THE NEW OUTLOOK

It being the responsibility of a newspaper to inform, interpret and explain, we pause here to talk patiently with those people with old-fashioned ideas who find it hard to understand the true meaning of some of the "demonstrations" they see reported on TV and in news pictures. They see high-spirited youths breaking into stores and walking away with television sets, cases of whiskey, lamp shades and shoes and other goods, and from this they jump to the conclusion that laws are being broken.

Actually what they are seeing is the Great Society in action. These beneficiaries merely take direct action to get the good things of life, without waiting for the tax people to take the money from the rich so that politicians can give it to underprivileged voters. In other words, these direct-action types are idealists, striving to right ancient wrongs, and doing only what any normal deprived, disadvantaged and frustrated person ought to do.

A Vice President of the United States, no less, has made this kind of thinking official, or at least semi-official, in saying that if he had to put up with some prevailing inequities he'd riot too. And the same thinking has been expressed by various brethren of the Orthodox Demogogic and Peripatetic Clan, whose chapters are everywhere there's trouble brewing. These bunion derbyists of the new creed have made it plain that it's a person's right, may verily his duty, to break any laws that seem onerous to him. So why take seriously the law that says "Thou shalt not steal?" Especially when you're only stealing from society and taking the stuff that by all rights ought to belong to you.

The real criminal, you see, is society. So who can blame anyone for anything when all he's doing is showing resentment against a society that has been mean to him? This also explains many murders. Quite often there's nothing personal in these murders. The perpetrators knife, gun or garrote fellow-citizens because they symbolize a society that has been rotten to them. Ergo, how can anyone call them criminals?

As for policemen, everyone knows that there would be no crime if it weren't for police brutality (which forces people to oppose violence non-violence or vice versa). Fortunately the Supreme Court is making it impossible for cops to continue their wicked ways, arresting people. The millennium will be ushered in when The Court declares all police forces illegal and disbands them.

SENATOR JOHN TOWER REPORTS

There has been considerable talk in Washington of increasing taxes to fight the high cost of living. The federal government, rather than cut back its own unnecessary spending, has hit on this method — even though a tax increase would simply further increase the American family's cost of living.

Since the logic of raising the cost of living to fight the rising cost of living has been somewhat lost on the taxpayers, the Internal Revenue Service has had to cast about for some way to increase taxes without calling it a tax increase. One way it found to do this was the curtailing of customary tax deductions which our tax laws provide many classes of citizens for many different reasons.

It was this attempt at a hidden tax increase which caught our teachers.

The Internal Revenue Service has decided that contrary to past practice, contrary to reason, and contrary to the intent of Congress, teachers no longer will be allowed tax deductions for study courses they take to improve their teaching qualifications.

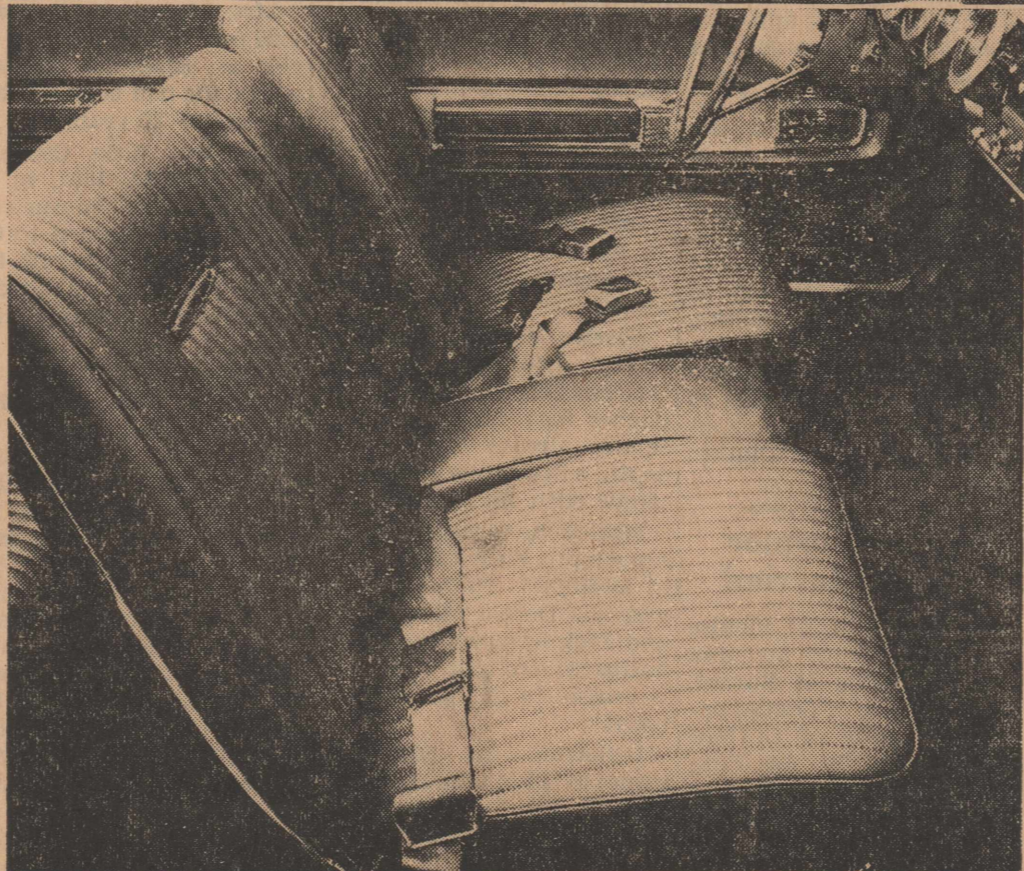
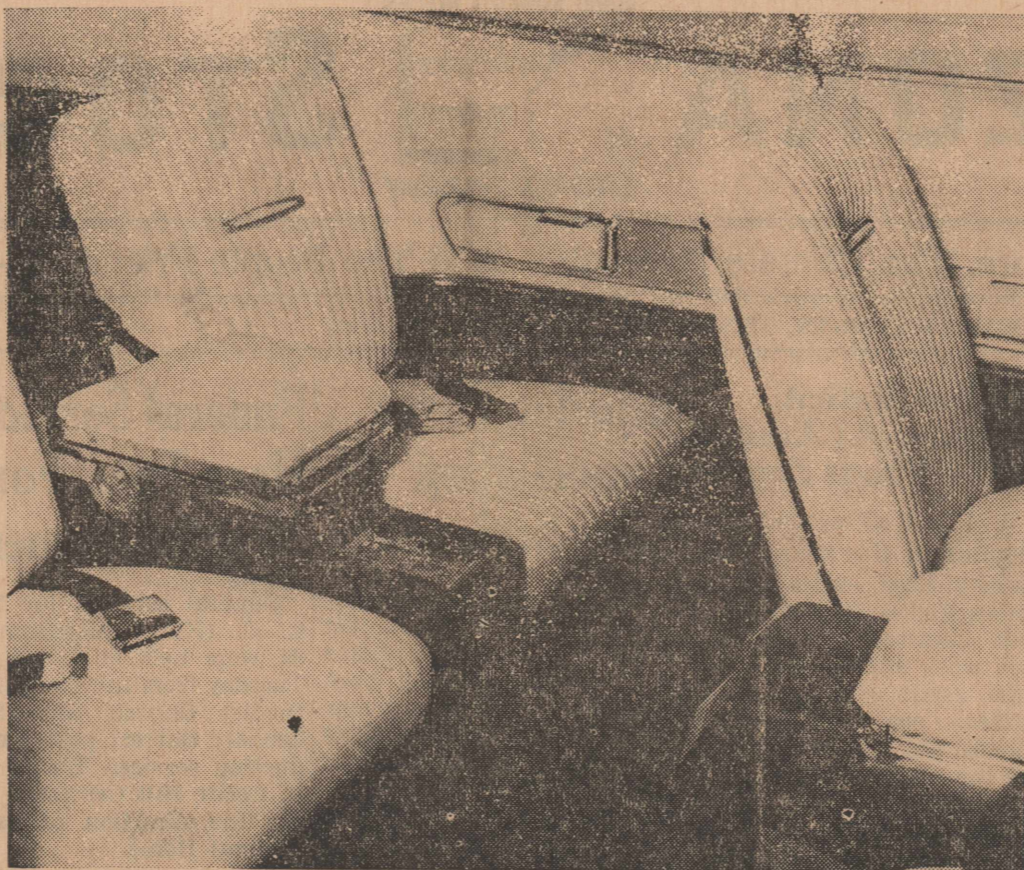
Both the Texas State Teachers Association and the National Education Association have protested this arbitrary federal tax action, pointing out that the curtailment would wipe out 25 years of programs aimed at encouraging and helping our teachers to train themselves so they may better train our children.

Thus, we see a surprising and shocking consequence of our inflation. Because of inflation, we find our federal government actually discouraging teachers from improving their teaching knowledge and from undertaking educational travel.

The effect of this IRS ruling, if applied to teachers, will be detrimental to the school children of this nation. The ruling will certainly discourage teachers from seeking additional training which they constantly need to keep abreast of latest educational developments in their field of specialization.

Let it be noted that this curtailment of tax deductions for education expenses also will strike at other Americans such as doctors, lawyers, dentists, accountants, and skilled technicians.

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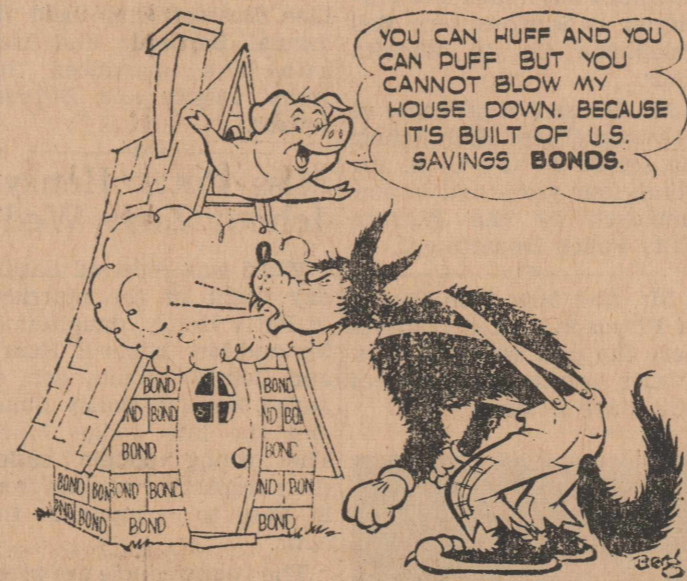

Apricot Sherbet

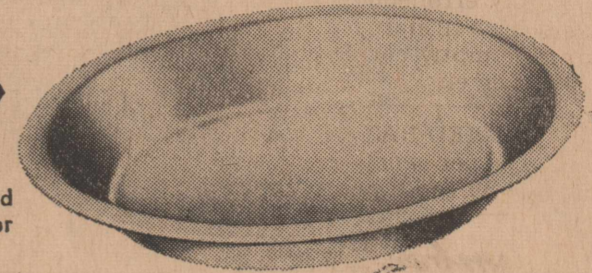

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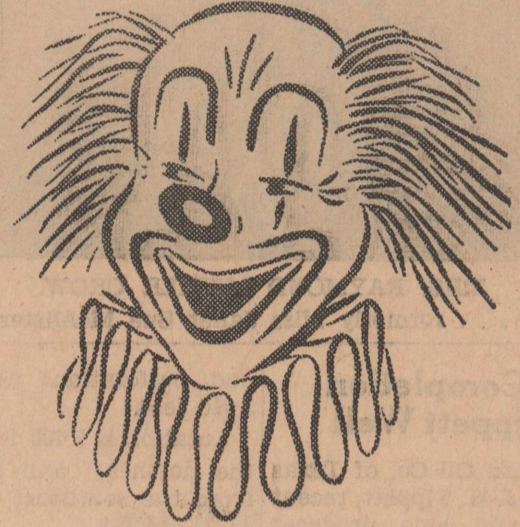

Yes — we need to go to church.

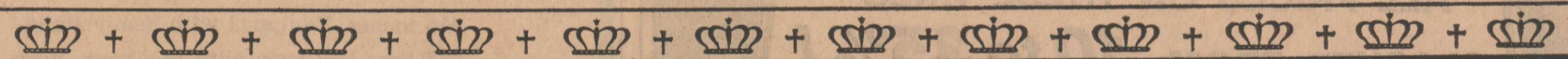

From Your State Capitol**

Austin, Texas—Officials from major Texas cities, beset with money problems, are calling on the Legislature to allow municipalities a 50-50 split in any new broad-based state taxes enacted next year.

Gov. John Connally pledged to recommend "very substantial new sources of revenue" for the cities after a group of metropolitan area mayors conferred with him.

Question as to whether the kind of revenue-sharing plan advocated by the mayors is permissible under the state constitution will be briefed by the Texas Legislative Council, at the request of House Speaker Ben Barnes.

Cities petitioned for a 50 per cent refund of any increase in the state sales tax or an equivalent amount of any new broad-base tax, with the state doing the collecting and apportioning half of new funds where paid.

**New Mansion Sought**—At its initial meeting, the Texas Fine Arts Commission, created by the Legislature in 1965, recommended a new governor's mansion and said the present residence, completed in 1855, should be operated as an historic house.

Governor Connally has not yet expressed his view on a new mansion. However, last year when the State Building Commission, of which he is chairman, recommended a new \$1,000,000 mansion, he differed and recommended that the money be used elsewhere.

Commission outlined a far-reaching program to encourage development of, and participation in, the arts, including traveling exhibits, festivals, awards, nighttime family entertainment in communities and revived band concerts on the square.

Former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd of Odessa was

named chairman of the new agency.

**"Red Means Wrong"**—You will be seeing lots of red if you drive the wrong way on a Texas freeway.

In a move to curb wrong-way freeway pileups, State Highway Department is installing red reflector buttons and pavement markers at entrances to interstate and other controlled access highways.

If you see a red arrow pointing at you from the pavement as you enter a freeway ramp, you are entering the wrong way. A straight red line pointing against you on lane lines means you are going in the wrong direction.

Highway Department has spent or obligated \$76,000,000 in an overall four-year safety program.

**More Money**—Mounting demands of higher education in Texas seem certain to force a tax increase by the Legislature which meets in January.

Budget requests for the 22 state colleges are almost double those of the current two years, in large part because of a need for "catching up." Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, says that the previous practice of providing money based on past enrollments just won't work. Cash should be provided for the 22 state colleges and the 34 junior colleges on the basis of what their enrollments will be, instead of what they were.

Texaco Inc., will drill the No. 1-1 M. T. Blakeney as a one-mile southeast outpost to the four-well J M (Ellenburger gas) field of extreme southwest Crockett County, 37 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, Exception to Rule No. 37, is 1,700 feet from the south and west lines of 66-Q2-GC&SF. Contract depth is 13,750 feet.

**Right To Work  
Bill For Guam  
On LBJ's Desk**

Washington, D. C. August 29—The Guam Right to Work Committee and the National Right to Work Committee today called on President Johnson to sign the recently enacted Guam Right to Work Act into law.

In a signed ad in a major Washington daily newspaper the two groups said, "Mr. President, recognizing your firm stand in support of Home Rule for the District of Columbia we feel confident that you will apply the same principle in your consideration of the wishes of U. S. Citizens in Guam even though they are 9246 miles away."

"Your decision is awaited with interest by all Americans concerned with the preservation of an important personal freedom. The Right to Work is an individual right, a human right and many people feel an important civil right."

The Guam Right to Work bill was passed on July 12 by the Eighth Guam Legislature by a 14-6 vote over the veto of presidential appointee Manuel Guerrero, Territorial Governor of Guam.

Federal law provides that when the territorial governor's veto is overridden the bill is forwarded to the President of the U. S. and he must do one of three things: sign the bill into law, veto the bill or, if he fails to act

within 90 days, the bill becomes law without his signature.

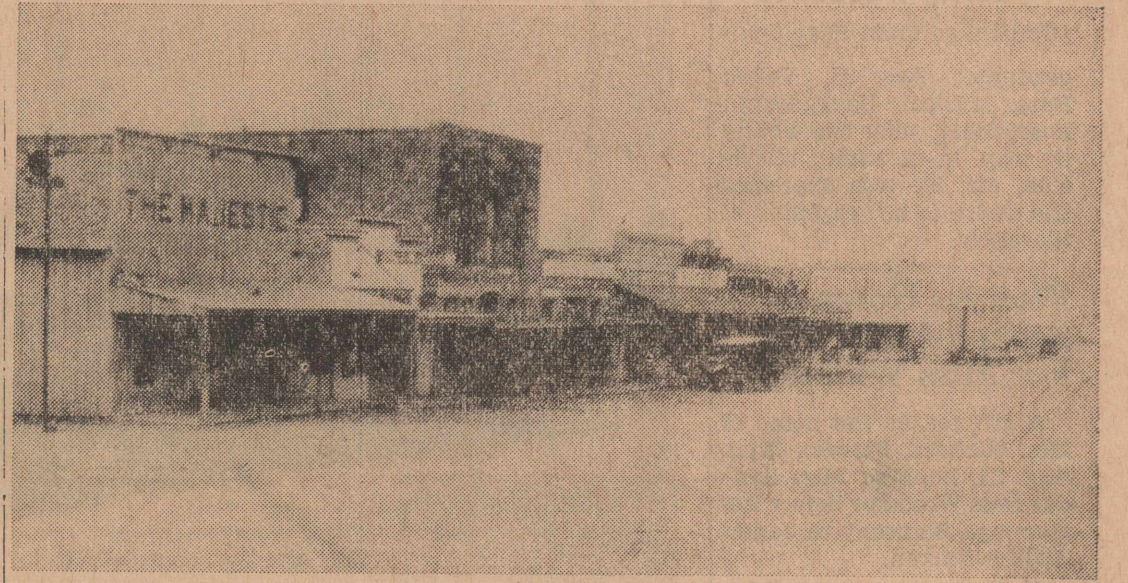
