Charles S. Black, Jr., 51, Shannon Hospital in San Angelo after a long illness. Funeral services will be held toat 3:00 p. m. from the Methodist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mr. Black was born August 28, 1915, in Fort McKavett. He moved with his family to Crockett County 40 years ago. He was married to Jane Murphey March 5, 1938

in Del Rio. He was engaged in the ranching business with his father, who also served several terms as county commissioner. Upon the death of his father October 8, 1949, Mr. Black was appointed to serve out the remainder of the elder Black's term and was elected to the office the following year. He had a brother, James Leslie Black, who died in 1941. His mother died in 1949.

Besides serving as commissioner, he served on the school board several years and on the Crockett County ASC Committee. He was a member of the Big Lake Masonic Lodge and of the Episcopal Church in San Angelc.


