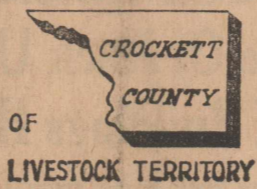

"I have been through the depths of poverty and sickness. When people ask me what has kept me going through troubles that come, I always reply: 'I stood yesterday. I can stand today. And I will not permit myself to think about what might happen tomorrow.'

"I have known want and struggle and anxiety and despair. I have always had to work beyond the limit of my strength. As I look back upon my life, I see it as a battlefield strewn with the wrecks of dead dreams and broken hopes and shattered illusions -- a battle in which I always fought with the odds tremendously against me, and which has left me scarred and bruised and maimed and old before my time.

"Yet I have not pity for myself; no tears to shed over the past and gone sorrows; no envy for the women who have been spared all that I have gone through. For I have lived. They only existed. I have drunk the cup of life down to its very dregs. They have only sipped the bubbles on top of it. I know things they will never know. I see things to which they are blind. It is only the women whose eyes have been washed clear with tears who get the broad vision that makes them sisters to all the world.

"I have learned in the great University of Hard Knocks a philosophy that no woman who has had an easy life ever acquires. I have learned to live each day as it comes and not to borrow trouble by dreading the morrow. It is the dark menace of the picture that makes cowards of us. I put that dread from me because experience has taught me that when the time comes that I so fear, the strength and wisdom to meet it will be given me. Little annoyances no longer have the power to affect me. After you have seen your whole edifice of happiness topple and crash in ruins about you, it never matters to you again that a servant forgets to put the doilies under the finger bowls, or the cook spills the soup.

"I have learned not to expect too much of people, and so I can still get happiness out of the friend who isn't quite true to me or the acquaintance who gossip. Above all, I have acquired a sense of humor, because there were so many things over which I had either to cry or laugh. And when a woman can joke over her troubles instead of having hysterics, nothing can ever hurt her much again. I do not regret the hardships I have known because through them I have touched life at every point I have lived. And it was worth the price I had to pay."

Fall Football Practice To Get Started Aug. 15

Fall practice gets underway for Ozona High School gridders August 15, with the football game scheduled for September 9, the Lions against McCamey in a non-district tilt.

Coach Sam Mosley's Lions are rated a close second to Sonora for the championship of District 8-A, according to the Texas football poll. However, that could change with twelve returning lettermen and All-West Texas halfback, George Cox, to lead them.

Cox, who last season rushed for 1,284 yards, an 8.7 average and 12 touchdowns, caught 13 passes for 315 yards, returned punts for a 15.2-yard average and punted 20 times for a 39.9 mark, is expected to be bigger and better than ever this year.

Along with Cox, the Lions will have such experienced backs as Randy Upham and Thomas DeHoyos. Other returning lettermen include Randal Clepper, sophomore quarterback, who showed great promise last season when starting quarterback, Billy Carson, fell ill; end Oscar Flores and interior linemen Gary Sutton, Marlin Farries, Humberto Ramos and John DeHoyos will beef up the line. Jack Applewhite Derold Maney and Dwight Childress will also be back with the Lions this year, plus some promising boys coming up from Coach Dozier's B team.

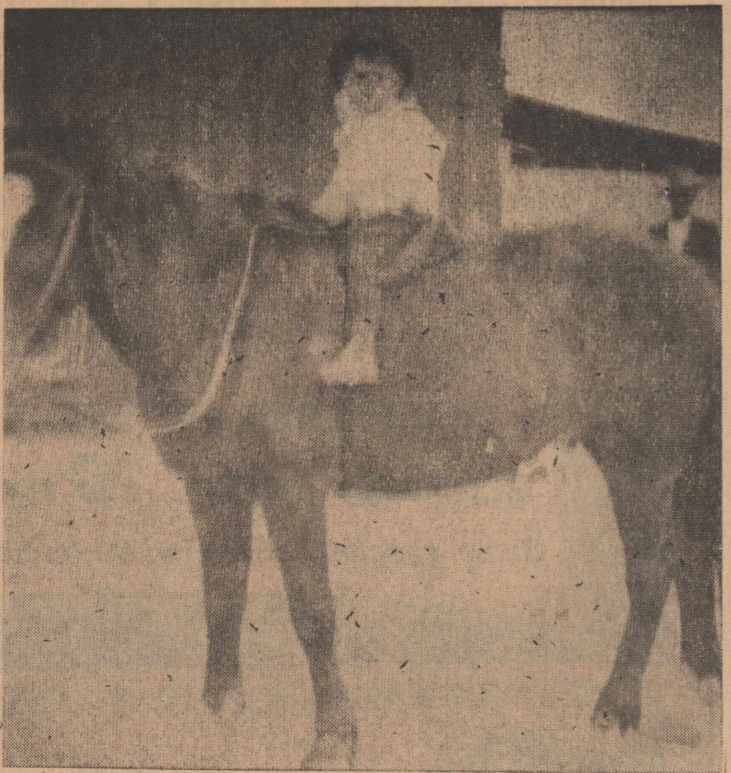

Teacher Reading Workshop Before School Opening

There will be a reading workshop for elementary teachers Thursday and Friday, August 25-26 at North Elementary School in preparation for the fall school term which will begin Monday, August 29. L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent, announced this week. The faculty meeting will be held Saturday morning, August 27.

Foy Moody will take over the duties of principal at North Elementary since the resignation of Frank James, who held the position the past several years. Moody has been the Ozona High School English teacher until this year.

Two new junior high teachers have been employed. Grosse Moehler, who has been teaching in a San Angelo junior high school, will teach 8th grade math and be assistant junior high coach. Bobby Wallace from the Silver schools will teach shop.

Other changes in North Elementary include a new second grade teacher, Mrs. Weldon Maness, replacing Mrs. M. A. Barber, who resigned this year. Mrs. Lawrence Janes will teach one of the three sixth grade rooms. Mrs. Dick Kirby will replace Mrs. Janes as librarian and primary Spanish teacher.

In South Elementary, Mrs. J. A. Pelt, will teach kindergarten rather than third grade which she taught last year. J. F. Poyner, formerly with the Sheffield schools, will teach sixth grade. Mrs. James Lively, who taught in the Crane schools last year, will teach first grade.

Two new English teachers for high school include Joe Marlett, Jr., who taught four years in Brownwood and has his Master's Degree from Howard Payne College there, and E. W. Ellis, recently with the New Braunfels school system.

Sikes expects to have the faculty complete by August 1, and any other changes will be announced then.

Historical Survey Committee Thanks Lancaster Helpers

At a meeting of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee Thursday, July 21, members expressed appreciation for all who have helped develop the Fort Lancaster site to date. A permanent caretaker, Mr. Hendricks, is now in residence at the Fort, living in a house furnished by the county. The house was moved from Ozona by Ira Carson and is now permanently located where designated by the architect, William Cliff of Odessa.

Special gratitude was expressed to the West Texas Utilities Company, local manager Wayne Lory, and sales manager Buzz Cuningham, for providing a cook-stove for the house. Only the purchase of water heater remained to complete the furnishings and such a purchase was authorized by the committee.

Mrs. Fred Hagelstein, Landmarks and Marker Committee chairman, announced plans to place several more historical markers in the county during the coming year. Among those planned is one for the Junior High School building, the first permanent building in the present school complex. (Continued on Page Five)

Red Propaganda Carried By Wets Seized By Patrol

Border Patrol officials are concerned with the increase in crime brought by an influx of illegal aliens crossing the borders of the United States. There has, in the past few years, been a marked increase of looting, stealing and killing of livestock in this area, according to Max Morris, Ozona Border Patrol Station Supervisor.

However, local Border Patrol officers have been able to apprehend the majority of these offenders with the cooperation of local ranchers and others, Mr. Morris said. When notified immediately of an offense, these well trained officers seldom fail to apprehend the offender.

On many occasions apprehended aliens have been found to possess large quantities of communist literature, narcotics and weapons, Mr. Morris revealed. Quiet often the alien is infected with a highly contagious disease, most common of which is tuberculosis.

Ozona's Border Patrol Station was established in November of 1958, with Mr. Morris as Station Supervisor.

Historic Photos Show Crockett County Courthouse Under Construction In 1902

A rare picture, one that local history buffs never dreamed existed, was uncovered as an aftermath of the county's Diamond Jubilee celebration held the week of June 12-18. (The county's actual birthdate was in July, 1891, when the county organization was completed and the first Commissioners Court meeting held.)

Shown here are two of three pictures taken during construction of the Crockett County courthouse in 1902. The third picture showed a close-up of four or five of the workers on the building.

The pictures are the property of Henry Brooks of Iraan, whose father was a member of the construction crew working on the building. He is in both pictures but his identity is not definitely established. The pictures were borrowed from Mr. Brooks for display during the celebration and were copied for inclusion in the county archives. The cuts reproduced here are made from copies of the original pictures made by Miss Leta Powell, county clerk, on the county's photo copying machine used in copying records.

The courthouse was built of native limestone quarried from the hillside just north of the high school gymnasium. This quarry was also the source of rock for the county jail, the Ozona National Bank building, the courthouse annex, which was first the Methodist Church, and other limestone rock buildings in town.

The building was designed by Oscar Ruffini, San Angelo architect. One of the stone masons employed on the construction was the late George W. Kyle, husband of Mrs. Minnie Kyle of Ozona and father of Arthur Kyle, Ozona dry cleaning shop operator. Mr. Kyle is fifth from right, white shirt and dark vest, in the lower picture. Third from left, front row, the man in the dark suit and black hat, is believed to be Judge Chas. E. Davidson, first county judge of Crockett county.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — There could be a new look around many Texas county commissioners courts under a reapportionment opinion laid down by the Texas Supreme Court in the case brought by Mayor Hank Avery of Midland.

Avery maintained that it isn't constitutional for one Midland County Commissioner to represent 95 per cent of the county's population — the City of Midland — while the other three commissioners represented only 5 per cent of the people.

Supreme Court agreed, 8-1 but with reservations. It held that the ratio was not fair representation, but that the re-division of county precincts, which it told Dist. Judge Joe B. Dibrell of Coleman to order, could consider factors other than population.

Declining to extend the population-only rule which the U. S. Supreme Court has applied to state legislatures, Supreme Court held that a commissioners court is not a legislative body. Court's majority wrote that the road, bridge and tax activities of the commissioners courts have more concern to rural residents than to city dwellers. In recent years, such courts have concerned themselves mainly with non-urban areas, leaving city matters to the city governments.

Supreme Court concluded that not just population, but also factors such as miles of county road, taxable values and geography, plus the "convenience of the people" set out in the Texas Constitution, can be taken into account by a commissioners court in dividing the county into four precincts. High court agreed with Judge Dibrell that the present Midland situation obviously is arbitrary and should be declared invalid.

Case either will go back to Judge Dibrell for final decision or will be appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court by either Mayor Avery or Mid-

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Dr. R. T. Holland
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Early Day Ozonan Puts Historians Straight On Source Of Rock Used In Construction Of Buildings Here

Along with some early day pictures of Ozona and the building of the court-house, some old timers and history buffs might enjoy the following letters received by the Stockman in recent weeks. The first is from Christian R. Myers of Baytown, an early day resident. Mr. Myers puts the record straight on where the rock came from in the courthouse, jail, bank and school buildings and he should know, he was there.

Dear Editor:
"Along with renewing my subscription, I wish to note that in a recent issue of your paper you alluded to old times in the way of the buildings in Ozona and where the rock was quarried for each, etc. It brought back some memories of the old times and I recall that in January of 1900 I came to Ozona from the Sabal Canyon by way of Juno.

"It was in that year that my father, John Myers, drilled wells on the Friend Ranch and burned a kiln of lime on that ranch. The following year, he helped well driller Mauldin drill wells on the Shannon Ranch.

"In 1902 he bought the piece of land on Rugged Street from which the rock was quarried for the court-house and later for the bank building. I may be right when I recall an old rock digging on the west slope of the divide about four miles east of town on the south side of the road to Sonora, from which the rock for the jailhouse came. It seems to me that I remember a sort of old rock pit in that locality.

"When the main school building of the old days was built, the quarry on the north side of the hill was opened and the rock for that structure came from the Couch property. I am sending along this information because I was a little put out by your naming it the "Myer" property instead of Myers and because your historian had lost sight of where

the rock came from for the jail house.

"Incidentally, the first money making job I held was quarrying rock that summer for the school building. I earned the big amount of \$1.50 per day that hot dry summer.

You know, speaking of rock, when it came to getting out the rock for the pillars on the bank building, some were wondering how such huge pieces of lime stone were going to be handled. As a result the first big derrick for lifting purposes went in on the Myers quarry and one rock at a time was loaded on the old team drawn wagon and transported to the building site for dressing down to form the pillars.

I had half heartedly contemplated being there for the Jubilee. Lack of energy and get-up and go accounts for my not being there. While I am writing, I wish to compliment you and the good people residing there upon your observance of the 75th anniversary and hope for you much prosperity the next 75 years.

WTU NOTEBOOK—PATTERNS FOR PROGRESS

INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS ... a must in Economic Development

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unattractive industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success. **LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS** — usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

—**BUSINESSMEN**—should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.

—**CITIZENS**—who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.

—**EXISTING INDUSTRY**—may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.

—**LOCAL IDEAS**—can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.

—**EX-CITIZENS**—should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

—**CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY** — should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

—**COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES** — such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

—**ANY and ALL industrial leads** should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.

—**Ask your WTU local manager for additional information and services available.**

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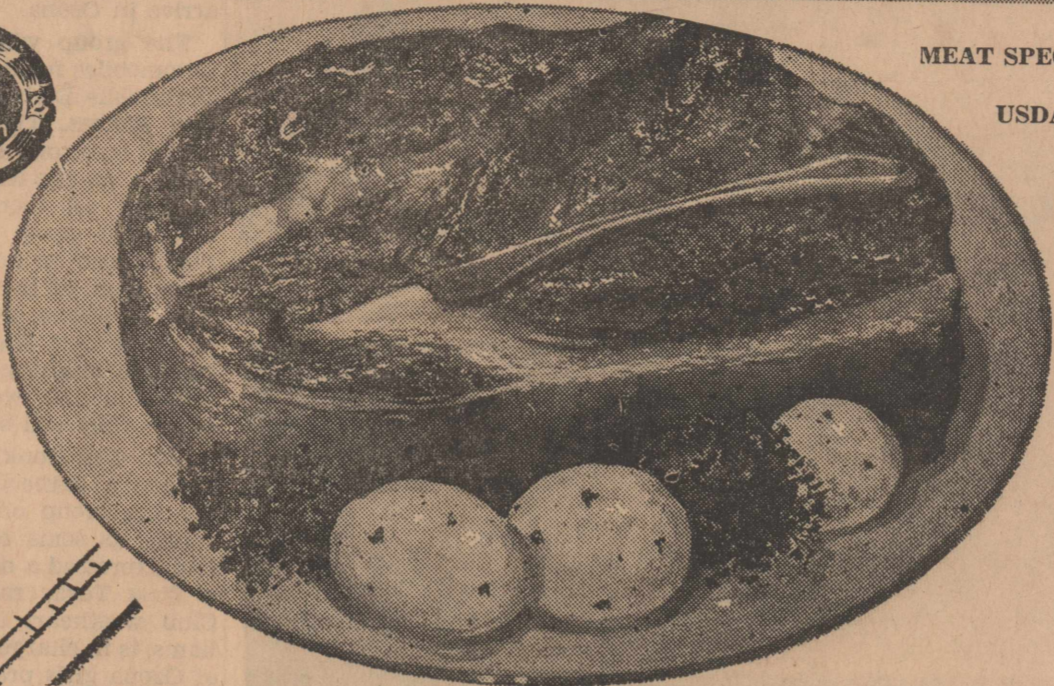
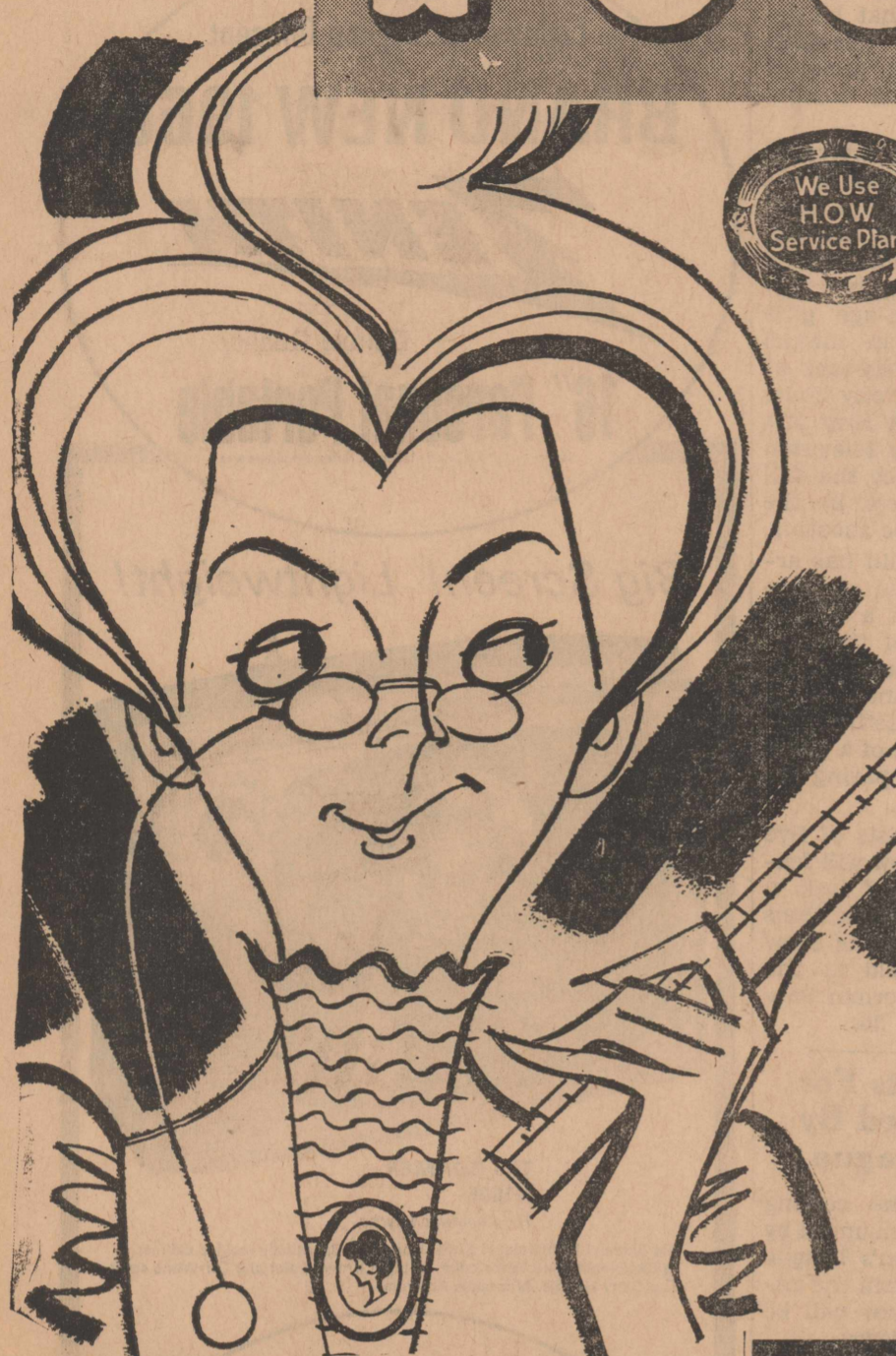

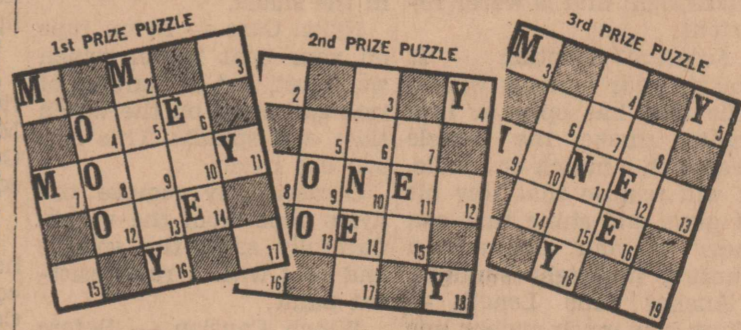

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Rod Storage — When storing fishing rods, either stand them up straight in racks or hang them by their tip-tops from the ceiling.

Never lean them against the wall as this will cause the rods to bend. If there should be unusual heat in the room, rods, particularly fiberglass, ones, will take a permanent set.

This set can be removed with a slight application of heat, but the process will only weaken a good rod and eventually cause it to break.

Handy Tape — Scotch brand tape, No. 810 is a must for every tackle box and hunting kit. You can use it to tape on rod guides and tip tops, patch minor leaks in boots and waders, and mend rips and tears in canvas tents, cots and boat covers.

This particular brand sticks tight and is water resistant.

Accurate Shooting — If you do your hunting with a rifle that has open or iron sights, smoke the muzzle bear with a match or candle. It will remove that tiny bit of glare and shine that can mess up your aim when hunting in bright sunlight.

Anchor Line Length — Know how much anchor line to carry?

Simply multiply the maximum water depth which you plan to fish by seven. This seven to one line scope will permit your anchor to bite deeply into the bottom and hold your boat in place even in a strong wind and heavy seas.

Shotgunners Don't Aim — You can improve your shotgun shooting by forgetting all about aiming.

A shotgun, except when rifled slugs are used, was never meant to be aimed. Your shooting will improve

by simply pointing the gun at the target.

Buy Roomy Waders — or hip boots, be sure the shoe portion is a size larger than you normally wear.

That additional space allows for an extra pair of socks to be worn. It'll also make room for wiggling toes to stimulate circulation in cold weather.

Buy chest-high waders with large chest size so they will fit comfortably over bundlesome winter clothing.

Knife Safety — Don't risk losing a good fishing knife overboard. Drill a small hole in the handle, attach a short length of line and a cork or plastic float so it will float if dropped overboard.

De-Kinking "Mono" — You can remove the coil set from monofilament line by washing it in mild soapy water and then stretch and dry it in the shade.

Nylon Care — Nylon rope on your boat trailer winch won't rot, but be careful of rust gathering on the winch sides and spindle. This rust can cut nylon.

Occasionally remove the nylon rope from the winch. Carefully sand the spindle and coat with a rust resistant paint.

Delta-Pauley To Drill Canyon Test On Davidson

Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc. Odessa, will drill the No. 1-5 Davidson, an 8,600-foot lower Canyon test, 3/4 mile southwest of lower Canyon gas-distillate production in the DePaul (lower Canyon and Strawn) field, of Crockett County but separated by a 10,101-foot Ellenburger failure, and 10 miles southeast of Ozona.

Location is 1,420 feet from the north and 1,520 feet from the east lines of 5-F-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,323 feet.

The field has one Strawn and seven Canyon producers. Shell Oil Co. No. 3 Mitchell, in 2-Q6-TCRR, 1 1/4 - mile northwest extension to the three-well JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 3 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona, was swabbing through perforations between 12,934-13,762 feet, making 15.7 barrels of load water per hour, plus gas at the daily rate of 1.6 million cubic feet.

The No. 5 Mitchell, in 16-Q6-TCRR, 1 7/8-mile southwest extension the same field, flowed 24 hours through a 48-64-inch choke and perforations between 13,136-14,812 feet, making nine barrels of load water, plus gas at the daily rate of 510,000 cubic feet daily. Testing continued.

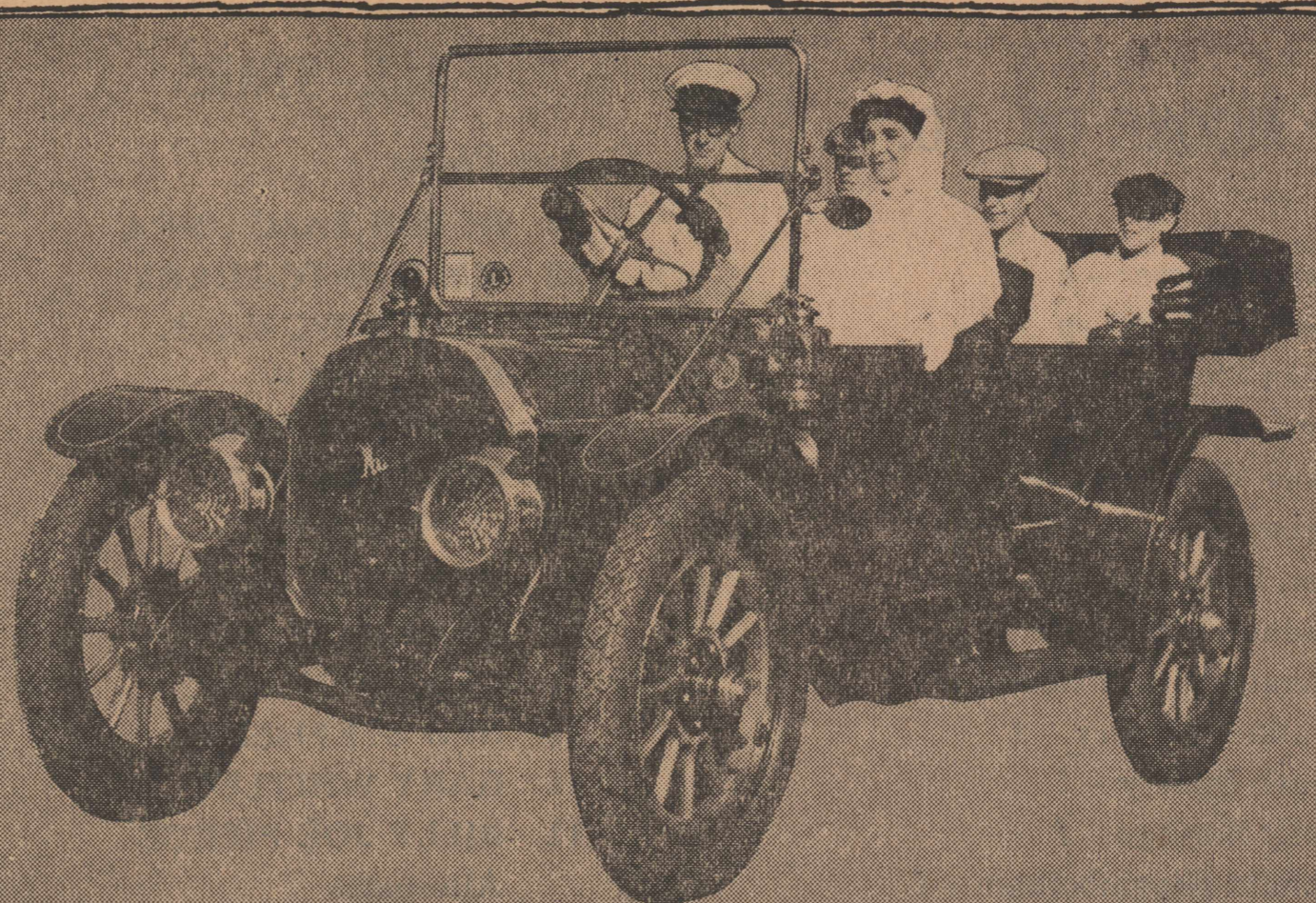

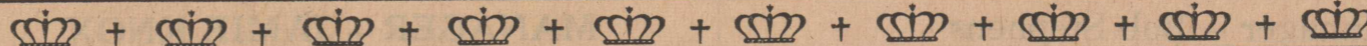

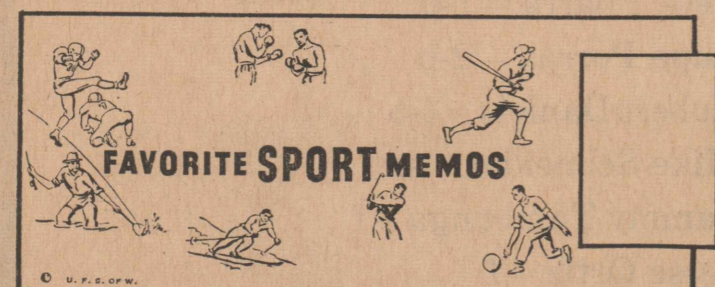

1/2 cup salt
