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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Texas has some 615,000 new voters as a result of the March 3-17 free registration period.

Turnout was six times larger than state officials had predicted and could be an indicator of a dawning new era in Texas politics.

More than half the total came from four big counties — Harris with an estimated 100,000; Dallas with 96,017; Bexar with 88,100 and Tarrant with 50,662.

April allowable raised — Texas Railroad Commission at a time when oil demand usually lightens, has raised statewide oil allowable for April to 33.7 per cent of potential.

Increase was the seventh straight monthly boost. Only once before in the last 20 years has April allowable been higher than March.

Important addition — Securities Commissioner William M. King believes a recent decision by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is an important addition to the legal protection afforded Texas investors against fraudulent practices in the sale of securities.

Court held that misrepresentation of material facts in offering securities for sale is a crime under penal provision of the Texas Securities Act.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has announced that more than 515,000 acres of submerged lands off the coast of Texas and more than 16,000 acres of uplands and riverbeds, most of them in far West Texas, will be offered for oil and gas leases at the Lease Sale to be held in the General Land Office on May 3.

Texas crime rate increased nine per cent last year, to 2,967.2 for each 100,000 population, for an all-time high of 284,249 offenses, according to Col. Homer Garrison, Texas Department of Public Safety director.

Autos must have safety checks by April 15 inspection deadline and Department of Public Safety says more than 1,300,000 cars still are to be inspected.

Selling price for heifers was \$23.60 per cwt., while old cows brought \$15.30 to \$19.10 per cwt. Steers went at \$22 per cwt.

Yearling muttons brought \$5.50 to \$7 a head with old ewes bringing \$7.75 to \$11 per cwt.

Three and 4 year old goats got a price of \$6.80 to \$10.80 per cwt. Old nannies sold for \$4.50 to \$6 per cwt. and old billies, \$8.50 to \$8.80 per cwt.

Sales are scheduled on an every other Thursday basis with the next sale falling on April 7.

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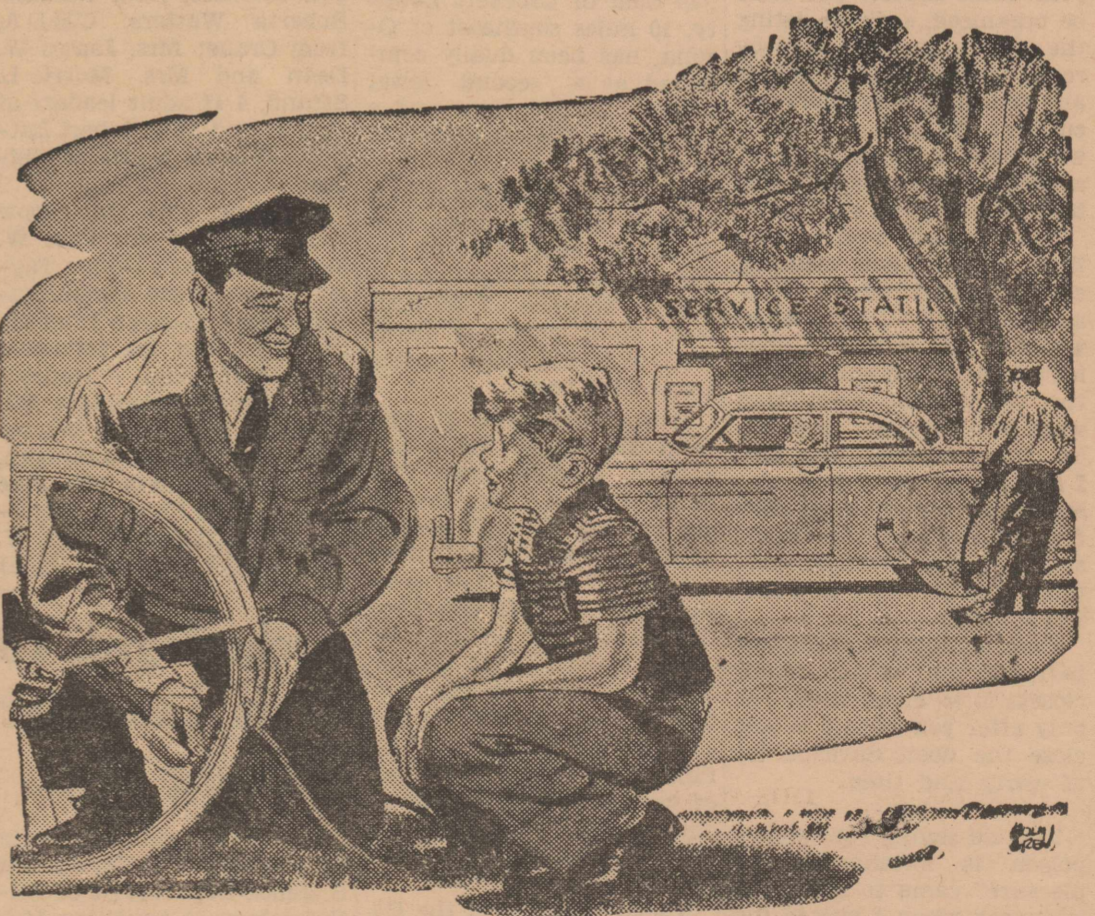



ARCTIC AIRLIFT—Nearly three million pounds of oil drilling equipment have been airfreighted from Fairbanks, Alaska, to a wildcat drilling site on the Arctic Slope. The 21-day airlift was carried out by Humble Oil & Refining Company and Atlantic Refining Company. The two companies will drill for oil on a site 330 miles north of Fairbanks, where temperatures as low as 50 degrees below zero were encountered by the airlift crews. 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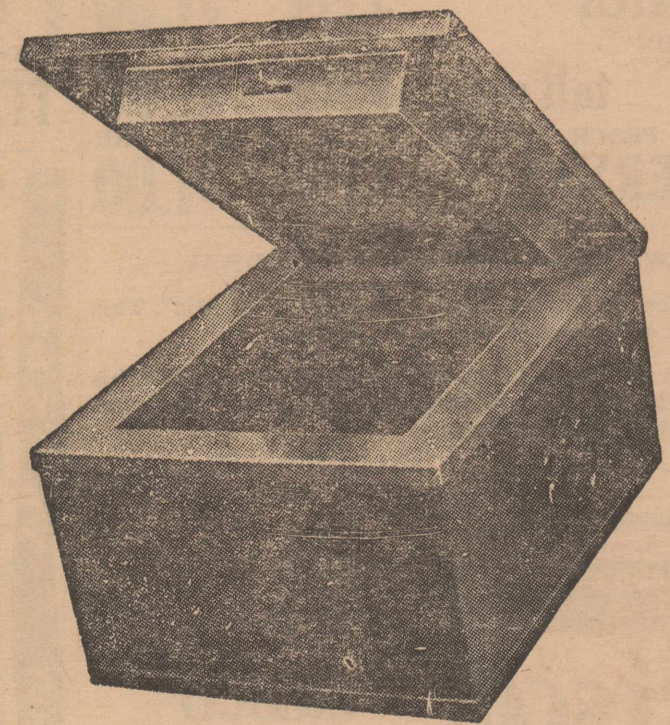

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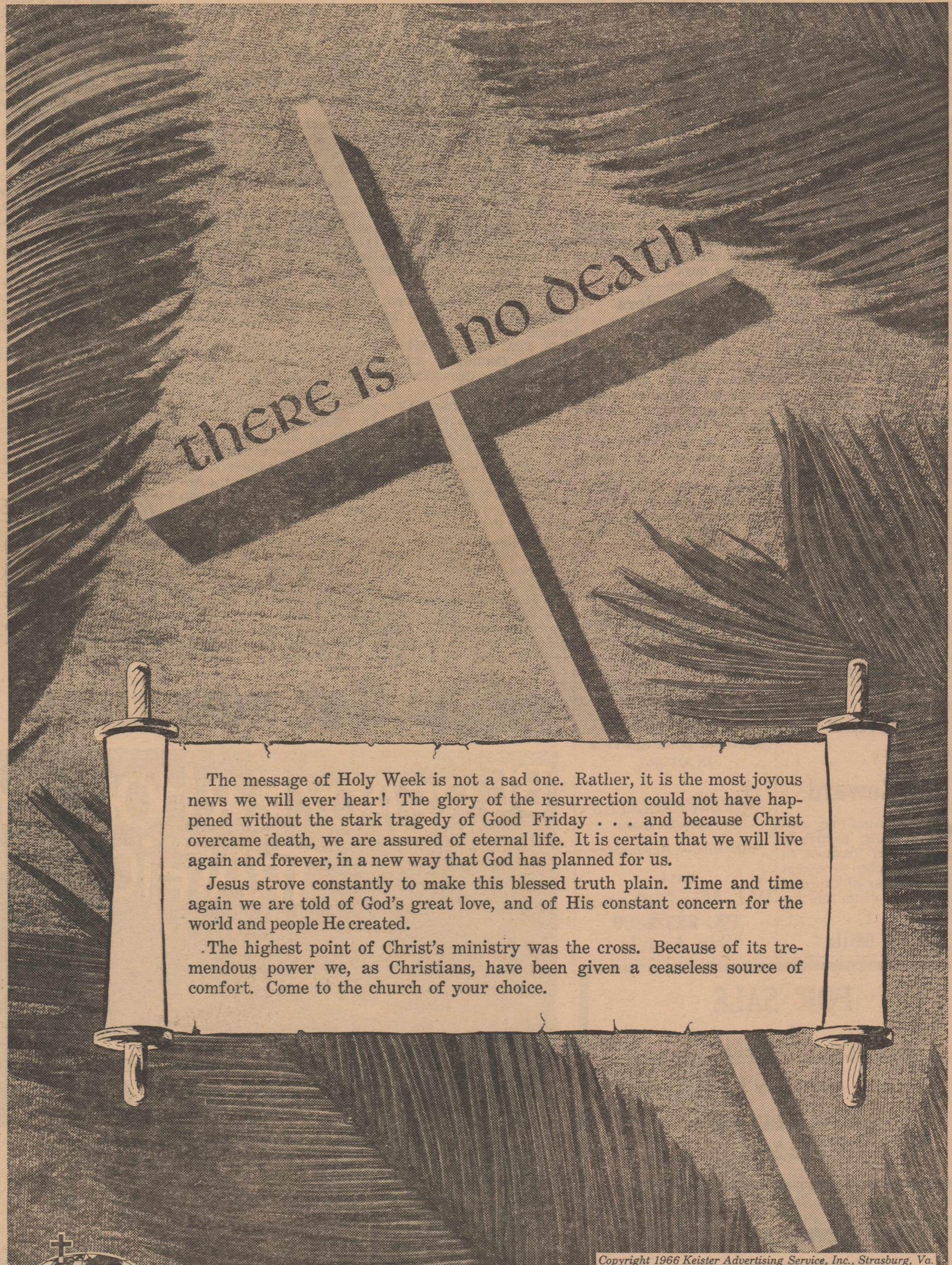

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Saves line loss — Lots of live bait fishermen use a sinker at the tip end of the line. Most attach the sinker to a weaker line than the regular line. This was if the sinker fouls you can break the leader line off and not lose the entire rigging.

Keeps Hooks from rusting — Carry a piece of cork in your tackle box. Then at the end of the day's fishing stick your fish hooks in the cork and you'll keep the points from rusting.

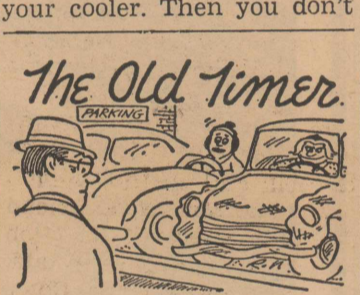
Pin-pointing fish — You can make an inexpensive fishing buoy with a discarded plastic detergent bottle. Tie a line to the handle and add just enough weight to keep it in one place. When you locate a school of fish, you can pinpoint the spot simply by anchoring your home-made buoy.

Stops earlock squeaks — When earlocks creak, rub them with paraffin or soap. That will eliminate the noise.

Excellent fire starter — cement-type glue is mostly acetone. It will burn with intense flame. Makes an excellent fire starter even in wet weather.

Handy drinking Cup — Cellophane from a cigarette pack can make an emergency drinking cup. And those light-weight plastic containers some cigs are packed in make even better cups.

No broken egg worries — Best way to carry eggs to camp is to break them in a jar or leakproof plastic container and carry them in your cooler. Then you don't

miles southwest of Ozona and eight miles east of the J. M. (Ellenburger gas) field, flowed 97 barrels of load water in 48 hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 1,276,000 cubic feet.

Flow was by heads at 10-minute intervals through a 48-64-inch choke and open hole between 13,538-14,250 feet.

Testing continued with 2,937 barrels of load water remaining to recover.

in Crockett County, located on the L. P. Powell ranch northwest of Ozona; early postoffice sites of Hinde and Hembre northwest of Ozona; Eureka, proposed townsite for Crockett County west of Ozona, and the Ozona-Comstock stage stand twenty miles south of Ozona. Other sites will be listed in the future.

The Committee considers the two medallions on the bank and on the Courthouse are inadequate and plans to place interpretive plaques supplying additional historical data with them. Private donations for one have been given and the county is being asked to furnish funds for the courthouse and the jail. Costs of these plaques are nominal in recording local history permanently.

Also to be marked are the graves of Confederate Veterans in the Cedar Hill Cemetery. Families will be given the opportunity to pay for these official markers.

Mrs. Harrell brought to the attention of the committee a new law which permits the naming of geographical sites which are now un-named. They may not be named for living persons. Blanks for this purpose may be obtained from the committee.

It was voted that publicity for the restoration of Fort Lancaster would be placed in the Diamond Jubilee Publication.

It was noted that Fort Lancaster is listed in a publication of the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior, entitled "Parks For America." This indicates that the Fort site is of both State and National concern.
