IT WAS LOST 60 YEARS AGO -OIL WELL DRILLING MAY SOME DAY LEAD TO RE-DISCOVERY OF COUNTY'S LOST DIAMOND MINE

its share of tall tales and legends in the past 75 years of its existence and looking through them brings to light the fact that Crockett County, too, boasts of a lost treasure. For the Diamond Jubilee celebration, what could possibly be more fitting than a story about a lost diamond mine, that goes something like this.

It seems that around the year 1906 or therebouts, one Bob Metcalf owned the propert that is now the Miller ranch southwest of Ozona, and it was in trying to drill a well on this ranch that the black diamonds, or something wonderfully like them, were encountered.

These stones were excessively hard and a diamond

Crockett County has had drill was powerless to penetrate the strata in which they were encountered. It was thought, at the time, that even if not real black Sonora Broncos diamonds which seemed too ping drills, and for other commercial purposes.

The samples brought to town by Mr. Metcalf were sent away for analysis and ther with his drilling, Metsubsequently was never able to relocate it.

There the tale of the Black Diamond Mine ends, but who knows, with so much oil activity, it could be uncovered again some day soon.

- 1 stick butter
- 4 tbs. cocoa ½ cup water
- 2 c. flour 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 teas. soda
- teas. cinnamon or van-

1/2 teas, salt 2 well-beaten eggs

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Combine butter, cocoa and water in saucepan and milk, soda, cinnamon or vanilla, salt and eggs. Pour into greased and floured oblong cake pan and bake at 450 degrees 20 to 25 minutes.
