Archeologists Making Progress At Fort Lancaster; Many Contribute Toward Making Success of Project

Through the fine spirit and generosity of many people work at Fort Lancaster continues to progress. Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, announced this week.

The Archeological team from Southern Methodist University, headed by graduate student, Scott Hays, and including three local boys, Sandy Stokes, Billy Carson, and James Donham, have uncovered parts of the foundation of one large building which may ultimately be restored.

A fine water well at a depth of only 115 feet has been drilled by W. T. Stokes, who has donated both his time and equipment. Casing for the well has been given by Bill Seahorn who also provided a tent for the temporary use of the caretaker, Mr. Hendricks, B. B. Ingham, Jr., hauled water for drilling purposes and has provided materials for use of the archeology group. A mobile water tank was provided by Henry Miller for use until water can be pumped from the new well.

Many others have contributed to the Fort Lancaster Development Fund which helps to pay the Ozona boys working at the site and the salary of the fulltime caretaker. Mrs. Joe Clayton is treasurer for this fund and it is hoped that further contributed amounts will help provide improvements in the near future.

The Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative System of Eldorado is providing electricity for the site at a small flat rate per month.

On a State level, funds were given by the State to Southern Methodist University for the archeological work. John Ben Shepperd, State Historical Survey Chairman, made it possible through the use of the El Paso Natural Products Company plane, for an architect, William H. Clift of Odessa, to spend a full day at the site developing plans for the area so that it may be enjoyed by the public.

As funds permit, trails will be built, small shaded shelters for those walking over the area will be provided, and building foundations cleared and identified with appropriate signs. All work proceeds only as directed by Dr. Edward B. Jelks and State Archeologists, Dr. Cur-

tis Tunnell. Both have already made several planning trips to the site.

Mr. J. A. Conklin, registered State Surveyor, donated his time in surveying the site and providing maps of the property free.

The publication, *Ozona*, just off the press will have its profits divided equally between the Crockett County Museum and the Fort Lancaster Development Project.

Many others are contributing much in many ways: the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, the County Officers, the Jubilee Committee Staff with publicity, area newspapers and stations, just to name a few.

"The Crockett County Historical Survey Committee is deeply grateful to each and everyone and it is their hope that the project will be a source of pride to the entire community," Mrs. Harrell said.

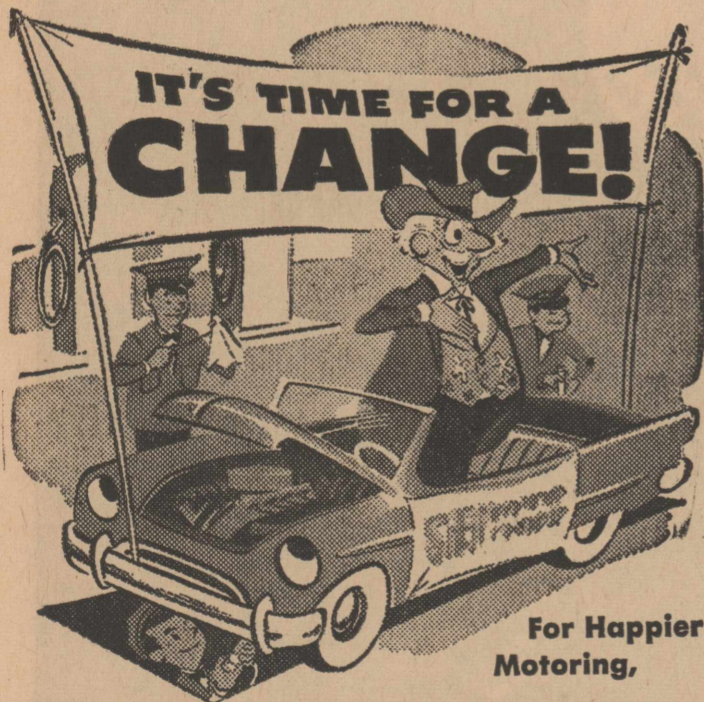

work in Farm Electrification in the Agricultural Engineering Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire state so that he is familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farms and ranches.

The short course at Ozona High School is scheduled to begin June 6 at 8:00 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building.

Persons interested in attending the short course should write or call Jimmy Davee, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Farm Electrification Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each person who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Jaska states that the short course can be adjusted to wishes and interests of the people enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to choose, protect, and ground electric motors, how to reverse and change motors from 120V to 240V, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.
