Recipe of the Week

From Kitty's Kitchen

Chicken Tetrizzini

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 4 Tablespoons flour
- 1 teas. salt
- 1/4 teas white pepper
- 1/8 teas nutmeg
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 cup light cream
- 1/2 cup sherry
- 1 lb. spaghetti, cooked
- 1/2 lb sauteed mushrooms
- 2 1/2 cups cooked chicken (cut in matchstick slices)
- 1/4 cup freshly grated parmesan (dried may be used)
- Paprika

Melt butter and blend in flour, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Gradually stir in chicken broth. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add cream and sherry then heat just to boiling. Mix half the sauce with cooked spaghetti. Add half the mushrooms. Place in a greased open baker, making a hole in the center by pushing some of the spaghetti

up the sides of the casserole. Mix chicken with remaining sauce and mushrooms. Pour into center of casserole.

Sprinkle with cheese and paprika. Bake at 375 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until top is browned and sauce bubbles. Serves 8 to 10.

This recipe came to me by way of Ann McMullan's kitchen and it is without doubt the best recipe I have ever tried for chicken tetrizzini.

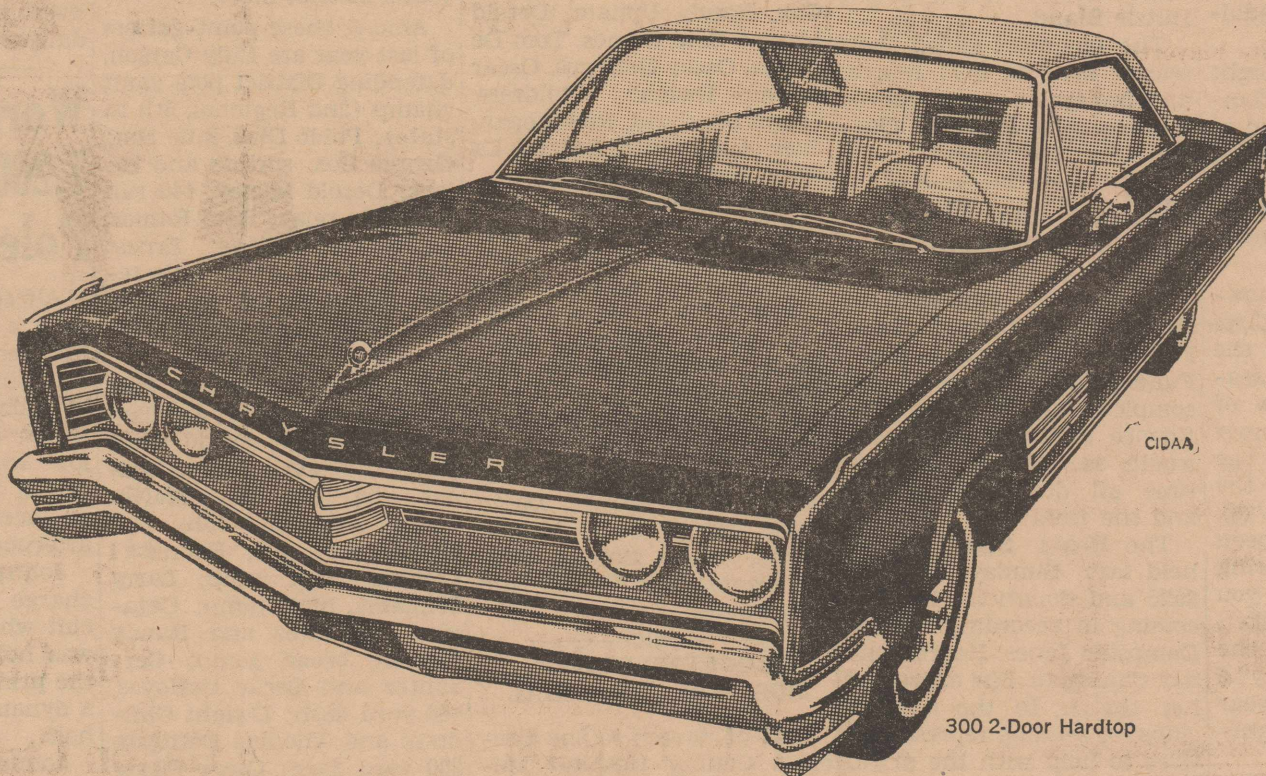

**Gas-Distillate Duel Discovery For Midway Lane**

Ashmunu & Hilliard, Midland, No. 1 Chambers County School Land, recent Atoka gas-distillate pay opened in the Midway Lane (multipay Permian) field of Crockett County, 12 miles north-east of Ozona, has been dually completed as a Strawn gas-distillate discovery.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 17.3 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 38,134-1. Gravity of the liquid was 66.2 degrees.

Production was through perforations between 7,222-316 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

It was finalized Feb. 15 from the Atoka for a calculated absolute open flow of 15 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 19,100-1, through perforations between 7,389-7,434 feet.

Location is 7,400 feet from the south and 4,300 feet from the west lines of Chambers County School Land . . . o. 4.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 Pierce in 2-BBB-TCRR, 1/2 mile north of a 1 1/8-mile southeast extension to the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County, 22 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed 7.1 barrels of condensate and 26.7 barrels of load-salt water in 24 hours.

The project was still flowing load through the lower set of Canyon perforations at 6,286-88 feet, with 1,284 barrels of load salt water and 58 barrels of load oil remaining to recover.

Earlier it tested through Canyon perforations at 6,169-71 feet.

Union Texas Petroleum Corp. will drill the No. 1-4 Montgomery, 1 1/8 mile northwest of a recent long southeast extension to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, 1 1/8 miles southeast of production and 18 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 4-R-TCRR. Contract depths is 7,200 feet.

**Crockett Gains Wildcat and New Offset Operation**

James K. Anderson, et al, Midland, will drill the No. 1 Flowers, an 8,000-foot wildcat in Crockett County, six miles north of Ozona, three miles north and slightly east of Canyon oil production in the Ozona, Northwest multipay oil and gas field and 3 1/2 miles south and slightly east of the one-well Holt Ranch (Ellenburger) field.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 8-OP-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,439 feet.

It is also 3/4 mile southwest of McAlester Fuel Co. No. 2 Harvick, a 9,163-foot wildcat failure, abandoned Nov. 23, 1959, which topped the Ellenburger at 8,393 feet on elevation of 2,505 feet.

McFarland Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 2-14 Holt as a 1/2-mile west offset to its No. 1-14 Holt, opener and lone producer in the Holt Ranch (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, nine miles north of Ozona.

Location is 1,783 feet from the north and 2,142 feet from the west lines of 14-OP-GC&SF. Contract depth is 8,100 feet; ground elevation, 2,547 feet.

The discovery was finalized July 13, 1965, for 130.25 barrels of 42.4 gravity oil, plus 5 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 295,600-1, through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations between 7,873-897 feet.
