### MASSIE MEMORIAL — Furnishings And Decor Selected For New Library

A San Angelo interior decorator consulted with school officials last Friday and plans for furnishing the adult reading room in the new library were revealed.

The room will be paneled with walnut and feature a walnut credenza over which oil pictures of Robert and Mary Massie will hang. The room is to be furnished as a memorial to the Massies, the furnishings donated by Clayton and Dow Puckett of Fort Stockton, nephews of Mrs. Massie.

Robert and Mary Massie were Crockett County pioneers. The Puckett brothers, in appreciation for all the Massies had done for them in their youth, asked to furnish the room in their memory several months ago, and the school accepted their generous offer.

The room will be done in a Mediterranean decor featuring colors of tangerine and green. The couch will be upholstered in a nubby fabric of tangerine with the chairs done in leather of the same color. A low lounge chair will be covered in a green and tangerine print on a natural background.

The drapes will be made of natural wool with the two colors woven in to form a design at the hem.

A sculptured two-tone wool carpet will be the floor covering. The reading table, which will be four feet wide and eight feet long, will be made of curly pine from the original Massie home. A side table to balance the room will be made from a carved mantle, it was come from the Massie home.

Miss Mildred North, librarian, says she expects the room to be completed by December 1, and plans to hold open house before the Christmas holidays so that the public may go through the entire building.

### Enrollment Up In Second Week Of School Term

As of this week school enrollment broke last year's record high of 1067 by 7 students, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced this week. The total enrollment stands at 1073 at the present time, 18 students above last week's enrollment figure of 1056.

South Elementary had 318 enrolled last year and has 344 students enrolled as follows this year: kindergarten, 51; 1st grade, 66; 2nd grade, 46; 3rd grade, 42; 4th, 50; 5th, 43 and 6th, 46.

North Elementary has the second highest enrollment with 330 students, by grades as follows; kindergarten, 53; 1st, 40; 2nd, 52; 3rd, 45; 4th, 42; 5th, 45; 6th, 53. Last year's enrollment was 338.

Junior high took a big drop in student enrollment this year. This week's figures show 162 as compared with last year's 180.

High School now has 231 students enrolled as compared with 231 last year. There are 87 students in the 9th, 68 in the 10th, 52 in the 11th and 31 in the 12th.

### Ozona And Area West Favored By Generous Rains

Ozona and a swath of ranch country west to beyond Sheffield enjoyed bountiful rainfall early Sunday morning as a weather front kicked off a line of thunder showers in the area.

Ozona rain fall reached from 1 1/2 to 2 plus inches in different parts of the city and the fall was as spotted over the ranch area covered. Falls up to nearly three inches were reported along the Pecos river in west Crockett county while in-between falls were reported at a 1.5 inches average.

The heavy shower in Ozona, which did not extend far north or east, nevertheless, made both draws flow through the city for a short time. A heavy rain on Ozona's east edge put Gurley draw on a moderate rise with rainfall that fell below the flood control dam located on the Friend ranch.

### Son Of Ozona Couple Cited In Vietnam Action

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Davis recently received word that their son, Pvt. Douglas E. Davis, a member of the armed forces serving in Vietnam, had been awarded the Army Commendation Medal for Heroism.

The communication reads: "For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force: Private First Class Davis distinguished himself by heroic actions on 26 July 1966 in the Republic of Vietnam. On this date, he was operating the 25th Aviation switchboard. During the period of 1920 to 2120 hours, the battalion headquarters was under heavy mortar and recoilless rifle attack.

Olson, who accepted the position last year when Mr. Post asked to be relieved because of ill health, resigned and left the hospital August 31. He is now administrator of the Overall Memorial Hospital in Coleman.

According to Mr. Post, things are pretty slow at the hospital right now with only six patients being cared for there.

There has been no definite word from Dr. Claude Tate, Austin physician who visited Ozona several weeks ago, looking over the prospects of moving his practice here. However, a member of the hospital board spoke to him by telephone earlier this week and he said he was still deliberating.

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NO GUNS FOR WRONG PERSONS

"Quick enactment" of federal gun-control laws has again been urged by President Johnson in the immediate aftermath of a shooting in his home state. The object, so he said, is to "help prevent the wrong persons from obtaining firearms." There's no denying that the wild spree of an apparently demented gunman at Texas University was a grim and sorrowful event. But by what stretch of whose imagination can it therefore be concluded that a federal law covering the sale of rifles, shotguns and handguns would have prevented it, or that passage of such a law now will really prevent similar tragedies in the future?

The primarily emotional character of this new surge of "anti-gun" activity — in other places besides the White House — is demonstrated by both the similarities to and differences from that which followed the assassination of President Kennedy in Mr. Johnson's home state 3 years ago. The chief target, or focal point of the anti-gun crusaders then was "mail-orders" guns. (Remember all those picture and cartoons?) This time the picture is of several weapons and the comments generally stress the fact that the sniper had a veritable arsenal with him; without nearly so much emphasis on how he obtained the weapons. Which really proves, when logic prevails over emotion, that how or from whom a gun is obtained has nothing at all to do with how or to what purpose it will be used.

We realize that from his standpoint as a politician, Mr. Johnson may be quite shrewd in trying to ride the crest of this new wave of anti-gun emotionalism. But we think it demeaning of his present office that he would do so. And as a former member of what has sometimes been called "the greatest deliberative body in the world" (the U. S. Congress), the President surely realizes the dangers to long range national interests and to constitutional government when laws are passed hurriedly in an atmosphere of emotionalism.

NOTED AND PASSED

**Bring Money to Washington:** American Legion National HQ estimated beforehand that \$7,500,000 would be brought to and left in Washington, D. C., by Legionnaires who assembled there for this year's annual convention. No wonder President Johnson gave government employees the afternoon off to watch the Legion parade. Most organized crowds that assemble in our Nation's capital have come to take it away rather than to leave it.

**Crime Doesn't Pay — After Taxes:** The Internal Revenue Service — ever alert for another tax source — has assessed income taxes against a man for money which his wife embezzled from her employer. The man claimed he didn't owe anything because he didn't participate in the theft. The Tax Court ruled against him, however, because he had filed a joint return with his wife. Which is only fair, we suppose, even if it isn't yet full justice. Now if the woman is convicted of theft, there may still be some doubt that her husband should be charged as an accomplice, if he was unaware at the time of filing that his wife's gains were ill-gotten. But no matter how that works out, the IRS is unquestionably a receiver of stolen goods.

**How to Stir up Violence, Peacefully:** Arrange for the taxpayers to provide armed guards to clear the way with clubs or whatever is necessary if residents of a community get in the way when you and your peaceful demonstrators come storming through their neighborhood. If the residents of the chosen community have the good sense and forbearance to ignore your mob, you can usually count on some other professional agitators from elsewhere to show up and help you with a counter-demonstration. One word of caution — always insist on Federal troops or agents to perform that armed guard service; local police and national guardsmen are not generally acceptable. We're not entirely sure why this is the case, but that's the way Martin Luther King does it. And we're not about to see-

ond guess him because he's been awarded a Nobel Peace prize for just this sort of leadership.

**Find the Typhoid Marys:** Attorney General Katzenbach says careful investigation by the Justice Department has proved that the epidemic of riots now plaguing the nation is not caused by Communist, black nationalist or other terrorist agitators, but by a combination of disease and poverty. Perhaps, then Dr. Katzenbach should enlist the help of the Public Health Service to track down which of those well-financed fellows who traveled to those poverty pockets in advance of the outbursts may be carrying this riotous disease.

GUARANTEED DESTRUCTION

Supporters of the idea that the federal government should provide a guaranteed annual personal income are no longer just talkers but full-fledged promoters. A Guaranteed Annual Income Newsletter is now being put out by a group at the University of Chicago. So far, the advocates of a government allowance are campaigning on the premise that it would do away with poverty. They reason that since poverty is essentially caused by the lack of money, giving everyone an income on which to live will help cause poverty to go away.

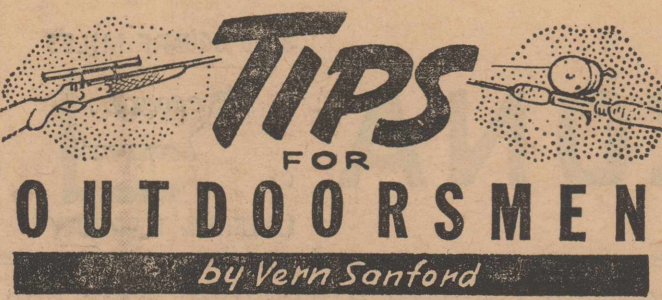
It is one thing to say poverty will go away when everyone is guaranteed a specific income. But, it is quite another thing to overcome the economic reality that it would not work. Those who advance the theories of giving something for nothing overlook one simple fact: the government can only give to the people what it first takes away from the people. And the amount of additional taxes necessary to sustain a guaranteed dole for everyone and the accompanying inflation that would result would be enough to bankrupt the United States. A great many more citizens classed as "poverty stricken" would be the unfortunate by-product of a guaranteed dole as dependency replaced self-reliance in the United States.

History supplies ample proof that no theory has ever provided more moral and material rewards for the poor than is available through U. S. freedom of opportunity.

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**Emergency Ear Plugs —** If you're going to do a lot of shooting on the target range, consider using filter tips off filter cigarettes as ear plug silencers.

**Rubber Bands Hold Boots —** Cut two thick rubber bands out of an innertube. Then slip the bands over your socks in a figure eight around your instep and ankle. You'll find this will prevent boots and waders from slipping off while fishing in mud or when duck hunting.

**Duck Hunter's Delight —** Duck hunters can take a tip from scuba divers and wear neoprene boots and britches under their regular hunting clothes to keep warm and dry.

**Camping Boots —** Don't try to walk mountain trails in the same sort of boots you use when rabbit hunting. Best authorities recommend rugged footwear equipped with vibram lug soles. Ordinary boots are much too soft for such hard wear.

**Underhand Casting —** Underhand casting is of little use to the average angler. It is more of an exhibition stunt. Better concentrate on the usual styles.

**Emergency Gunsight —** Now and then even the best of the hunters will accidentally knock off a rear gunsight. This needn't be a catastrophe if you have an old fishing rod handy. Just take off the guide and tape it in position on your gun.

**Bore Cleaner —** A handy bore cleaner to carry with you can be toted in any small pocket. Take a 4 or 5 foot length of heavy monofilament fishing line, make a knotted loop at one end, insert a rag in the loop and draw tight. A smaller, similar loop at the other end makes a good finger grip.

**Cut Motor Vibration —** Rubber mats between your outboard's motor clamps and the boat's transom cut vibration way down.

Buy a "store-bought" version or cut a piece of a discarded rug.

**Removing Birdshot —** It's not much fun to chomp down on a hidden shot pellet when enjoying a game dinner. The cook can easily prevent such a painful occurrence by inserting a small light bulb in the bird's cavity before cooking. Light enables the cook to quickly locate imbedded shot.

**Clothes Hangers Useful —** Wire clothes hangers serve a myriad of purposes around

camp. Examples: Shaping the hanger to clasp boat gunwale and serve as rodholder. It is a rack for towels, a toilet paper holder, boot hanger, lantern stand, steak grill, or a pot hanger. You can even use 'em to hang clothes on.

**Wrapping the Fishing Rod —** If you want to rewrap your fishing rod, try using your wife's sewing machine.

There is a tension attachment for the thread spool that is exactly the thing to keep rod winding thread under light but steady pressure as you wrap the guides.

**Improvised Pork Rind Strips —** Makeshift pork rind strips for lures can be improvised by cutting white strips from the belly of the bass you caught and preserve them in a saline solution.

**Use for Plastic Bottles —** Don't throw away those plastic containers that detergent comes in. Cooking oil for camp can be put into such a bottle with no fear of breakage or leakage.

**Save Tinfoil Plates —** Those foil plates that TV dinners come in make perfect eating utensils for camp. Once you use them at the campground, you can discard them or save for another trip.

Hugh Huntley bought Jet Top Too for \$37,000.

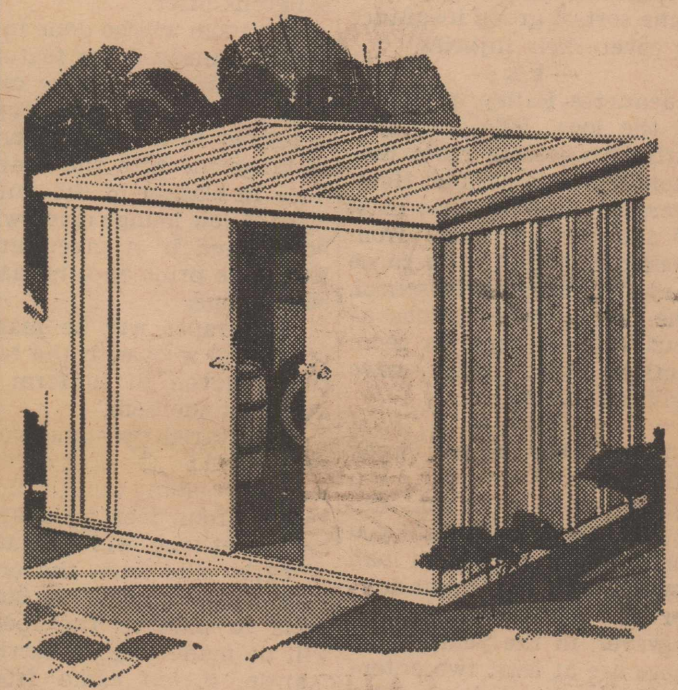

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — It seems that a power struggle between House and Senate leaders on the Legislative Budget Board cost Director Vernon McGee his \$20,000 a year job.

Board is made up of five state senators and five house members. In the past they have fashioned the State budget . . . mainly behind closed doors.

House Speaker Ben Barnes maintains that the budget should be written "on the floor" by the lawmakers and that all committee hearings on it should be open to legislators and the public.

**Millions asked for Buildings** — State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation is seeking \$53,600,000 for new buildings and for expansion of existing facilities during the next biennium.

Money would go to facilities at Abilene, Austin, Denton, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Lubbock, Lufkin, Mexia, Big Spring, Richmond, Kerrville, Rusk, San Antonio, Terrell, Wichita Falls and in the Rio Grande Valley (site of be selected).

**Revenue Split "Barred"** — Staff attorneys for the Texas Legislative Council say a proposal by big-city mayors that municipalities get a share of state tax revenue is unconstitutional.

But municipal officials still are convinced that where there's a will, there's a way to obtain a partial refund of broad-based taxes collected by the state in their boundaries.

Texas Municipal League Director Steve Mathews says he feels "things can be worked out" if the Legislature wants to provide a source of supplemental aid to hard-pressed cities.

**Connally Says No** — Gov. John Connally told Rio Grande Valley farm workers

he will not call a special legislative session to consider a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage act. Connally went to New Braunfels to meet the marchers who were on a 400-mile trek to the Capital for a Labor Day rally.

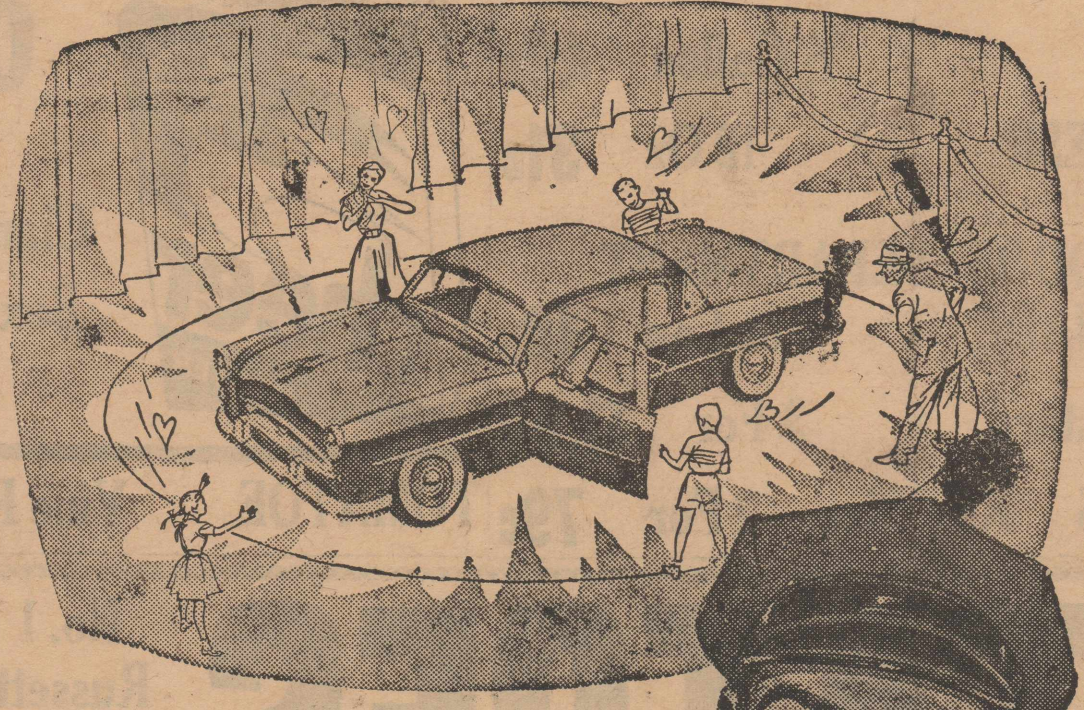

### ACA Sees Trend To Conservatism In Natl. Congress

Washington, D. C.—Changing patterns of voting by Members of Congress, many advancing from liberal orientation toward Conservatism, highlighted the first six months of the present Second Session, 89th Congress, according to unofficial figures released by Americans for Constitutional Action.

The new ACA ratings list the voting records of all Members of both the Senate and the House of Representatives on a wide range of key legislative issues. Simultaneously, this non-partisan national conservative organization, headquartered in Washington, which has issued cumulative voting records for Members of the Senate since 1955 and for House Members since 1957, revealed that its field assistance program to aid se-

lected members of the present Congress and other candidates in 1966 is the strongest in any non-presidential election year in ACA's history.

"Strong currents are running throughout the nation this year for drastic curbs on the Ultra Liberal policies and practices of this Administration," declared Charles A. McManus, Executive Director of ACA.

"The most dramatic political fact of the year is that numerous members of both parties in both Senate and House are establishing voting patterns markedly less Liberal and more Conservative than in the past.

"Conservatism, far from dying as its critics contend, is making striking gains. The current ACA ratings offer conclusive evidence that an aroused and angry electorate — with Goldwater's 27-million-plus voters as a base — is communicating its anger far more effectively to its re-

presentatives in Congress. "A voter revolution unquestionably is in the making. The Liberals of both parties are on the spot this time in the upcoming November elections and many of them are scuttling their old Liberal voting records to present a somewhat different and improved image.

"A number of the Liberal losses undoubtedly will be among the 83 Freshmen in the House, many of whom came in on the Goldwater defeat. Actually, 62 of these 83 Freshmen improved their ACA ratings to some extent, some of them quite sharply upward, in contrast with their 1st session ratings.

"Mounting Conservative strength, and the disenchantment of countless in-

dependents now confront a frightened and sharply divided Liberal coalition."

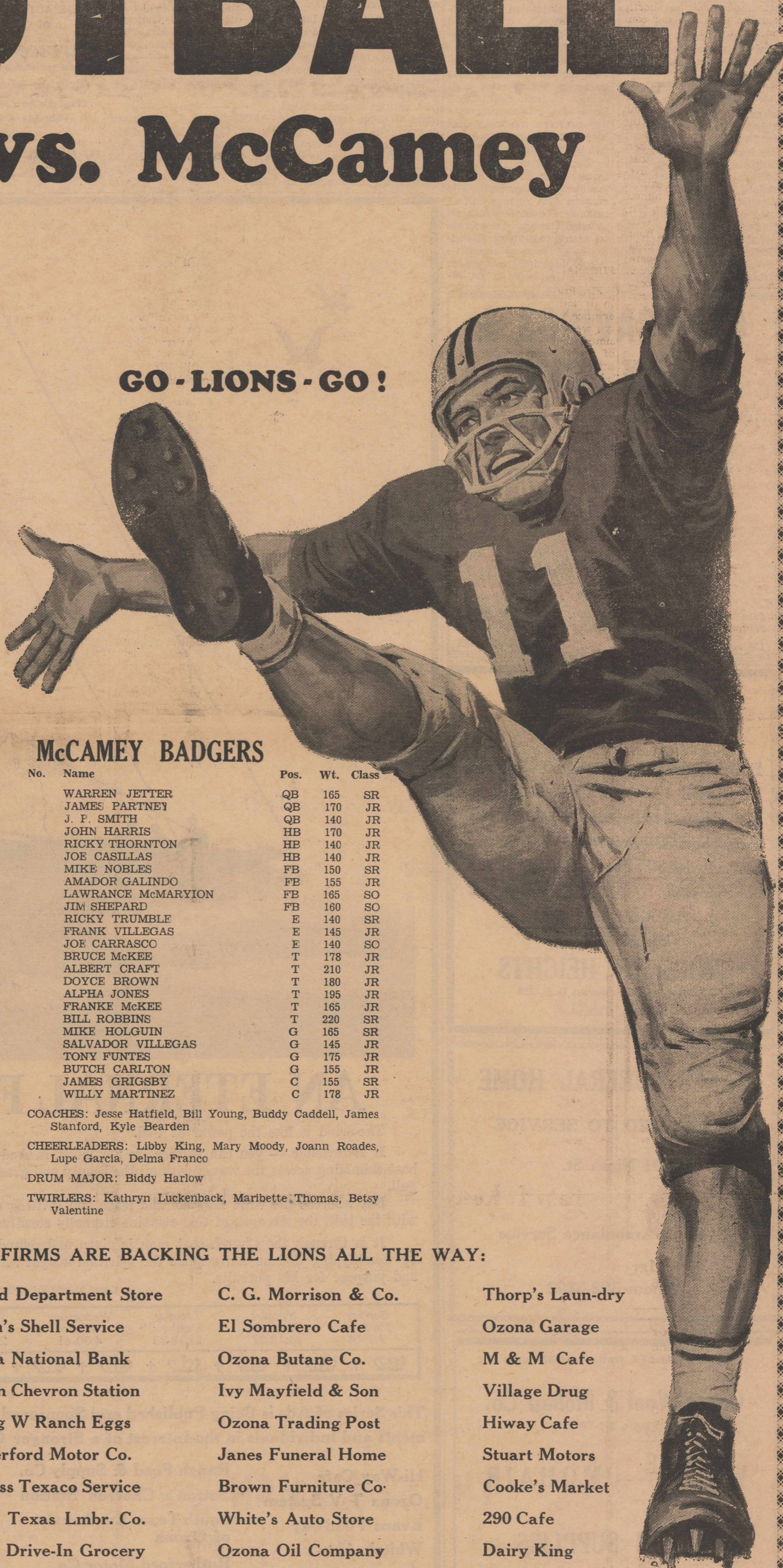

In the Chicago disaster, fire killed 250 persons and left 2,100 acres in smoldering ruins, destroying 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168,000,000.

### TOWER UPHOLDS RIGHT TO BEAR ARMS (Weekly Report)

By Senator John Towers

No well-meaning person could fail to have been moved by the tragedy which took place several weeks ago in the capital city of our state. Men of good will over the entire nation were shocked and deeply saddened by the terrible misfortune in Austin, and many persons were spurred by the incident to consideration of ways to try to stay a repetition of the tragedy.

I am concerned, however, that there is danger that in our very worthy desire to avoid a repetition of this and other criminal tragedies we will strike not at the root and cause of the calamity but at a single secondary attribute: the weapon involved.

It has been truly said that guns do not kill people, criminals do.

We all are aware of the serious problem of the increase in violent crimes in the United States. I am sure that every one of us has at one time or another been troubled by current crime statistics and that we each have sought an answer to the problem of mounting violence. But, I submit that the long-run solution to the problem lies in increased assistance to and improved facilities for law enforcement officers; in objective, effective programs of research into the nature of mental health; and of identification of mental diseases, especially criminally-oriented disorders, and of possible treatments.

I do not believe in legislation which would, in effect, punish those law-abiding members of our society who want to purchase, own and use guns for sport. Their actions are blameless. It is unfair and it is folly to deny them their rights to purchase and use firearms.

If we are to pass federal

legislation aimed at curtailing the distribution of firearms, I could support specific legislation aimed at keeping firearms from the possession of felons and minors.

I think this is as far as we can justifiably go in this direction at the federal level. I oppose all proposed legislation which would impede the sale and distribution of firearms for sporting purposes. I believe the states are better judges of their requirements than the federal government.

Americans have a constitutional guarantee which we must fully observe in considering this legislation. I will not support, and I hope the Senate does not see fit to enact, legislation which would abridge the right of the people to keep and bear arms.

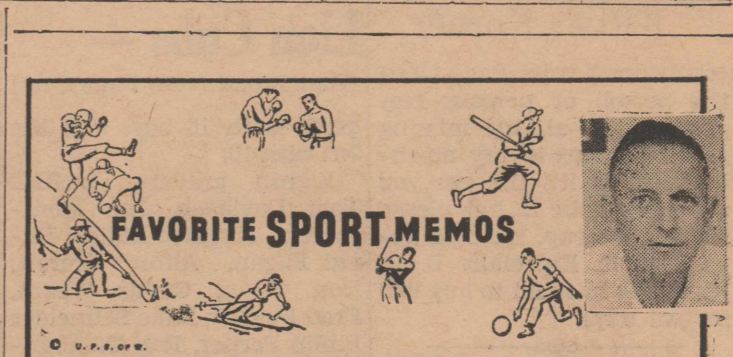

Mrs. Al Mills read the Club Woman's Resolve. Mrs. Will O. Mills won the door prize, and the club adjourned with the club prayer.

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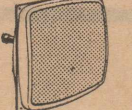


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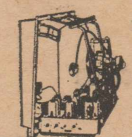
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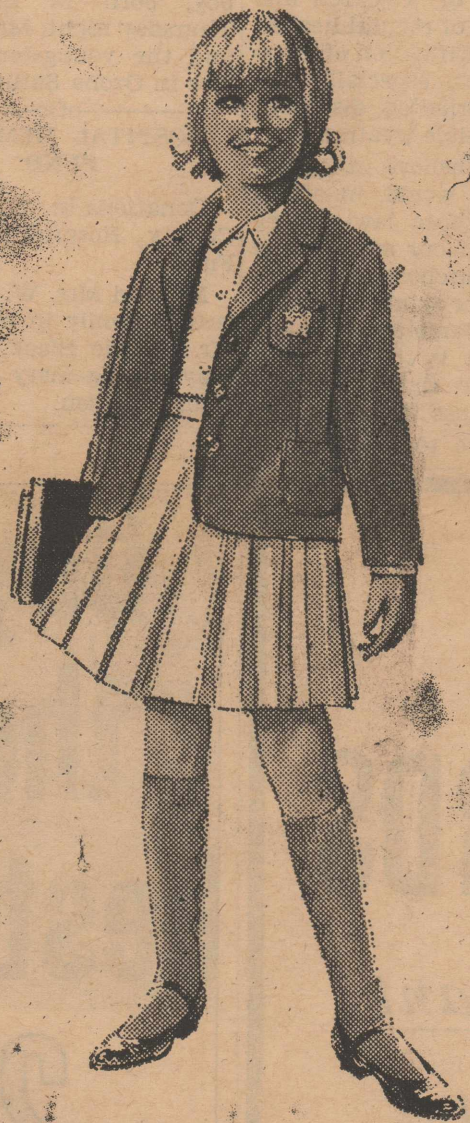
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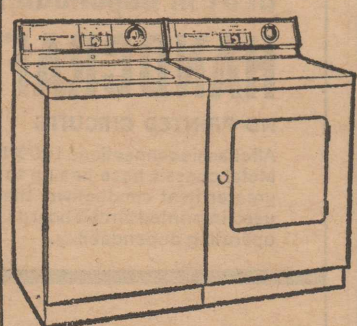
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
