Col. Escue was in Texas to make arrangements for his son in a dormitory at the University of Texas where he will be a freshman next fall. He has one other son, 14 years of age, just entering high school. He was on his way to Alpine to visit his mother before leaving for the West Coast and return to his duty in Hawaii.

## Shauna Montgomery, 5 Fatally Hurt When Run Down By Car Here Mon.

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the First Baptist Church for Shauna Camille Montgomery, five years old, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Ed Montgomery of Ozona.

Shauna died at 12:30 Tuesday morning in the emergency room at Shannon Hospital where she had been rushed after she was struck by a car near the Little League baseball park here at about 9 o'clock Monday night.

Rushed in a Janes ambulance to the Crockett County Hospital, the injured child was given emergency treatment and X-Ray examination to determine the extent of her injuries. A broken thigh bone and ribs were revealed but when she showed to have received internal injuries she was rushed to

San Angelo for possible surgery.

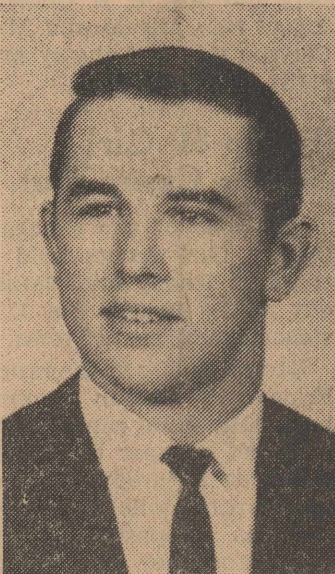

Shauna was born Feb. 5, 1961 in San Angelo.

She is survived by her parents; one brother, Jim Montgomery; her grandmother, Mrs. George Montgomery of Ozona, and a number of aunts and uncles.

### Ozonan Serving Aboard Destroyer Off Vietnam Coast

USS ROBISON — Engineer Third Class James Wyatt, Jr., USN., son of Mrs. Clarence Feist of Ozona, Tex. is aboard the guided missile destroyer USS Robison off the coast of Vietnam.

His ship provided gunfire support for helicopter vertical assault forces during Operation Jackstay from March 22 to April 10. Operation Jackstay was a Marine Amphibious and Helicopter assault and landing near Saigon.

Robison is one of many destroyers operating with the U. S. Seventh Fleet providing naval support and search and rescue for ground forces, and American pilots.

## Crockett County Ranks 49th In Oil Producing Counties Of Texas, Worth \$24.3 Millions Annually

As Texas celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil-producing state, Crockett County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the No. 1 energy source for a booming American civilization.

In 1866 Lyne T. Barret — a man most history books forgot — drilled the first Texas oil well near Nacogdoches at a depth of 106 feet. In the one hundred years that followed, the search for oil and gas spread to every county in Texas, and today Crockett County is one of 210 which produce oil or gas.

Barret and other pioneer Texas oil men left a legacy for Crockett County that can be measured at approximately \$24.3 million a year, based on statistics compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

During Texas' first century of oil production (29 billion barrels), Crockett Co. has contributed approximately 165.6 million barrels, its record dating from 1925.

The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Crockett County produced more than 7.2 million barrels of crude oil valued at \$21.5 million; and 23.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$2.9 million. The 1965 output would be approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.

Crockett County ranks 49th among the Texas coun-

ties producing oil and gas.

Payroll distribution of royalty checks to local landowners, new drilling ventures and tax payments are some of the ways by which oil and gas revenues are injected into the Crockett County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers and other landowners is the royalty income.

Bill Lewter, Little League director, announced Tuesday that all Little League games for the balance of the week would be cancelled. The action was taken following Monday night's tragedy at the Little League park when little Shauna Montgomery received fatal injuries when struck by an automobile.

### Area Range And Grass Judging Contests May 25

The Annual Crockett County Range and Grass Judging contests for area 4-H and FFA members, will be held in Ozona next Wednesday, May 25. The contests is sponsored by the Crockett County Soil Conservation Supervisors and the Extension Service. Awards for the contest are furnished by the local supervisors, the Ozona National Bank and the Crockett County Water District.

The Range and grass judging contests will be set up by Bob Ragsdale and Garryn Hoffman, Extension range specialists and Sam Fitzhugh Crockett county range specialist with the Soil Conservation Service.

The Crockett County 4-H Mothers Club and Ozona FFA will serve a barbecue lunch to all contestants, parents of 4-H members and local and visiting leaders working with boys and girls in grass and range judging work.

About one hundred contestants are expected from the following counties: Crockett, Sutton, Glasscock, Sterling, Schleicher and San Saba. The San Saba FFA team made a clean sweep of both grass and range judging contests last year when they edged out strong teams from Sutton county and the Ozona FFA Chapter.

### Mike Pettigrew, 12 Ozonans' Grandson, Hurt In Accident

Mike Pettigrew, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Kit Pettigrew of Clovis, N. M., and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McMullan of Ozona, is well on the road to recovery after undergoing surgery in an Albuquerque, N. M. hospital to repair head injuries suffered in a freak accident late last week.

An exploding irrigation pump sent fragments which struck young Pettigrew on the head, causing a skull fracture and depression. He was rushed to a brain specialist in Albuquerque who performed surgery to relieve the pressure. The operation was successful and no damage to the brain resulted from the accident, friends here have learned, and he is recovering satisfactorily.

Mr. and Mrs. McMullan have been at the youngster's bedside since the accident.

Word was received this week that Dr. Edward B. Jelks will arrive in Ozona during the weekend to make preliminary arrangements for actual archeological exploration to begin at Fort Lancaster on Monday, May 23.

Three Ozona boys: Billy Carson, Sandy Stokes and James Donham will be working with a crew from Southern Methodist University headed by graduate student, Scott Hayes.

"We are all looking forward to the work at Fort Lancaster", Dr. Jelks wrote to the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee.

A Finance Committee composed of W. R. Baggett, Eugene Miller, Joe Couch and R. A. Harrell has raised the necessary funds to pay Ozona's share of the excavation work.

It is one mile northwest of the same operator's No. 1-N Shannon, a 9,415-foot failure, abandoned April 1963.

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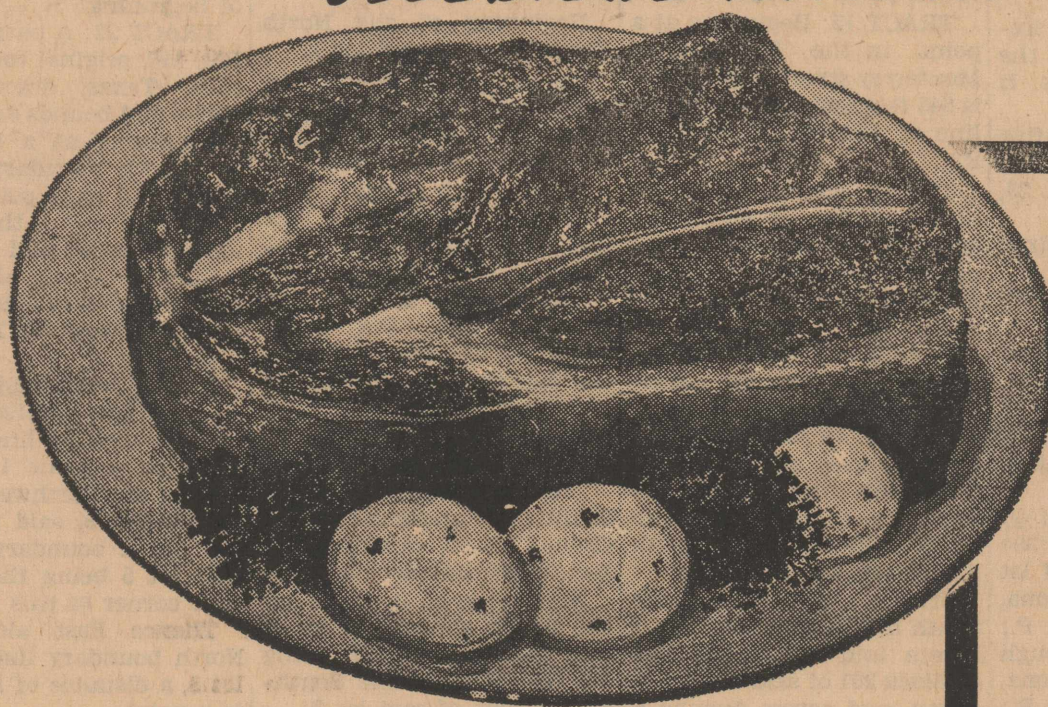

**Texas Rural Vote Went For Martin**

Crawford Martin who, attracted more than half a million votes in the May 7 primary in the Attorney General's race, praised the rural voters of Texas this week to the interest they took in going to the polls.

Martin said that a survey, based on county-by-county returns which were released Sunday, showed that 63.2 per cent of the eligible voters in rural counties went to the polls on May 7. That was a total of 569,277 voters.

In the 23 so-called metropolitan counties, which have more than 2,000,000 eligible voters, only 23.2 per cent bothered to vote. The big-city counties had a total of 576,723 votes.

Martin carried 188 counties in Texas and had a majority in 119. His run-off opponent was the leader in just 54 counties, tying Martin for the lead in Sterling County with 56 votes, and had a majority in only 20 counties.

The third candidate in the first primary — Galloway Calhoun — was the leader in 11 counties and had a majority in five. Calhoun endorsed the candidacy of Martin last week.

**Shell Spots 7th Test On Mitchell, 5 Are Producers**

Shell Oil Co. will drill the No. 7 Mitchell as a 3/8-mile east outpost to the two-well JM (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,440 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 50-Q3-TCR R. Contract depth is 15,000 feet.

Tests continued at the firm's three previously as-sured confirmers.

The No. 3 Mitchell, in 2-Q6-TCRR, 1 1/2 mile north-west extension, flowed 24 hours on a 24-64-inch choke and open hole between 12,790-14,202 feet, making gas at the daily rate of 2.9 million cubic feet, plus seven barrels of water.

The No. 4 Mitchell, in 10-Q3-TCRR, 1 1/4 miles south extension, flowed 24 hours on a 32-64-inch choke from open hole between 13,230-15,025 feet, making gas at the daily rate of 3.2 million cubic feet, plus 21 barrels of water.

The No. 6 Mitchell, in 11-NNN-T. Brown (A. W. Fowler), flowed an unreported time to pits, making 7.3 million cubic feet of gas, plus 65 barrels of water, from open hole between 12,130-13,360 feet. No choke was reported. Three-hour shut-in tubing pressure and casing pressure were 2,200 pounds.

**Dual Production Is Indicated In Crockett Wildcat**

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1-5 University, in 5-14-University, Crockett County Fusselman wildcat, and indicated Permian discovery, 11 miles southwest of Rankin and 7/8 mile east of the Crockett (Grayburg) field, but separated by failures, has indicated production in a deeper zone with the recovery of 420 feet of oil and gas-cut mud, plus a small amount of unidentified water on a drillstem test

Tool was open one hour on the test taken between 6,310-33 feet. Flowing pressure was 93-124 pounds; one-hour initial and final shut-in pressures were 2,464 pounds.

It was drilling ahead below 6,360 feet on a 6,500-foot contract.

Permian production was indicated with the recovery of 2 barrels of 16-gravity oil on a drillstem test between 4,410-6-feet, which also surfaced in seven minutes, no gauges.

Gravity of the liquid was 54.4 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 3,596 to 4,468 feet, which had been acidized with 1,250 gallons and fractured with 168,000 gallons and 157,000 sand.

Drilled to 15,050 feet, it is plugged back to 4,790 feet with 2 3/8-inch casing set at 4,142 feet. Elevation is 2,251 feet.

terent from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate of approximately \$3 million a year in Crockett County. Many more thousands a year are paid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators hope will some day yield oil or gas.

In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty owners send some \$1.2 million a year to the State Treasury in severance taxes. Oil taxes account for \$985,000; gas \$204,000.

Triggered by the first discovery in 1925, the search for oil in Crockett County is still under way. The Oil and Gas Journal reported 184 wells were drilled in the county last year. Forty five of these were "wildcats" seeking new field or production from new strata. Results: 75 oil wells; 62 gas wells; 45 dry holes; 2 service wells. Oil men and other investors risked an estimated \$17.9 million in Crockett County to drill 940,000 feet of hole. Some \$3.2 million disappeared forever in dry holes.

The Texas Employment Commission reports an industry payroll of about \$1.7 million a year for Crockett Countians who are directly employed by oil and gas firms. This, of course, is only part of the total employment created by petroleum operations for many others work in related service and supply jobs.

One of the most significant technological developments of the last two decades has been the high recovery of liquids like butane and propane from natural gas. Three plants operating in the county process approximately 95.9 million cubic feet of gas a day, which gives added value to gas production here.

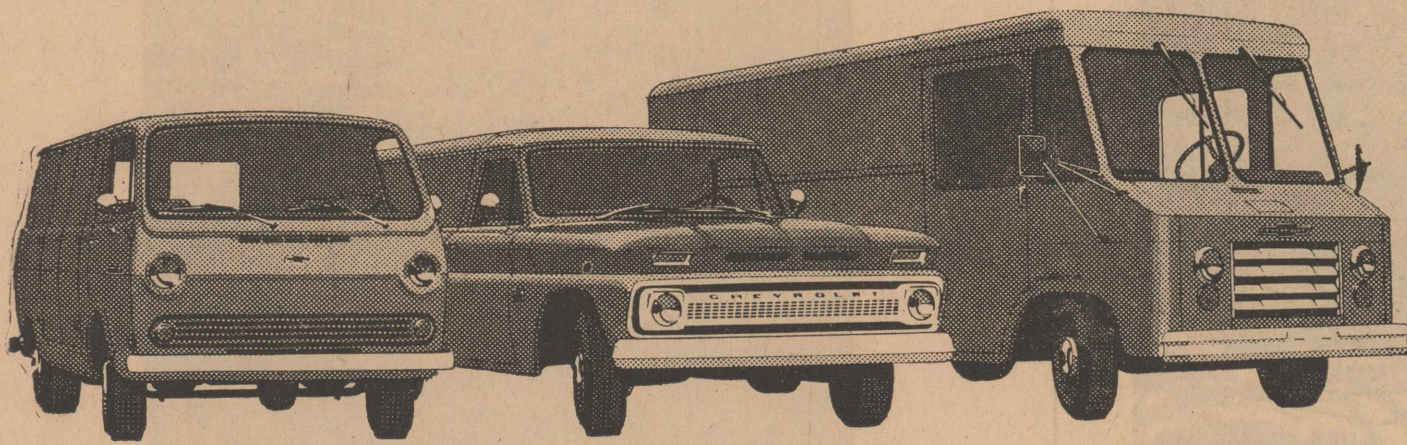
