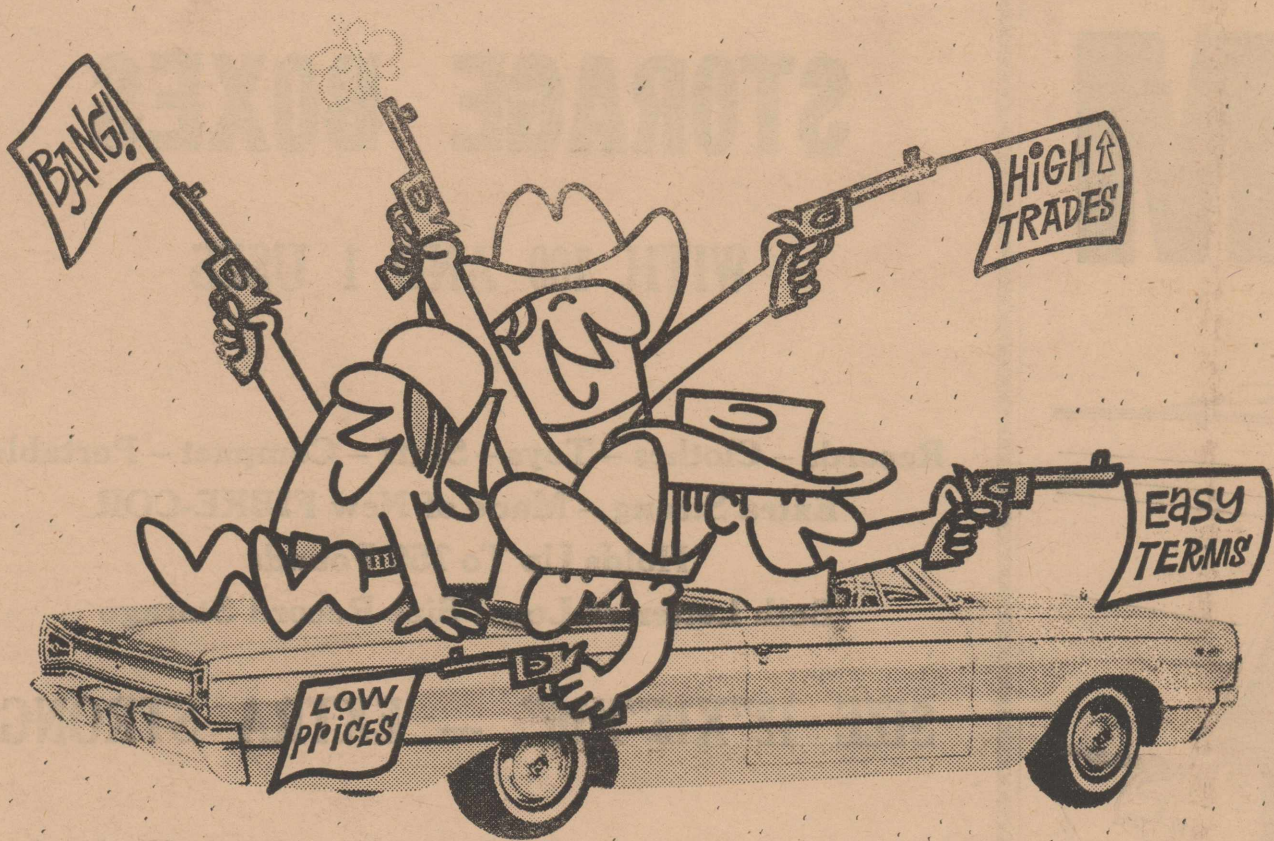

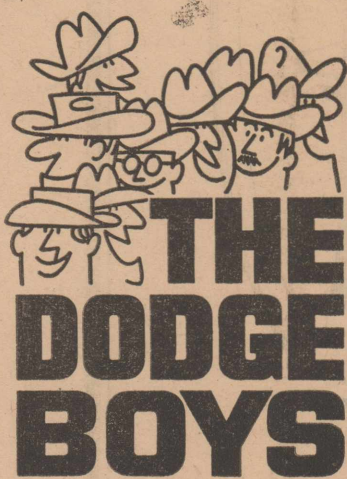
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
