Project STOP Will Conclude

"Stop! For Project STOP," urges Muleshoe Jaycee Jeff

He is the chairman of the local group of Jaycees who are working with the Texas Jaycees in the project.

He said, "With at least 1,500 American servicemen in Vietnam unaccounted for, and no information being released by to the delinquency of a minor, the North Vietnamese government as to their location and wellbeing, an effort is being made to secure additional information.

"Some of these servicemen have been on the 'missing' list for at least five years," he added, "and Project STOP is a petition and letter campaign for the heads of state and governments of the world. The petitions ask that the names of all prisoners be published; all prisoners receive proper medical care and adequate food; regular inspection of on an impartial basis of prisoner of war soners and their families be

allowed." For all this week, petitions 1 p.m. have been available in more than 20 locations in Muleshoe and in Lazbuddie and Needmore for signatures. The Jaycee said he has received full signed petitions to date and these will be coordinated at the end of the week with identical petitions



Neighbor Lamb County planted 166,400 bales of cotton and harvested 123,100 acres for a loss of 26.1 percent. Parmer County harvested 35,100 acres of the 38,900 acres planted for a loss of only 9.8 percent and Cochran County lost 9.3 percent of the cotton for the year. Commodity Distribution Procedure Outlined

Wednesday and Thursday and 8:30 to 11:00 o'clock in the mornings, and between the hours of 2:00 to 4:00 o'clock in the afternoons at the Bailey County Commodity Distribution Program Warehouse, 603 East American Boulevard, said Jane Morgan, local commodity distributor.

Identity cards must be presented by those eligible to re-

ceive commodities. Persons certified as eligible to receive commodities during the initial stage of setting up the program, except those receiving state aid or who produced documents verifying their income upon first application, were approved on a temporary

basis. "No commodities will be issued to persons who have not complied with the terms of the review letter mailed to all who were approved to receive them in June and July. Persons receiving state aid are not affected by this, as no review letter was mailed to them," said Miss Morgan.

A few letters have been returned to the Bailey County Commodity Distribution Office for lack of proper address. Some have not understood the requirements due to difficulty in reading.

Before issuance of commodities to them, it will be necessary that they bring the folowing information to the commodity supervisor IN WRITING:

1. Amount of weekly or monthly wages and bonuses paid to them in May, June and July by their employers. Paycheck stubs, deposit or cash silps from employer will suffice.

2. Number of dependents claimed, amount of income tax and social security deducted from wages by employers and any other job-connected deductions, such as insurance premiums or uniforms during May, June and July.

3. Amount of earnings or income from sources other than jobs, supported by written records showing how much was received in May, June and July,

4. Written receipts or can-
