Ozona Natl. Acquires Site For Construction Modern Bank Facility

Ozona National Bank has acquired a site in downtown Ozona on the south side of the square where it plans the construction of a new, modern banking facility to serve a growing Ozona, it was announced this week by Lowell Littleton, executive vice president.

The bank has contracted with Lee Wilson of Truitt

or Consequences, N. M., conditioned on approval of title, for purchase of Wilson's building at the corner of Avenue D and Eleventh Street, for many years the location for a thriving Buick agency operated in Ozona by Mr. Wilson, and occupied until recently by Southland Pipe & Supply Co.

As soon as the real estate transfer is finally completed and after plans are drawn by an architect yet to be employed, the bank will begin construction of a new banking home and its ultimate move from its 61-year-old quarters, a Historical Medalion marked building on the downtown square whose massive stone pillars in front have been an Ozona landmark since 1905.

The new bank building will be modern in every respect, including a drive-in window, Mr. Littleton said, but other than that no estimate of figures on final construction costs or size and shape of the building are yet known, Mr. Littleton said.

Most General & Generous Rain in Years Soaks Area

While torrential rains were flooding much of north, central and east Texas, causing tremendous property damage and loss of life, West Texas was basking in perhaps the finest general rains to soak this section of the state in several years.

Some extremely heavy rains spotted areas of Crockett and adjoining counties during the past two weeks of dripping skies, but damage has been light if any and the generous moisture is seen by area ranchmen as the makings of a fine year for the livestock business.

The town of Ozona apparently received less rainfall than did most areas of the county. The total since April 18 has been 1.41 inches here, according to the gauge at the water office, but most ranchmen in the county report from two and a half inches to five and six inches over the long rainy period.

Except for some heavy rains in the northwest section of the county, which put Howard Draw on a series of rises that lasted over several days, and heavy falls in spotted areas all over the county, the rain for the most part has been the kind that soaks into the ground, falling in moderate amounts and at intervals scattered over a number of days. And followed by cool weather and cloudy days, the moisture did a maximum of soaking into the ground for long lasting benefit.

Taken were a 16-gauge pump shotgun, a 12-gauge Remington pump shotgun, a 30.06 Springfield rifle, a 6 mm 700 model Remington, a 25.06 Springfield sports rifle, and a 22-250 Remington rifle. The portable Singer sewing machine had a light plastic cover.

Onofre Lopez of McCamey, was being held for Upton county authorities here this week after being arrested by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department for violation of probation.

Lopez was convicted about a year ago on a charge of theft in 112th District Court here. A hearing will be held next Tuesday before Judge Charles Sherrill, 112th District judge, to determine whether or not Lopez' parole is to be revoked, Sheriff Billy Mills said.

Lopez is charged with failing to report to his parole officer, Sheriff Gene Eckols of Upton county, and of drunkenness and passing worthless checks, the Crockett sheriff reported.

Receiving top billing for interest locally, of course, is the four-way race for county judge, although equally spirited races for county commissioner are being waged in two precincts of the county, intensifying the interest, if possible, in those precincts.

Mrs. Bernice Bailey Jones, incumbent county judge, who was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill out the unexpired term of her late husband, Judge M. Brock Jones, is being opposed for re-election by Carl Conklin, Troy Williams and W. W. (Woody) Mason. Conklin and Williams are ranchers and Mason is an Ozona business man. With Mrs. Jones occupying third spot on the ballot, the other candidates are named above in the order they appear on the ballot.

A five-way race has developed for the post of County Commissioner from Precinct 4, with Glenn Sutton, incumbent Commissioner, being opposed for re-election by a field of four candidates contenders. As they appear on the ballot, the Precinct 4 candidates are Basil Dunlap, Alfonso (Al) Ramirez, Jake Young, Glenn D. Sutton and Bekie Diaz. Precinct 4 is the southwest segment of the county.

In Precinct 2, four candidates are vying for the place now held by Rex Halydier. Tom Ed Montgomery is listed in first spot on the ballot, Halydier is second, and Richard Flowers and J. P. Pogue follow in that order. Spirited campaigning is being waged (Continued on Last Page)

An Ozona FFA Wool Grading and Judging team won top honors Saturday in the wool contest at Texas Tech in Lubbock. The team placed first in overall wool competition out of a field of 16 schools competing in that particular contest.

The Ozona team had all three members receiving awards in the top ten individuals. Jesse Deaton placed second; Buddy Couch, third and George Cox ninth.

In the different divisions of the contest the team won the grading part with Buddy Couch being the high individual and Jesse Deaton, fifth. In the judging division (placing of three classes of four fleeces each) the team was second behind Stanton. Jesse Deaton was third high individual in this phase.

Other teams placing in wool competition were Marfa, second and Sterling City, third.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Old Fashioned Gingerbread

¾ cup molasses, add enough sugar to measure 1 cup.
½ cup melted shortening
1 teaspoon ginger
pinch of salt
1 teaspoon soda in ½ cup boiling water
2 cups sifted flour
Combine the above ingredients and bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Bake in 13"x9" oblong pan, greased and floured.

This recipe for your Jubilee Collection came from Sue Arledge's grandmother. The original recipe reads "lard or drippings" instead of shortening.

Chocolate Bread Pudding

3 or 4 cups soft bread torn into pieces. Soak in enough milk to make a soft mush.
2 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla dash of salt
1 to 1½ cups sugar mixed with 3 tablespoons cocoa
Combine all ingredients and bake in buttered baking dish in 350 degree oven till firm.

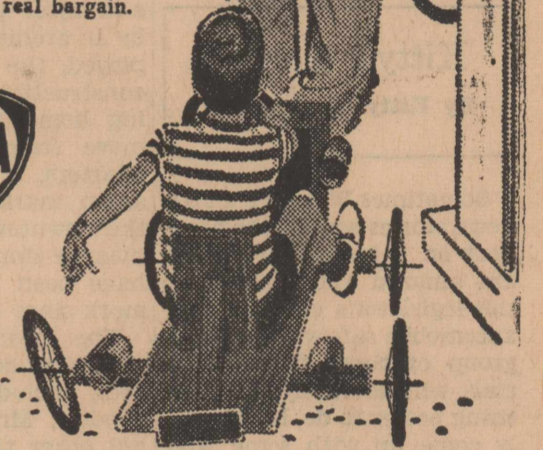

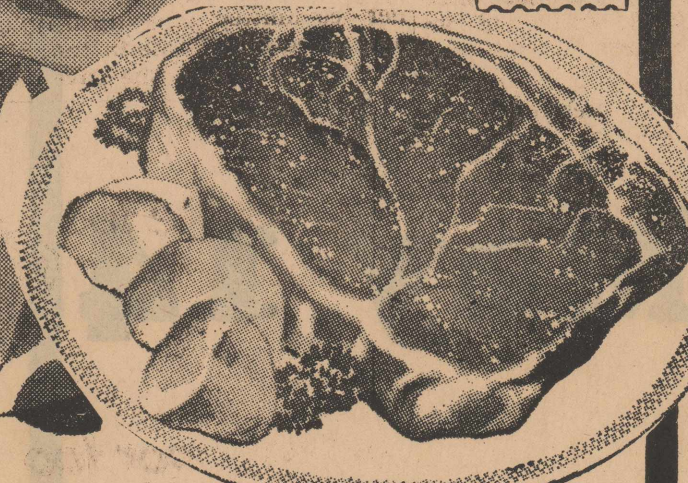
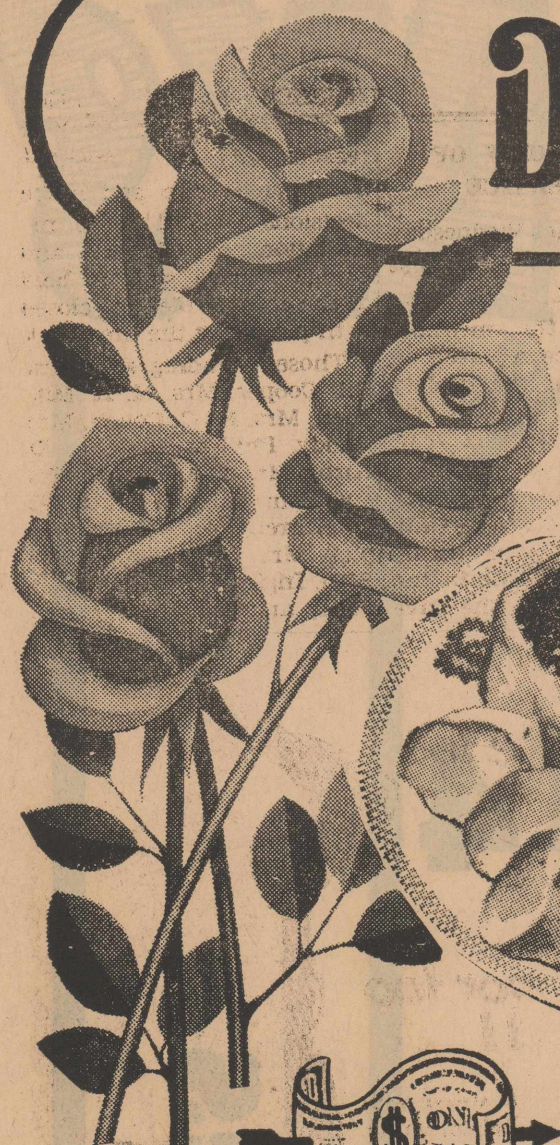

—30 years ago— The Station A Pumpers, Ozona-Sonora's hopes for Permian Basin League honors this year, kept their place among the three unbeaten teams, making it four wins in a row, when they nosed out the McCamey Refiners by a lone tally in a three-hour hit and error carnival on the Sonora diamond Sunday afternoon.

—30 years ago— The Ozona Woman's Club will hold the final meeting of the year Tuesday at the home of Mrs. N. W. Graham. Installation of officers will be made and reports by standing committees will be heard.

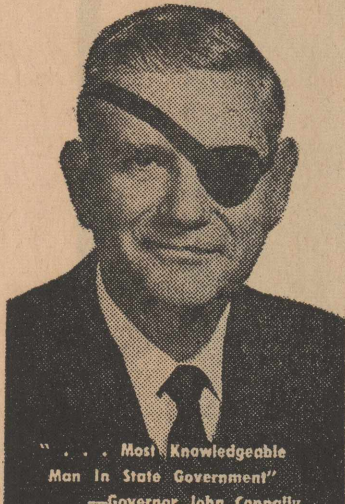

Fisher of San Angelo. The juggling of Congressional districts cut Crockett county from the district represented by Richard White and included it in Fisher's district. Fisher has no opponent.

The race for State Representative, with two new names for Crockett county voters to choose from, is another district race of interest. Again redistricting cut this county from the area long represented by Jim Nugent of Kerrville and casts it into the area formerly represented by Roger Thurmond of Del Rio. Thurmond was not a candidate and Hilary B. Doran, Jr., of Del Rio, a young attorney and son of a prominent Del Rio business man, and Albert R. Smith, Maverick county farmer, are candidates for the office.

Governor John Connally is expected to be a shoo-in in

his race for re-election, although two candidates, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Washington county and Stanley C. Woods of Harris county are on the ballot in opposition. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith is also thought to be in the lead in his bid for re-election over Bill Hollowell.

The attorney general's race is another hot statewide race, with Franklin Spears of San Antonio, Crawford Martin of Hill County and Galloway Calhoun of Smith county in the running.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who incurred the wrath of the Great Society by voicing opposition to the give-away of minerals belonging to the state under several thousand acres of land included in the proposed Guadalupe National Park, is opposed by Fred Williams

The only other race of which has created much statewide interest is that for Railroad Commissioner, with incumbent Byron Tunnel opposed by Paul B. Haring of Goliad and P. S. (Puss) Ervin of Dallas.

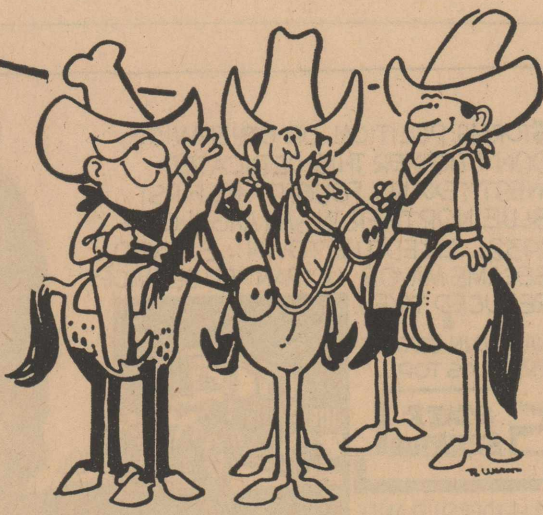
