There is no cost to register, although an application for the certificate must be made giving name, address, age, birthplace, information about citizenship, occupation and residency status. The application must then be turned in at the tax office and a voter registration certificate will be issued if applicant is eligible.

If applicant has resided in state for more than one year, or the county or city for more than six months, a statement of the year in which such residency began shall be sufficient. In lieu of the dates on which residency began, applicant may show the length of residency in the state, county or city; the month, day and year on gram, the group will adjourn which residency began must be shown if the period reora fire station. 




