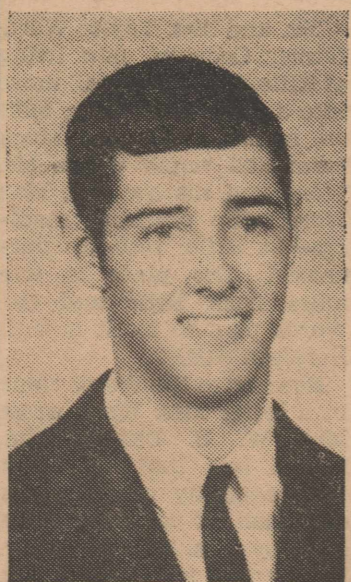

IT WAS LOST 60 YEARS AGO -

OIL WELL DRILLING MAY SOME DAY LEAD TO RE-DISCOVERY OF COUNTY'S LOST DIAMOND MINE

Crockett County has had its share of tall tales and legends in the past 75 years of its existence and looking through them brings to light the fact that Crockett County, too, boasts of a lost treasure. For the Diamond Jubilee celebration, what could possibly be more fitting than a story about a lost diamond mine, that goes something like this.

It seems that around the year 1906 or thereabouts, one Bob Metcalf owned the property that is now the Miller ranch southwest of Ozona, and it was in trying to drill a well on this ranch that the black diamonds, or something wonderfully like them, were encountered.

These stones were excessively hard and a diamond

drill was powerless to penetrate the strata in which they were encountered. It was thought, at the time, that even if not real black diamonds which seemed too good to hope for, the stones would be valuable for tipping drills, and for other commercial purposes.

The samples brought to town by Mr. Metcalf were sent away for analysis and were lost. At the time of the find, unable to go farther with his drilling, Metcalf closed the hole, and subsequently was never able to relocate it.

There the tale of the Black Diamond Mine ends, but who knows, with so much oil activity, it could be uncovered again some day soon.

4-H Quarter Horse Judging Teams Converge In Dist. Meet Here Sat.

Sonora Broncos Edge Ozona For Dist. Track Title

The Sonora Broncos edged Ozona for the District 8A Track Title 117½ to 106 at Lions' Stadium last Saturday. The Broncos jumped out ahead after the completion of the five field events Saturday morning and the Lions were never able to catch up.

Rankin surprised with 83½ Junction picked up 39 points; and Iraan trailed with 7. Five Ozona Lions qualified for regional competition in Lubbock this Saturday, and two, Billy Carson and Gary Sutton handily broke district records in the pole vault and discus. George Cox, although handicapped with a leg injury, won the 220 and qualified for the Lubbock trip, and Pablo Diaz and Maggie Galindo took first and second in the mile run for their trips to regional.

In one of the most thrilling races of the day the two Lions teammates battled for the top spot with Senior Diaz beating Sophomore Galindo for the first time this year.

Iraan won the B-Team meet with 132½ points, followed by Ozona (121½), Big Lake (80), Rankin (59½), Sonora (109), and Junction (5).

Sonora copped the Jr. High title with 24½ pts. followed by Eldorado (22), Junction (21), Big Lake (18), Rankin (14½), and Ozona with 10.

Carson broke the oldest record on the 8A books with a leap of 12'6", breaking Pete Badillo's 12'1" jump in 1957. Sophomore Sutton led a strong field of discus throwers with a record breaking 158'1½" Jerry McDonald's 152'10". Don Childs broke Ozona Gary Pagans' record in the shot put Cook, the Bronco's leading point maker, broke the high hurdle mark with a 14.9 eclipsing . . . eclipsing the 15 flogging of David Childress and Jerry Jacobs, both of Ozona.

Point makers for the Lions were Mike Prater with a 4th and a 6th in the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Randy Upham picked up a fourth in the broad jump; Carson added a third in the high hurdles and a 5th the lows; David Huff grabbed a 6th in the pole vault; Sutton added a 4th in the shot; George Parker was third in the low hurdles; Ernest Vargas and Cox were 3rd and 4th in the 440 yard dash; the Lion sprint relay won fourth, and the mile relay team was third.

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CROCKETT CO. OWES SENATOR HARDEMAN A DEBT OF GRATITUDE

Aside from the fact that he is perhaps the most powerful man in the state government at Austin next to the governor himself, Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, veteran 25th district representative in the upper chamber of the state legislature for many years, deserves to be re-elected to that post by the voters of this district because of his faithful service to the district and to the State as a whole.

Senator Hardeman voted for the Texas Right to Work law and supported retention of Taft-Hartley act's 14-B. He voted to outlaw the Communist party. He supported legislation to stop pollution of fresh water in West Texas. He authored the constitutional amendment, approved by voters in 1964, stopping legislative raids on the state's permanent school fund. He co-authored the school teacher pay bill in 1965. He has worked as a member of the Senator Finance Committee to maintain a balanced budget and one of the lowest per capita costs of government in the nation.

These are but a sample of the many services a steadfast, conservative but progressive State Senator has rendered the people of Texas as a whole and West Texas in particular.

Senator Hardeman deserves particularly a resounding vote of confidence from Crockett county voters for one service alone he rendered this county a few years back. This was the occasion when a scheming

group from a segment of a neighboring county oiled up the machinery for creating a separate county out of one of the richest segments of Crockett county and a piece of Pecos county. It was largely through the quiet efforts of Senator Hardeman that that move was squelched in the legislature. And Crockett county voters who don't like the idea of breaking up the present county set-up to create more county government costs and weakening existing county organizations should do their part toward returning Senator Hardeman to Austin for another four years.

Recipe of the Week

From Kitty's Kitchen

Jiffy Chocolate Cake

- 1 stick butter
- 4 tbs. cocoa
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 c. flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 teas. soda
- 1 teas. cinnamon or vanilla
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 2 well-beaten eggs

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Combine butter, cocoa and water in saucepan and bring to boil. Cool slightly and add flour, sugar, buttermilk, soda, cinnamon or vanilla, salt and eggs. Pour into greased and floured oblong cake pan and bake at 450 degrees 20 to 25 minutes.

Icing

Melt one stick butter in sauce pan with 4 tablespoons cocoa and 6 tablespoons of milk. Bring to a boil and add 1 package powdered sugar, 1 teas. vanilla and 1 cup chopped pecans. Spread on cake as soon as you take it out of oven.

This is the quickest and easiest recipe I have ever used for chocolate cake and one of the best. I snatched it from the kitchen of Thelma James last week and I have used it twice since then.

If you plan to have guests during the Jubilee, you'll surely want to add it to your collection. It takes less than 35 minutes from start to finish.

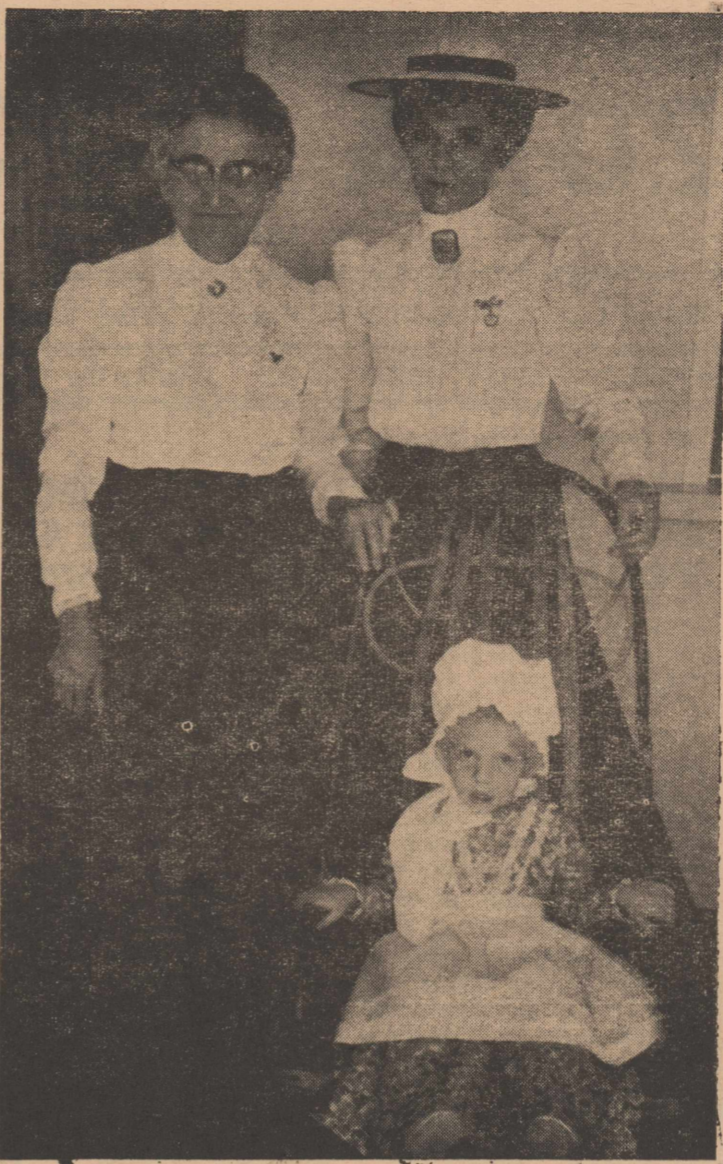

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman April 22, 1937

With the close of the present school year, Miss Elizabeth Fussell will bring to a close eighteen years of service in guiding the footsteps of tiny tots who are just being launched on their educational careers.

Bountiful and timely rains soaked most of the stock raising sections of West Texas early in the week to put new life into sprouting vegetation and to bring new thrills to the ranch operators and residents in general.

Funeral services were held here at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon from the First Baptist Church for Jack Merck, young ranchman living near Barnhart, who was found dead on the Claude Linthicum ranch nine miles south of Barnhart in this county late last Thursday evening.
