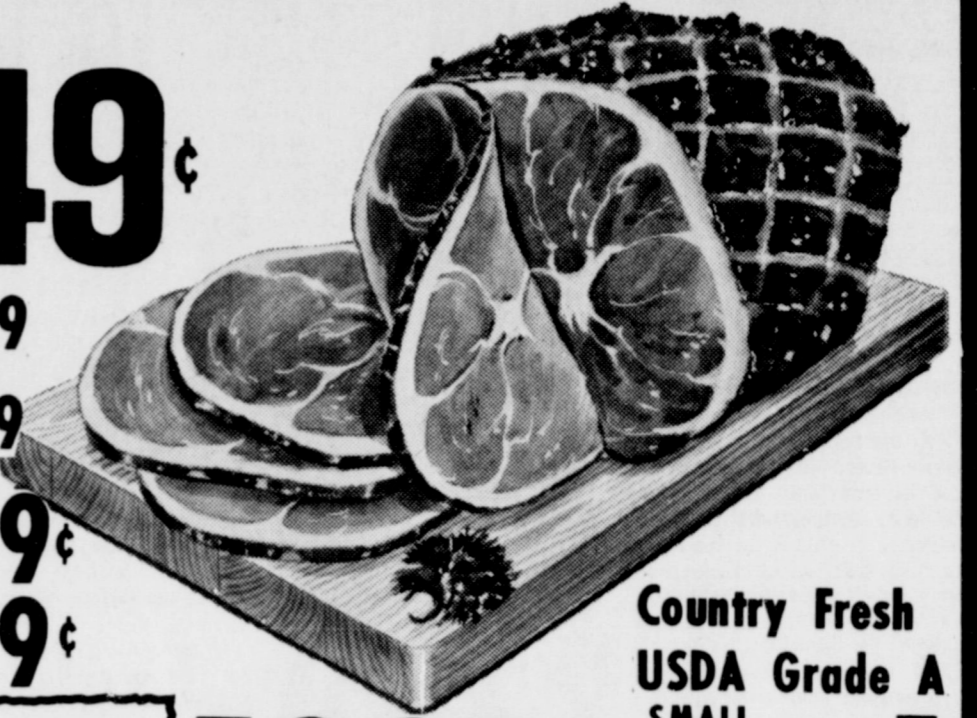

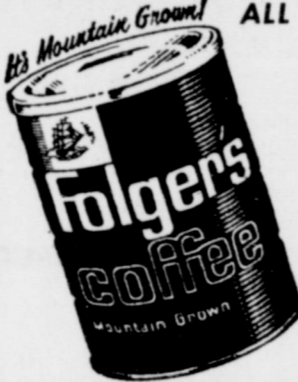

### County Shows '69 Cotton Production

The report of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service on acreage, yield and production of cotton, just released, shows 1,418,600 bales (500 pounds gross) produced in the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. The total is down from 1,662,300 bales grown in 1968 but still represents 49.6 percent of the State's 2,862,000 bale total and over 14 percent of the 9.9 million bale total grown in the U.S.

Running bales for the area were reported earlier by the U.S. Bureau of Census at 1,392,800. Statewide production in running bales came to 2,806,926 in the Census report.

The TCLRS report for 1969 reveals an average yield per harvested acre for the Plains counties of 349.2 pounds, compared to 1968's yield of 496 pounds. The State average yields per harvested acre for 1968 and 1969 were 410 and 294 pounds, respectively.

Weather in 1969 cost High Plains farmers 226,250 acres of cotton, 10.4 percent of the 2,173,950 acres originally planted. Abandonment of acreage between planting and harvest time across the State came to 9.7 percent. Adverse weather both on the Plains and Statewide was responsible also for the drastic drop in per acre yields last year.

cotton harvested on the Plains total 1,256,600 acres or 64.5 percent of total acres harvested. Yield on irrigated acreage averaged 404 pounds per acre as opposed to a yield of only 255 pounds on the 35.5 percent grown under dryland conditions.

With planted acres of cotton in Bailey County being 86,500, only 70,800 were harvested.

from area towns to be sent to the government. This represented a loss of 18.2 percent. The yield per harvested acre was 281 and the production of 500 pound bales was listed as being 41,600.

Neighbor Lamb County planted 166,400 bales of cotton and harvested 123,100 acres for a loss of 26.1 percent. Parmer County harvested 35,100 acres of the 38,900 acres planted for a loss of only 9.8 percent and Cochran County lost 9.3 percent of the cotton for the year. They planted 71,400 acres and harvested 64,800 acres.

The 25 counties listed in the Plains Cotton Grower area had planted 2,173,950 acres and harvested that amount 1,947,000 acres for an average loss of 10.4 percent. A total of 1,418,600 bales were recorded from the 25 counties.

It was found that the group had given numerous checks in the Muleshoe area, and in amounts from \$54 to \$94. By late Monday morning checks in the amount of \$557.44 had been picked up by officers of the Bailey County Sheriff's office and officers expected the total amount in Muleshoe to exceed \$800 by the time all the checks had come in.

Working with officers from surrounding and outlying counties, the Bailey County officers have found that the group is wanted for giving at least 10 checks in Hale County and several in Levelland in Hockley County. Other officers have checked on the possibility of the same group giving checks in their areas.

Local officers said possibly more people will be involved in the forgery ring, which allegedly has been a widespread operation, involving several people.

District Attorney Jack Young said the group was charged with forgery and passing a forged instrument. Monday, they were taken before a magistrate who advised them of their rights and offered them an examining trial

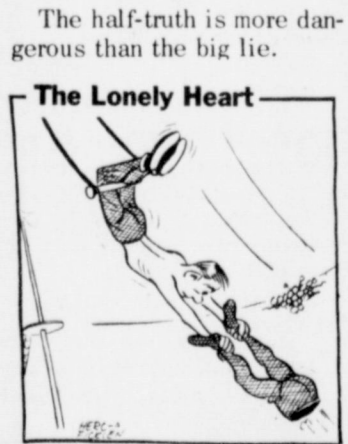
He stressed that what the youths learn in the classroom, they must apply to everyday life, and added that much of what they learn and how they learn it will affect them in their adult lives.

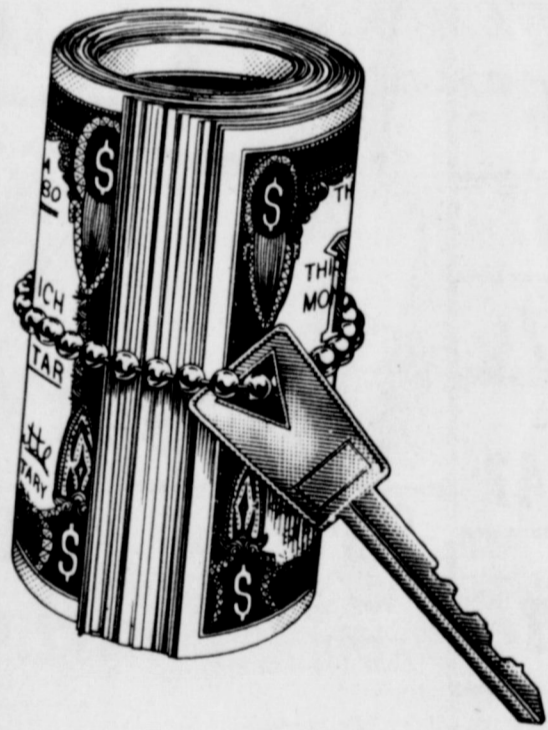

Commodities will be issued Wednesday and Thursday and Friday between the hours of 8:30 to 11:00 o'clock in the mornings, and between the hours of 2:00 to 4:00 o'clock in the afternoons at the Bailey County Commodity Distribution Program Warehouse, 603 East American Boulevard, said Jane Morgan, local commodity distributor.

Identity cards must be presented by those eligible to receive commodities.

Persons certified as eligible to receive commodities during the initial stage of setting up the program, except those receiving state aid or who produced documents verifying their income upon first application, were approved on a temporary basis.

Ceiled checks for payment of rent, house payments, utilities, fire insurance policy on home, medical hospitalization or life insurance premiums, prescription drugs or medical bills paid during May, June and July, 1970.

5. Written statement from physician to establish inability to work, or condition requiring continuing medication and treatment.

6. A recent bank statement indicating amount of savings account.

7. Any other papers or documents that may indicate present financial condition, health, or change in either, since application was made for commodities.

4. Written receipts or cancelled checks for payment of rent, house payments, utilities, fire insurance policy on home, medical hospitalization or life insurance premiums, prescription drugs or medical bills paid during May, June and July, 1970.
